#### Contract Let For School Construction

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session Monday, January 8, 1973, in the board room of the high school.

Minutes of the December 4. 1972, (previously reported) and December 21, 1972, meetings were read and approved as presented. The December 21 meeting was for the purpose of letting of the contract for the construction of the new junior high school and a cademic center. The contract was awarded to Durbin Construction Company with a low bid of \$656,232 and 450 allowable days for construction. Construction will begin as soon as weather permits and inclement weather is included in the allowable

days.
Routine items presented included tax collection (90.30%), enrollment, health, and cate-

teria reports.

The board began studies of the various state plans for fu-ture financing of the public schools in the state. Eleven committees are working at the state level and will present these reports to the current legislature. Reports of these committees were surveyed by the board. These were: the Senate Plan directed by Sena-tor Mausy, the Texas State Teachers Association Plan, and the Texas Education Agency Plan. All plans will be examined as they are made available by the legislature. The legislature has been ordered by the Federal Courts to adopt a new plan for financing the public schools by September,

#### City's Share Of Revenue Is **Under Promise**

Abernathy's City Council met in regular session January 8. 1973, at City Hall, Jack Moss from the auditing

firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss was present and presented to the council the audit report for the City of Abernathy's fiscal year 1971-72. Following a general discussion of the report, it was the general consensus of the council to accept the report as submitted. Audit copies are available in the City Manager's office for persons wishing to review the

Bids for the 1973 gasoline supply for the City were received and opened. Consumer's Fuel Association was the low bidder at 17.9¢ per gallon and was awarded the bid for a one-year period beginning

Jan. 15, 1973. The City Council voted unanimously to establish the following Standard Policy for water and sewer utility extensions in new sub-divisions or additions. "All cost of water and sewer utility extensions in new sub-divisions or additions are to be paid for entirely by the developer of such subdivision or addition with no reimbursement whatsoever from the City of Abernathy for such water and sewer utility extensions."

The proposed sanitation contract with Triple C Sanitation Service is to be presented at the next regular meeting of the city council. City Attorney is presently reviewing certain legal matters concerning such a contract.

Revenue sharing report given by the city manager revealed that no explanation or clarification as to the reasons for the City of Abernathy's resharing allocations has been received from the United States Treasury Department or the United States Office of Revenue Sharing. Correspondence received in September, 1972, reported that Abernathy would receive approximately \$40,424, but final allocation amounts released in December, 1972, stated that Abernathy would only receive an approximate annual allocation of \$27,172. One of the major concerns of the reduction is that this reduces the per capita allocation far below that of Plainview, Lubbock, and Slaton -- which have similar tax rates and other financial characteristics. Until such time as the Federal Government is willing to discuss the statistics used in deriving Abernathy's allocation, there is very little that can be done.

The City sales tax check for the quarter ending September 30, 1972, has been received in the amount of \$6,306.30 which is a 9.7% increase over the same period last year. CITY RECEIVES SECOND

FEDERAL CHECK The City of Abernathy received its second revenue-sharing check Jan. 9th. This check was approximately 3-1/2% less than the first check due to the Treasury Department establishing a reserve fund to facilitate future adjustments for entitlement allocations.

The first check received December 11, 1972, was for \$13,586 and covered the period from Jan. 1, 1972, to June 30, 1972. With the second check, the City has received \$26,623 for the first year of a proposed

five-year revenue sharing plan. City Manager Glen Metcalf has returned a request from the Treasury Department indicating discrepancies in some figures used to compute the City's revenue sharing funds. It is hoped the discrepancies stated will increase annual allocations for Abernathy.

#### Rigs Could Help During **Emergencies**

emergencies. The recent severe ice storm and snow reminds that emergencies can arise ... such as those in the late 1950's when school buses became stranded in snow and passengers were taken in by nearby farm families. At that time, tractors and improvised sleds were used to take groceries to these farm

Now, we are better equipped than ever, transportation-wise, in snow and muddy roads. A new piece of equipment (shown above) recently was purchased by Plains Grain & Farm Supply of Abernathy. It is a rig that can apply fertilizer and herbicides, both in one trip over a field at the same time. This rig can run in fields covered by snow, and in rain-muddy itions without rut damage to the field in which it operates. In fact, it was used late last week to apply fertilizer & herbicide in a field, with no rut or compaction damage to the land. The rig has flotation tires that are over 40 inches wide.

The Plains Grain Co. rig could be used in emergencies to deliver groceries, medicine or a doctor in case snow or mud made other vehicle travelim-



The Hi-Plains rig, with its powerful water pump and height, was effectively used during the fires last fall (1971 crop) to help control gin fires at County Line. Crow also pointed out another valuable rig to help fight fires in the rural area. It is the fertilizer/herbicide nurse tanks that can carry a lot of water and pressure a stream of water 20 to 30 feet. Also, the tanks could augment the limited water supply carried in the city's rural fire fighting truck tank.


#### Winter Releases Area From Cold



The Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District states that the Soil Conservation Service provides technical and engineering assistance to producers who are planning to install permanent conservation practices such as irrigation pipelines, land leveling, diversion terraces, parallel terraces, pasture planting and grassed waterways. These services are available through the Soil Conservation Service without cost to the producer.

Many farmers and ranchers planning conservation work this winter and spring will find that there is no cost-share assistance available.

The Rural Environmental Assistant program was terminated by presidential order December 22, 1972. Any applications for cost - share assistance through this program that were made after this date will not be approved.

The Great Plains Conservation Program has not been affected. The conservation work on any certified contract can be done as soon as conditions







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#### BEESON YOUTH RETURNS HOME

Bill Beeson, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Beeson, was returned to his home here Saturday from Hendricks Memorial Hospital, Abilene. He had been a patient in that hospital since Dec. 28, when he was injured while on a bird hunting

trip near Novice, Texas.

He lost part of his liver, part
of his right lung and some ribs
on the right side in the acci-

Actually, it was a freak ac-cident in which he was injured, He was carrying shotgun shells in a hunting jacket. When he raised the automatic shotgun to shoot at birds, the butt of the gun kicked against the hunting jacket, causing a faulty shell in the jacket to discharge. Discharge from the faulty shell caused about three other shells in the jacket to explode, with the full impact of the exploding shells hitting him in the area of his liver, lungs and ribs. When Bill realized what had happened he began trying to throw the shotgun away, knowing another shell would be fired by the automa-tic. As he shoved the gun away by the butt, it turned in such a way that his right hand was hit and badly damaged by the sec-ond shell fired by the automa-
