



# Amendments, weather elections nearing

Hale County residents will join other Texas voters on Nov. 8 to cast ballots on seven proposed state constitutional amendments. But, unlike other voters in Texas, they will have an opportunity to vote for or against the issuance of a permit providing for weather modification.

The weather modification vote is the result of an application by Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview to conduct a much-debated hail suppression program over most of Hale and portions of Lamb, Castro, Swisher and Floyd counties.

Hale County commissioners did not call for a vote on the hail suppression program last summer when voters in eight other high plains counties opposed the continuation of the program.

Following those elections, the Texas Water Resources Commission terminated operating permits for PWIA and Better Weather Inc. of Littlefield.

**VOTERS IN PRECINCT 7** will cast ballots at the First Presbyterian Church, 2101 Utica; Precinct 8, Plainview Police Department; Precinct 9, Abernathy City Hall; Precinct 10, Plainview Chamber of Commerce; Precinct 11, Lakeview Methodist Church; and Precinct 12, Halfway Co-op Gin.

In Voting Precinct 14, voters will cast ballots at the Edmonson City Hall; Precinct 15, United Farm Industries Gin Office; Precinct 17, Plainview-Hale County Airport terminal building; and Precinct 18, Plains Co-op Oil Mill on Highway 194.

On the constitutional amendments election, the first proposed amendment would increase the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges and permit the court to sit in panels of three judges. Currently, the court consists of five judges.

**AMENDMENT TWO** would provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances. This proposed amendment would allow the continuation of the program, established in 1946, to allow Texas veterans to have low interest loans to purchase land.

Proposed Amendment Three would permit denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been previously twice convicted of felony offenses, or charged with a felony offense

committed while he was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon and he had been convicted of a prior felony offense. A 60-day limit to the person's confinement without trial also is designated.

**UNDER THE TEXAS** Constitution, a person can currently be denied bail only when indicted with a capital felony or if he has been convicted of two previous felony offenses and is accused of a third.

Amendment Four, if approved, will authorize property tax relief to encourage the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources. Currently, such places are not eligible for either a property tax exemption or other property tax relief.

Amendment 5 would authorize the formation of agricultural associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing or use of their products. This amendment, if approved, would allow for the continued operation of several such organizations. A law, passed in 1967 by the state legislature, allowing for such collections was judged in violation to the state constitution in 1975. This amendment, if passed, would eliminate

passed earlier this year, calls for an election on hail suppression permits if 10 percent of the qualified voters in the county sign a petition asking for the vote, the Hale County commissioners voted to forego the petition and called the election last Monday.

The weather modification question and the constitutional amendments will appear on separate ballots and, although Voting Precinct 9 at Abernathy is not included in the proposed weather permit target area, voters throughout the county will be able to vote on both questions.

Polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Those voting precincts and locations include: Precinct 1, Hale County Courthouse Annex; Precinct 2, Happy Union Community Building; Precinct 3, Petersburg Community Center; Precinct 4, Hale Center Chamber of Commerce; Precinct 5, Cotton Center High School FFA room; and Precinct 6, Hutcherson Physical Education Center at Wayland Baptist College.

## FARABEE SEEKS RE-ELECTION

He also serves on the Senate Finance Committee, the Jurisprudence Committee, and the Natural Resources Committee, which deals with issues concerning agriculture and energy.

## ANTELOPES LOSE SECOND DISTRICT GAME 33-0 TO FLOYDADA; PREPARE FOR HOMECOMING GAME

The Abernathy Antelopes put up a tremendous defensive effort during the first quarter of their contest against Floydada last Friday night, and virtually played the Whirlwinds on even terms for that period. But from that time on, the 'Lopes were no match for 'Winds, who could do "no wrong," and wound up on the bottom side of a 33-0 score.

Defensively, the 'Lopes had "bright spots," but could not stop the 'Winds' passing attack.

"We were flat," stated Coach Larry Aldridge. "I've never seen a flatter bunch...." he added, pointing out that "we even made mistakes in the pre-game warmup.... Just didn't bounce back." The head mentor commended the

team for "pretty good" defense, pointing out that Scott Cunningham (playing the rover position) had his best defensive game of the year, getting 12 tackles. Big Mark Pope had 15 tackles, and Mike Hill, playing his usual good game, had 20 tackles. Wade Henderson also had a good defensive game, as did Kenneth Sanders and others.

"Gilbert Cuevas had another good kicking game," the coach stated, then added, "hopefully this week he will

get to do more kicking-off and less punting!"

Even though the 'Lopes looked good at times on defense, and had several outstanding defensive plays, they also missed a lot of tackles.

Offensively, the Antelopes managed to keep the ball for only nine plays in each of the second and third quarters, and had it for only 11 in the final period. They gave the ball up twice on fumbles and twice on inter-

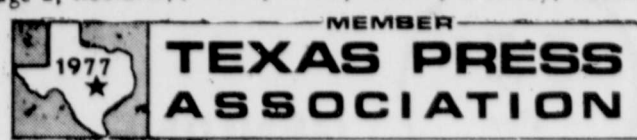

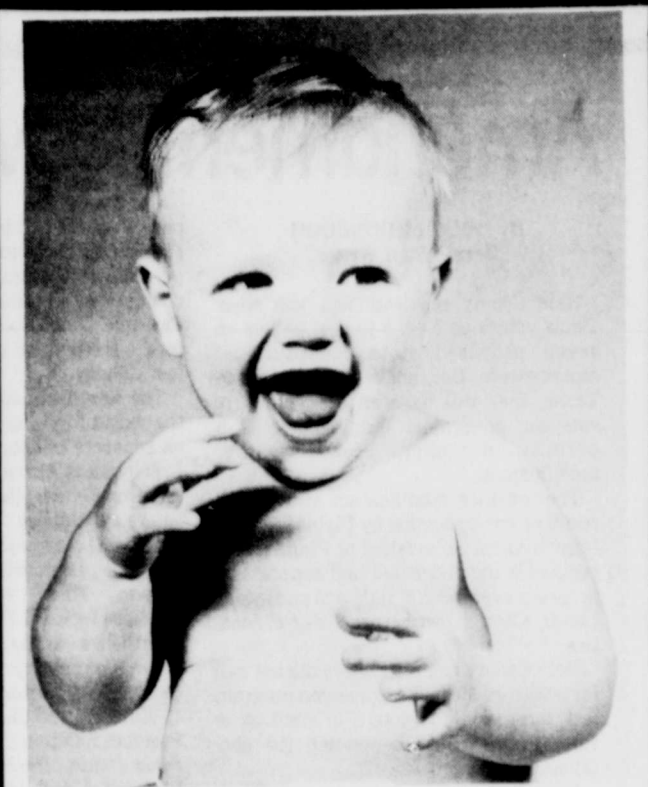
### Student Teacher From Uruquay

constitutional problems with the program.

AMENDMENT 6 would authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines. Currently, each bank may conduct business at only one location. The amendment would authorize the legislature to allow banks to

set up electronic fund transfer terminals at various other locations including retail stores.

Amendment Seven, if passed, would change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and would change the membership of the commission to include four citizen members instead of three and to add one justice of the peace.

The amendment would grant the commission and the supreme court the power to suspend a judge from office, with or without pay, pending final disposition of charges against the judge, and would authorize a public reprimand in addition to a private reprimand. The amendment provides for removal from office by the supreme court of errant judges in addition to the current impeachment and other methods.

One out of every five jobs in the state is directly or indirectly related to the Texas farm and ranch industry so that the state-wide goal of making Texas agriculture Number One means increased economic stability for every Texan, Brown said.

"A positive vote for Amendment Five will secure the future of farm associations which provide a major tool in our fight for economic stability as a state," he concluded.

adequate water supply for both present and future needs. In addition to the water supply benefits, the elevated water storage tank will bring the City into compliance with the State Board of Insurance's requirements for adequate water storage. The additional water storage will lower the City's Insurance Key Rate, which in turn will result in lower fire insurance premiums for Abernathy residents.

The acquisition of the FM, H.A. grant represents the second federal funding that the City has received within the last two fiscal years. The first such grant was obtained through H.U.D.'s Community Development program. This grant was for \$100,000 and is being used to extend sewer facilities to an area on the east side that is presently without these services. This project is presently underway and progressing rapidly as lift stations are already in place and collections lines being laid. It is estimated that it will be completed by December 1 of this year.
