## Community Co-Operation

Modern times have ushered in a new species of panics known as "money panics" which usually develop during periods when the country is producing good crops of all kinds. These "money panics" have the same depressing effect on values as the panics caused by crop failures and shortages.

If the wealth produced by the people in any community is kept at home a money shortage is almost an impossibility. This wealth kept at home stimulates community values and benefits every local producer.

If you live in a community where co-operation is practiced you spend a certain amount of money with your local dry goods merchant. He in turn patronizes the grocer, the druggist, the hardware merchant, the furniture dealer, etc. His employees are paid by him and they in turn spend their wages with home dealers. In other words, any money you spend in a local store reaches nearly every legitimate line of business in your

community even to the professions, such as doctors, dentists, lawyers and others.

In such a community your local merchants purchase your various products, or should do so, and in this way you get back the money you have spent with him.

"Community Buying and Selling" simply means the trading of money from one interest to another, thereby keeping the larger per cent of the wealth at home and in that way preventing depression during money shortages. Remember that during "money panics" every dollar has a buying power well above par.

You must also take into consideration the fact that your local merchant pays local taxes which apply to the building and maintenance of local churches, schools and other public service buildings, as well as good roads, parks, local charity, etc.

Weigh your purchasing money carefully on the scales of your local market before sending it away.

The problem that confronts the farmer next in importance to distribution is diversification.

To eliminate waste and inefficiency in living, the farmer should keep in close touch with market conditions.

The commonly accepted theory that we are short on production is all wrong. We are short on marketing information.

While Texas is the leading livestock state of the union, we consume \$24,000 more of pork annually than we produce.

As the season advances, the plow is the farmer's best friend but when the season closes, the silo comes in mighty handy.

The farmer can not be helped until he organizes, and the government can not help the farmer except through organization.

We must study the markets of the community, state and nation and see that the wants are supplied and not overflowed.

We can not bring rain when it is needed, but we can keep the cultivators going during the worst drouth that ever happened.

While the Texas farmer is plowing in the field, he is boarding in Europe or takes his meals with his neighbors a thousand miles away.

If a boy imagines that education will enable him to live without work, he is sadly mistaken. It will only enable him to work to better advantage.

Many wealthy corporations and individuals have been telling the farmer how to plow when they should have been telling him where and when to market.

The problem of marketing is the biggest business proposition of any age or nation, and one that will require the combined efforts of all the agencies of civilization to solve.

We purchase annually from other states and countries \$30,000,000 worth of corn, \$24,000,000 of pork, \$100,000 of sugar, \$9,000,000 of potatoes, and various other food products, aggregating \$85,000,000 in value.
