

After spending a cold night in a car that didn't have a heater the group tried to get cut several times before finally crossing the creek about 10:00 a. m. Tuesday.





> Sports license fees comprise 58.6% of the revenue flowing into Special Game and Fish

> The department estimates that by 1974, expenditures from the fund will equal income. Something has to be done.

> The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department supports these bills now before the 62nd Legislature, fourth called session, proposing an increase in resident and nonresident fishing licenses from \$2.15 to \$5.25 and the resident hunting license fee from \$3.25 to \$5.25.

Nonresident hunting licenses would also be increased from \$25 to \$50.25.

Texas sport license fees have remained static while neighboring states have raised their fees to keep pace with the cost of good conservation projects.



Education Act is a system of sion. Basic Education Opportunity Grants; a program of direct institutional aid to colleges and universities and grants for occupational and vocational education, including what is known as the National Institute of Education, which proposes to develop new and better methods of teaching at every level from pre-school to post-graduate.

The Head Start Program was broadened to include children of working families in the voluntary day care program.

Veterans education assistance was considerably increased and itation for returning veterans. In addition educational benefits were increased by 25 percent and provisions were made cent in benefits for disabled veterans.

Benefits were increased for an estimated 20 million senior citizens such as nutritional meals for those who need them. low-cost transportation, employment opportunities, community centers, pre-retirement training, health and education services, and centers to study the variety of problems facing older people.

A National Institute of Aging was created to conduct research on special health problems of the elderly.

Drugs, juvenile delinquency and crime were treated in numerous pieces of legislation. Principally, they are the establishment of a National Institute on Drug Abuse, increasing funds on specific projects under the Community Health Centers Act. providing grants to states to develop new drug abuse programs, establishing a Council for Drug Abuse Strategy and the requirement for federally funded health facilities to provide needed treatment for drug addicts.

A number of bills were passed relating to consumer protection-truth in lending, wholesale meat and poultry inspection truthin-packaging, automobile safety, toy safety and fair credit reporting, to name a

Protection of the environment received high priority in the Congress. A measure entitled "The Water Quality Standards Act" provides \$24.6 billion towards cleaning up the Nation's water. A far-reaching measure towards controlling air pollution and conservation of our resources and wildlife is another major enactment. Probably the most prominent bill dealing with rural areas is the Rural Development Act for the purpost of improving conditions of rural living. It provides loans and grants for improvement of facilities, increasing job opportunities on farms and in small

In the area of foreign policy and military actions, the so-called SALT Agreement was approved to limit strategic weapons. A treaty with the Soviet Union was approved by the U. S. Senate limiting the number of ballistic missiles.

The Selective Service Act was amended to extend the draft to June, 1973, at which time it is supposed to end. Increases in military pay were provided in order to encourage voluntary enlistments.





Other grazing systems, such as the four pasture three herd system, allows a producer four months of grazing use and 12 months of rest before returning to the original pasture. This type of grazing system gives a pasture one full year of rest every four years.

All grazing systems are designed to fit the needs of the producer and to allow improvement of ranges from the standpoint of plant population, production and vigor. All grazing systems are aimed at increased carrying capacity of the range unit. All grazing systems will provide a choice of grazing for stock to utilize the various species over a long period of time during their season of best palatibility.

Needless to say that brush control and seeding often go before the initiation of a planned grazing system. Most pastures must be in a fair to good condition before such a grazing system can be successfully put into operation.

Come by the Soil Conservation Service Field Office in Haskell, or let your SCS Conservationist meet you on the ground, and discuss planned grazing systems that will fit your land unit. Grazing systems can be planned even for bermudagrass pastures.




