## AHS Antelopes Defeated 68-0 Against Slaton Tigers Here

The Antelopes of Abernathy High School had a "Tiger by the tail" here last Friday night--the state-ranked Slaton Tigers, that is -- and before they could turn loose, the visitors had injured four of the Antelopes' key men and had riddled the home

team 68-0. Antelope fullback Lee McCune was injured early in the first quarter and did not see any further action. With just over three minutes left in the second period, flanker Scott Cunningham was put out of commission with an injury to his left hand after picking up yardage around end. Then four plays later AHS standout Mike Hill sustained a knee injury going down field on an Antelope punt. Also in the second period, junior defensive stalwart David Kennedy was

knocked "senseless" and had to leave the field. And senior tailback Lon Mason saw only limited action early in the

Even though the Tigers completely dominated the gime, AHS tailback Roger Lindsey was the leading goundgainer in the contest. The 138-pound sophomore picked up a total of 130 yards on 29 carries, most of them right up the middle. 
Two of Slaton's TDs were set up after fumble recoveries deep in Antelope territory.

Due to these delays, it may be as late as January before the permits are actually granted, Swart said.

## Report On Mental Health Released By Commission

AUSTIN, SEPTEMBER 20-

The Mental Health Association praised most of the recommendations made in a preliminary report by the President's Commission on Mental Health.

Mary Chase Pell, MHA National President, said in a telegram to Rosalynn Carter, honorary chair of the President's Commission: "We are particularly pleased with the Commission's recommendation for an increase in funding for mental health

Citizens of Abernathy supported the Mental Health Association in May, by contributing to a Bellringer drive organized by Mrs. Mona Toler.

The Commission urged President Carter to support a federal mental health research budget increase "in the range of 20 per cent" over the current appropriation. If realized, research sponsored by the National Institute of Mental Health would receive \$140 million in fiscal year

The President of the Texas Association for Mental Health, Shirley K. Camfield, said: "This increase is urgently needed. Even though the National Institute of Mental Health's research budget has lagged since 1969, major opportunities for expanding our base of knowledge still

President Carter established the Commission last February to identify the mental health needs of the nation and to recommend ways to meet those needs. The preliminary report is the first from the Commission, with its final report due April 1.

The only reservation expressed by the citizens' group was that it is not clear whether the Commission's recommendation on funding for mental health services would enable the establishment of new community mental health centers in fiscal year 1979. The Mental Health Association pledged to continue working with the First Lady, the Administration, and the Congress to assure

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## Accident Prevention A Good Investment

Accident data being received from individual states provide national estimates indicating that , 400 farm residents were killed and 500, 000 disabled to work, home, recreation and traffic accidents during the past year, points out Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engiwith the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

occupationally related portion of these totals indicates that work related accidents claimed the lives of nearly 1,900 persons (200 in Texas) and about 180,000 suffered disabling injuries, of which 1,300 and 130,000, respectively, were farm residents as opposed to employees.

President Carter accepted the challenge to help reduce farm and ranch accidents by declaring July 25-31 as National Farm Safety Week. The theme for "Safety Is a the week is Good Investment, " notes Nelson. This theme emphasizes that in addition to personal injury, accidents result in costly equipment damage, medical expense, loss of valued talent and skill of agricultural producers and workers, and production loss due to time delays and the unavailability of injured workers and damaged equipment.

National Farm Safety Week is co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Both sponsors emphasize the wisdom of making a personal and financial investment in accident prevention of help cut the human and e conomic

costs of accidents. Farm and ranch families can achieve much by investing a small amount of time in adopting low risk work procedures, contends Nelson. Extra protection can be obtained with a modest financial investment in

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
