



## City; School Trustee Election April 3

Haskell Countians will go to the polls Saturday, April 3rd, to cast their ballots in city and school trustee elections.

**HASKELL City Election**  
Uncontested race, two councilmen are to be elected, with only two names on the ballot: W. O. (Bill) Holden and Lorraine Johnson. Holden is seeking re-election and Johnson is running for his first term.

**ROCHESTER City Election**  
A mayor and two councilmen to be elected. Alton Byrd is seeking re-election for the mayor's post. E. K. Acree and James Reed are up for re-election for councilmen. Uncontested race.

**RULE City Election**  
A dual election faces voters at Rule, at which time qualified voters will decide FOR or AGAINST the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

**WEINERT City Election**  
J. E. Jetton is seeking re-

election as mayor, unopposed. Two councilmen will be elected and only two names appear on the ballot: Lester Hutchinson and Melvin Vojtkurka.

**O'BRIEN City Election**  
An uncontested race faces voters at O'Brien. L. A. Covey is seeking re-election for Mayor. Charles Cassillas and Don Whitley are seeking seats on the council.

**Carney R.H.S. District 704**  
Two trustees to be elected for three-year terms. Seeking seats on the board for three-year terms are J. M. Emerson and Claudale Varnard. One trustee to be elected for one year term, and J. O. Brothers is running for that place.

## Restrictions On Texas Swine

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Acting Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission today ordered a restriction on swine movements in Texas in order to bring the present hog cholera situation under control. This restriction is imposed to implement a quarantine order signed by Joe B. Finley, Jr., Chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission on March 22, 1971.

**Paint Creek R.H.S. District 49**

**Haskell Independent School District**  
In the Haskell Independent School Trustee election five names, Leonard Weis, Raymond Andrada, Abe Turner, Charles McCauley and Cleatus Drinnon, appear on the ballot, with four to be elected.

Effective March 29, 1971, the movement of all feeder and breeder swine within Texas will be allowed only by permit issued after inspection of the herd from which they originate.

Special permission from the Texas Animal Health Commission must be obtained for exhibitions, shows and special feeder and breeder sales. Restrictive sanitation requirements at such points of swine concentration should minimize exposure to hog cholera.

**Weinert R.H.S. District 706**  
There is no opposition in the school trustee election at Weinert. Three board members will be elected, with three names

McCauley and Turner are running for three-year terms; Leonard Weis, a two-year term; Andrada and Drinnon one year term.

Under the restriction, slaughter swine may be consigned directly to livestock markets for sale to slaughter or directly to slaughtering establishments.

Prior inspection and permit for movement is required for any farm to farm movement of swine. Permits for movement may be obtained by contacting a representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission or a County Agricultural Extension Agent.

Department of Transportation regulations farm truck driver qualifications WILL BECOME EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1971—unless we can convince the Department of Transportation that its proposed regulations are totally illogical and apply to agriculture. Proposed regulations would include the requirements for drivers of farm trucks: (includes pickups)

- (1.) Be at least 21 years of age.
  - (2.) Carry a certificate of a physician during the preceding 24 months, evidencing drive a truck.
  - (3.) Pass a road test in truck operation.
  - (4.) pass an examination on the federal Motor Vehicle Safety Act.
  - (5.) If the driver is an employee of a farmer, he must supply evidence of compliance with the four preceding regulations plus an application for employment which shall disclose conditions and disposition thereof, plus an annual supplementary relating to traffic violations.
  - (6.) A farmer who employs would be required to "verify" the driver's driving record maintain for each driver a file containing items 1-5 above in order of the employer's verification of the employee's driving.
- To be successful in this attempt to stop adoption of these regulations many letters need to be written. These letters should show your farm and ranch operation would be affected if these regulations are adopted. Your letter should request that present regulations for farm trucks be retained.

Request that our Senators and Congressmen intervene with the Secretary of Transportation to retain present regulations. It is very important that letters about this matter be mailed April 8th. They should go to the following:

**OUTDOORS -IN- TEXAS**

By Vera Sanford

Sometimes crappie can be the easiest of all fish to catch. And sometimes the most difficult!

They are easy to catch only because they roam in schools. Once you pinpoint a concentration of crappies you can anchor at the spot and quite often fill a stringer with these tasties.

Finding the school is, of course, your problem. And, unless you are fishing where the fish are, you aren't likely to catch any.

Schools of crappies are scattered and unless a person is fortunate enough to be at a spot where they gather, he will find that catching one is next to impossible.

Crappies prefer to linger around some underwater obstruction; a sunken tree, a large boulder, or a clump of brush.

Some fishermen create their own crappie-fishing hotspots by cutting brush (cedar is good), tying it together and anchoring it in deep water. The depth where you'll find crappie varies from lake to lake, but in our large reservoirs you'll usually locate them in about 10 to 30 feet of water.

In the spring they'll move along the shoreline to spawn. Then you can catch dozens of them in the shallows. But most of the time they'll be near the bottom in deep water.

Here are some suggestions offered by accomplished crappie fishermen:

When crappies are in a cooperative mood, they'll usually bite in a hurry. Never spend more than 15 or 20 minutes in one spot. Drop your live minnow right to the bottom, then take a couple of turns on the reel handle. Leave the bait here for about five minutes,

and if you haven't had a nibble, take a couple more turns on the reel handle. Every five minutes come up a few more feet. This way you'll be prospecting each layer of water from the bottom to near the top. Move frequently, trying different spots, around underwater obstructions.

You'll likely find a school of fish sometime during the day if they are biting at all.

A helpful aid is a commercial crappie rig, available at most sporting goods stores. This rig has a pair of twisted-wire "arms" which extend out from the main line. Snelled hooks are tied on these extensions which hold the wiggling live minnows away from the line, preventing twisting. Many anglers prefer to hook a minnow through both lips, rather than behind the dorsal fin. Since a crappie tries to swallow a minnow head first it is more susceptible to becoming hooked this way.

the proper taxes. Q. I understand the IRS has a booklet that is helpful to the small businessman. Where can I get a copy? A) A copy of the 1971 Tax Guide for Small Business, Publication 334, can be purchased for 75 cents at IRS offices and from the U. S. Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C., and its branch stores throughout the country. Q) Is it true that there is a penalty for filing your income tax return late? A) Yes, a penalty of five percent of the taxes due and unpaid on the date the return was required to be filed will be imposed for each month, or part of a month, the return is late. The total delinquent filing penalty is limited to 25 percent. Under unusual circumstances a taxpayer may be granted an extension of time to file a return. Extensions are not granted as a matter of course, and reasons for your request must be substantial. Your request for an extension must be made before the due date of the return. Q) Does it make any difference if I use a red, white and blue or a black and white Form 1040 for my Federal income tax? A) No difference at all. Actually the tax packages mailed to taxpayers contained the red, white and blue Form 1040 while the 1040's available at banks, post offices, and some office buildings are black and white. The IRS, however, urges taxpayers to use the multi-colored form whenever possible, since the red lettering on the form highlights areas where errors are most commonly made. Be sure to use the peel-off label that came on the tax package you received in the mail. Using the pre-addressed label will speed any refund due and eliminate possible errors. Simply peel off the label from the front of the tax package and affix it to the Form 1040 you send to the IRS. Q) Can I make the arithmetic a bit easier on my tax return by rounding off some of the figures? A) Yes, you can. Money items appearing on your tax return may be rounded off to whole dollars. ### COVERAGE DUE JULY 1 FOR NEW ELIGIBLE MEDICARE ENROLLEES

For some people who are age 65 and over, March 31st could be a very important day, stated R. R. Tuiley social security district manager in Abilene. That date will mark the end of the current "General Enrollment Period" for Part "B" of Medicare or doctor bill insurance, as many people know it.

A general enrollment period, he stated, provides many people who had previously refused

or neglected to enroll with the opportunity to do so. Anyone who is eligible to and does not enroll on or before March 31st will have the medical insurance coverage effective on July 1971.

The current enrollment period will be the last opportunity for most people born after October 1, 1902 and before October 3, 1903 to enroll. If they do not enroll now, they will never be able to obtain this valuable coverage.

People who wish to enroll or who wish additional information have only to write or phone the Abilene Social Security Office located at the Federal Building in Room 2321. The phone number is 677-5262. An application to enroll for Medicare or whatever information a person needs will be quickly supplied.

The item to take note of is this: They just might also apply to that pickup the small farmer owns and operates, and his son operates daily.

Why? Because, the way the proposals are explained, they apply to interstate commerce. And, recent court decisions indicate that the interstate commerce clause applies to anything and everything which might at some time enter interstate commerce. All agricultural products could, of course, be included in this category.

Too, if the federal government adopts such regulations.

The special meeting was the first of its kind ever held by the Texas Farm Bureau and culminated almost a year of study and program development activity involving hundreds of county Farm Bureau leaders. The 13-member State Program Expansion Committee consulted county Farm Bureaus in the drafting of the recommendations which were submitted to the voting delegates.

Here, in brief, are the major programs approved by the delegates:

- (1) Commodity Activities
- (2) Marketing Program
- (3) Information—Public Relations
- (4) Research and Education

The proposals voted on at the Dallas meeting were based on the desires expressed in county Farm Bureau board meetings last summer. Priorities were established at a statewide meeting of county presidents in August. The State Program Expansion Committee, in cooperation with similar committees on the county level, has been studying and evaluating proposed expansion needs for the past several months.
