City Office To Close Saturdays

The City Council met in regular session May 9, with the following members present: Mayor Roy Jones; Aldermen Billy Skipper, Jim Bob Smith, Ralph Wolf, Royce Henson, L. G. Deering and City Manager Bob Sokoll.

The first item on the agenda was the appointment of a Board of Equalization, H. L. Howard, W. A. Scott and Kenneth Jones were appointed to this Board.

The Council agreed to close the City Hall and discontinue City services, except those of an emergency nature, on Saturday mornings, beginning June 1, 1966. Water and Street Department employees will begin working a nine hour day, the City Hall will stay open thru the noon hour and the Police Department employees' hours will remain the same.

Other matters considered by the Council were that of amending the City Personnel Policy, renewing the Fire Fighting Contract with Hale County under the same conditions as last year; and listening to City Manager Reports on the Monthly Financial Statement, Airport, Civil Defense and Airport Wells.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

Carriers Distribute Cards Here

Postmaster Herman Lambert reminds rural patrons of the Abernathy Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Lambert explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: J. D. Webb, Route 1; Jack Hacker, Route 2.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Lambert concludes.

RAFB Plans For Armed Forces Day

Reese Air Force Base again this year will be the focal point for the May 21 observance of Armed Forces Day on the South Plains.

An open house will be held from 12 noon to 5 p.m., with emphasis on the undergraduate pilot training program at Reese. South Plains residents are invited to sit in on classes for students and all areas of the base will be open to the public.

Various aircraft will be on display on the flight line, there will be fly-overs and numerous displays by the Army, Navy, Marines, National Guard and other military organizations. Civic organizations are joining the military in preparing the program.

Reese almost continually since 1942 has been training pilots for all commands of the U.S. Air Force and has turned out almost 18,000 highly qualified pilots.

"On Armed Forces Day for 1966 we are extremely hopeful that South Plains residents will take a close look at our training program," Brig. Gen. Dudley E. Faver, wing commander, commented.

During the afternoon of May 21, student pilots will be flying regular training missions so the public will be able to thoroughly understand how a pilot is trained. Academic classes will be held and other training phases will be carried on as usual, with the public invited to see any and all.

"Power for Peace" is the theme of Armed Forces Day throughout the Nation and all installations will have open houses, with the public invited. Project officer at Reese is Lt. Col. Don E. Simmons, Student Squadron commander.

Thousands of visitors have flocked to Reese annually for Armed Forces Day and roads surrounding the base have been clogged for periods with traffic. Reese officials expect the same situation this year, Colonel Simmons stated.

Accident Report For April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 23 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of April according to Sergeant Thurman Ketter, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, eleven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$17,265.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1966 shows a total of 74 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 40 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$74,290.00.

"Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, who is Chairman of the Federal Savings Bonds Campaign, has appealed to the 930,000 Americans who have \$285,000,000 on deposit with the Post Office Department to convert their investments into United States Savings Bonds," Mr. Lambert stated.

"I join him in urging local citizens who have Postal Savings Accounts to make that change which will be of great benefit to both themselves and our country. Savings Bonds offer every advantage of convenience and security formerly available through Postal Savings Certificates plus many other advantages unique to Savings Bonds."

Among those special advantages, the Abernathy Postmaster said, are Savings Bonds' new, higher interest rate of 4.15 per cent and "the great intangible benefit of supporting our country in the fight for freedom in the world and for economic progress and security here at home."

Mr. Lambert said details about the procedure for conversion can be obtained from the postmaster of any Postal Savings Depository Post Office (which includes Abernathy.)

The Postal Savings System, in operation since January 1, 1911, was discontinued April 27, 1966, by Act of Congress. The Post Office Department presently is liquidating its accounts and on July 1, 1967, will transfer all unclaimed as-

OIL CONTRIBUTES TO HALE ECONOMY

Oil and natural gas produced in Hale County contribute to the economy in general, and pay a considerable portion of the total school taxes. Hale County has produced 34.8 million barrels of crude oil since 1946. The original well that started the Anton-Irish Field in Southwest Hale County still is in production. The discovery well is a mile north of County Line on the Irish farm.

The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Hale County produced more than 1.9 million barrels of crude oil valued at \$5.7 million; and 1.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$193,000 for that year. The 1965 output was approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.


