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Weather modification vote fails

Near record numbers of Hale County voters braved bitter northerly winds Tuesday to journey to the polls where they, by a slim majority, apparently ended weather modification activities over the High Plains while approving six of seven proposed state constitutional amendments.

Unofficial totals indicate that 3,133 county voters cast ballots in the amendments election and 3,155 in the weather modification special election. Record turnout for an amendments election in the county is 3,266, set in 1975.

On the weather modification question, 1,732 voters approved the program while 1,732 were against with the project being defeated by 55 percent of the voters. Within the proposed 1978 target area, which includes all of Hale County with the exception of Precinct Nine at Abernathy, the project was defeated by 115 votes with 1,402 ballots cast in favor of the project and 1,517 against.

Dan Thompson, president of Hale County Citizens for Natural Weather, chief opponent of the local program, told The Herald today, "We are elated, happy and proud of how the election turned out, although we are a little surprised by the

support we received in Plainview and the immediate Plainview area."

HE ATTRIBUTED the defeat of the issue to the fact that "the program failed to do the job that it was meant to do. Much of the support to end weather modification came from people who suffered hail damage during the last seven years. I just want to thank the people of Hale County for coming out in our support."

On the other hand, a spokesman for Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview told The Herald, "We are disappointed that the county didn't vote overwhelmingly in favor of the program, but we are not bitter: I guess we just did a

poor job of educating the people of Hale County on the benefits of weather modification and hail suppression."

He said that PWIA officials will decide whether to continue to pursue a 1978 permit at their next meeting. "When you take the entire proposed 1978 target area into account, the vote is really a toss-up."

THE PROPOSED target area, in addition to most of Hale County, includes portions of Floyd, Castro, Lamb and Swisher counties. In elections this summer, a majority of those precincts approved the continuation of weather modification, but those totals were unavailable.

Countywide, the weather modification

issue failed in nine of 16 precincts as well as in absentee balloting. Its largest defeats came in Precinct Nine, at Abernathy, 14 to 215; Precinct Two, at Happy Union, 4 to 41; and Precinct Three, Petersburg, 19 to 75.

Other precincts voting against it were: Precinct One, Hale County Courthouse, 53 to 93; Precinct Four, Hale Center, 84 to 114; Precinct Six, in Plainview, 99 to 129; Precinct 10, also in Plainview 103 to 129; Precinct 11, Lakeview, 9 to 40; Precinct 15, Plainview, 57 to 106; and absentee, 37 to 40. All are unofficial totals released by the county clerk's office.

ANTELOPES END GRID SEASON

It was strictly a defensive battle last Friday night at Tullia as the AHS Antelopes of Coach Larry Aldridge put up a gallant performance to keep the Tullia Hornets from crossing the goal line. Thus it was that a field goal by Tullia's Randall Reeves proved the difference in the score, with the Antelopes closing out the 1977 season with a 3-0 loss. The Lopes were 1-9 for the year and 2-4 in District 4-AA competition.

It was a see-saw battle during most of the contest, with one team and then the other being forced to punt or give up the football on downs. The Lopes held the Hornets to only 11 first downs, and were able to garner only 7 for themselves.

The Antelopes were never able to muster an offensive punch, and most of their offensive play took place deep in their own territory. The "Lopes did put together one good drive, however, early in the third period. After kicking off to the Hornets to open the second half of play, the 'Lopes put up such a tough defense that three plays netted the Hornets a minus 10 yards, and they punted to Roger Lindsey the Antelope 44, and the sophomore back returned the punt 6 yards to the 50. From there Lindsey hit the line twice for 11 yards and a first down, then he and Scott Cunningham picked up 9 more yards on three plays to bring up a fourth-and-one situation on the Tullia 30 yard line. The Lopes set up for a field goal attempt by quarter back Gilbert Cuevas, but a Tullia lineman broke through to block kick. That ended Abernathy's deepest penetration.

The Hornets, on the other hand, managed to penetrate deep into Antelope territory at least five times but the 'Lopes defense rose to the occasion each time, with the Hornets netting only a field goal for their efforts. The Hornets' first penetration came late in the first quarter when they drove to the

Abernathy 14 where they were forced to give the ball up on downs. Then late in the second quarter the Hornets intercepted an Antelope pass and began a march from the Abernathy 41. A 25-yard pass put the Hornets on the 13, then three running plays gave the Hornets a first-and-goal at the 2 1/2 yard line. The Antelope defense was not going to give up easily, and on the next play David Kennedy broke through to nail the ball carrier for a two-yard loss. That must have been a signal for defensive end Kenneth Sanders, for on the next play he broke through the Hornet line and smeared the would-be passer for a loss of 13 yards, and the Hornets only had time for another pass attempt (which failed) as the first half ended.

Early in the fourth quarter the Hornets again put together an offensive drive after taking possession on their own 4) following a 35 yard punt. (An illegal motion penalty against Abernathy had nullified a booming 60-yard punt by Cuevas on the previous play.) With leading rusher Mark Buchanan doing most of the damage, the Hornets drove to Abernathy's 7 yard line, where they stalled under tremendous pressure from the Antelope forward wall, thus settling for a field goal from the 17.

The Lopes returned the ensuing kickoff from the 27 to the 44 yard line, but managed only one play, fumbling the ball to Tullia. The Hornets then drove to the Abernathy 26, but gave the ball up on downs at the 30 after being pounded in the line by Mike Hill, Jimmy Runnels, Ruben Olgun, Erick Harley and Kennedy. Also being "a thorn in the Hornets' side" all evening Wade Henderson, Rusty Powell, Joe Jack Connell, Mark Pope, Micah Blalock, Ted Heard, Sanderson and others as they fought to contain the Tullia team.

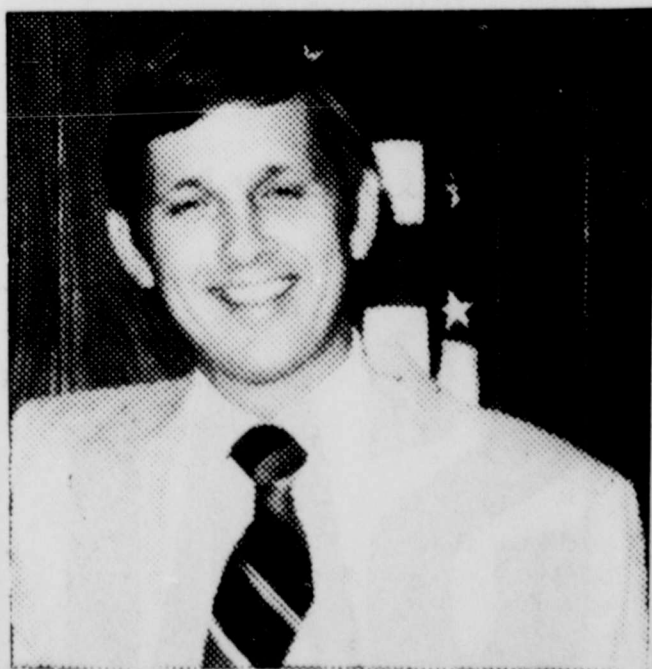

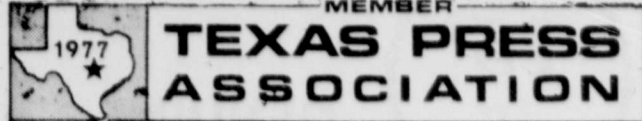

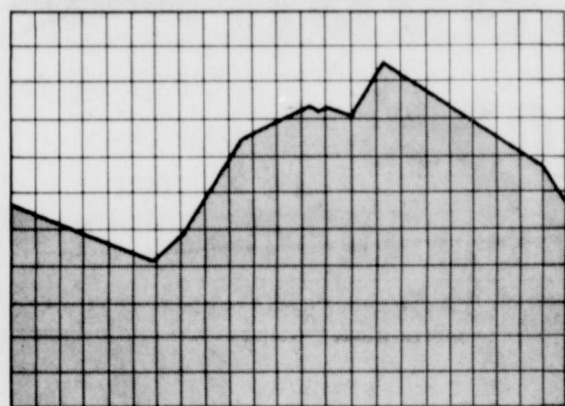

were voters in Precinct 5, Cotton Center, at 83 to 15; Precinct 7, Plainview, 320 to 315; Precinct 8, Plainview, 302 to 268; Precinct 12, Halfway, 77 to 29; Precinct 14, Edmonson, 33 to 32; Precinct 17, Plainview, 90 to 58; and Precinct 18, northwest of Plainview, 32 to 26.

Voters in three of seven precincts within the city of Plainview voted in favor of the continuation of weather modification. Combined city vote was 1,024 in favor and 1,106 against.

To date, weather modification has failed in nine county votes on the High Plains, failing to carry in any county tabulations. In addition to Hale County, other counties disapproving the program include Briscoe, Swisher, Lamb, Castro, Floyd, Randall, Hockley and Bailey.

IN THE AMENDMENTS election, county voters approved all except Amendment Six which would allow electronic transfer of banking funds. They defeated that proposed amendment 1,512 to 1,535.

On amendment one, which called for enlarging the court of criminal appeals, county voters approved the amendment by 2,194 to 839. Amendment two, on the issuance of an additional \$200 million in bonds for the Veterans' Land Fund, was approved by county voters with a total of 1,597 for and 1,408 against.

Amendment three, that will deny bail in some felony cases, carried with a vote of 2,677 to 380. Amendment four, that would give property tax relief to some historical sites, passed 1,561 to 1,456. Amendment five, which would allow creation of agricultural association that charge a refundable producer assessment, passed 1,605 to 1,340. Amendment seven, to expand to powers of the judicial commission, passed the county with 1,833 favoring it and 1,133 against.

THE ADVERSE weather modification vote in the county apparently ended hail suppression programs in Plainview that first began in 1960 under the direction of Gordon Clouser. Clouser, who introduced the program to the High Plains by seeding

clouds with dry ice, was killed in 1952 while attempting to seed a hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico.

Plains Weather Improvement Association, based at the Plainview Hale County Airport, has been conducting the hail suppression activities for the past seven years, but fell in disfavor of individuals that felt that the silver iodide used in the project actually increased hail in some instances while decreasing rainfall.

In each of three court battles and several public hearings before the Texas Water Development Board (now the Texas Department of Water Resources), PWIA won the right to continue the project but, in June 1977, Gov. Dolph Briscoe signed into law SB 632, a law allowing for binding elections to be held in areas where weather modification projects are to be carried out.

That law, under which the Hale County election was called, stipulated that another vote on the issue could not be held within two years.

Near Million In SS Monthly Payments In Hale

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Hale County at the rate of \$942,585 a month at the start of 1977, Ray Purcell, social security manager in Plainview said today.

Social security benefits can be paid to retired persons age 62 and over, to workers who become severely disabled before age 65, and to survivors of deceased workers.

Monthly social security checks are also paid to certain dependents of a worker who has retired, become disabled or died.

Of the 5,426 social security beneficiaries living in Hale County, 2,614 are retired

workers and 345 are disabled workers. Another 779 persons are receiving benefits as the wives or husbands of retired or disabled workers. Widows, widowers and dependent parents of deceased workers number 1688.

In Hale county, 1,879 people under age 65 and 3,547 people age 65 and older are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries, 1,938 are men, 2,633 are women and 855 are children.

Statewide, 817,914 retired workers receive an average monthly benefit of \$206.81.

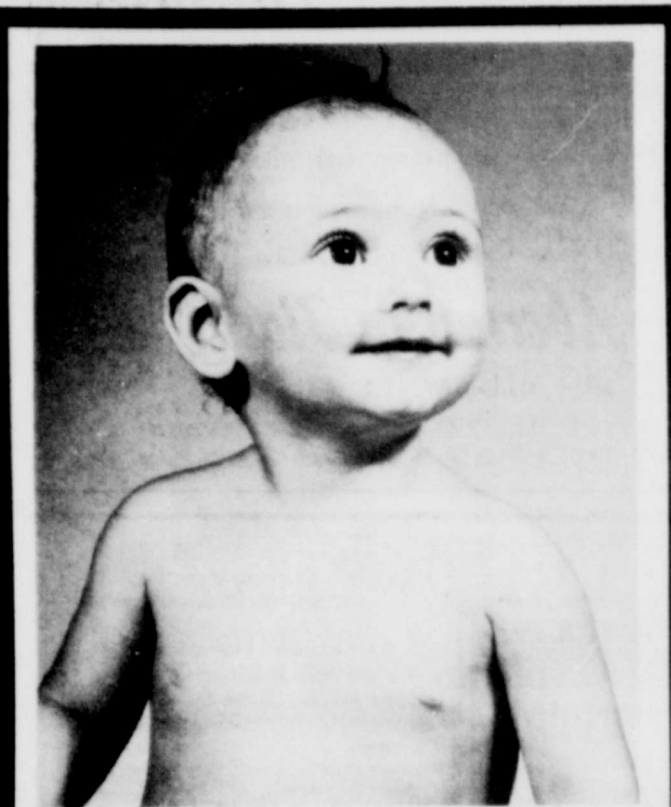
The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Amy Pettit gave a report on the National 4-H Week window display. Patsy Davis
