### Draper Handed Down Seven Year Sentence

In Judge Ben Charlie Chapman's 39th District Court, last Thursday, Louis Draper, of Lubbock, pled guilty to burglary of Hunter Men's Wear, Haskell, on December 3, 1970, and was handed down a seven year sentence in the Texas Department of Corrections.

District Attorney, Royce Adkins, was the prosecutor, and Dennis P. Ratliff, by court appointment, represented Draper. Draper was billed by the 39th District Grand Jury on January 4, 1971.

Some \$10,000 in men's clothing was taken, plus a small amount of cash in the December burglary.

**Tax Questions And Answers**

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Last year my husband won \$50 in a photography contest. Must he report this as income on his tax return?

A) Yes. If you win a prize in any contest, such as a raffle, beauty contest, door prize, and the like, the prize is taxable. Taxpayers should also remember that prizes and awards given in goods or services must be included in income at their fair market value. Of course, if you refuse to accept a prize, it is not included in your income. An award or bonus given employees for their achievements in work or for adopted suggestions is also taxable.

Q—My teenage son earned enough money in 1970 to owe tax. Does that mean I will lose my exemption for him?

A—Not necessarily. As long as your son is a full-time student at least five months of the year or was under 19 at year end, the amount of his earnings will not affect his dependency status. However, the other dependency tests, support for instance, must be met.

Q—What tax rate should I use when I report my maid's wages for the fourth quarter?

A—The combined rate is 9.6 percent, 4.8 percent each for employer and employee, and should be used when filing your Form 942, Quarterly Report on Household Employees, for the months of October, November and December. The deadline for filing and paying the tax is February 1, 1971.

Note that the rate goes up effective January 1, 1971 from 4.8 percent to 5.2 percent for both employers and employees.

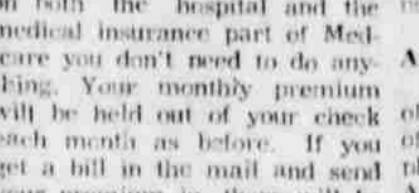

it in a highly emotional appeal. All in all, emotionalism and propagandism seem to characterize too much of the discussion of what to hunt, where to hunt and whether to hunt. There are those who contend further that Americans no longer 'need' to hunt. There are those who contend further that Americans no longer 'need' to own firearms.

In many public discussions one question appears to lead, sometimes spontaneously and sometimes almost too neatly and readily, into another: Should we hunt? Should we own firearms?

There is already afoot a movement which would divide firearms ownership by passing laws directed against handguns, but not rifles and shotguns. The anti-hunting movement might tend to split apart hunters and other gun owners. We need unity in improving the world around us. We need unity in working out the best game management methods to preserve both wildlife and sport hunting. We also, emphatically, need unity in the ranks of American firearms owners on movements affecting firearms. To quote old Ben Franklin, either we hang together or we hang separately.

# President Nixon's Economic Report

The Recent Economic Report of the President barely gives recognition to the Agricultural Sector of our Nation

### WHAT IS THE ADMINISTRATION FOR?

The Administration's views in regard to the state of the farm economy are missing from the report.

The Administration seems willing to concede, in speeches at least, that all is not well on our farms and in our rural communities.

In mid-December, for example, the President said:

"The Nation owes American agriculture a very great debt, a very great debt which perhaps has not been adequately reflected in agriculture income."

We, of course, agree with the President and would hope that his Council of Economic Advisors understands the problem of inadequate farm income and diminishing opportunity in rural America.

Just over 2 years ago, when President Nixon was campaigning for the Presidency, he called 74 percent of parity "intolerable" for farmers and said they were "entitled to better." Again, of course, we agree with the President. It is not clear why a more detailed report on the state of the farm economy was excluded from the Economic Report of the President in view of these comments. But since such a report was left out and since the President has not sent any agricultural message to Congress since he has been in office, we, in Farmers Union, will make such a report for the hearing record.

### Prices Received and Prices Paid

In January 1971, the index of prices received by farmers (base period: 1910-14) was 271. The average index of prices received by farmers in the period 1947-49 was 271. No change in more than twenty years occurred in farmer's prices, but retail food prices over the same period has increased 56.7 percent.

In January 1971, the index of prices paid by farmers (base period: 1910-14) was 399. The average index in 1970 was 399; in 1969, the index was 373; and in the period 1947-49 the index of prices paid was 250. There has been no change in the index of prices received since 1947-49 but the index of prices paid since that period has increased 59.6 percent.

In the 1947-49 period, the parity ratio was 108 (base period: 1910-14). In January 1971 it was 68-unadjusted. Adjusted to include payments, it was only 72. As one can see, the increasing costs of production on farms have not been accompanied by increases in prices received by farmers.

The Above statement is a very small portion of the Report Farmers Union will make for the hearing record!

### Federal Land Bank To Reduce Interest Rate

Joe Harper, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7 1/2%. "This reduction will be effective on installments maturing on or after June 1, 1971 and affects more than \$110 million in variable rate loans to over 3200 Texas farmers and ranchers," Harper stated.

The variable rate loan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the second time since January 1 that the billing rate has been reduced and the third such reduction in the past year. "This action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices," Harper stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. The Bank has over \$540 million in volume of loans outstanding. ## Soil, Water Conservation Booklet Now Available At The SCS Office

A new booklet outlining broad phases of conservation work underway in Texas is now available from the Soil Conservation Service, a local conservation leader said this week.

District Conservationist J. C. Yeary of the Haskell Soil Conservation Service office said the new booklet "Soil and Water Conservation in Texas" tells how SCS programs are helping Texans conserve, develop and protect the state's soil, water, plant and wildlife resources.

"The booklet is a must for the conservation teacher, urban consumer, agricultural leader or businessman honestly interested in the conservation thrust being made in Texas," Yeary said. "It is a concise, simply written, profusely illustrated booklet which tells the conservation story as it is—a non-spectacular, continuous, difficult job of trying to intelligently manage our state's renewable natural resources."

The publication describes SCS soil surveys and tells how they are used by cities, planners, farmers, contractors. It tells how conservation reduces pollution and enhances environmental quality. It also describes resource planning help available from SCS. Other programs explained include the search for improved conservation plants for livestock and wildlife; the Great Plains Conservation Program; efforts to help multi-county areas speed up resource programs; and upstream watershed protection projects.

Yeary said conservation work is coordinated through local soil and water conservation districts. In the Haskell County area, the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts are the action groups through which conservation work is directed.

W. L. "Kool" Ballard of Rochester and Tiffen R. Mayfield of Weimer are the district directors for the Wichita-Brazos SWCD covering the north half of Haskell County, while Elmer Boedeker of Sagerton and R. V. Earles of Paint Creek are the district directors for the California Creek SWCD covering the south half of the county.

The booklet points out, however, that cooperation of state and federal agencies, cities, counties, conservation organizations, civic groups and others is the key to getting the job done. Yeary said that in Haskell County, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration and the Haskell County Commissioners Court have been most helpful in getting conservation work done in the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Single copies of the booklet "Soil and Water Conservation in Texas" are available free from the Soil Conservation Service office in Haskell.
