Postmaster Herman Lamberty reminds rural patrons of the Abernathy Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Lambert explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are: J. D. Webb, Route 1; Jack Hackler, Route 2. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician,

in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decision," Mr. Lambert concludes.



Accident Report For April

These crashes resulted in one person killed, eleven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$17,265.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1966 shows a total of 74 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 40 persons inured, and an estimated property damage of \$74,290.00.

Savings Bonds Purchase Is

Urged By PM

Postmaster Herman Lambert today urged local citizens who have funds on deposit in the abolished Postal Savings System to convert their hold-

"Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, who is Chair-man of the Federal Savings Bonds Campaign, has appealed to the 930,000 Americans who have \$285,000,000 on deposit with the Post Office Department to convert their investments into United States Savings Bonds," Mr. Lambert stated.

"I join him in urging local citizens who have Postal Savings Accounts to make that change which will be of great benefit to both themselves and our country. Savings Bonds offer every advantage of con-venience and security formerly available through Postal Savings Certificates plus many other advantages unique to Savings Bonds."

Among those special advantages, the Abernathy Postmaster said, are Savings Bonds' new, higher interest rate of 4.15 per cent and "the great intangible benefit of supporting our country in the fight for freedom in the world and for economic progress and security here at home."

Mr. Lambert said details about the procedure for conversion can be obtained from the postmaster of any Postal Savings Depository Post Office (which includes Abernathy.)

The Postal Savings System, in operation since January 1. 1911, was discontinued April 27, 1966, by Act of Congress. The Post Office Department presently is liquidating its accounts and on July 1, 1967, will transfer all unclaimed assets of the System to the Trea-

sury Department. The decision to abolish the Postal Savings System was made because of declining interest in it by the general public as a savings and investment medium. Higher interest rates paid by financial institutions and other means of intestment had attracted the bulk of funds which formerly went into Postal Savings and the convenience factor was negated by expanded hours of service by banks.

The original purposes of the Postal Savings System were to (1) get money out of hiding, (2) attract the savings of im! grants who were accustomed to saving at post offices in their native countries, (3) provide safe depositories for people who had lost confidence in private banks and (4) provide more convenient depositories for savings of working people who were unable to bank dur-

ing regular banking hours. "Those purposes have long since been fulfilled," Postmaster Lambert commented, "and, as Mr. O'Brien has emphasized, no greater new purpose could now be served by funds on deposit in the Postal Savings System than to put them to work for America in the form of United States Savings Bonds."

Wins Trip To Mexico

George W. Ragland, longtime area resident, and a former Abernathy postmaster and rural route one letter carrier, has won an expense-paid four-day vacation for himself and his wife in Acapulco, Mexico. They

will leave here by jet June 3. The trip was awarded Ragland for placing well over onehalf million dollars of business for the insurance company he represents since Jan. 1, 1966.

TO HALE ECONOMY Oil and natural gas produced in Hale County contribute to the economy in general, and pay a considerable portion of the total school taxes. Hale County has produced 34.8 million barrels of crude oil since 1946. The original well that started the Anton-Irish Field in Southwest Hale County still is in

production. The discovery well is a mile north of County Line

on the Irish farm. The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Hale County produced more than 1.9 million barrels of crude oil valued at \$5.7 million; and 1.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$193,000 for that year. The 1965 output was approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.


