SPAG REPRESENTATIVE SPEAKER AT SUNSHINE GROUP MEETING

Mrs. Virginia Ferebee, a program specialist for the Office of Aging at SPAG in Lubbock, was guest speaker at the Sunshine Group Thanksgiving Program on Thursday, Nov. 17.

The Sunshine Group has expressed a need for a larger meeting place, a place where they could have meetings other than their monthly luncheon. Mrs. Clorine Henderson contacted the SPAG office on behalf of the Sunshine Group to learn if there were programs available to help them in securing a larger building of their own for meetings.

Mrs. Ferebee explained that securing the building would be the responsibility of the Sunshine Group. After they had done this she explained the steps necessary to become a chartered Senior Citizen Center. She gave them an outline of what would be needed to get the Center started. After this the Office of Aging at SPAG would help with the program.

Once the Club is chartered there may be funds available through their Office of Aging to help with the Center.

Mayor Pete Thompson was present at the meeting along with other businessmen and pastors of the churches in town, and they all expressed an in-

terest in seeing that the Sunshine Group secure a larger meeting place. Several possibilities were discussed.

Mrs. Ferebee has been in Lubbock about five months & helps with the programming for 15 counties surrounding Lubbock, and with the Centers of the city of Lubbock. She has worked with Senior Citizen Centers for four years before coming to Lubbock. She served as Supervisor of the Rosepark Senior Citizen Center in Abilene, and assistant of the Amarillo Senior Citizen Center for one year.

Mrs. Ferebee will meet with the Sunshine Group later on to see how their plans are progressing and help them in any way she can. CITY SALES TAX RECEIPTS HIGHER

The last report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock, for the period ending 11-3-77, shows that Abernathy's city sales tax has brought in 23% more money in 1977 than it did to the same date in 1976. The state average increase is 22%.

For the year 1977, to 11-3-77, the total received by the City of Abernathy on sales tax is \$35,44135. The comparable figures for 1976: \$28,678,42.

The local city sales tax check for the month ending 11-3-77 was \$2,483.54. For the comparable date in 1976: \$1,759.92.

The report indicates that Abernathy is sharing in Texas' bright economy picture, with 1% greater increase than the state average increase in 1977 over 1976: Abernathy 23% higher; state average 22% higher. Hale Center also reported a 23% increase for 1977.

A portion of the Abernathy Independent School District's annual audit, covering the period from Sept. 1, 1976, to August 31, 1977, is published elsewhere in this issue of The Abernathy Weekly Review as required by a state law.

Mr. Earl Carter, the school district business manager, has provided The Review a bound copy of the complete audit report containing several pages. This audit copy will be on file at The Review office, 916 Ave. D, and will be open for public inspection. Audit copies also will be available for public inspection at the school business office.

The school audit was prepared by Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss, Certified Public Accountants of Lubbock.

New Book Presented To Abernathy Library

The Abernathy Public Library announces the receipt of EARTH HAS NO SORROW, presented by the Voluntary Action Center of Caldwell County and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

EARTH HAS NO SORROW is the result of a year long Oral History project funded by the Emergency School Aid Act in Lockhart, Texas. Approximately 140 elderly life long residents of all ethnic groups were interviewed and taped by local county volunteers. Twenty of the tapes were then transcribed verbatim and edited for inclusion in this publication.

This one hundred and thirty-two page soft bound book included 25 photographs by Dee A. Adian illustrating life in Rural Texas. An introduction by Robert Thompson, Professor of English at Wouhwest Texas State University, sets the scene for the personal and historical remembrances.

In the words of native Texans, the reader sees the joy and sorrow of the lives of Anglos, Blacks, and Mexican-Americans in a rural Texas county.

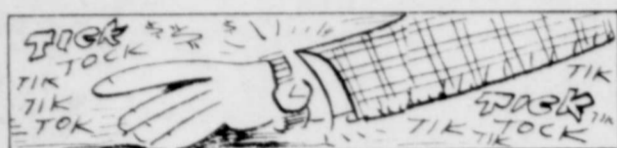

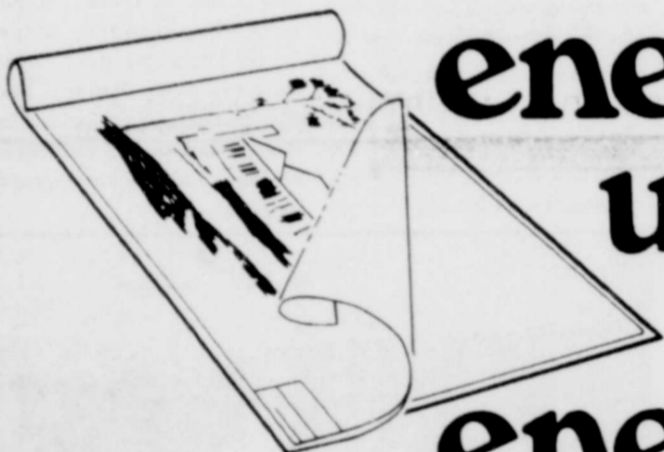

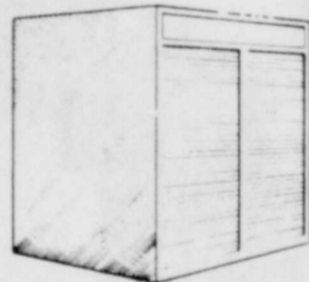

We would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation to Abernathy for the excellent READ-a-thon program recently held there. Our many thanks to everyone who sponsored a student to read. The co-operation and encouragement of the teachers and Mr. Adkisson, principal, is indicative of the fine school system in Abernathy.

The Multiple Sclerosis Society, South Plains Chapter, which covers 23 counties is dedicated to finding a cure for MS and to give financial aid to the 134 MS patients in our chapter. We help by providing medical equipment such as wheelchairs, crutches. We have a monthly meeting for the patients to keep them up to date on recent research and medication developments as well as providing the opportunity for fellowship, and program on development and rehabilitation.

69% of the monies donated stay in the chapter area which in 1976 \$83931.00 was used for patient services. 49% is remitted to National where 48.6% was spent for research on 1976. Again may we say a sincere thanks to a wonderful community that got involved in the MS READ-a-thon and opened their hearts to those who need and deserve your kindness.

MAHON ASKS VIEWS ON SET ASIDE RULE

WASHINGTON — Congressman George Mahon called upon West Texas farmers and agricultural leaders to let their views be known in connection with proposed ASCS regulations which will govern the use of set-aside acreage under the new farm program.

Mahon expressed concern that under the proposed rules farmers would be unable to graze wheat set-aside acreage as has been the practice in previous farm programs. "I urge farmers to make their wishes known. In my opinion, it would be most damaging to our wheat-growing areas for this traditional practice to be denied. I have protested to the Secretary of Agriculture in person and by letter and I hope

farmers will also make their voices heard in this matter," Mahon said.

The proposed regulations were published in the Federal Register Oct. 14, 1977, and interested parties have 30 days to send their comments to the Department of Agriculture. The proposed regulations would require that set-aside acreage be land that was recently tilled; that it be protected by a cover crop; and that harvesting or grazing of the cover be prohibited.

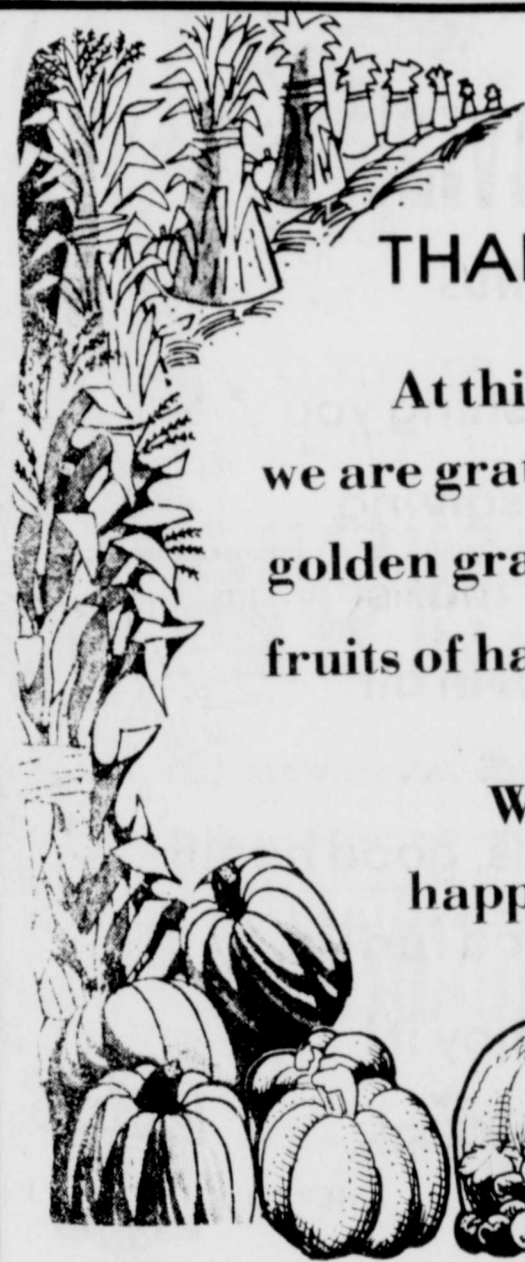

Abernathy Man Doing Well in Lubbock

Franklin Mathis, distribution center manager for Gentec Hospital Supply Company, had to travel only sixteen miles to find an opportunity... After twelve years of hard work, Mathis has made an outstanding contribution to his community.

"I started with Gentec as a deliveryman, and today I've had an opportunity to move up the ladder," he says. "One thing about this company, we like to see people move up from within the company," he continued.

"You know, it's a funny thing how I got this job," he said. The young enthusiastic 1963 Dunbar High School graduate continued: "My father was shipping clerk at Methodist Hospital, and he told me about the job. I went down to apply, and I hit it off real well with the manager whose first name was the same as mine."

Mathis, who has eight employees under him, says that the sky is the limit if you work real hard and the reward is just super. Under this leadership, the Lubbock Branch, which is owned by Foremost-McKesson Company of San Francisco, California, was named "Branch of the Year" for fiscal year 1977.

Fifty percent of the persons employed by the local company are black. "When the rest of the branches hear that we've won this award, they are going to say: 'Hey, most of those people are

black, but they can do the job."

"I never wanted anyone to give me anything, and that's why I work as hard as I do each day," smiles Mathis. "Sometimes I believe I work twenty-four hours a day, seven times a week," he said. Mathis admits he works this hard because he loves what he is doing.

"People will never know who I am, but I as well as all employees of the Gentec Company are responsible for seeing that persons who are sick are made well through our efforts," he said. "We supply hospitals and health facilities within a hundred mile radius of necessary equipments,

that is, everything except drugs," he continued.

One of the employees of Gentec, Ernestine Pine was recently chosen as "Employee of the Year" because of her contribution to the company. "A plaque will be given to Ms. Pine in the very near future for this effort," said Mathis. "We're just proud of her," he continued.

Other employees working at Gentec include Richard Johnson, Corinne Lawson, Charles Kerr, Tom Carlson, Aretha Irene Lee and Anthony Bryant. "We are just proud of these fine people also," he said seriously.

Mathis, who is responsible for hiring all employees in his area, believes in evaluating employees once a year. "We do this because it is important for our people to know where they stand, and if anything needs to be corrected, they are advised," he said.

"I keep my employees informed of all the opportunities in the company, because I want them to move up the ladder as I have," he said. "You know, you can't be selfish and make it in life," he said.

A member of the Bethel Baptist Church in Abernathy, his wife, Audrey, and he have three children, a son, Michael, two daughters, Dana and Jaquelin.

"I was the first black employee hired by Gentec, and I will continue to do a super job for the organization," he concluded.

District sales manager for the company is Frank Washburn, who gave Mathis the opportunity to contribute something to the Gentec Hospital Supply Company.

The senior citizens of the South Plains area have a new service available to them—HOMEMAKER SERVICE! The College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University, through a grant from the Administration on Aging, is promoting this service that will match homemakers wanting jobs with older citizens needing some help and planning services in the following counties: Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd,

Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.
West Texans are people who like their independence, and they keep this spirit as they grow older. Most older folk live in their own homes, even though many must live alone. Some older people must live in nursing homes or other institutions because they are too ill or feeble to take care of themselves properly. But, too many are institutionalized solely because they have no alternative. As a result, this new program is designed to study the needs of older people and will attempt to provide them with care in their own homes as an alternative to institutional care. With relatively little assistance, many older South Plains area residents can remain in their homes, where most prefer to stay, and where it may be less costly than residing in an institutionalized setting. Needs of the older citizenry who remain at home are varied. Some need help with housekeeping and shopping; others need escorted service to stores, doctors, or dentists; some need the assurance that someone will be calling on them on a regular basis; or many need personal care during temporary illnesses.

provided the Homemaker Service Aides. These training sessions are held for twelve consecutive weeks, on Friday afternoons at the Y. W. C. A. in Lubbock. Topics of study include nutritional and food management, environmental health, practical psychology, home management, consumer education, and Red Cross Multi-Media First Aid training. In addition to being paid for this on-the-job training, the Homemaker Service Aides receive Continuing Education Units from the Division of Continuing Education and a Certificate from the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University.

Any older client needing assistance in their home on an hourly basis is encouraged to consider this new service. The fee is based on a rate of \$2.30 per hour, or may be based on the client's ability to pay according to an established fee schedule. Persons who wish to participate in the program as Homemaker Service Aides, or those over sixty who desire the service in their homes should contact the Homemaker Service Aide Program office.

"THE UNTAPPED RESOURCES OF THE HOLY SPIRIT"
by Pat Stanton

There are four great days on the Christian's calendar: Christmas, Good Friday, Easter, and Pentecost, but the greatest of these for our lives today is Pentecost. Without Pentecost, there would have been no Christian church.

The early disciples had gone through Christmas and Good Friday, as well as the wonder and glory of Easter, but they were still afraid. It took Pentecost to take the fear out of them and to put courage and faith in them, and Pentecost gave them power to be sent out into the world. But what was Pentecost? What was so great about it? Acts 1:4, 5, 8: "And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence. But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

After Pentecost, they were so filled with the power of Almighty God that even Peter's shadow falling upon a sick person brought wholeness and healing. Handkerchiefs taken from the body of Paul were laid on the bodies of the sick, and they were healed. After Pentecost, the disciples knew that God was in them, and this knowledge brought great faith to them. John 14:16-17: "And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever; Even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you."

These early Christians had a resource that most Christians today do not have; they had the fullness of the Holy Spirit, which is dynamite! This power is available today to all who will ask, and pay the price of self-denial. We could say that the apostles had the

fullness of the Holy Spirit, but it might be more accurate to say that the Holy Spirit had them, and was in complete control of their lives.

What is the Holy Spirit? The Holy Spirit is a personality; He is Almighty God dwelling in the human heart. When we link ourselves with Almighty God, anything can happen. John 15:5, 7, 8: "I am the vine, ye are the branches; He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me ye can do nothing. If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will and it shall be done unto you. Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples."

What does the Holy Spirit give to us and do for us? He is the power and key to the fabulous riches of God, which surpass our imagination. The Spirit brings gifts to believers (1 Cor. 12: Wisdom, knowledge, faith, miracles, healing, and prophecy, etc. He also quickens our mortal bodies. Romans 8:11: "But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you." It is the Holy Spirit, therefore, that quickens, renews, and re-energizes our physical bodies. In addition, the Holy Spirit, transforms us. II Cor. 3:18: "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord."

Who needs to receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit today? In answering this question, we need to consider several important things. 1) Jesus never preached a sermon or healed a body until the Holy Spirit came down upon Him (Luke 3:21-22); 2) Jesus commanded the disciples to do nothing until the Holy Spirit had come upon them (Luke 24:49); 3) Jesus' own mother was among the 120 who were filled with the Spirit on the day of Pentecost. From this, we can conclude that all who want to serve God effectively need the baptism of the Spirit.

Many Christians today think that this great experience was just for the disciples, but six times in

the book of Acts it is recorded that the disciples taught the people to receive the Holy Spirit. (Acts 8:14-18) Others ask if we receive the Holy Spirit at the time of conversion. The answer to this question is "Yes". Our spirit is reborn by the Holy Spirit at conversion, but we do not receive the empowering from "on high" until we desire and seek His anointing. Many of us have been subnormal in our Christian life for so long, that we would be accused of being abnormal if we ever became normal.

Matthew 3:11: "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire." How can we receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit? 1) We must want Jesus through His Spirit more than anything else; 2) We must ask to receive fully (Luke 11:13); 3) We must let go and put ourselves completely under His control; 4) We must receive by faith, and praise the Lord for His new power in us.

After you have received this anointing from the Lord, it will be up to you to live a life filled with the Spirit. You must daily: 1) Run from sin and turn your back on things of self and the devil; 2) Live a life of study in God's Word, and fellowship with Him through prayer and thanksgiving; 3) Have a lifestyle of giving and reaching out to others. God desires to touch you; He wants to hold you in His hands. He gives His own Spirit so that you can be strong, secure, and serene. The Holy Spirit is our stabilizer and blender; He makes life liveable by giving warmth and comfort. Jesus wants to baptize you with His "all encompassing love and fire". Do you need Him? **ASK and DESIRE**, and you shall be filled to overflowing. The joys and resources of the Holy Spirit are still available to those who humbly come and ask.

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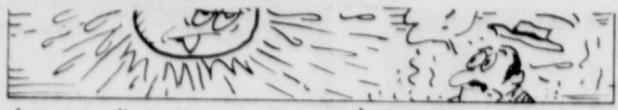
