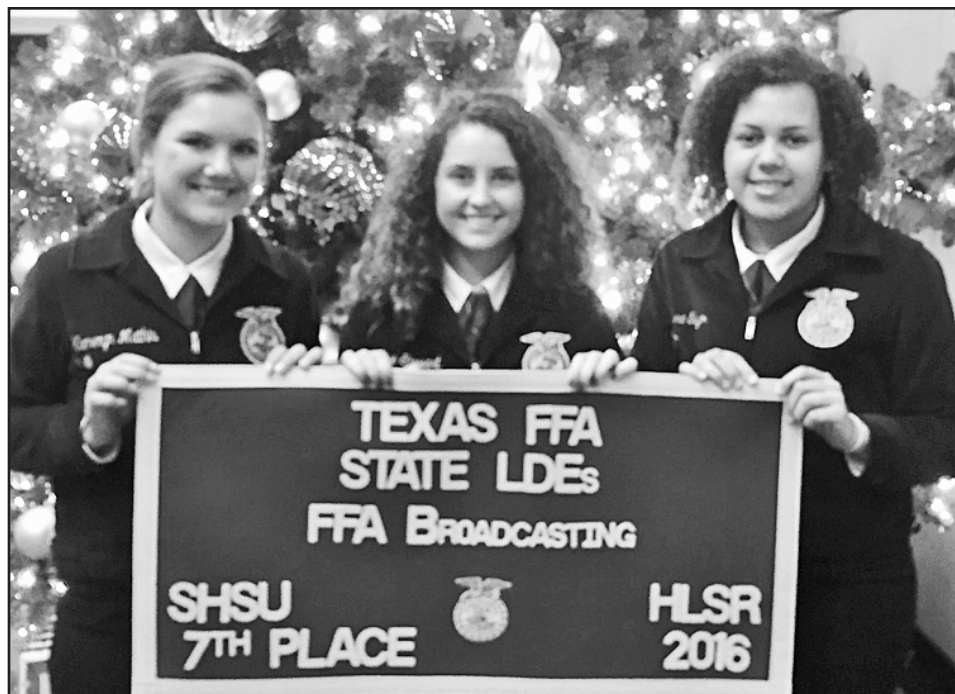

Kellen Parks, a senior wide receiver, was named to the First Team Offense, while Indian quarterback senior Alec Roewe was listed on the Second Team Offense.

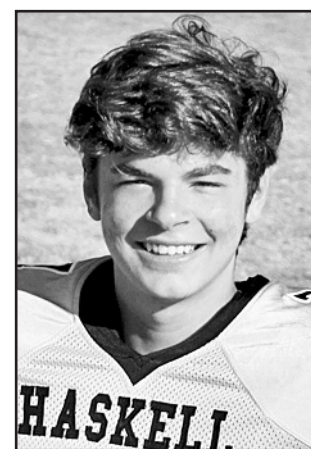
Also named to the Second Team Offense was senior Hayden Leach as an outside linebacker.

They were able to present the family almost \$1700 through the generosity of this community. A fund has been set up for the family at First Bank Texas in Abilene. Tuesday night at the game, members of the Haskell NHS introduced themselves to the

Eula High School Principal, Mrs. Smith, and then loaded all the donated items into her vehicle to be delivered to the family.

Brenda Sayre, whose home burned, called the Haskell High School in tears to express her gratefulness for this unexpected gift.

This is not the first time school organizations have worked to help those in need from other schools and towns. What an important lesson of compassion toward others, for both students and adults alike, this is.

In spite of the negative news we often hear, there are good people all over the country, and Haskell County seems to have gotten an extra large number of them. Thank you to all who had a part in this project.

District 3 4-H Food Challenge Contest Champions

The District 3 4-H Food Challenge Contest was held Wed., Nov. 30 in Jacksboro.

This 4-H Foods & Nutrition project contest requires that a team of three to five members prepare a food dish from certain ingredients that they receive and plan a presentation and clean up

within a 40 minute time frame.

Teams are randomly assigned to four food categories: Main Dish, Fruits and Vegetables, Breads and Cereals, and Nutritious Snacks. Assignments are not announced until check-in the day of the contest. Each team must bring their own equipment box with an approved supply list. The team is required to give a five minute presentation to a panel of judges including key nutrients in their dish and their functions in the recipe and in the body, Myplate.gov knowledge, food safety and cost analysis.

Updates from the DCOH, Chamber and KHB

Recently, our regional organization, Texas Midwest Community Network, put me on to an amazing opportunity for Haskell. It was a grant for \$500,000 to be used to revitalize our downtown and the small businesses in the community. It was part of a program called the "Small Business Revolution." It was the brain child of Deluxe, originally a check printing company, but now a full suite of small business services and marketing tools.

In 2016, Deluxe introduced the "Small Business Revolution on Main Street," which will award a \$500,000 makeover to one small town. Two finalists will vie for the chance to win half a million dollars worth of services and support. The winning town's transformation will be featured in an online show debuting Fall 2016 at smallbusinessrevolution.org.

The competition was stiff with 14,000 applicants applying. Unfortunately, Haskell was not in the top 8 communities who will be featured in the video series; however, Haskell did get a second nod and a request for "additional information." That was an honor and it allowed us to showcase more of the rich history of Haskell.

The final eight communities chosen were Marietta, Ohio, Wooldand Park, Colorado, Georgetown, South Carolina, Frostburg, Maryland, Red Wing, Minnesota, Kingsburg California, North Adams, Massachusetts and Bristol Borough, Pennsylvania. These communities will be featured in an 8-episode online series, and in February 2017 the public will get to choose which town receives the grant.

Last year's winner was Wabash, Indiana. Here is what the producers had to say:

"We spent the summer in the town of Wabash, Indiana, winner of the 2016 Small Business Revolution Main Street campaign. We not only invested \$500,000 into the community, we got to work side-by-side with small business owners and community leaders to help Wabash fulfill its potential. In this eight-episode original series, we tell the story of this small town and its tireless work to survive and thrive against the odds."

As you can see, it would have been a huge honor to be chosen. We will try again next year. For

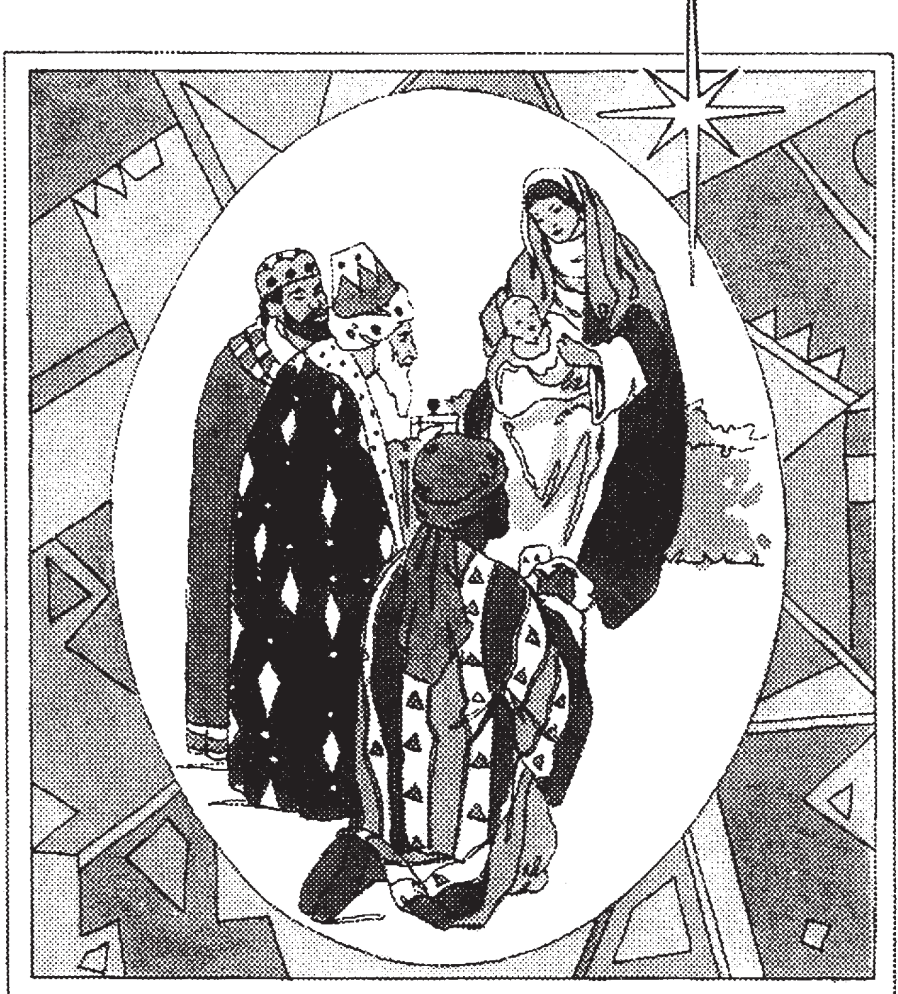

Maidens' basketball

Maidens capture 12th ranked Lady Pirates
Haskell outscored 12th ranked Eula 23-16 the first half and extended the lead in the second half to get the 49-37 win Tuesday night, Nov. 29 at home in front of a great non-district crowd. Haskell moves to 3-2 on the season and Eula falls to 7-3. The Maidens were led by sophomore Taylor Manske who recorded her first double-double for the season finishing with 17 points and 14 rebounds.

Freshman Landry Hanson had 9 points followed by Ariel Martinez with 6, Courtney Whitt 6, C'Era Taylor 5, Jordan Garvin 3, Makinzie Garvin 2 and Ashlyn Bevel 1. Haskell was (16-54) for 29% from the field, (3-19) for 15% from three point land, and a season high (14-21) for 66% from the free-throw line. Leading the team in assists were Manske and Hanson with 2 each.

"Offensively, the girls did a great job executing our man offenses, quick hitters, and secondary fastbreak for it to be this early in the season. We did not shoot the ball up to our potential, but we generated almost 50 points and that will usually be enough for us to win," head coach Blake Eddleman said.

Haskell won the rebound battle over Eula 36-15. Leading the team in rebounds was Manske with 14, Hanson 6, C. Taylor 6, Hadaway 3, and J. Garvin 3. C. Taylor and J. Garvin had a team high 2 steals. "Defensively, we did not get the job done and we must improve if we want to beat some of the teams that we are going to face over the next couple of weeks. We showed a lack of discipline on defense throughout the entire game

individually and collectively. That led to Eula shooting 41 free-throws. That will get you beat most of the time," Eddleman said.

"Overall, it was a good non-district win over a traditionally strong basketball school. We did a lot of good things for the most part. We just need to do a better job of playing tough man to man defense without fouling. That being said, I was really proud of our effort and determination. We have a tough team again this year and that goes a long way in this sport. They are fun to coach and a joy to watch play with one another," Eddleman added.

The JV Maidens handed Eula JV their first loss of the year by beating them 40-25. Coach Melissa Burson and the JV Maidens move to 10-0 and remain undefeated on the year.

Haskell outscored Whitedeer 27-13 in the second half to help get the 46-28 win last Thurs., Dec. 1 to open up the Clay County Classic Basketball Tournament. The Maidens improved their overall record to 4-2 on the season.

Haskell was led by senior Ashlyn Bevel with 17 points and sophomore Taylor Manske with 12 points. Other leading scorers were Hollyn Hadaway with 4, Ariel Martinez 3, Courtney Whitt 3, Landry Hanson 3, Jordan Garvin 2 and Makinzie Garvin

2. Leading the team in assists was Bevel with 4.

The Maidens shot (16-39) for 41% from the field, (4-11) for 36% from three point land, and (10-16) for 62% from the free-throw line. "Offensively, we did a good job sharing the ball and we shot the ball well," head coach Blake Eddleman said.

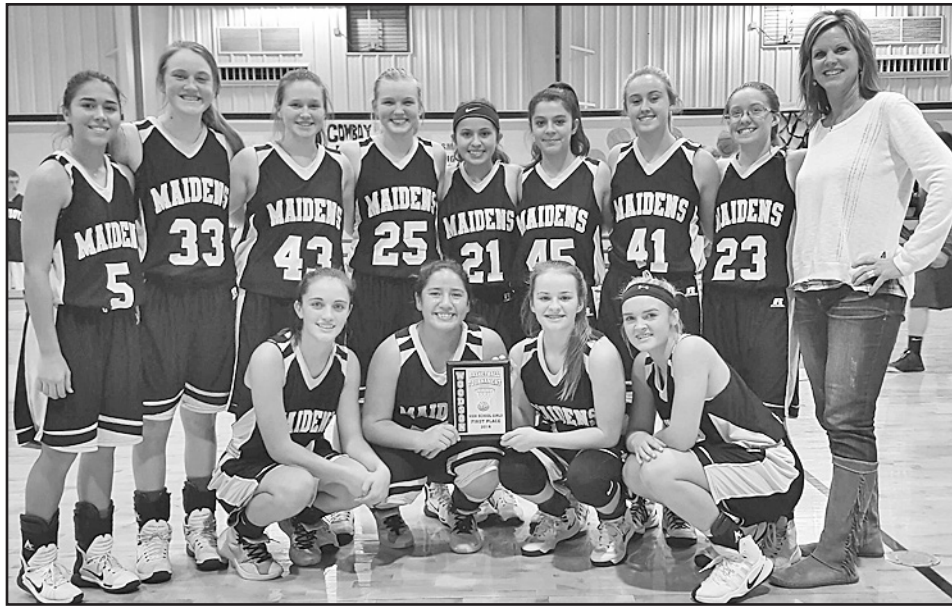

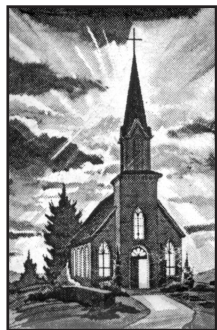

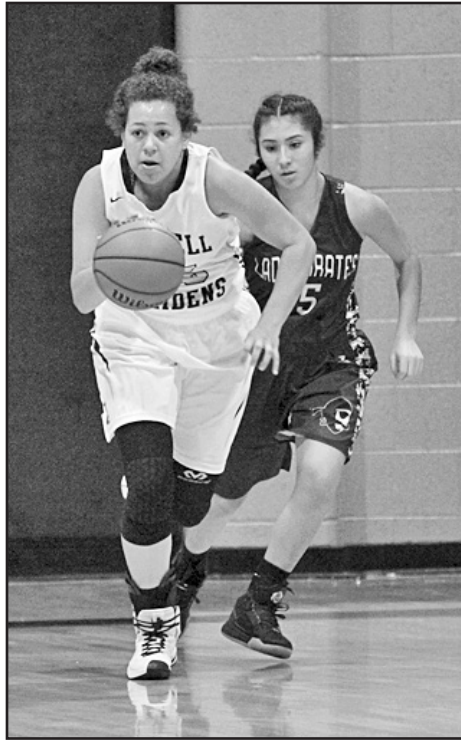
