FARABEE PROTESTS HEW GUIDELINES

AUSTIN -- State Senator Ray Farabee has contacted the federal Health Resources Administration in protest of proposed HEW guidelines. In submitting his statement, Farabee said, "It is important that those responsible for proposing standards understand the needs of smaller cities and rural communities."

"It is not always possible for a patient to be transported to a larger city for treatment. You don't always know when you will need hospital treatment as a result of a heart attack or an accident. Hospitals and other health care facilities should not be eliminated in the same areas which are producing the food, fiber and energy that are so vital to the remainder of the country," Farabee continued.

In urging HEW to consider these factors before adopting any proposed guidelines, Farabee said, "Persons in these less populous areas deserve the same quality of health care as their counterparts in larger cities. Facilities in many of these communities have been built by the people through great personal effort and expense in an attempt to meet critical needs."

Farabee said that he hopes the response from areas such as the 30th District will help preserve the existing medical facilities in smaller towns and cities.

Teakell Gin Hands Victims Of Robbers

Four men from Mexico, who are working for Mac Teakell at Teakell Gin in County Line, were hijacked by two armed Mexican men about 9:30 p.m. Sunday. The victims reside in a house about 150 yards west of the Teakell Gin office. The bandits, one armed with a rifle and the other with a hand gun, entered the house, robbed the four men of a total of \$2,700, locked them in the bathroom and broke out the electric lights. One of the robbers was partially masked by a hood pulled down on part of his face. The other had no mask.

Teakell said no one saw a car leave the house after the robbery.

The house in which the victims reside straddles the Hale-Lubbock county line. It was determined that the robbery took place in the portion of the house that is in Lubbock County.

No one was injured in the incident.

MS Read-A-Thon Held Here

Two Port Lavaca Pioneers, sophomore Rhonda Braun and freshman Annette Sparks, scored three points each.

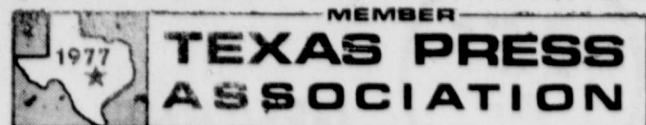

NEC--For being one of the top 20 field seed salesman in the U. S. A. for Northrup-King, Billy Beard earned an expense-paid trip for him and his wife to Mexico City and Acapulco. They went on the trip late last month (Nov.).

NEC--Back-Wash from Washington: The new Department of Energy, which will employ 20,000 government workers, has a budget of \$10.4 billion. The cost for Federal regulation of energy will exceed the value of the annual Texas crude oil output by about \$1 billion.

Burial followed in City of Lubbock Cemetery under direction of Rix Funeral Directors.

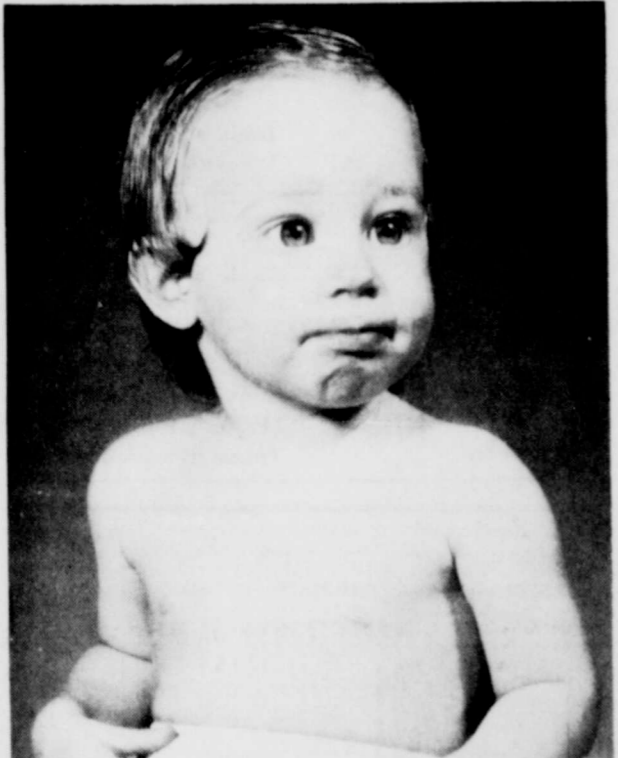
Bufe died at 5:30 p. m. Saturday in Highland Hospital following a brief illness.

Nuclear Plants Set New Energy Record

A significant milestone in the history of man's use of clear power plants in America surpassed that generated by hydroelectric plants.

The Federal Power Commission reports that nuclear plants accounted for 12 percent of all the electricity produced in the United States in the first six months of 1977. The nuclear total was 123.8 million megawatt hours. (A megawatt is 1 million watts.)

This exceeded hydro-generation, which totaled nearly 110.4 million megawatt hours.

Nuclear power is now challenging natural gas (13.2 percent) for third place fuel in electricity generation, behind oil (17.8 percent) and coal (46.1 percent).

It would indeed seem that nuclear power is vital in meeting our energy needs.
