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### CONSERVATION VIEW POINTS

The Haskell Free Press has graciously allowed me this space to express weekly items of interest concerning conservation activities. It is my expressed hope that you, the reading public, will turn to our column each week to learn who is doing what in the field of air, soil and water conservation.

POLLUTION of our environment is the most talked and written about topic in the United States. Rightly it should be. We Americans are dumping tons and tons of polluted air into the atmosphere daily with our motor vehicles. Our highway maintenance people spend many hours weekly picking up trash, cans and bottles from the highway right of way... thoughtlessly thrown out by the traveling public.

Many other forms of pollution takes place daily that we over-

look as being commonplace everyday happenings. But enough about pollution for this time. STOP!

Marvin Wheatley, cooperating with the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, who farms about six miles northeast of Haskell recently completed 23,690 feet of parallel terraces on the old John Wheatley farm. This brings the total footage of parallel terraces for Haskell County to 1,380,839 feet since last July.

A. C. Denson of Stamford, co-operating with the California Creed SWCD, and who farms the old Behringer farm in the Sagerton area completed a livestock water pond last week. This brings the total to 33 ponds this year.

The BIG COUNTRY Resource Conservation and Development project recently organized including Haskell County. The chairman of the Board of Directors for the project is Haskell County's own R. V. Earles of Paint Creek, R. V. is our local California Creek SWCD director. You will be hearing more and more about the BIG COUNTRY RC&D as things happen. And they are going to happen.

A word to the livestock raisers—during this period of much less than normal rainfall it will mean money in your pocket to further reduce livestock numbers to save grubbing your native grass. It will take many years to recover from an overgrazed pasture that took less than three to five months to get in that condition.

My weekly conservation quote: "The land has a direct bearing on the strength and economy of Haskell—use it wisely."

## Texas A&M Vegetable Center To Be Dedicated At Munday On July 16th

Dedication of the new Quarter-Million Dollar Texas A&M Vegetable Center at Munday, will be held on Friday July 16.

The modern brick facility is located at 811 North Ivy Street in the northeastern city limits of Munday, and is one of the best equipped in the State.

The dedication ceremony will get underway at 10:00 a. m. State officials included on the program will be Senator Jack Hightower, of Vernon; State Representative W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah; Speaker of the House Gus F. Mutscher; John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture; a host of Texas A&M officials, including Dr. Jack Williams, president, Clyde Wells, chairman of the Board of Directors, Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Dean of Agriculture, Dr. John E. Hutchinson, Director of Extension Service, and Dr. M. E. Bloodworth, head, Soil and Crop Sciences.

This project represents the culmination of a long awaited dream of many farmers and progressive businessmen of the Munday area who teamed together to purchase 50 acres of choice irrigated land in 1968 through the coordination of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The formal ground-breaking ceremony was held in October 1970 at which time the land was deeded to Texas A&M University for vegetable research. Construction of the buildings began in April of this year.

Sealed bids covering the sale of the State's interest in a tract of land containing approximately 2,066 acres of land, more or less, and the improvements thereon, located on State Highway 24 (Walton Street) in Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, will be received at the office of Texas Highway Department District Engineer J. C. Roberts until 2:00 p. m., July 14, 1971, and then publicly opened and read.

The property to be sold consists of the State's interest in 2,066 acres of land, more or less, being all of Lots 1 through 8, Block "J", S. H. Johnson Addition to the Town of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, and the improvements thereon. The tract is approximately 300' square fronting approximately 300' on State Highway 24, 300' on Grissom Street and 300' on Warnock Street. Improvements on the land consist of a 31'x78' frame warehouse building, a 30' x 60' frame storage building, two underground gasoline storage tanks, fencing and other minor improvements.

The State will convey all its right, title and interest in the land to the successful bidder. The State does not own an abstract of title on this property and if the successful bidder desires he may purchase an abstract or title insurance at his own expense but at no cost to the State.

No bids under \$7,750.00 will be considered.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a Certified or Cashier's check on a State or National Bank of the State of Texas in the amount of \$400.00 made payable without recourse to the order of the "State Highway Commission," as a guarantee that the bidder, if successful, will consummate the purchase. Before actual construction began, the Center was supported by a water quality study project through a grant from the Federal Water Control Agency. This grant will enable the Center to do complete soil and water analysis, compile and record complete mineral data on underground water in an area covered by the Seymour strata which includes approximately nine counties of the Rolling Plains area of Texas. 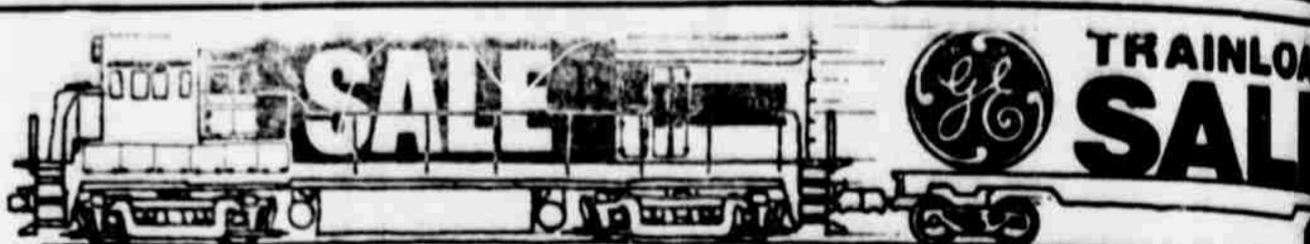

Upstream Flood Prevention Dam To Be Built

The 1,500th upstream flood prevention dam to be built in Texas was contracted for construction this week, reports State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

East Fork Construction Co. of Seagoville was low bidder for the contract.

The dam is Site No. 13 in the Hickory Creek watershed near Denton. The Hickory Creek project will provide flood prevention and recreation for the City of Denton while protecting cropland, roads, bridges and other property in the watershed. The dam will be the sixth in a series of 16 to be built in the watershed.

The project, including conservation land treatment in the watershed, is expected to keep 58,000 tons of sediment out of Garza-Little Elm Reservoir each year when completed. Garza-Little Elm serves as a water supply for Denton, Dallas and other cities in North Texas.

"The 1,500th dam marks another milestone in the watershed approach to resource management in Texas," Graham said. "Upstream watershed projects have vast environmental benefits; they not only cut flood damages but they also reduce erosion and sediment damage. And sediment is still our state's biggest pollutant. It fills lakes, streams and harbors; it kills fish and ruins their spawning grounds."

## Prattle

Edith and Robin Wheatley are vacationing in California, and the following note was received from Robin Tuesday morning: "Dear Al, We're having a great vacation, but we will be glad to come home. There's no place like Haskell, Disneyland was great and all the tours we have made will make good memories."

Crime costs are high. Permissiveness costs money. That fact is brutally clear, when we pick-up our daily paper or listen to the news on TV, and radio.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reports, "We complain about high taxes, but last year crime cost every man, woman and child in the United States \$122.00, or a staggering estimated total of \$20 billion. Perhaps this figure could become more meaningful if we realize that for every \$1 spent on education, crime costs \$1.45; and for every \$1 which went to the churches of the nation, \$13 went to crime."

Violent acts against persons and property are an offense against every citizen. Whether he is a victim or merely a taxpayer, he must help foot the bill. He has a direct stake in the law and order issue.

Food for Thought: How far can we abandon the principle of self-reliance and still expect to retain the privilege of self-government and the liberties granted under it. Admittedly, this is an old and shopworn question. But, it remains, nonetheless, more pertinent today than ever before.

As in every profession, there is a special language that is spoken and understood among newspaper people. When a newspaper employee talks about a "dummy" he isn't necessarily referring to another person. He means the miniature copy of the next issue of the newspaper which has been prepared by the advertising department and shows the space will be allocated. On the dummy the ad department shows the size and location of ads it has sold and then the Editor fills in the remaining portions with news. "Dummy" can also be a verb to describe the job of deciding where each story or picture will be placed and marking it on the dummy sheet.

Kill means to throw away the type. A slug doesn't mean a fake quarter in the cigarette machine. It's a solid piece of metal carrying a line of type. And the machine which produces it is a Linotype.

A cut isn't a call for the first aid kit. It can mean two things: 1. Instructions to make a picture or a story fit the space available. 2. The picture itself once it has been processed into

a form where it can be used on the press. These are also sometimes called plastics (for the material) or scans or scans (for the machine which makes them).

If you call your newspaper and say, "Now I want this in the paper just as I give it to you," you'd better be talking to the advertising department. Within limitations you can say anything you want in print...if you pay for it. But the same thing does not hold true for the news department.

In this case the publisher and

the Editor determine if things should be printed and how they should be worded. There is a charge for advertising, but not for news.

Once you submit a story to the paper (anything from a baby shower to a death notice) you have no control over how it is handled. Papers have certain way things are written, certain styles which are acceptable and some which are not. And they are not obligated to use any story if they don't want to.

Just what is news? The stock

answer used to be "Dog bites man...so what? Man bites dog...that's news." This definition has outlived its purpose.

Your hometown newspaper prints local news and leaves the world shocking news for the dailies. Where else can you find news of people you know and associate with day-to-day than in your "local" paper? People still want to know about marriages, births, deaths. They want to know who has guests. They want to know about high school athletes, etc., etc. Other people make the news...we print it!"

(June 24, 1911)

### HUSBAND AND WIFE TEAM RE-ENLISTS IN AIR FORCE

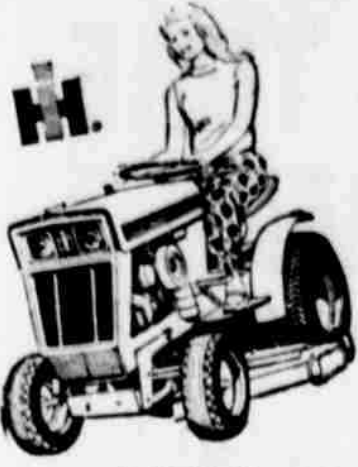
