

First Month of Racing Is Big Success At Tonkawa Downs, Inc.

Graham's newest tourist attraction, quarter-horse racing at Tonkawa Downs, has proven a big success since May 15. Large crowds of race fans have been driving in from many parts of north and west Texas to the weekend events, to enjoy the scenic park, the beautiful 200 year old pecan trees, and the exciting races. Many of the top horsemen of the state, as well as some leading jockeys and trainers, have started frequenting the new track, which is reported to be one of the finest track surfaces in Texas.

The feature of the Saturday, June 12th, race program was the first race, won by Sonny Earl, owned by Bill Lewis of Wichita Falls. The 5 year old stallion topped Juanita B, owned by L. R. Pearson of Ranger, Gerónimo Bars, owned by B. C. Lawrence of Seymour, and Bar-Little-Dick in the fine AA plus time of 18.4 seconds for the 350

yard event. Sonny Earl has been a consistent performer in the past at Ruidoso, and in the South Texas Circuit. Sleepy Renfro, one of the top jockeys in Texas, Larry Isom of Abilene, Linda Wignall of Graham, Mario Gomez of Brady, and several other outstanding jockeys have been turning in great rides, according to the horsemen and trainers.

An 8 race card is slated for Saturday, June 19, starting at 2:00 p. m. The races for the June 19th program will feature the finest group of quality horses yet to run at Tonkawa Downs. The feature race will be the \$150.00 added Tonkawa Derby for 3 year old and up. Saddle horse races, with stock saddles only, will be held at the conclusion of the 8 race program.

Farmers Union Opposes Second Class Postage

The Farmers Union has urged the Postal Rate Commission to turn down a proposed increase in second class postal rates.

Dr. Weldon V. Barton, assistant national director of the Farmers Union, said in testimony before the Commission that increasing second class postal rates would threaten the existence of small town newspapers. But in addition, he said, it would also "combine with other forces working to stagnate rural America."

Loss of weekly newspapers and other printed information sources that move through the mails "would serve to drag down and frustrate efforts to upgrade health, transportation, employment, education, and other activities essential for rural revitalization," Barton said.

Furthermore, he urged that rates on other classes of mail not be increased in order to absorb the deficit that will result from maintenance of current second class rates. "Instead," he said, "Farmers Union urges that after the Postal Service makes every effort to secure financial savings by squeezing out operating inefficiencies—the deficits be allowed to accumulate so as to encourage remedial amendment of the 1970 Postal Reorganization Act."

Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) How can I correct an error on my tax return?

A) Form 1040X is the preferred form to use to correct an error on your original return. The 1040X calls only for information that relates to that part of the original return which you wish to change. It is not necessary to include all of the information furnished on the 1040 which you filed.

Form 1040X and instructions are available at your local IRS office.

business. Do you have any publications that will be helpful to me?

A) Yes. IRS Publication 454, Mr. Businessman's Kit, contains forms and instructions that will help you comply with tax laws. Contact your local IRS office to arrange a mutually convenient time to have the Kit delivered and explained to you.

"Year Federal Income Tax," IRS Publication 17 and "Tax Guide for Small Business," IRS Publication 334, will also be useful to you. These publications can be purchased for 75c each from the Government Printing Office or at any IRS office.

Q) My company is giving me an all-expense paid vacation trip because I exceeded my sales quota. Is this taxable?

A) Yes. Incentive awards and work bonuses which you receive from your employer are taxable. You must include the fair market value of the trip as income in the year in which it was received.

Q) I am working for two employers, and both are deducting social security tax from my wages. Since my wages from one employer will exceed \$7,800 can I ask my other employer to discontinue his social security deductions?

A) No. Each employer must withhold social security taxes on the first \$7,800 in wages paid to each employee. However, you will be entitled to claim any excess social security tax withheld as credit against your 1971 income tax at the time of filing.

Q) I lost my refund check. Can I get a duplicate?

A) Yes. Report the loss to the Internal Revenue Service Center where you filed your return and they will supply the forms needed for a replacement.
