County Will Use Jury Wheel District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman said that Haskell County is making plans to put fied voters in the county into operation a jury wheel to select venires for both district and county court juries. A law adopted by the Texas Legislature this year repeals

all laws regulating the formulation of jury commissions. Haskell county has picked venires from a list of prospects selected by a jury commission. Although the bill did not set

out to eliminate jury commissions anywhere except in counties having population of 10,000 or more, Attorney General Crawford Martin issued a legal opinion July 14 in which he held that all counties must comply with the law because all laws pertaining to jury commissions had been wiped off the books.

The law sets out that the sheriff, district clerk, county clerk and tax collector shall get together sometime each year between August 1 and 15 and prepare the wheel.

In this wheel, which will be somewhat like those in use for community drawings, will be placed the names of all quali-

Unlike the usual container for drawings, the jury wheel must be of solid exterior and must have two locks, with the sheriff having one key, and the district clerk the other.

Cards placed in the wheel are to be of uniform size and color. The wheel is to be turned so that the cards are thoroughly mixed before the venire is selected.

After the cards are selected, the jury list is prepared and the prospective jurors are notified as in the past.

serving on juries have been greatly reduced by the law. Only those persons over 65 years of age and women who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of 10 are now exempt. The law specifically eleminates any consideration of economic factors.

Judges in the past have been known to excuse a juror if he is busy putting in, or gathering his crop. Presumably this will no longer be permitted.

An opinion dated July 20th, 1971, by Attorney General Crawford Martin held that persons under 21 years of age may not serve on juries, and their names need not be placed in the jury wheel. All other names on the current voter registration list as of August 1, each year MUST be placed in the jury wheel and no oth-

Neither the District or County Judge can excuse a juror before trial unless the juror requests same in writing, giving the reason and making an affidavit and then neither judge can excuse for economic reasons until the day of trial and all attorneys must agree at that time on excuse for economic reasons, before either judge can excuse a juror.

Judge Chapman commended the Commissioners Court for their cooperation in planning and assisting with setting-up this new system.

If you own horses that have not been vaccinated, you are required to have them innoculated. The shots are free of charge, so take your horses to the Fair Grounds tomorrow at 1:00 p. m.

Farmers Union has urged the Postal Rate Commission to turn down the proposed in-

crease in newspaper postal rates. Testifying before the Commission, Dr. Weldon V. Barton of National Farmers Union, said that a "increasing second class postal rates would threaten the existence of small town newspapers."

"In addition," he continued, "it would also combine with other forces working to stagnate rural America..."

Thanks, Mr. Farmers Union! Smalltown newspapers should take note of their friends at this time when the newspapers need friends. We spend much of our time supporting this and that "worthy cause" and other "worthy legislation' advocated and promoted by others.

Those we have befriended through the years now have an opportunity to go to hat for the newspapers. But how many will?

Of course, it's one more of those cases. where the real losers, in event of the demise of the weekly newspaper, are not the newspapers themselves, but those they serve.

If the weekly newspaper becomes a casualty of an unfriendly government, weekly newspaper editors probably can find other jobs and their lives will continue to go on as usual. But what about those who need the weekly newspaper?

It's like the smalltown merchant. He needs us! But we also need him!


