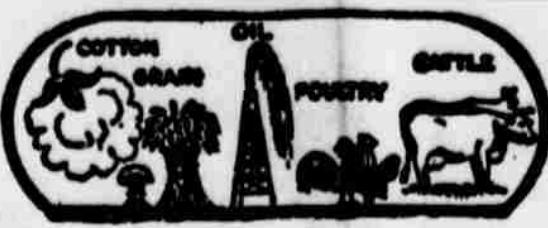

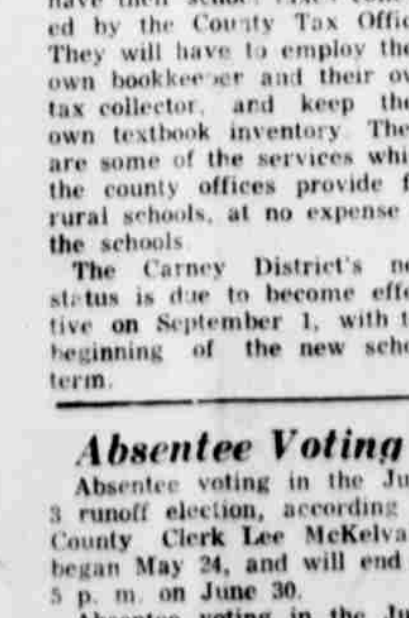

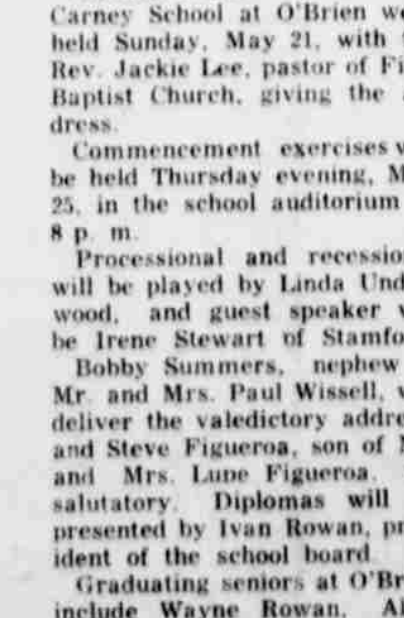

A crack-down on vandalism, hot-rodding through town at night, and disturbances of various kinds, was requested by Haskell City Council of Police Chief T. P. Barnett and night patrol Richard Wohnus at the regular meeting of the Council Tuesday, May 23.

The council also tabled a request of Lone Star Gas Company, represented at the meeting by local manager Bob Philpot, for a rate increase, for further study.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Councilman Buster Gholson, and minutes were read and approved. They also discussed the seal-coating of several streets in town; approved and adopted the budget for 1972-73, and heard a report on progress at the airport. The first five hangars are now almost completed, and the foundation has been poured for the terminal building, getting ready for the airport dedication and fly-in set in June.

All members of the Council were present, along with Mayor J. Belton Duncan, water superintendent Marvin Collins, Police Chief T. P. Barnett, night patrolman Richard Wohnus, city secretary Ira Hester, and Philpot.

## HIGH QUALITY LETTUCE



For commercial use or for the home garden the new lettuce, Ithaca, is tops when planted in earliest spring.

This year, for the first time, there is plenty of seed available of a new lettuce, so new it was released for seed production just 2 years ago.

Named Ithaca, for the home of Cornell University, this lettuce was developed by Prof. Peter L. Minotti and Prof. Emeritus George J. Raleigh, both of the Department of Vegetable Crops, New York State College of Agriculture, a part of the university.

Ithaca is intended to be used for commercial lettuce production and it already has proven outstanding in field performance in New Jersey, so that demand for seed is particularly high from that state. But it also is excellent for the home gardener who wants early lettuce that will transplant perfectly in cold, less than perfect spring weather.

Ithaca was bred for spring planting on well-drained mineral soils. It matures early; has a firm, bright green, attractive head with shiny green leaves. Heads in a planting mature at the same time, a characteristic

vital for harvesting for commercial use but neither necessary or particularly desirable in the home garden.

Thus it would seem sensible for the home gardener to make several small, successive sowings of Ithaca in a cold frame or seed bed, transplanting the seedlings to the garden as they become large enough.

This would insure a supply of high quality early lettuce and also the best performance from this variety, which needs to be transplanted to mature satisfactorily. But this is its only foible, one that is not too hard to cater to.

Ithaca has 2 characteristics that will particularly endear the variety to the home gardener: it resists tipping — that browning and drying of the margins of the tender leaves — and it is slow to go to seed after heads have formed.

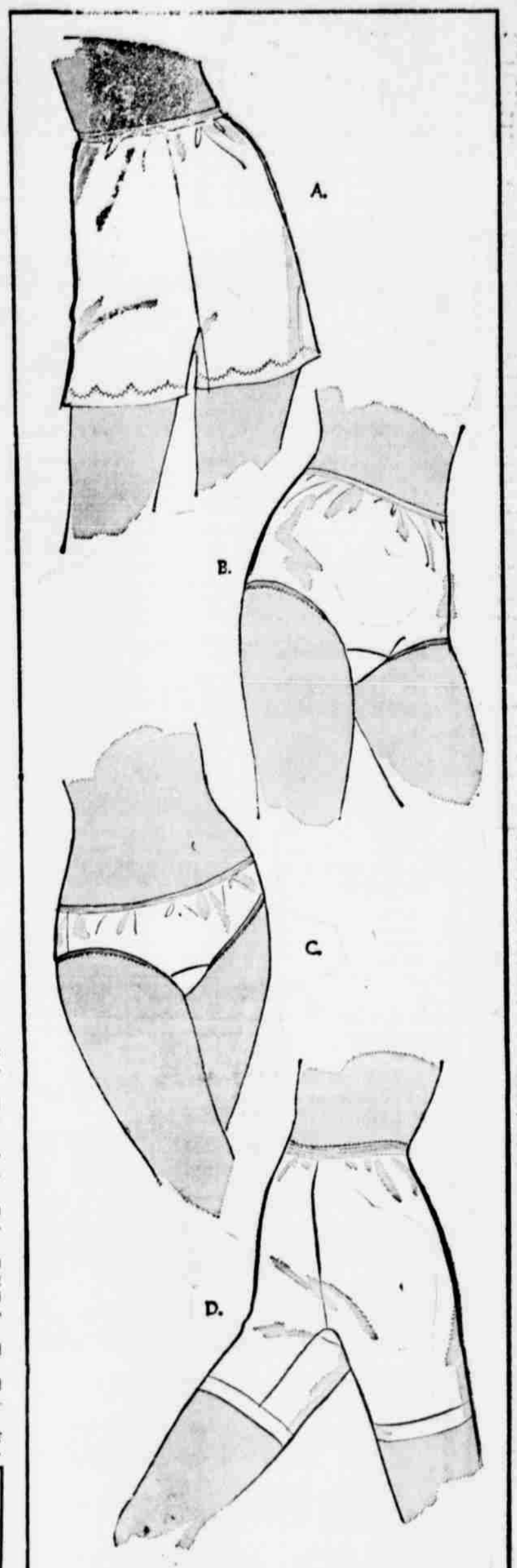

This week's 4-H recipes are from Bennita Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie Jackson who prepared a dish from the Bread and Cereal Group, called Green Rice. Bennita is a member of the Haskell Sr. 4-H Club and she placed second in her division of the Food Show.

**Green Rice**  
1 c. long grain rice  
2 c. boiling water or bouillon  
1 tsp. salt  
1 clove garlic  
2 tsp. butter  
2 tsp. strained spinach  
1/4 c. Parmesan cheese

Cook rice in boiling water or bouillon. Sauté the garlic in butter and when it turns yellow, discard. Add rice and spinach to the butter and mix well. Sprinkle cheese over, cover, and cook one minute.

The second place winner in the milk group was Kris Kupatt, a member of the Sagerton 4-H Club. This is Kris' second year in 4-H and she is already making a record in winning. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kupatt. Her winning recipe this year was "Grape Fluff."

**Grape Fluff**  
1 c. grape juice  
20 marshmallows  
1 c. whipping cream  
1 c. chopped pecans

Melt marshmallows in grape juice over low heat. Cool and put in freezer until it becomes thick and begins to freeze. Remove from freezer, whip cream and add grape mixture and chopped pecans. Place in bowl and return to freezer. Garnish with whipped cream. Makes 8 servings. May also be frozen in ice cube trays.

Another winner was JoAnn Cloud, daughter of Mrs. Joe W. Cloud of Rule. She is a member of the Sagerton 4-H Club. Her winning recipe was Scalloped Beans.

**Scalloped Beans**  
1 can cut green beans  
1/2 cup grated mild cheddar cheese (or processed cheese)  
1 cup white cream sauce, (medium thickness)  
1/4 lb. soft butter or margarine  
1/4 cup Zwiebach toast crumbs rolled fine

Light sprinkle of black pepper, salt, and powder garlic, to taste

Simmer beans for 20-25 minutes in their own liquid with a light sprinkling of black pepper, salt and powdered garlic. Drain, and place in buttered casserole dish. Spread grated cheese over beans and pour white sauce over the cheese. Dot the top with soft butter and sprinkle with Zwiebach toast crumbs. Add another light sprinkle of black pepper and

garlic powder. Bake in oven for 20-25 minutes at 325 degrees. Serves 4 to 6.

**White Cream Sauce**  
2 tbsp. butter  
1 cup milk  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper

Melt butter in sauce pan; blend in flour until smooth and let bubble over low heat for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly until boiling point is reached. Reduce heat and cook for 3 minutes longer, add seasoning blend.

Scalloped Salmon was the title of the winning recipe for Lynn Fouts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Fouts of Rule. Lynn is a member of the Sagerton 4-H Club and this is her second year in 4-H.

**Scalloped Salmon**  
1-7/8 oz. can salmon  
1/3 c. butter or margarine, melted

**Dash pepper**  
25 Saltine crackers  
1 tsp. chopped onion  
1 cup milk

Set over 400 degree temperature. Open a can of salmon. Pour off liquid. Put salmon in a plastic bag. Crush them with a rolling pin. Measure 2 cups. Measure butter. Melt in skillet over low heat. Chop onion fine. Combine Saltines, butter, onion and pepper in bowl. Put salt in bottom of pie pan. Spoon in salmon. Cover with crumbs. Add milk, bake 20 minutes.

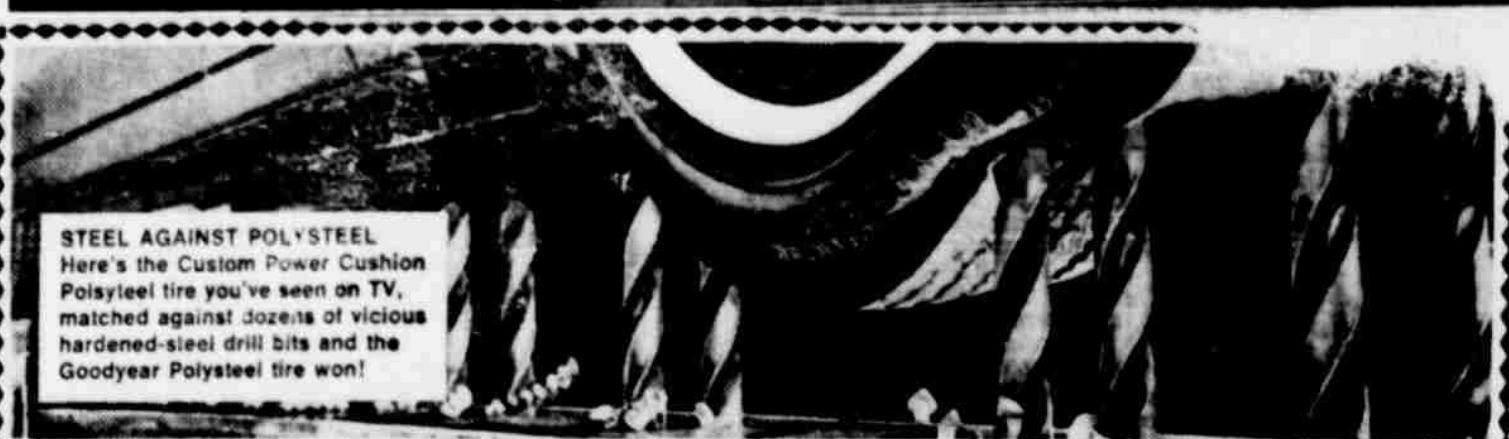

## Hog Cholera Is Still On The Loose In Texas; Breeders Urge Caution

College Station—Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas, and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was placed under a state quarantine on May 6. Moore County in the Panhandle was also quarantined recently when an infected herd was found. Five other counties in the state remain under state quarantine. They are all in South Texas and include Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Webb and Willacy.

Three counties recently released from quarantine were Fayette, Gonzales and Lavaca. "There is one major point regarding the hog cholera quarantine that relates particularly to those buying hogs," points out the Texas A&M University veterinarian. "This is that any hogs bought in a quarantined area are confined to the buyer's premises for a period of 30 days. The animals cannot be resold or moved for that 30-day period unless they are shipped directly to slaughter."

Armstrong emphasizes that the purpose of the quarantine is to limit the movement of hogs. Then, if sick animals are detected, animal health officials can be notified and the animals can be properly disposed of. "This is the only way Texas will be able to move toward 'hog cholera free' status," he contends.

**Cotton Leads The Trend To Casual Wear Clothing**

Hart, Texas (Special)—"Momentum is going for cotton," a leader of the industry declared today in calling for support of the USDA-National Cotton Council campaign to achieve "Better Yields of Quality Cotton for Profit and Market Growth."

Ray Joe Riley of Hart said cotton is the leader in the trend to more casual clothing and pointed out that cotton denims, corduroys, prints, etc., are "going strong."

Mr. Riley and Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, are co-chairman of the "Better Yields" campaign in Texas.

Mr. Riley said that providing adequate supplies will let cotton's mill customers cash in on its popularity and encourage them to keep using it. He noted that adequate supplies also are needed to restore customer confidence in the ability of growers to meet market needs.

"Better yields of quality fiber express the grower's determination to compare and protect his dollar-per-bale investment in research and promotion," Mr. Riley said.

"Textile demand is increasing worldwide. It more than doubled in the past 20 years. Cotton's ability to share in this growth, halt the swing to man-made fibers, and discourage foreign production depends on an adequate supply and profitable farm production."

Scotty Griffin was one of the five Merit Award winners named recently during the annual Texas A&M University Agricultural Convocation '72.

## Cotton Legislation Introduced By Sen. John Tower

Austin, Texas—U. S. Senator John Tower has introduced legislation in Washington to protect cotton growers against complete or partial crop losses which occur through no fault of their own.

The proposal would amend the Agricultural Adjustment Act to allow victims of crop loss to use the average per acre yield of other farms in the county for that crop year in figuring participation levels in the USDA's cotton program during the three succeeding years.

Tower said his proposal should prove to be of valuable assistance to cotton producers both in Texas and throughout the country.

"The struggle of today's farmer is very difficult indeed," Tower said. "Farm operations are expensive and the profit margins are small."

Tower said his new proposal would provide protection of the established yield of cotton on

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Every morning all over the world hundreds of millions of people satrt their day eating American cereals. The kids eating Wheaties and drinking a certain fruit juice will have energy and grow up to be champions.

A toothpaste guaranteed to "scrool your nurd" is better than all the rest if it is advertised enough. We are great advertisers and billions of dollars are spent on promoting various types of products.

It is a good question then—Why can't we sell our system of democratic government with a free enterprise system? We know that capitalism is a better product than socialism but seemingly there is difficulty in conveying the reasons to many of our people much less than those around the world.

It seems that in every hemisphere people who are looking for an improvement in their society tend to look to the left instead of straight ahead.

If a company is not selling its product, somewhere up around the offices of top management questions will be asked. It may be concluded that the message is not clear and that the advantages of the product have not been clearly defined. If it is an automobile that swivels in the middle, maybe the advantages of parking and making short turns have not been properly presented.

In the case of our system of government, are we communicating properly to our own people and those abroad? Have we shown the average person that our product is the best form of government?

Are we doing enough to tell the story to our youth?

It is not necessary to contend that it is a perfect system but we can contend that it is the best.

The world has been made aware of our shortcomings, which in a way is an asset. Where else can anyone be so openly critical of government? All news media at one time or another have differed strongly with the Administration in power, which proves we have more freedom of the press than any nation.

All over the world people

know of the dissent in this country. Do they know that the right to dissent is unique to a free society?

We are the richest country in the world. The majority of our people enjoy the highest standard of living ever achieved. We have a Constitution and the forces of law that guarantee the freedom of the individual under it. Equality is the centerpiece of commitments under the law—but it seems we have failed to place this product of our society in the market place.

Advertising is a great business in this country and is done by the most highly qualified experts. It sells products to billions of people which have a lot less going for them than the products of our system of governing ourselves.

Maybe we need research people, writers, producers and public relations, presently lacking.

The government itself cannot finance this type of campaign. In the first place there is no authority for it and in the second it would likely be viewed simply as propaganda.

There might, however, be utilized the highly skilled advertisers who have such a great influence over our markets. Industry figures indicate that something like \$20 Billion was spent in 1971 on the promotion of products. Suppose that business would be willing to set aside just a small percentage of their advertising outlay on TV, radio, newspapers, magazine and outdoor advertising to tell the story of America. They prosper under a free enterprise system and they need to sell the system to maintain conditions which keep them prosperous. Even the idea of some form of tax credit might be justified for those who would be willing to devote attention to this need but it should not be necessary.

The 36-inch line is expected to be completed in less than a year, and will cost in excess of 70 million dollars. Funds for the project will be drawn from cash generated within the company and from borrowing; no equity issue is anticipated in connection with the project.

McCord explained that the pipeline is necessary to further strengthen Lone Star's currently excellent gas supply; and to provide access to additional supplies for serving new marketing areas. The Dallas-based utility currently has owned and contracted gas supply equal to about 15 year's sales at current delivery levels.

This is the first in a series of planned management actions to place Lone Star in a position to continue its recent trend of growth and increasing profitability.

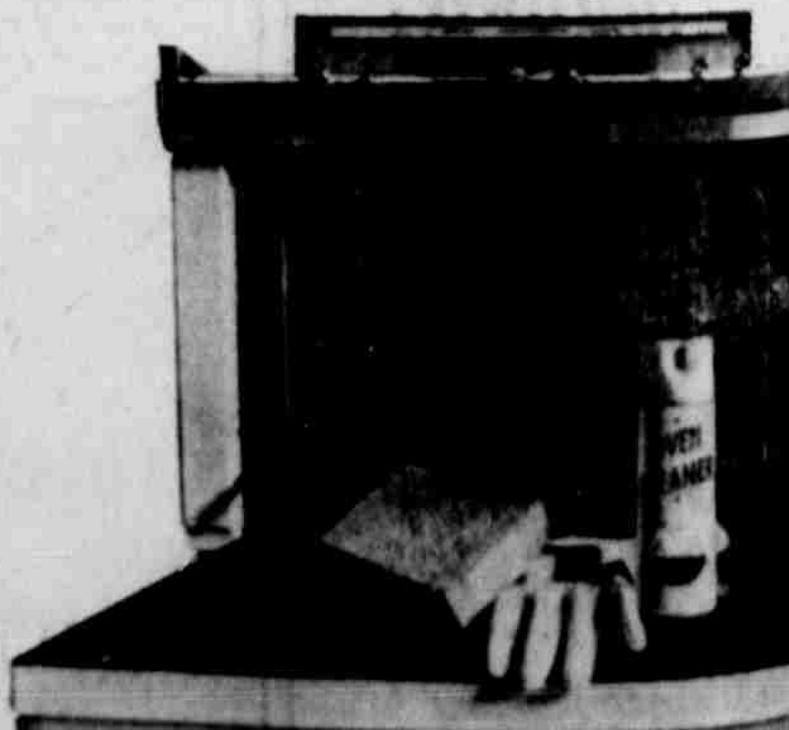
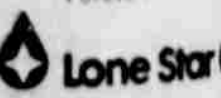

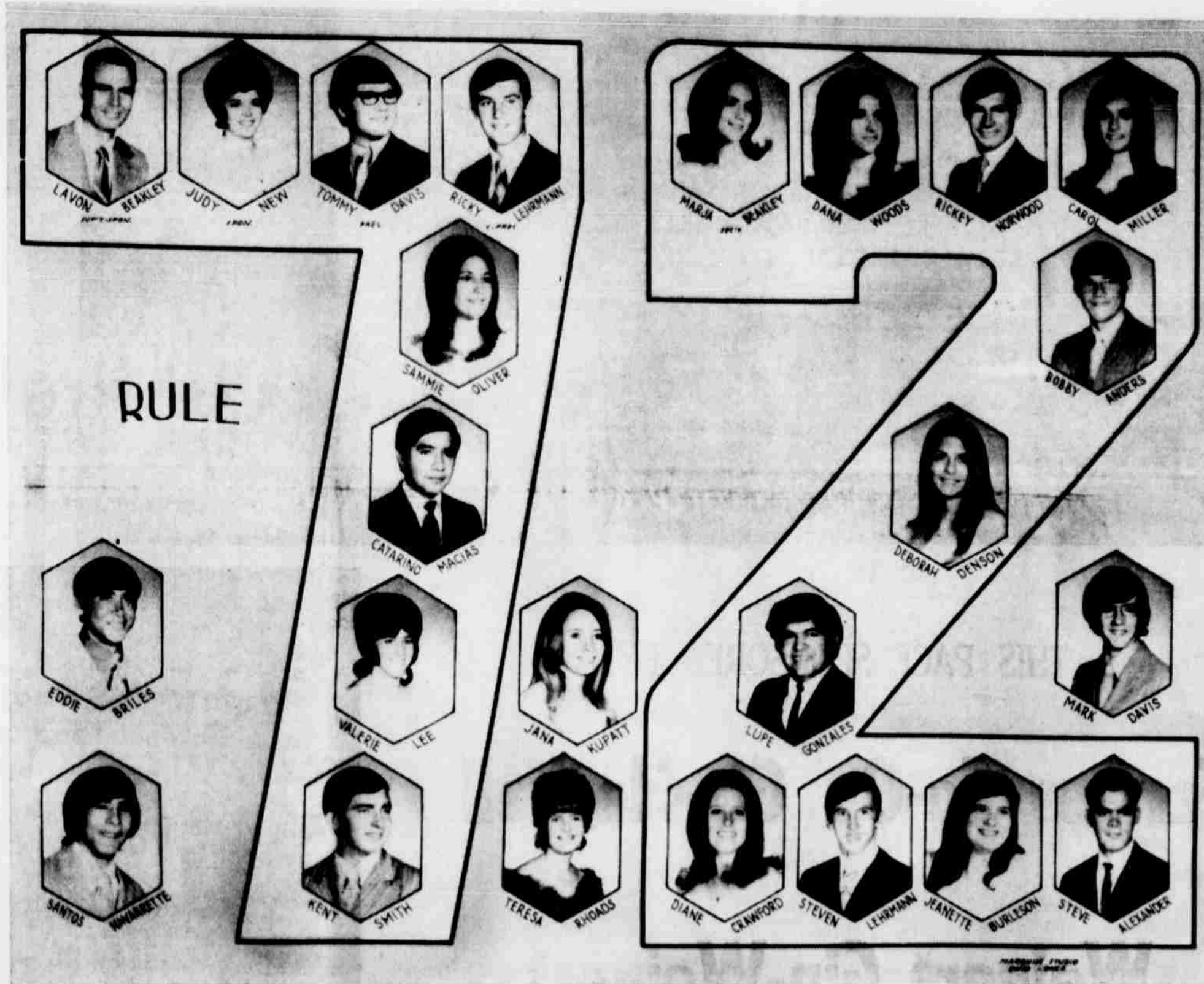
