A banquet is set for Saturday night, August 7. Some 300-350 are expected to attend.

Abernathy has two members of the Lost Battalion, Jesse Webb and H. G. Thornton. The ship on which the men destined to be known as the Lost Battalion was in Hawaii the night before the Japanese struck Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941. Their ship had cleared the attack area before the early morning sneak attack by the Japanese. They ended up in Australia, and from there to Java. They served as the ground crew for the 10th U. S. Army Air Force Bomb Group. With the Japanese closing in, the bomb group planes left Java... and the men who were to become known as the Lost Battalion. They were captured by the Japanese about March 8, 1942, and moved from Java to Singapora then to Burma, where as prisoners of war of the Japanese they were forced to build railroads. They underwent brutal treatment by their captors... were freed after Japan surrendered to the United States August 14, 1945.

HALE COUNTY PEST MANAGEMENT PROGRAM NEW SLETTER

Elwin E. Latham, County Extension Entomologist, Hale County. Crop continue to make good growth and development. Most corn is in the milkstage with some very early corn in the soft-dough stage. Much of the grain sorghum is in the boot stage with some headed out. Cotton is beginning to bloom well.

INSECT SITUATION COTTON: Cotton seems to be without major insect problems at this time.

CORN: The bulk of insect problems this week is corn. Spiller mites are increasing in many fields and are approaching the economic level for the first time. In other fields beneficial insects have kept spitter mite numbers low. Second generation southwestern corn borers can be found in many fields at this time. The first major egg lay occurred over the weekend in fields with heavy first generation populations. Infestations range up to 40% of the plants with corn borer egg masses. The first eggs will hatch around July 28-29th.

Again let me remind producers that the first generation of the corn borer is greatly spread out. Larvae of the first generation are still abundant in some fields. This means that eggs of the second generation will be laid over a long period. Prevention controls to keep all borers out will require several applications at considerable cost. Texas Agriculture Extension Service recommendations state that chemical control should be applied when 35% of the plants are infested with egg masses and/or young borers. Many fields with low populations may never reach this population level.

Early harvest with modern machines designed to pick up lodged corn will greatly reduce losses to the corn borer.

Several fields have been covered with extensive defoliation by fall armyworms. The fields affected are as a rule "grassy". The fall armyworms feed on the watergrasses and then move up on the corn. Producers need to check grassy areas for this pest to avoid excessive defoliation.

HALE COUNTY 1st IN SUNFLOWERS

AUSTIN--Hale County farmers placed first in 1975 sunflower production with a crop of 60,187,000 pounds, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported.

County farmers harvested 53,500 acres with an average yield of 1,125 pounds per acre. Planting of sunflowers started in South Texas in late February and the stands made good early growth and crop prospects were excellent. The crop outlook was also outstanding for the High and Low Plains, but insect problems developed and production fell off. Stands which had appeared excellent in the field failed to measure up to expectations when harvested, and yield per acre declined considerably.

Late stands on the High Plains went through a period of cold, wet weather in September that delayed growth, and many of the fields failed to reach maturity with a corresponding loss in yield and quality.



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
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

HALE COUNTY PEST
MANAGEMENT PROGRAM
NEW SLETTER

Elwin E. Latham, County Extension Entomologist, Hale County. Crops continue to make good growth and development. Most corn is in the milkstage with some very early corn in the soft-dough stage. Much of the grain sorghum is in the boot stage with some headed out. Cotton is beginning to bloom well.

INSECT SITUATION

COTTON: Cotton seems to be without major insect problems at this time. CORN: The bulk of insect problems this week is in corn. Spider mites are increasing in many fields and are approaching the economic level for the first time. In other fields beneficial insects have kept spider mite numbers low.

Second generation southwestern corn borers can be found in many fields at this time. The first major egg lay occurred over the weekend in fields with heavy first generation populations. Infestations range up to 40% of the plants with corn borer egg masses. The first eggs will hatch around July 28-29th.

Again let me remind producers that the first generation of the corn borer is greatly spread out. Larvae of the first generation are still abundant in some fields. This means that eggs of the second generation will be laid over a long period. Prevention controls to keep all borers out will require several applications at considerable cost. Texas Agriculture Extension Service recommendations state that chemical control should be applied when 35% of the plants are infested with egg masses and/or young borers. Many fields with low populations may never reach this population level.

Early harvest with modern machines designed to pick up lodged corn will greatly reduce losses to the corn borer. Several fields have been observed with extensive defoliation by fall armyworms. The fields affected are as a rule "grassy". The fall armyworms feed on the watergrasses and then move up on the corn. Producers need to check grassy areas for this pest to avoid excessive defoliation.

HALE COUNTY 1st
IN SUNFLOWERS

AUSTIN--Hale County farmers placed first in 1975 sunflower production with a crop of 60,187,000 pounds, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported. County farmers harvested 53,500 acres with an average yield of 1,125 pounds per acre.

Planting of sunflowers started in South Texas in late February and the stands made good early growth and crop prospects were excellent. The crop outlook was also outstanding for the High and Low Plains, but insect problems developed and production fell off. Stands which had appeared excellent in the field failed to measure up to expectations when harvested, and yield per acre declined considerably.

Late stands on the High Plains went through a period of cold, wet weather in September that delayed growth, and many of the fields failed to reach maturity with a corresponding loss in yield and quality.

SWPS Directors Meet In Boston

Directors of Southwestern Public Service Company, meeting last week in Boston, approved construction of a third 350,000-kilowatt, coal-fired electric generator for installation at Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo.

The unit approved at the meeting will go into service in mid-1980. Roy Tolk, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Southwestern, said that both 1980 and 1981 had been considered as completion dates while the unit was in the planning stage, but that load growth and customer gains in the last few months made it advisable to move forward to the 1980 date. Earlier, Tolk had reported to

the board that the company had gained nearly 8,000 customers in the last twelve months.

New officer posts went to two Amarilloans as a result of today's meeting and an earlier meeting of the board of TUCO INC., Southwestern's fuel subsidiary. Coyt Webb was named treasurer and assistant secretary of TUCO, and Doyle Bunch was elected assistant secretary and assistant treasurer of Southwestern.

Webb, who is a graduate of Texas Tech and a certified public accountant, joined Southwestern as a system auditor in 1964. He was named supervisor of internal auditing in January, 1975, promoted to executive assistant in October of that year and elected assistant secretary of Southwestern and

TUCO last January.

Bunch, a native Amarilloan and Texas High School graduate, earned his bachelor of business administration degree at Texas Tech. He is also a certified public accountant and joined Southwestern in June of this year from a national accounting firm. The directors also approved an amendment to the by-laws, reducing the number of directors from 12 to 11. This action came after they had accepted, with regret, the resignation from the board of Murrell R. Tripp, who had served on the Southwestern board since 1962, resigned for personal reasons.

All of the directors signed the necessary consent forms to stand for re-election at the annual meeting of stockholders which will be held in

Amarillo in January of next year.

A price of \$12.00 per share was established for 1,050,000 shares of the company's common stock which will be offered to the public today. Proceeds from the sale will go for the construction of new facilities.

The regular quarterly dividend of 24-1/2¢ per share on the common stock, payable on September 1 to holders of record on August 16, was approved. The dividend will apply to the new shares which are being offered to the public today.

Other dividend action in-

cluded declaration of the regular quarterly dividends on all outstanding issues of preferred stocks. These dividends will be paid on November 1 to holders of record on October 20.


