Boy's Ranch Rodeo Slated Sept. 4 - 5

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, thirty-six miles northwest of Amarillo, 370 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-third annual Boys Ranch Rodeo.

Practice rides on the broncs and bulls have been going on since June with only about 150 riders expected to appear in the Ranch's rodeo arena over the Labor Day weekend. They will be competing in bareback bronc riding, Brahma studs, steers, calves, and even stick horses for the three-to-six-year-olds. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules are the only contestants. About 10,000 people are expected to drive to the Ranch for the event.

Approximately 3,000 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was started in 1939, and the rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. Some of the graduates and their families travel long distances to attend.

An added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.50. Reserve box seat tickets at \$2.50 will be on sale at the Boys Ranch Office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$.75 for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 2:30 p. m. each afternoon, September 4 and 5.

WATCH FOR CROSS-WALK USERS AUG. 29

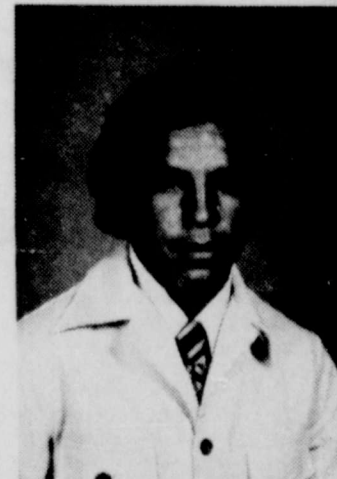
MR. and MRS. RONNIE HAMILTON and STEVE JACKSON ATTEND NICE AT TEXAS A. & M. U.

Local Young Farmer, Ronnie and Crystal Hamilton at National Cooperative Institute. (College Station, Tex.)  
Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Hamilton, Abernathy were participants in the National Institute on Cooperative Education (NICE), at Texas A&M University, August 15-18--the largest annual gathering of agricultural and cooperative leaders in the United States, with nearly 2,500 attending.  
About 250 young farmer couples from across the country attended special and general sessions where nationally known speakers were discussing forceful, specific solutions for farmer cooperatives in the areas of financing, education, and marketing--both overall and by specific commodities.  
In addition to cooperative managers, directors and employees, the NICE participants include special groups of young farmer couples, youth scholars, women, and employees of cooperatives and collegiate students. They were focusing on the 1977 NICE theme, "Cooperation--Making It Work," from their own particular viewpoint.  
Selected because of outstanding leadership exhibited in the community and the cooperative, Ronnie and Crystal Hamilton are being sponsored by County Line Co-op Gins to participate in the four-day NICE educational experience.  
Also attending from Abernathy was Steve Jackson, who was sponsored by Plains Co-op Oil Mill.  
Also, for the first time, nominations will be taken of young farmers or couples who have attended NICE to serve as associate trustees on the full AIC board of trustees, and help plan educational activities for the following year. However, only those actively farming in the Farm Credit District in which next year's NICE will be held are eligible to be selected for a one year term. In 1978, NICE will be held at Montana State University, Bozeman, in the 12th Farm Credit District comprising Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Alaska.  
Special luncheons, a barbecue and rodeo, entertainment, and a tour of farms in neighboring counties around College Station are also scheduled.  
NICE is sponsored by the American Institute of Cooperation, a national educational organization for farmer cooperatives, headquartered in Washington, D. C., and Texas A&M University with the support of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives; the Houston Farm Credit Bank; and Texas Cooperatives.

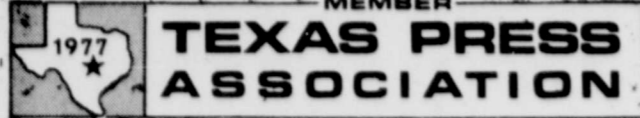

Elvis gained admiration of Americans when, without complaint, he served his two-year hitch in the Army when drafted. My brother, Walter L. Rutledge, a retired U. S. Army career man now living in Lubbock, was on duty in Germany when Elvis served there. They were in different outfits near each other. Due to the nature of their respective duties, Walter and Elvis had occasional contact. Walter liked and admired the entertainer for his friendliness and dedication to duty. What's more, my brother said that Elvis was like by his fellow GIs with whom he lived and worked in his outfit.

NGC----The other story, which I cannot substantiate, includes another Country/Western great, Charlie Pride. As it was told to me: Charlie Pride, who lives in a very fine Dallas residential section, was working in his yard one morning when a lady passed, stopped, backed up her limousine. She asked Charlie if he, by chance, would have time to do her yard that day. She explained that her regular yard man was not available and that she was having a party that night. Charlie, masking his amusement at the request, agreed to do the lady's yard, which he did. Upon finishing the job, he asked the lady to inspect to see if it met with her approval. When she asked his charge, and he declined, was when she learned that he was Charlie Pride, and that the yard in which he was working up the street was his own. She was both embarrassed and delighted . . . so delighted, in fact, that she invited Mr. and Mrs. Pride to come to her party and meet some of their neighbors. He accepted. Shortly before time for the party that night, Pride called the lady. He told her that some friends had come by unexpectedly, and could he bring them (she didn't know who he was bringing to the party). Yes, she would be happy to have their friends come to the party. The friends that the Prides took to the party included Elvis Presley and some of his touring musical group. Had they been booked, that much famous talent at one private house party would have cost the hosts a small fortune.

NGC--Charlie Pride will be at Fair Park Coliseum to entertain at an afternoon and evening shows at the South Plains Fair in Lubbock in September. We had the pleasure of seeing him there in one of his several previous appearances. His appearances there have set all-time high attendance records. He's great, I think.

NGC--The first and only personal appearance of Elvis Presley we attended also was at Fair Park Coliseum in 1956. I went in grumbling about having to take some teenagers to see Elvis Presley. After the show, I left the coliseum an Elvis Presley fan. And, I have remained a fan throughout the years, and am now a sad fan.

In some cases even find out some of you folks name and pretend they are friends with them. One showed a man selling a Bible to an elderly woman for \$200.00 which was worth about \$10.00. But she believed he was her husband friend and he knew her husband would want her to have it. Another was a card shark setting up to fleece an elderly man so he took a girl with him. They let him win then they had him put in a lot more and they switched purses. Another example was people selling properly of any kind and getting the money for it and when the people went after it - it was not there. Then all three of our guests told us things to beware of. Be sure our door and window locks are the correct kind. When traveling keep doors locked, especially when driving in towns with stop lights, be very sure your doors are locked because someone could be in before you could lock them. We had a question and answer session. One person ask if somebody came by and did a little repair without asking, would we have to pay. Our sheriff said if they hadn't asked they can't collect. Some questions were ask about the parking lots. They said if we saw anyone, but its usually two, people who seemed to be watching us, just drive off and come back later and park as close to the door as possible. We ask about pursing. Don't go along swinging one, that's too easy to snatch. Have something you can hold on too as a shoulder strap. There are certain ways to mark your household items so you can identify them. Any of these three people will be glad to help you with that. If you are going to be away from home call the police and they will set up a watch for your home also let the neighbors keep their eyes open. Sheriff Marr said if anyone see's any person or thing that looks suspicious call him. He would much rather see about it than find later something had happened to us.

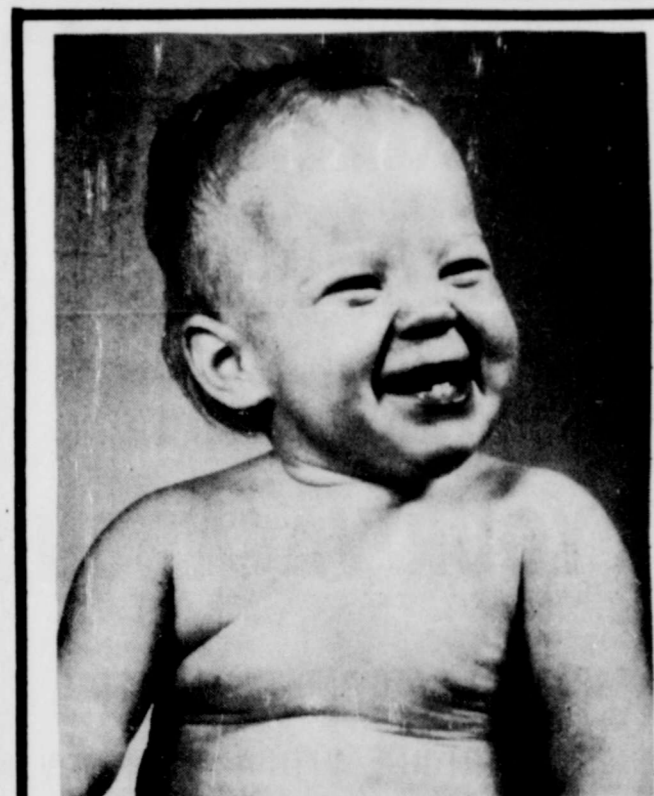
