



AHS ANTELOPES LOSE 29-12 IN OPENING GAME WITH THE PETERSBURG BUFFALOS

In their 1977 debut, the AHS Antelopes of Coach Larry Aldridge came out on the short end of a 29-12 football game against the Petersburg Buffaloes last Friday evening on the neighboring rivals' home field.

The 'Lopes put up a tough defensive battle the first half and trailed by only 6 points midway in the contest, 6-12. However, in the third stanza, the home team added a TD, 2 extra points and a 28-yard field goal to the ledger for a 23-6 cushion before swapping TDs with the Antelopes during the final quarter of play.

Sophomore tailback Roger Lindsey was credited with both Abernathy touchdowns, the first on a 5-yard thrust through the left side of the line on the first play of the second quarter, and the other in the final stanza, going 19 yards around right end on a pitch out.

AHS sophomore quarterback Tony Heath went the distance in the driver's seat for Abernathy, hitting on 5 of 10 passes for 33 yards. The 'Lopes picked up an additional 227 yards on the ground behind the running tailback Lonnie Mason (15 carries for 81 yards); fullback Lee McCune (9 carries for 73 yards); flanker Scott Cunningham (4 carries for 32 yards); and Lindsey (8 carries for 41 yards).

Defensively, Mark Pope, Mike Hill, Joe Jack Connell, Jimmy Runnels, Ruben Olguin, David Hunt, David Kennedy, Micah Blalock and Company fought hard, but could not contain the running of tailback Mike Jones and fullback Ruby Zapata. Jones picked up 149 yards on 23 trips and scored three touchdowns, while teammate Zapata carried 18 times, mostly on short-gainers, for 59 yards.

The game was marred by penalties, with the 'Lopes being tagged 7 times for 55 yards and the opponents 5 times for 38.

The Antelopes kicked off to the Buffs, who carried from their own 25 to the 48 on 6 carries. At that point the Antelope defense jared the ball loose from Jones' grasp and alert tackle Eric Harkey pounced on the loose ball.

Abernathy picked up two first downs and 27 yards with McCune, Mason and Cunningham each plugging away for short gains. Then McCune was hit hard and fumbled on Petersburg's 25 where the Buffs recovered.

After a couple of running plays and an 11-yard pass, Jones took a pitch out and raced 60 yards to paydirt to put the Buffs ahead 6-0. The extra point try failed.

Joe Barrera took the ensuing kickoff on the 11 and carried out to the 26. From there McCune burst through the middle of the line and rambled deep into Buff territory only to have a clipping penalty bring the ball back to Petersburg's 36. An off-sides penalty against the 'Lopes on the next play moved the ball back to the 41, then a couple of plays later Heath tossed a well-executed screen pass to end David Hunt good for 11 yards.

After swapping penalties with Petersburg, Abernathy was on the Buffs' 15 yard line with a first-and-15 situation. Cunningham got the ball and carried to the 4 around left end, but Abernathy was called for holding which moved the ball back to the 30. Heath then hit Hunt with a quick pass over the middle for 13 yards, then after a couple of running plays and a 4-yard penalty against Petersburg, Lindsey earned the score at 6-6, carrying the ball over to the 4.

The extra point attempt by Mason was low. The Buffs managed to carry the ball from their own 36 to midfield on short runs against tough opposition before being forced to punt. The 'Lopes couldn't move the ball either, and Hunt got off a short punt to just past

midfield. From there Jones and Zapata alternated at carrying the mail, with Jones going the final 11 yards to put Petersburg ahead 12-6. Jones' attempt to score the extras failed.

Again the 'Lopes could not move, and punted, then held the Buffs as the first half ended.

After taking the second half kickoff, the 'Lopes again met stout resistance and managed only 3 yards in 3 plays, and Hunt punted to Cary Rhodes at midfield and he was nailed on the Abernathy 49. From there the Buffs mustered a sustained drive, with Jones going the final 9 yards for the TD and then adding the extra points.

The ensuing kickoff went into the end zone and Abernathy took over on the 20.

Two plays later the 'Lopes temporarily lost the services of Cunningham who was injured while leading interference for McCune on an end sweep. A Heath-to-Barrera pass was good for 9 yards and a first down, but another pass on the next play went awry and Jerry Bearden intercepted on his own 40 yard line and returned it to the Abernathy 40.

The Buffs then drove to the 5 yard line with a 1st-and-goal situation. Pope broke through the Buffs' line and nailed Zapata for a loss, then a 5 yard penalty moved the ball back to the 12.

Pope and Eric Harkey teamed up to toss quarterback Mark Scarborough for another 6-yard loss. The Buffs then called on David Vaughn for a 28-yard field goal to make the score 23-6 as the third quarter ended.

Mason took the next kickoff on the 7 and scooted out to the 28. He then lacked only inches making a first down on two carries, and Lindsey picked up the first down on a 9 yard burst up the middle. However, two running plays and an incomplete pass netted only 2 yards, and Hunt punted into the end zone.

The Buffs failed to penetrate the Antelope defense, and punted to Mason on the Abernathy 35. Mason pitched off to Lee Knight who was surrounded by the opponents and was thrown back to the 31. From there Mason followed good blocking around right end and scampered 48 yards to the Buffs' 21.

Two plays later Lindsey satled around right end for 19 yards and his and the 'Lopes second TD. After a 5-yard penalty on the first EP try, the 'Lopes' pass attempt for two points on the 7 failed.

Jones returned Mason's kickoff from the 14 out to the 36, and the Buffs then put together another scoring drive, this one on 9 plays. Tailback Junior Castilleja carried 6 of the 9 times and went the final 16 yards for the score. The EP try was wide, and the final score read, Petersburg 29, Abernathy 12.

Ted Heard took the ensuing short kickoff on the 30 and advanced to the 41. Cunningham took a pitch out and rambled around end for 18 yards and a first down, but then the momentum flazled. A pass intended for Chad Major was incomplete, Mason carried for 2, and a pass for Randy Gregory was short. Mason managed only 4 yards on a 4th-and-8 try, and the Buffs took over on their own 35 with time for only one play as time ran out.

David Kennedy and Micah Blalock each had outstanding offensive blocking grades and Mike Hill led the defense with 12 tackles, Mark Pope (9 tackles), Jimmy Runnels (6), Micah Blalock (6), and Eric Harkey (9) also had good defensive games.

Then came the Petersburg drummer section and the Abernathy drummers, all from the east side of the field.

In unison, the remaining members of the two bands entered onto the field in three ranks each.

Explorer Scouts To Meet September 8th

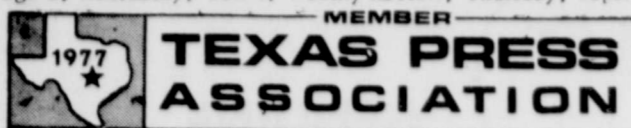

TAES Field Day Set Sept. 13

LUBBOCK-----The 68th annual edition of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Field Day for Lubbock and Halfway, which highlights a variety of crop research programs on the Texas High Plains, has been set for Tuesday, Sept. 13.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock, is host this year, according to Dr. Bill Ott, resident director of the Lubbock-Halfway Experiment Station, and Dr. Bill Lyle, field day chairman. The Lubbock Station is part of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center complex located three miles north of the Lubbock Regional Airport, just off Highway 87.

Scheduled for this year's event is a five-stop field tour of the Lubbock Station research plots and facilities. Machinery displays presented by area implement dealers, grape vineyard tours and a garden information booth will be added attractions. Stops along the field tour include research plots for weed control, cotton varieties, cotton disease control, soil fertility, nematode control and water use efficiency of the row diking system.

Professional staffs of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Agricultural Research Service-USDA, and the National Weather Service Agricultural Meteorology Office will be on hand for the special occasion, say TAES officials.

COUNTY LINE CHIT-CHATS by Faye Ann Nelson

"TEXAS" gets better and better every year. Wayland and I drove to Amarillo Thursday and visited Mrs. Robert Gill. We had supper at the "Bonanza" then drove on down to the canyon and sat on front seats which we enjoyed very much as we can see the faces of the actors and hear them much better. I would advise everyone to go see it. This is the third time we have seen it. I believe Buford has been nearly every year. My friend (Mrs. Robert Gill) has been nine times but she went with us and said she enjoyed it just as much this 10th time as she did the 1st time. I believe someone said "TEXAS" has run longer than any stage show in the United States.

Did you know County Line had a Dramatic Club in 1926? It included Aubrey Tucker, Luke McGuire, Frank Adams, Skeezie Robison, Gerald Horton, V. A. Cross (sponsor), Oleta Allen, Leota Nelson, Margaret Teague, Leota Allen and Frances Rice.

The late summer of 1901 found 3 men, John Pettit, Murray, and A. O. Vaughn planning to educate their children. Mr. Murray donated 5 acres of land for the present County Line Club House and County Line Baptist Church now stands and also the County Line Cemetery. The lumber to build the school house was brought by wagon from Canyon and erected a frame building that was later moved to D. O. Williams farm (now the Doyce Newton farm), one and one half miles east of the original 5 acres. Eleven grades were taught for a term of nine months. The pupils warmed by a blast heater which burned coal hauled from

Canyon City. The pupils and their teacher received mail sometimes as often as once a week from the nearest post office which was at Hale Center. Various kinds of books were used as texts. New double desks were purchased for the school because logs were plentiful.

The pupils (of which were mostly Pettits), came to school on horseback and in buggies. In 1910 the second teacher was elected to help the present teacher (Mrs. E. L. Klett) teach the children. Mrs. Klett's sister was hired later to teach music and a piano was brought from Swisher County, a distance of 60 miles.

A new modern building costing \$20,000 was erected out of brick in 1926. There were 6 classrooms, a library, an auditorium equipped with stage and dressing rooms. Later a laboratory and equipment was added. The school later met the requirements and was an accredited school in 1929 until 1931 and for the next two years was a standard school.

Information taken from Lubbock County Classroom Teacher's Yearbook brought to the reunion by Edwin Merrell who said his mother Ruth Merrell gave to him dated 1936.

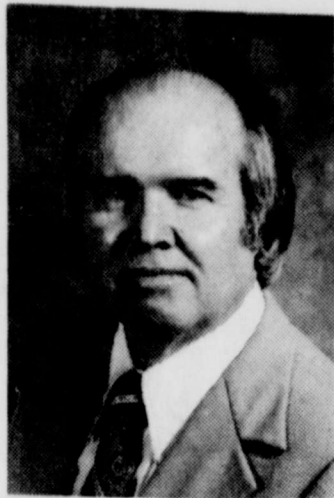

Ft. Hood, Tex. (AHTNC) Aug. 26----Army Private Johnny Lara, whose wife, Beki, lives at 2006 60th St., Lubbock, Tex., is among the more than 12,000 U. S. troops who flew to Europe to participate in Reforger 77.

Troops were airlifted to Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg for the 10th annual Reforger field training exercise. After arrival they moved to sites in Germany to draw pre-positioned equipment for maneuver use.

Another aspect of Reforger tested sealift mobility forces. The Army's Military Traffic Management Command moved some 37,000 tons of equipment aboard two military sealift command ships. The ships crossed the Atlantic using simulated wartime convoy procedures.

The entire exercise emphasizes the orderly disposition of forces and stressed deployment procedures and techniques. Pvt. Lara, a telecommunications center specialist with the 16th Signal Battalion at Ft. Hood, Tex., entered the Army in October 1976.

Hickox told us you are watched and listened to constantly. After awhile this gets on your nerves. For his and his family's mental health they left the country completely for a weekend or a holiday. Lt. Col. Hickox was a military attache to the American Embassy in Moscow.

How thankful I am for the freedom of worship when he showed us pictures of beautiful church buildings. Some of these are being used as museums, some are empty, and a few are used for worship services. Just the very old and a few (very few) young people who are not members of the communist party attend the services. The Russian government is trying to phase out all organized religion.

How thankful I am for our military personnel who have taken an oath to defend our country. I am thankful to know we still have people who are concerned about the welfare of the people and our great country.

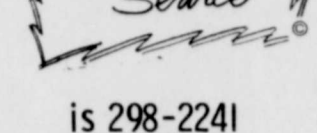

 An oxy-acetylene welding short course for adult farmers will be held Sept. 12-15 under the sponsorship of the New Deal High School Vocational Agricultural Department, according to Mr. F. L. Flood, Superintendent

ent and Mr. Tommy Holmes, and Ronald Tyson teachers of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Charles H. Yeates, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Yeates holds a B.S. degree from Texas A&M University in Agricultural Education. Mr. Yeates taught vocational agricultural and farm shop for a period of 15 years. He also taught automobile mechanics, electricity, electrical and acetylene welding and woodworking in the Jasper County vocational school. He has had two years experience as a draftsman, and two years experience as a welder.

"Many oxy-acetylene welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Yeates and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture Plainview. Arrangement for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office.

The short course at New Deal is scheduled to begin Sept. 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held Sept. 13, 14 and 15. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Yeates will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Tommy Holmes and Ronald Tyson.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. F. L. Flood, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Tommy Holmes or Ronald Tyson. An entry fee of \$15 will be charged. Oxy-acetylene welding short course certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Yeates stated that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in oxy-acetylene welding, factors controlled by the operator in oxy-acetylene welding, choosing a justifying torch flames, types of welding rods, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting and hard-surfacing.

Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialist available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people. Specialists are not avail-

John Bowling told the association about plans being

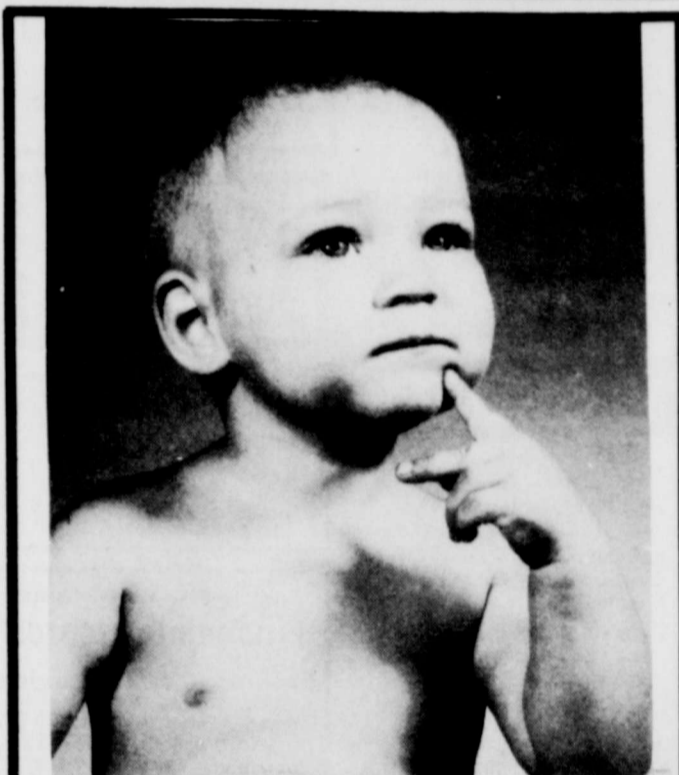

Abernathy Schools Have New Number

JOYCE ADAMS CHECKS CROPS

AUSTIN---Joyce Adams of Abernathy travels to cotton fields in her area to check on the progress of the crop.

She's not a cotton buyer; she is one of 54 field enumerators in Texas employed by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service to provide a detailed study of a "section" of a cotton field, 10 feet x 2 rows.

This work is part of the overall process of estimating cotton yields and harvesting losses in providing statistics on the state's cotton production.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown commended the work of the enumerators. "We have found that these enumerators are trained well by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service and do a thorough job."

During the cotton growing season, special plant counts and measurements are made to indicate yield as a guide to production. There are 710 such sample units across the state.

The enumerator returns to the same units each month to count the number of squares, blooms, and bolls. This information along with the acreage data, and a continuing response to mail questionnaires sent to cotton farmers are important ingredients in accurate monthly production forecasts, issued beginning August 1 through December.

Near harvest time, the enumerator, who started the season with an intensive training course, picks the cotton in the sample units and sends it to the laboratory in Austin for moisture checks and other examinations to refine the estimate.

After the farmer harvests the field, the enumerator makes one final visit to glean the cotton missed by the stripper or picker as an indication of harvesting loss.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is a cooperation effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Such field surveys are conducted for wheat and corn also.
