Effective date for certificates issued to voters who register during February is April 1, 1971.

If you have applied for registration, but have been notified that your application was unsigned or was otherwise insufficient, you may sign or correct these applications during February.

Applications received after the original January 31 deadline will be effective April 1, 1971.

Any local option election or other election held prior to April 1, 1971, registrations in February will not be effective.

This also applies to 18 to 21 year olds who now may vote in FEDERAL ELECTIONS ONLY.
