



Fair Credit Reporting Act Becomes Law

The Fair Credit Reporting Act, which has just been signed into law by President Nixon, satisfies the concerns of consumers without placing undue restrictions upon the credit reporting industry, said Elvis White, owner of the Haskell Credit Bureau.

Consumer protections provided in the Fair Credit Reporting Act have been standard operating procedures at the Haskell Credit Bureau for many White said. "For example, the Act requires credit bureaus to disclose credit records to consumers which is our regular practice.

Associated Credit Bureaus, Inc., the international trade association with which the Haskell Credit Bureau is affiliated, supported passage of the law.

Even though most credit bureaus are already in compliance with the provisions of the Act, we plan to work closely consumer groups and credit granters so that everyone has a complete understanding of the law and how it will affect them." White said.

Cotton Classing Report

has helped put the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Munday, Texas, about 5 days behind. According to John E. Williams, Officer-In Charge, 6,632 samples were classed during the week ending November 6, 1970. The eason's total now stands at 10,750 samples. Most of the samreceipts continue to be from

Haskell County The predominant grades were as follows: 41 with 23 percent; 32 with 37 percent; and 42 with 31 percent. Staple lengths stayed about the same with 29's making up 28 percent of the total. Forty-four percent was 30's, 8 percent was 31's, and 16 percent was one-inch or longer.

Micronaire readings continue to be high but show a slight decrease over last week. Fiftyfive percent of the cotton miked 3.5 through 4.9, 37 percent was 5.0 through 5.2, and 8 percent was 5.3 and higher.

Buyer demand is still strong especially in the lower grades and staples. Producers received from 250 to 400 points above CCC loan prices for the predominant qualities.

Her decision led her to the Christian Medical College at Vellore where, guided by the ideals of its founder, the famous Dr. Ida Seudder, she became a surgeon. Then, shortly after her graduation, an accident made Mary a paraplegic. How she reconstructed her life, how she learned to perform delicate hand and face operations while seated in her wheel chair, and how she became a fully qualified rehabilitation specialist are some of the theme of this dra-
