V. A. TO VERIFY BENEFITS

The Veterans Administration has initiated a study to verify the accuracy of disability and death pension benefits being paid to wartime veterans and their widows, and dependency and indemnity compensation being paid to dependent parents of deceased veterans. According to Herbert Hardin, Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post No. 500, some 3, 100 VA beneficiaries will be receiving a letter in the near future, advising that a Veterans Administration representative will visit

lement to benefits. The primary purpose of the study, according to the recent VA announcement, is to measure the accuracy of the current reporting and processing procedures used by the VA. The study, when completed, will provide the VA with information which will determine what changes need to be made in the way in which eligible persons must report their annual income and net worth to the Federal agency. At the present time, such persons must complete an annual income report sent to them on November 1 of each year. Benefit payments for the current year and the follow-

the income information

furnished by the veteran,

widow or parent. The letters which are to be mailed to those persons who are included in the survey state that participation in the study is mandatory by law. Failure by any person to cooperate may result in the suspension of any VA payments that are being made. When the VA representative calls on pensioners, he or she should insist upon being shown proper identification. Any VA employee chosen for this personal contact survey will have ample identification, and will not hesitate to produce it for verification of his or

VOTING HEAVY IN LOCAL ELECTIONS

Abernathy School-Incumbents Richard Howard and David Pinson were reelected to their school board positions with 238 and 290 votes, respectively.

Opponents Larry Griffin received 174 votes, while Laurin W. Prather polled 219 in an above-average voter turnout. City of Abernathy -- A

heavy write-in vote of 118 of 351 votes cast here Saturday fell short of success as the three names already on the ballot sent one incumbent and two newcomers to the city council. Incumbent Jerry Givens polled 286, Harold Stillwell

263 and Charles Nelson 284 to fill three places vacant. Carl Johnson, a write-in candidate, received the 118. Leland Phillips, election judge, said that a total of 474 votes were cast, includ-

ing five write-in votes.

NEW DEAL ELECTIONS

New Deal School--Local farmer Wendell Attebury and Lubbock businessman Verlin Anglin were elected to fill two three-year terms on the New Deal school board, while R. C. Bufe won a two-year unexpired term. Attebury received 158 votes and Anglin, an incum-

bent, garnered 169 ballots. Officials said a total of 295 ballots were cast in what was termed a heavy turnout.

City of New Deal-Voters re-elected Mayor Ray West and two city council incumbents in what election officials termed an average voter turnout. West was re-elected with

64 votes over write-in candidate Grady Henly who received 22 ballots. Incumbent P.W. Ford was

elected to council place 2 with 44 votes over two write-in candidates. Joe Gonzalez, also an incumbent, was returned to his place 4 position with 94 votes. ------




