

One County Race To Be Held In Second Primary

Potential vote in Haskell County, based on registrations, is 4,319; however, Haskell County voters must have taken their voting lightly as only 2,523 ballots were cast Saturday in the first Democratic Primary, and left only one county race to be settled in the second primary, June 16, that of County Clerk, which pits Mrs. Lee McKelvain against Mary (Sego) Lowe.

Incumbent Artie Bradley, defeated both of her opponents, Frances (Blackwell) Arend and Geraldine (Petrich) Hise, with-out a run-off, for County Treasurer.

County Superintendent Jessie Vick, incumbent, defeated her opponent, Iva Palmer.

Incumbent Slover Bledsoe topped his opponent, Cole Hamner for Commissioner Precinct 2.

E. C. Collins, incumbent, downed his opponent, Joe Kimbrough.

The lowest reading for the month of April was on the 5th, when the temperature dropped to 27 degrees. A high of 89 was registered on April 22.

Only seven days remain on the calendar before the big Frontier Days Celebration and Rice Springs Rodeo gets underway and there is only one man standing in the way who could keep it from being one of the most outstanding annual events ever staged in Haskell. However, this one old boy, The Weather Man, is an onerous cuss and he carries a lot of weight and a terrific wallop, as was experienced by local citizens last week when he pitched a curve ball in the form of baseball size hail which left local insurance men and adjustors literally pulling their hair trying to take care of their honored claims of damage.

Sponsors of the celebration, designed to re-live some of the days of the old West, are hoping to have his cooperation and are going full steam ahead to be sure that all phases of the full three days and nights program of entertainment is oiled and ready to function on scheduled.

Actually, the first event is planned for Tuesday night, May 12, at the Texas Theatre when Haskell county ladies don ankle length dresses, etc., which were in style when Grandma was courting. They will vie in a unique contest on the stage for the honor of being selected as "Miss Frontier Days." Women from the ages of 25 on up are eligible to enter and are encouraged to notify the Chamber of Commerce of their intentions in this respect. The winner will receive a beautiful plaque plus being honored in the western street parade at 5 p. m. Thursday, May 14. Other feature attractions at the Theatre will be square dancing by the Scartie-Teens under the direction of Mrs. James Mickler and the first time appearance in Haskell of the Abilene High School's famed barbershop quartet. Haskell Is Pelted By Hailstorm; Considerable Damage Is Reported

Haskell was on the edge of a rain and hailstorm which moved-in, out of the northwest, striking about 4:00 p. m., Wednesday of last week and lasted for only a few short minutes. Considerable damage was reported. The north section of town seemed to bear the brunt of the storm.

The hailstones measured from marble to golf ball size and some as large as baseballs. Roy Cook, who resides on North Avenue G, reported picking up two hailstones that measured 9 1/2 inches, and another 11 1/2 inches in diameter.

Several neon signs were knocked out; a large number of homes had roof damage, window panes broken-out, doors beaten-in; several cars and trucks windshields were smashed, and the streets were covered with tree leaves and brush.

Nine windows and two doors were broken out at the Clear View Lodge, 1504 North First; several windows were smashed on the west side of the third floor of the courthouse; 20 stained glass panes were broken at the Presbyterian Church; three plate glass windows were broken at the USDA Commodity office, 309 South First; a glass on a west door of Medford Buick-Pontiac Company, 200 N. Avenue E, was broken-out; 300 window panes were broken out at Haskell High, Junior High and gym; a number of stained glass windows were smashed on the west side of the Church of Christ; some 20 panes were broken-out on the west side of the Duncan Gin; Conner Nursery & Floral Company had some 500 panes smashed and heavy damage to plants; a skylight at City Floral was broken out; two windows were broken out at the Fire Station; three window lights were broken out on the west side of Holden-McCauley Funeral Home; Some 40 or 50 window panes were cracked and broken at the Auditorium of the First Baptist Church and damage to air conditioner units.

A total of 30 of an inch of rain was gauged in Haskell during the hailstorm and another .48 of an inch was added to that amount in the "wee hours" of Thursday morning, according to Sam Herren, "The Weatherman."

There was, of course, other damage, but the above mentioned was reported to the Free Press.

THE ROAD TO RUIN

Historical Item From Haskell Is On Display At Institute Texas Culture

SAN ANTONIO—History and frontier wit combine in a display from Haskell now on view at the Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

The historical item is an old sign that once hung over the only saloon in Haskell.

The town was built near Willow Springs, discovered by Capt. Randolph Marcy, who al-

so mapped the Big Spring fur-trail southwest.

Official name of the saloon was "Road to Ruin," which fit the dry humor for which the West was famous. Across the top of the sign was fashioned an oversized key, with the letters "W H I S" prominent thereon.

The sign was salvaged by a cowboy, Tom Lemmon, of Haskell. The Museum, of Texas Technological College in Lubbock, obtained the sign from the late Tom Lemmon, Jr. of Haskell.

The Institute of Texan Cultures, part of the University of Texas System, later obtained the sign on loan from The Museum.

Now the "Road to Ruin" display has joined the thousands of other items at the Institute, helping to tell the story of Texas and its people.

Marvin Post, formerly of Haskell and now living in San Antonio, recalled a wealth of details about the sign and the saloon.

Two Haskell businessmen with a sense of humor bought the idea and the sign from a travelling sign painter, Frank Draper and Jack Baldwin, co-owners, ran the saloon from 1884 to 1895, when they sold out to John Keister and Jumbo Hazelwood. The latter two continued to operate the Road to Ruin until 1904, when Haskell County voted dry.

According to the Texas handbook, the saloon, ironically, was also used as a church—not uncommon in the early days.

Baldwin and Draper had other business interests in Haskell—a livery stable and a mail hack which ran to Abilene.

Post has cause to remember the saloon, as he was once evicted because of his age.

Post recalls that he had entered the saloon with an older gentleman in order to get away from the cold weather. He stayed in the back room while his friend, being more than of age, went on to the bar. The bartender spotted young Post, who was about 7 or 8 years old, and told the older man to get the lad out.

The Road to Ruin sign hangs in the Anglo-American section of the Institute, along with many other artifacts.

The Institute uses all modern methods to tell the story of Texas in terms of its people, from the various cultures which made up the population and helped influence our heritage.

The main exhibit floor, the approximate size of a football field, is divided into 26 sections—one for each national, racial or religious group which contributed to Texas history.

Besides the imaginatively-designed artifact exhibits, use is made of music, film and slides.

Also used are Histo-walls, consisting of easy-to-read text panels accompanied by historic photos of persons, places and things.

In addition, the Dome Show portrays, on 36 screens, the various traditions of Texans of all cultures as practiced today.

The Institute of Texan Cultures is on the southeast side of HemisFair Plaza in downtown San Antonio.

There is no admission charge. Hours through June 1 are from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. Tuesdays through Fridays, and from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. Saturdays and Sundays.

30 YEARS AGO (May 10, 1930)

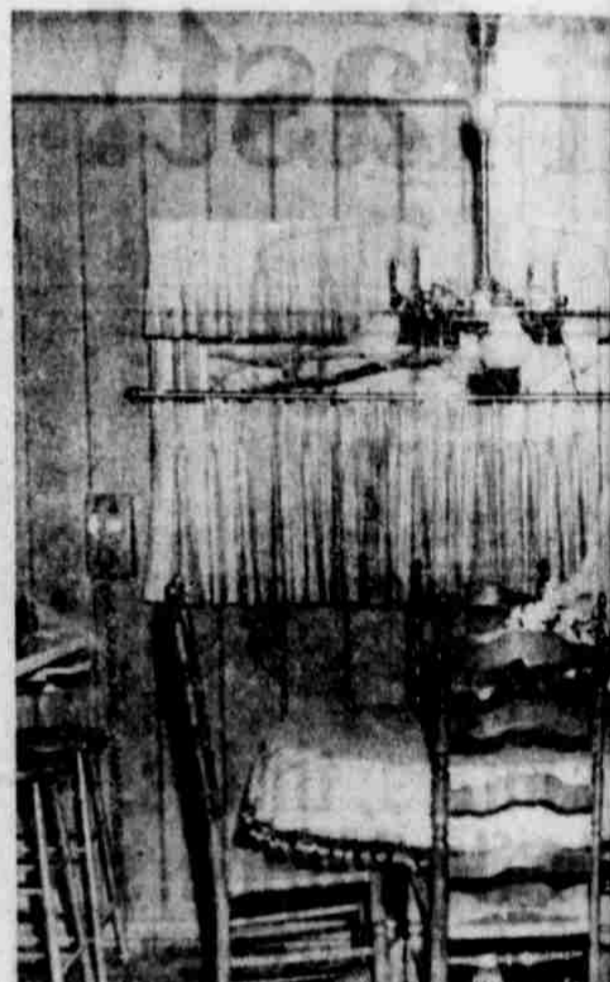

Who Was Where You Are Now?

There is an old adage which proclaims that, "time changes things." The saying certainly holds true in many aspects of life and especially so as it pertains to towns, communities, the people who lived in them in days gone by, and those who now call them home.

Many changes have been made in Haskell since the covered wagons first brought the settlers to the western part of Texas. Even the name of the town was changed from Rice Springs to Haskell and the Indians who were the first settlers moved onto the reservations. The countless herds of

buffalo which provided them with meat, clothing and tepees were killed off and now modern Hereford Cattle range where they did in the early days.

The frontiersman passed on long ago to his just reward but today there are quite a few of his ancestors living here and to give them the opportunity to look backward to olden times, and for the information of the "newcomers" who now call Haskell home, the following word-picture is drawn.

One of the early-day business establishments which flourished here was, of course, the Road to Ruin Saloon which was

located just south of where the Haskell Free Press now does business. The well which provided water for the saloon (if and when needed) was covered up by Jetty V. Clare when he moved the paper into its present quarters. He considered it a hazard as it was under the floor just about where the presses are now standing. It is reputed that more than one early day settler reached the end of the trail while partaking of the beverages it had to offer.

The Haskell Free Press has been housed in more than one building since it made its appearance in Haskell many years ago which makes it the oldest business establishment in town. It is followed in number of years by the Haskell National Bank, Oates Drug and one or two others.

The First National Bank was located in a wooden building where the City Cafe is now operating. Later it was moved to where Sherman Floor Co. is on the Northwest corner of the square where it was for many years until the present modern structure was erected.

Oates' Drug was established in 1888 by a Mr. Pope McElmore for operation by T. B. Bond and has been in the same location since that time. The bricks used to put up the building were made on what is called Spring Creek about where the city park now is.

where the Coffee Shop is at the present time.

Grissom's Store was housed in the building presently occupied by the Ben Franklin Store. It was an early day mercantile firm which did big business here for many years and later set up in Abilene.

One of the very first businesses here was, of course, the Sherrill Brothers Hardware which occupied the space where Bynums is presently located.

Brooks Cafe and Bakery was located for many years in the building where the Johnson Pharmacy now does business.

Oscar Harrow also ran a bakery here for many years in the building where the City Floral now is. There are still quite a number of people living who can remember the delicious Milk Dandy Bread baked daily in this establishment.

Several early day firms are still doing business here under the same trade names such as Jones-Cox and Co., which has been operating in the same location since the year 1905.

Gholson Grocery is yet another early day establishment and it has been housed in four buildings, at various times being on the north side in two or three locations before being located at the present site.

J. U. Fields Grocery was on the west side for many years in the building where Frazier's is now located. Also, on the west side was Mask Grocery and where Lane-Felker now is, Henry Lee ran a grocery store for a number of years.

Where the Pogue Grocery now is located used to be the location of the Y. L. Thompson Twin Service Stations. R. J. Reynolds was an early day grocer and was located at times on the north side of the square and on the west side.

Reid Drug was just north of Fouts Dry Goods and Variety, a firm which has passed the half century mark in operation.

Wheatley's is yet another early day clothing store and has been on the north side for many years.

Cahill and Duncan Insurance and Real Estate has been in its present location since the late

1980's and the Hartsfield Agency has been in continuous operation since about 1890 with different owners.

The list could go on and on but neither time nor space is permitted at this time, but perhaps the above list will give you a hazy idea of how Haskell must have looked long, long ago.

Were You Counted In Census '70?

Were you counted in Census '70? With the 1970 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Manager Richard R. Newton announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

If you think you or your family might have been missed, you are urged to notify the census district office by means of

a "Were You Counted?" form. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures giving the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the District Manager is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued from Washington later this year after returns have been tabulated by the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Manager. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the

next Federal census. "Representation in Congress and the future is determined by population count in the census. Funds, in turn, are allocated to states, counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. A complete count means uniformity in the Federal allotment in government. Thus, it is imperative that a complete help of every resident area is needed to reach the goal," he said.

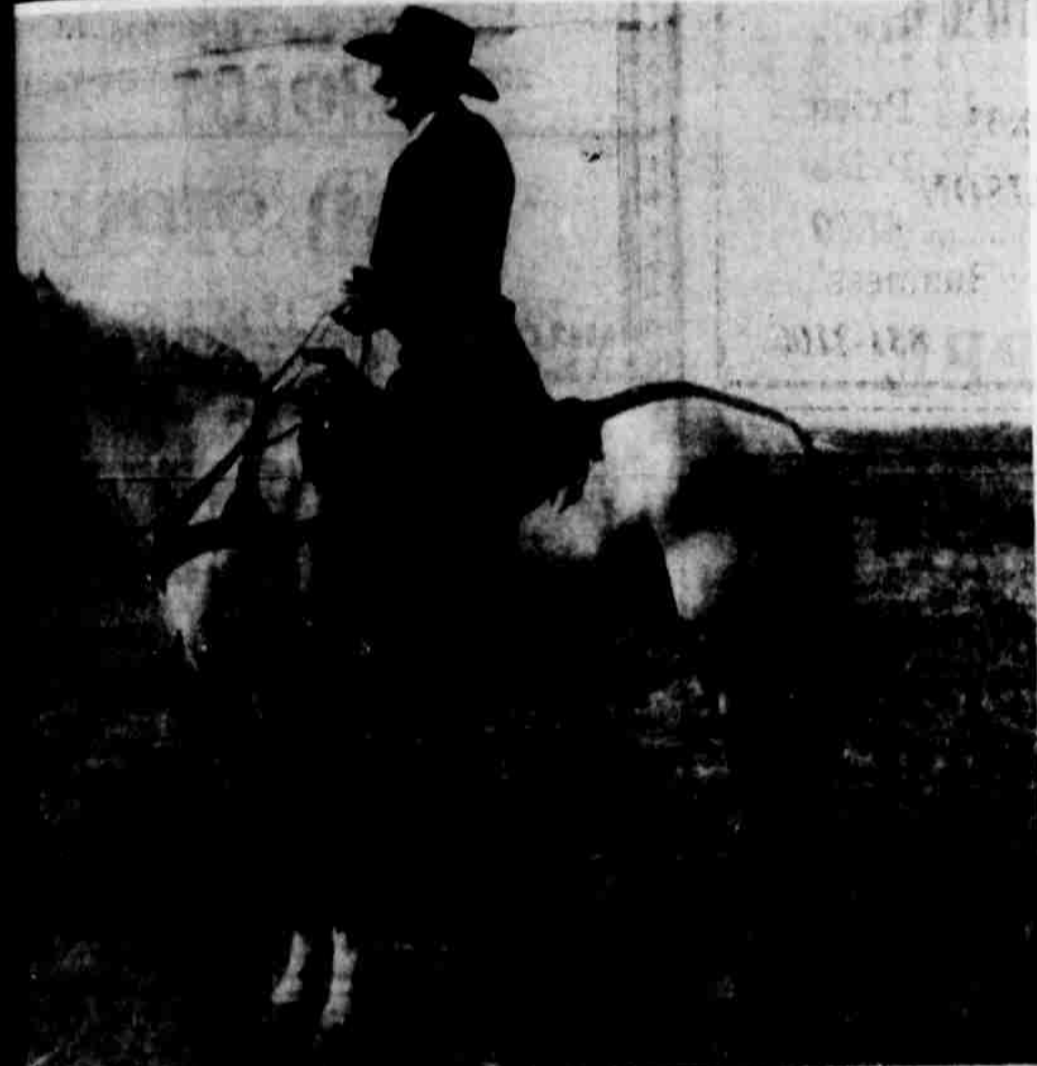

The May Draft Call For Texas Down From April

The May draft call for Texas is 834, and no man will be selected and ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 145, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service Director, said Friday.

The May quota is down from 940 in April, which has been filled with men having random sequence numbers no higher than 115.

The state quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in May is 5,828, down from 8,442 in April. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 215.

Deferred or exempt men, such as teachers, college students, and vocational or trade school students, with random sequence numbers 1 through 215 may be forwarded for these examinations if they are likely to lose their deferred or exempt status during the next six months, Colonel Schwartz said.

No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, also will not be called now for this purpose.

A drawing probably will be held in July to establish the numbers for the 1951 group.

All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number.

The Texas induction quota of 834 for May is the state's share of a national call for 15,000 men, all for the Army.

Joe Harper, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell, received word today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 1/2%.

The variable rate loan plan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank last July, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market.

In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in the price which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans.

"Recent improvements in the money market have made this reduction possible," Harper stated.

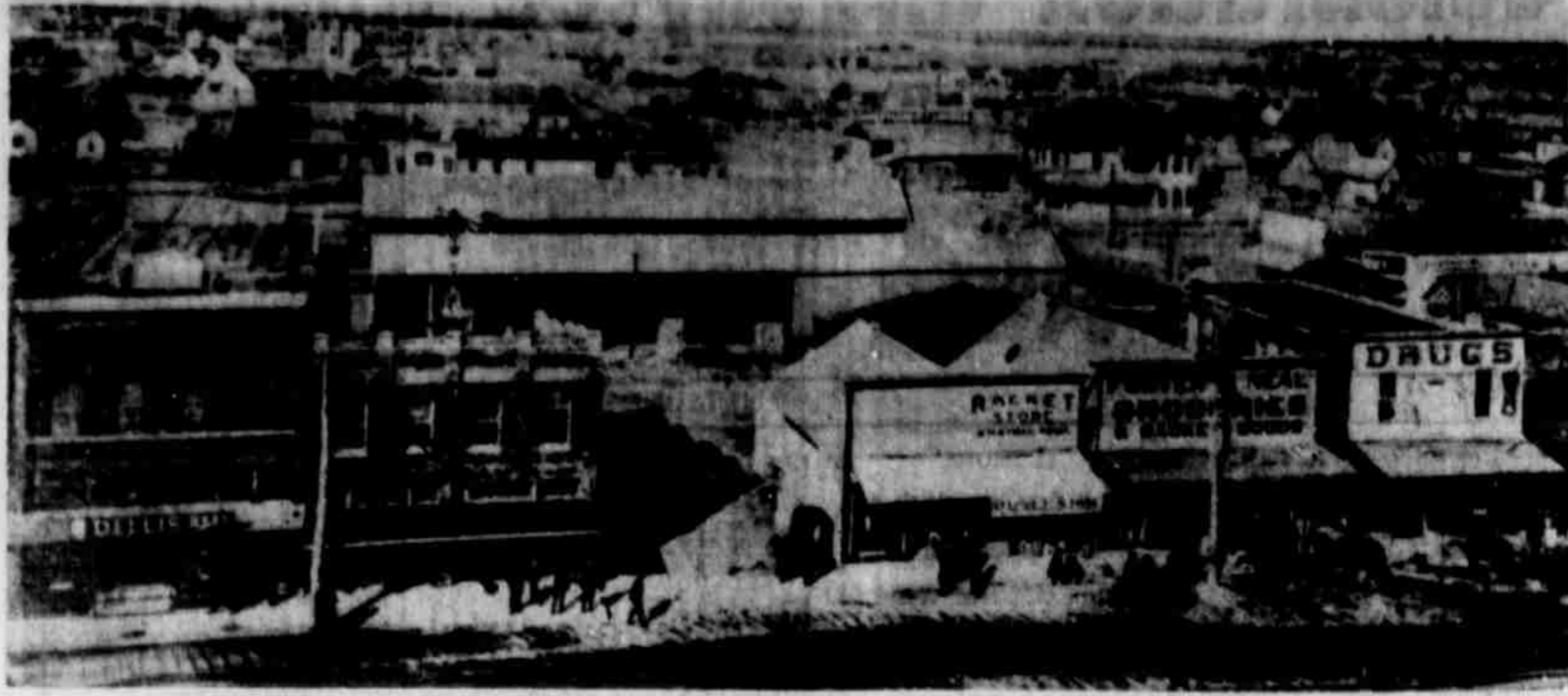

Park Sloan Champion of Haskell Country Club Golf Tournament

Park Sloan, of Breckenridge, who lost a one-shot lead on the 18th hole, rolled in a six-foot putt of a sudden-death play-off on the fourth hole to defeat Houston Satterwhite for the championship of the Haskell Country Club Invitational tournament Sunday.

Sloan, Satterwhite and defending champion David Burson all tied at three-over-par 74 at the end of the regulation 18 holes. Burson went out with a bogey on the first hole of the playoff. The end came on the tough fourth hole, which plays much longer than its 352 yards because of a stiff wind. Neither of the two golfers reached the green in regulation. Ken Lane of Haskell Featured In Story In The Progressive Farmer

The following article, headed "Interplanting Pays A Bonus To Skip-Row Planting", was released in the May issue of "The Progressive Farmer", by Del Deterling, Associate Editor, about Ken Lane of Haskell:

"The greatest increase in cotton yields from skip-row planting, researchers and growers have found, is obtained by leaving four blank rows on each side of two rows of cotton. However, this system requires three acres of land for one acre of cotton, and on a total land-used basis it is often less profitable than solid planting.

Many growers are making skip-row cotton more profitable by planting an alternate cash crop in the two center rows of a four-row blank.

Last year, Ken Lane, of Haskell, used a planting system of 2 rows cotton, 2 rows fallow, 2 rows cotton, 4 rows fallow. This let him plant the maximum amount of cotton and also get full credit for diverted acreage under the government farm program. Late in June, about a month after planting cotton, Lane planted guar in the two middle rows of each 4-row

blank. His bonus, even after reduction in diversionment, was \$6.21 an acre. He was pleased with considering that 1969 were down throughout because of unfavorable conditions.

Lane's experience cut by research at A&M Agricultural Station at Chillicothe over four years. Net income averaged from \$14 to \$20 above the conventional system of 2 rows cotton, where guar was in the middle of blank.

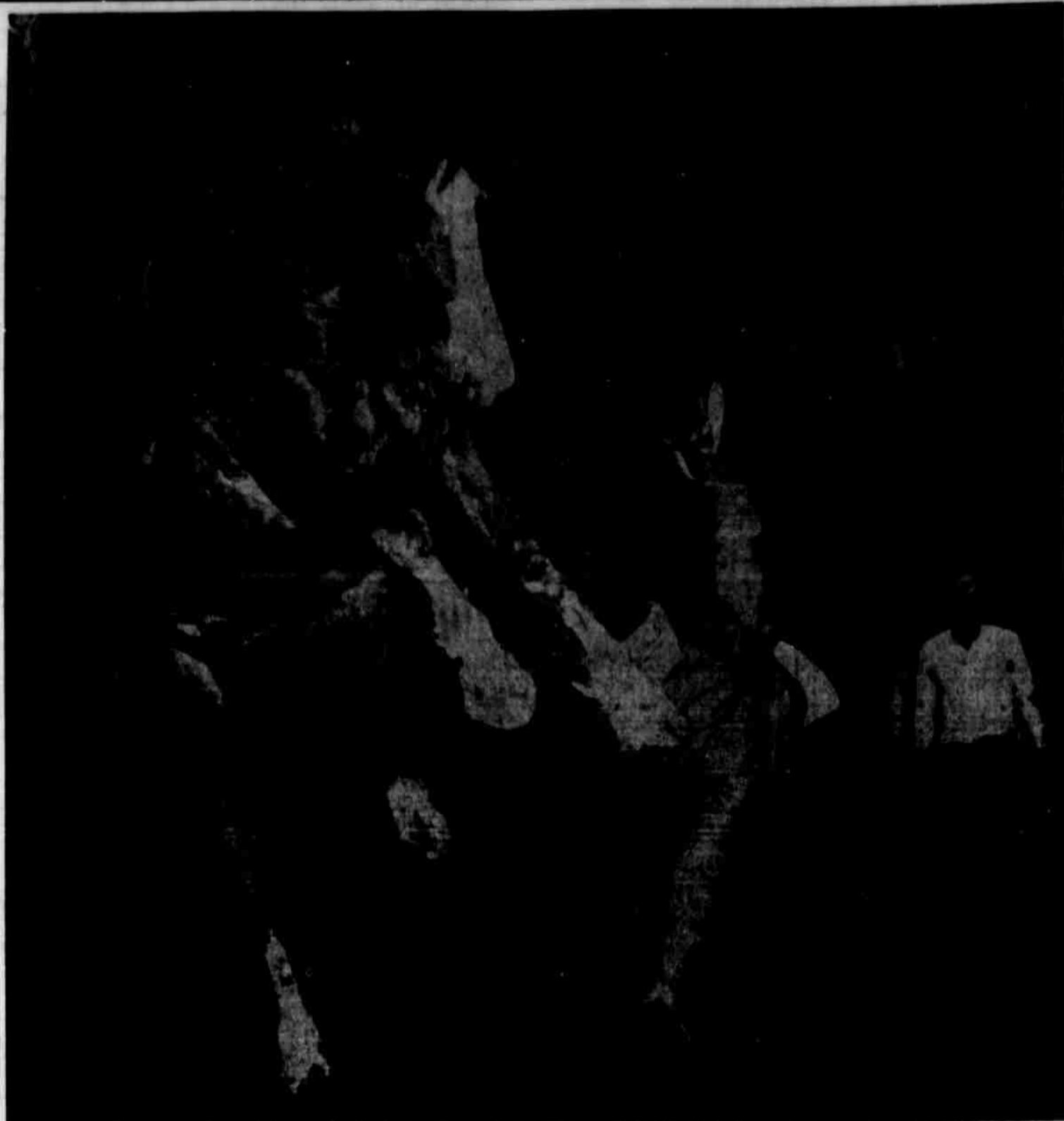

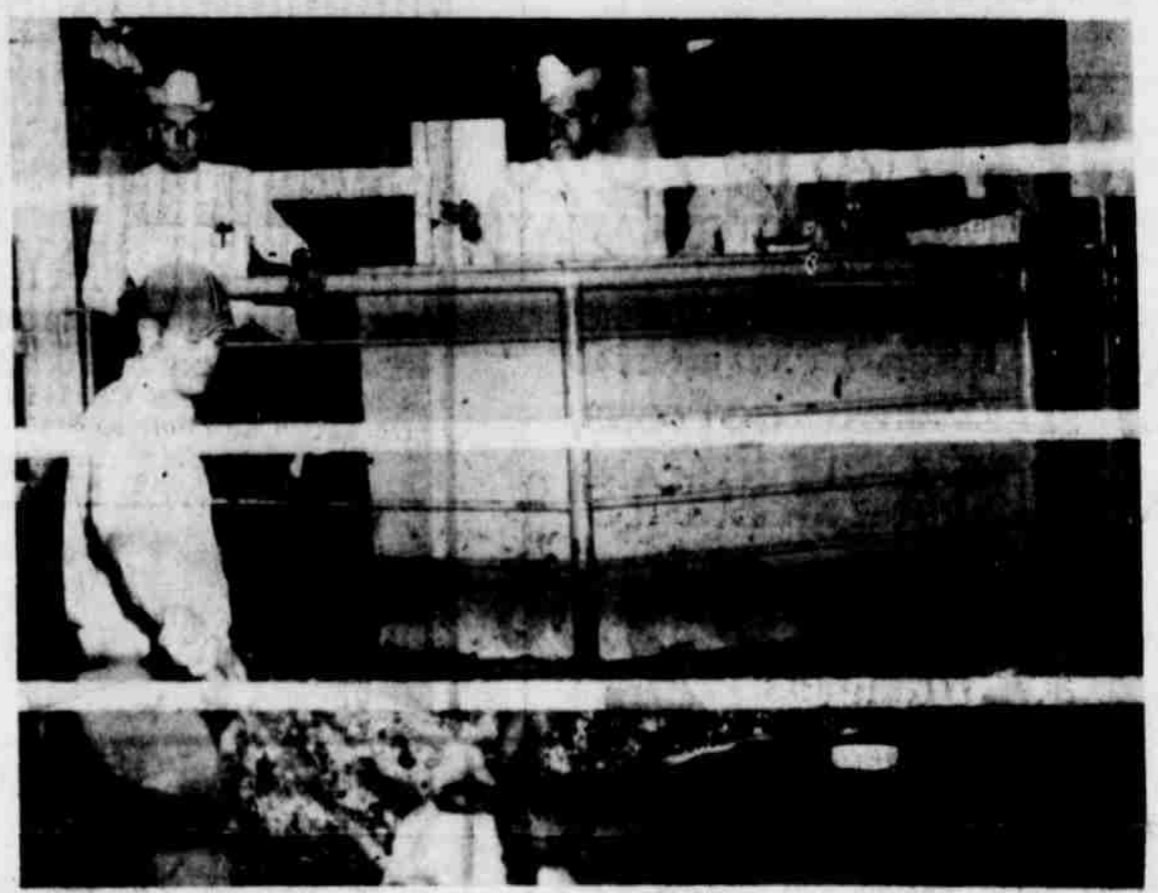
