

There are more than 250 of these individuals, and this is the first time in history that such a special recognition dinner has been held in Texas.

John Ben Shepperd of Odes-sa, president of the West Texas Chamber, will focus attention of the entire WTCC leadership on his newly-formulated Potentials for Progress at the Pampa meeting. For two months now, hundreds of WTCC leaders, Texas experts and community leaders have helped the West Texas Chamber formulate the growth potentials through a series of idea and planning sessions, followed by another series of Directors' Action Forums. Ideas and recommendations have been examined and re-examined, then incorpora-ted into the new program of work for the organization. It will get its final scrutiny at the Pampa meeting.
