Anyone interested in this type of employment is asked to complete the form inserted in the Free Press this week and return it as soon as possible. The questionnaires may be returned postage free by simply dropping in any mail box.

The interview applications were inserted in seven area newspapers last week, and at press time Wednesday, 106 applications had been received from Seymour, Aspermont, Rochester, Knox City, Rule, Old Glory, Stamford and Haskell.

After extensive research, members of the Haskell Industrial Foundation were very impressed with the possibilities of the Herman Marcus plant. Shooting Results In One Death

Horace J. Smith, Jr., 38, was dead on arrival at Haskell Memorial Hospital Nov. 23, at about 11:00 a. m., following a shooting at the home of Ossie Cain.

Smith was employed by the Weinert Gin Co. and had lived in Weinert for about two weeks. He moved to Weinert from Corpus Christi.

The shooting reportedly took place after Haskell Deputy Sheriff Buddy Wilson was called to the residence to investigate a reported disturbance. The shooting took place after Wilson's arrival. The incident was investigated by District Attorney Royce Adkins and Deputy Sheriffs Olen King and Pete Mercer.

At an inquest held Nov. 24, an autopsy was ordered. The apparent cause of death was a bullet wound in the left shoulder. Results of the investigation are expected to be turned over to the next session of the grand jury.

Funeral services for Mr. Smith were held in Seguin.

Vet Educational Benefits Raised

C. H. Herren, local Veterans Service Officer for Haskell County, wishes to advise all veterans that the Congress recently passed a law which increases the monthly payments of educational assistance allowance for those in training under the G. I. Bill.

It is generally felt that the increased training allowance rates will enable many veterans to either remain in school or now consider beginning a new career. Many veterans have been forced to drop out of school because of the high cost of education. The increased rates of Veterans Administration training allowance will enable them to return to the classroom to complete their education.

In order to be eligible for GI Bill educational benefits, a veteran must have been in service for more than six months, any part of which was after January 31, 1955, and he must have been discharged from service under other than dishonorable conditions. A veteran is entitled to 1½ months training for each month he was in service with a maximum entitlement of 36 months of training time. If he had as much as 18 months continuous active duty, he is entitled to the full 36 months training time.

A veteran with no dependents is now entitled to a monthly training allowance of \$220; with one dependent his rate is \$261; with two dependents the monthly rate is \$298. The increased rates will be retroactive to Sept. 1, 1972, for those who were in training at that time. Increases were also authorized for veterans taking On-Job Training under the GI Bill.

Bond Sales Reach 36% of 1972 Goal

United States Savings Bond sales in Haskell County totaled \$7,162 during the month of October. Sales for the ten-month period were \$85,898 which represents 36% of the 1972 goal for the county, according to County Bond Chairman, R. W. Herren.

October sales in Texas totaled \$17,851,277 compared to sales of \$15,480,457 during the same period of 1971—an increase of 15.3%. Ten-month sales totaled \$177,041,953 for 89.6% of the sales goal of \$197.5 million.

National sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds during the month were \$467 million—14.8% above 1971 sales of \$407 million. Sales for the first 10 months totaled \$5.2 billion for 98% of the 1972 sales goal of \$5.3 billion.

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LOAN ANNOUNCEMENT PROTESTED

Within the past three weeks, Farmers Union has issued a strong protest with Secretary Earl Butz over his failure to raise the cotton in the 1973 program and his announcement of acreage by 13 percent.

In a letter to the Agriculture Secretary, Farmers Union president, Jay Naman, said that the same program, and price supports for the cotton that have caused below production-cost prices indicates a callous disregard for the nation's producers. Your decision to retain the 1973 program support is clear evidence that, once again, the administration of the cotton program is based on the interests of the cotton trade at the expense of cotton farmers.

"An increase in the price support loan level possible under the existing law. As your program have indicated, the loan level could be as high as 100 percent," stated Naman.

With regard to the latest 1973 cotton program announcement by the Administration, Naman said that the decision to reduce pay acreage and eliminate requirements for next year's cotton program is "devastating" to Texas cotton farmers.

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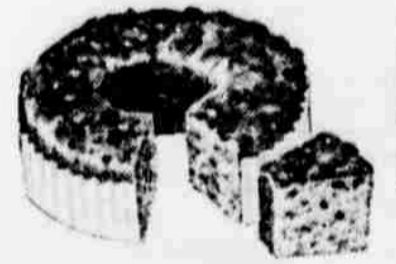

The girls were defeated by Hawley, 53-51, in their play this week.

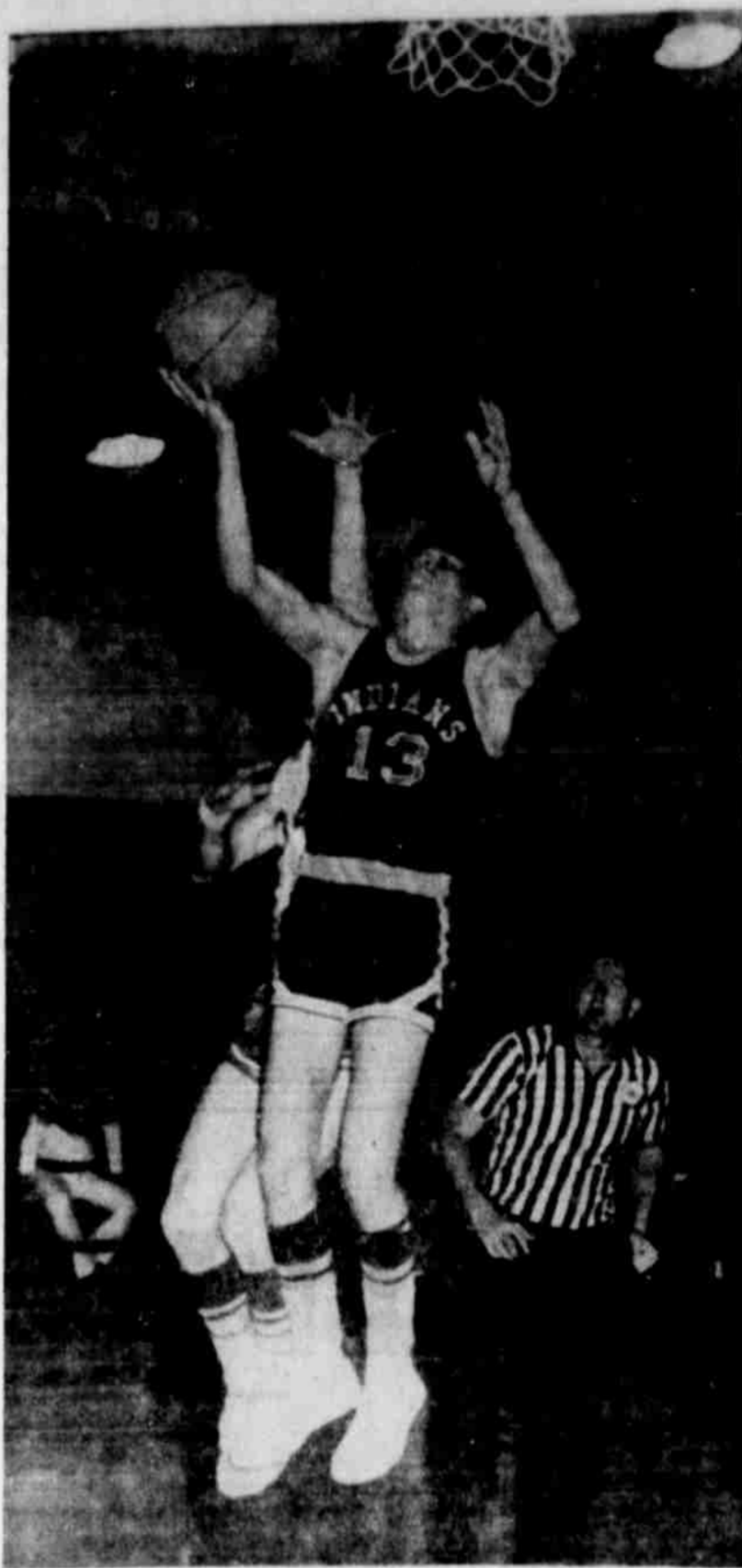

Good Year To Buy Bird Dog

"It's a good year to buy a bird dog."

Horace Gore of the Parks and Wildlife Department is optimistic about quail season in Texas this year.

"With the exception of a few counties scattered over the state," said Gore, "quail populations look the best in several years."

Drought hit some areas of the state last year and department biologists feel that it may have robbed quail of food and cover during critical breeding periods.

Timely rains in most of the state, however, have increased quail numbers by over 100 percent.

According to George Litton, department project leader in the Permian Basin, bobwhites are up a whopping 188 percent and blue or scaled quail have increased at least 94 percent.

One problem with all this abundance is that heavy stands of weeds could hide the increase in birds until the first killing frost improves hunting conditions.

Late summer 'whistle counts' in Northeast Texas indicate the highest populations since 1969. Hunters can also expect to find most birds fully developed because of little late nesting this year.

Blue quail numbers in the Trans-Pecos area are the largest in several years. Project Leader Tom Hailey of Marfa says that a portion of the present quail crop can be attributed to a mild winter with a high survival of birds from last year.

Throughout most of the state the quail season opens Dec. 1, with bag and possession limits of 12 and 36 respectively.

Seven Accidents During October

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first ten months of 1972 shows a total of 52 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 51 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in October, 1972 of 604 accidents, resulting in 20 persons killed, and 280 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 595 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This is 10 more accidents, one more fatality and 14 less injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that the winter months of cold weather are close by and the traveling conditions are more dangerous at this time of year. Allow a following distance of one car length for every 10 mph of speed between you and the vehicle ahead.

The 20 deaths for the month of October, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock and Lipscomb, 4 each; Yoakum and Randall, 2 each; and Parmer, Potter, Sherman, Swisher, Wilbarger, Bailey, Haskell and Palo Pinto, one each.

Winter wheat furnishing grazing—Rio Grande Valley citrus production increasing — Texas still cattle feeding king—Questionnaires in mail—

Full grazing capacity of the state's winter wheat crop is expected when weather conditions improve. Seeding of wheat is nearing completion. About 40% of the 1973 wheat crop is already of sufficient growth to permit grazing; last year at this time only 10% of the crop could be grazed.

An increase of 15% for the state's citrus production is forecast by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Grapefruit production is expected to total 10.4 million boxes, 13% above the 9.2 million boxes produced last year. Early and mid-season oranges are forecast 415 million boxes, 18% above last year.

As production is up so is the quality of Texas citrus this year. Increased fresh market shipments are expected through November. Trees are in excellent condition, although cooler weather would help color and size the fruit.

Cattle feeding honors still belong to Texas. As of Nov. 1, there were 2,266,000 cattle and calves on feed in Texas. This is 30% above 1971 and is also 8% above a month ago.

Marketings of fat cattle during October totaled 406,000 head which is 14% above October of last year.

In the seven major cattle feeding states—Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas—there is a 9% increase in cattle on feed compared to a month ago and 13% more than a year ago.

Livestock questionnaires have been mailed to 60,000 livestock producers in the state as a part of the annual livestock survey conducted for Texas. If you receive one of the questionnaires, you are requested to fill it out as accurately as possible and return it as soon as possible. This is the basis for estimating the state's livestock numbers and getting as complete a picture of the livestock industry as possible.

None of the information will be divulged on an individual basis. It will be compiled into county, area and statewide totals.

A county-by-county report on all agricultural production for 1971 is now available. All 254 counties in the state—from A to Z (Anderson to Zapata) are included. Information for each county includes all agricultural production as well as cash receipts and government payments. A statewide total is also included.

lars of about \$7.65. Each bale of cotton harvested by stripping produces an average of 675 pounds of burs, stems and other wastes.
The maintenance of organic matter in the soil is an important key to profitable crop yields in the future.

Cotton Classing

burrs have been added also are more resistant to wind and water erosion and will have a better infiltration rate. The cotton plant makes better use of water where organic residues are returned to the soil at regular intervals.
To produce one pound of stable organic matter or humus, the soil organisms must decompose 20 or more pounds of gin waste. Organic matter helps the soil most when it is in the process of decomposition. Residues that decompose slowly remain active longer and produce effects that last longer than residues that break down rapidly. Tests have shown that 12 to 15 lbs. of nitrogen added per ton of burs usually will provide the necessary nitrogen for the crop being grown and for decomposition of the burs at the same time.
Each ton of burs contains about 18 pounds of nitrogen, 9 pounds of phosphorus, and about 75 pounds of potassium, a total worth in fertilizer dol-

MUNDAY
Sample receipts dropped sharply as unfavorable harvesting weather halted harvesting in all of the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Officer-in-Charge. According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, harvesting is approximately 21 percent complete.
Quality statistics for the week ending Nov. 24, 1972, show little change from the previous week. Thirteen percent of the cotton was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), 45 percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), and 20 percent was Low Middling Light Spotted (52). Twenty-five percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass. The staple length showed 31 percent staple 31 compared to 19 percent the previous week. Fifty-one percent staple 32 was down 9 percentage points from the last week, and 14 percent staple 33 was down 3 percentage points from the previous week.
The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 78 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9. 22 percent read 5.0 and above.
The Pressley fiber strength tests conducted by the USDA's fiber laboratory at College Station shows that the average strength dropped slightly with 79,000 pounds per square inch being the average this week compared to 82,000 pounds p.s.i. last week.
Cotton markets continue to be fairly active with farmers offering moderately. Nineteen to 24.00 cents per pound was paid for most grades offered with staple lengths of staple 30 through staple 33.
The Munday office classed 3,675 samples this past week, bringing the season's total to 22,855.

ed. This compares with 5,400 white grades, 46 percent were light-spotted, and 3 percent were spotted cotton. The presence of bark in samples increased, with 56 percent of the samples reduced in grade for that reason.
Staple lengths and micronaire readings maintained desirable levels. Staple lengths were slightly longer than those of last week, with 39 percent being staple 31, 28 percent being staple 32, and 18 percent being staple 30. Eighty-five percent of the samples read in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range.

Pressley fiber strength tests show tensile strength to be about average. Forty-two percent of the cotton tested fell in the 75,000 to 79,000 pounds per square inch range, 29 percent in the 80,000 to 84,000 PSI range, and 15 percent in the 70,000 to 74,000 PSI range.
Cotton prices held about steady last week. Prices for grade 51 with staple 31 ranged from 18.50 to 20.25 cents per pound. Grade 52, staple 31 cotton ranged in price from 17 to 19 cents per pound. Buyers discounted the price of cotton reduced in

grade because of bark by one-half to three-fourths cents per pound.

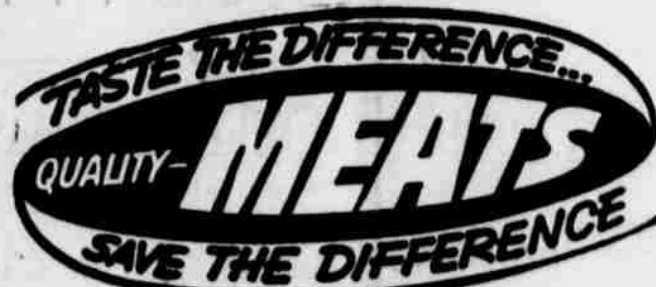

WHEAT OUTLOOK WARNING VOICED

Wheat producers who lost income on their wheat certificate payments this year as a result of the Soviet sales cannot realistically expect higher prices for their wheat in 1973, a spokesman for National Farmers Union has cautioned.

Weldon Barton, NFU Assistant Legislative Director, voiced the concern about lower prices in an address to the Sumner County Farmers Union.

Barton stated two reasons why "next year" may never come for wheat producers in early-harvest states, in the sense of continuation of higher prices into the 1973 marketing year.

First, the Nixon Administration is already encouraging a larger U. S. wheat crop for next year. After displaying virtually no ability to predict the huge Soviet imports of wheat this year (or even to report the Soviet sales weeks after they were made), the USDA is now saying to wheat producers that the Soviet Union probably will have to import large quantities of grain next year to meet its commitment for improving Russian diets by 1975.

"This speculation," Barton said, "flies in the face of statistics indicating that during 1950-1972, any poor wheat crop in the Soviet Union has generally been followed by a much larger crop the next year. The USDA's speculation is reckless, and appears designed to produce an unrealistically-large U. S. crop and lower prices in 1973. To understand the low-price disaster into which this kind of speculation can lead the producer, one need only look at the way (and the reasons) to sell CCC stocks until the price is driven down around 115% of the loan rate, or about \$1.44 per bushel. If this happens, the 1973 marketing year will BEGIN with prices much reduced from present price levels."

"Because of these realities," Barton stated, "if wheat producers in early-harvest states such as Kansas, are to receive equity of returns, there is no substitute for enactment of legislation introduced in Congress in September that would reimburse farmers for their losses in 1972." Barton said the legislation could be reintroduced into the new Congress when it convenes in January. He noted that the Nixon Administration opposed reimbursement of wheat farmers for their losses in a September 23 statement to the Senate Agriculture Committee.
