## Over 250 Are Interviewed

Over 250 people were interviewed for possible employment in a garment factory last Friday and Saturday in the Community Room of the Haskell National Bank by representatives of Herman Marcus, Inc.

The interviews were conducted in conjunction with a labor survey which the Haskell Industrial Foundation is conducting. During the last two weeks almost 400 individuals have returned the survey forms.

More interviews will be held

this Friday night from 7-9 and Saturday morning from 9-12, in the law offices of Adkins and Chapman. All persons who have not been interviewed or who are interested in applying for a job if the garment factory is located in Haskell, are urged to attend one of the interviews. Applications are available at the Haskell Free Press or may be completed at the time of the interview.

Charles Grodin and Fred Hoekstra conducted the interviews and stated that the results of the interviews would be taken back to Dallas to be further evaluated. Results from the evaluation should be known in 4-6 weeks. Both men seemed pleased with both the quantity and quality of applicants and

four women qualified as supervisors.

Of 253 applicants who were interviewed, a substantial percentage had previous experience in garment factories.

Letters have been mailed to each applicant who was not at either of the interviews last week emphasizing the importance of the interviews.

Haskell's varsity eagles brought home the Consolation trophy from Ballinger, ending a weekend of tough competition.

In round one, Haskell was teamed with Stanton, who after leading the Indians a heart-breaking one-point deficit—80-79 final score, went on to win the tournament.

Their effort was outstanding. High man for Stanton was Deavenport with 18, also outstanding defensive man who ended up with the tourney's Outstanding Player Award.

Haskell had three men in double figures as Kretschmer 21, Young 21, and Pringle 14. Green, Ivy and Mickler all participated and played outstanding defense.

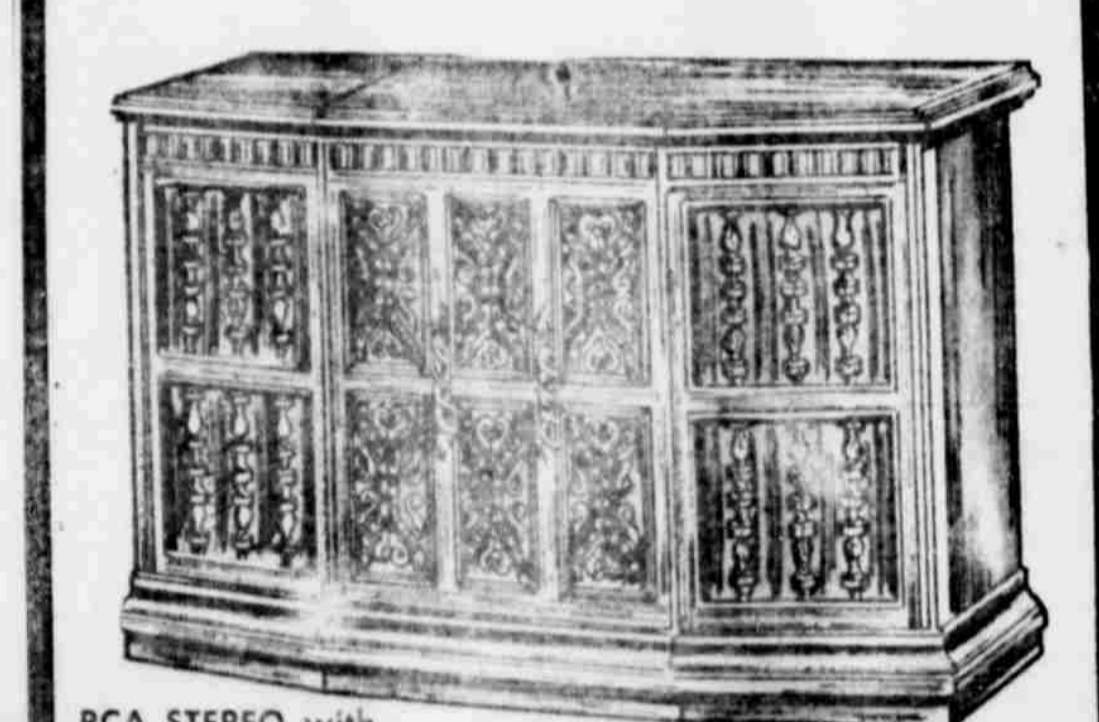

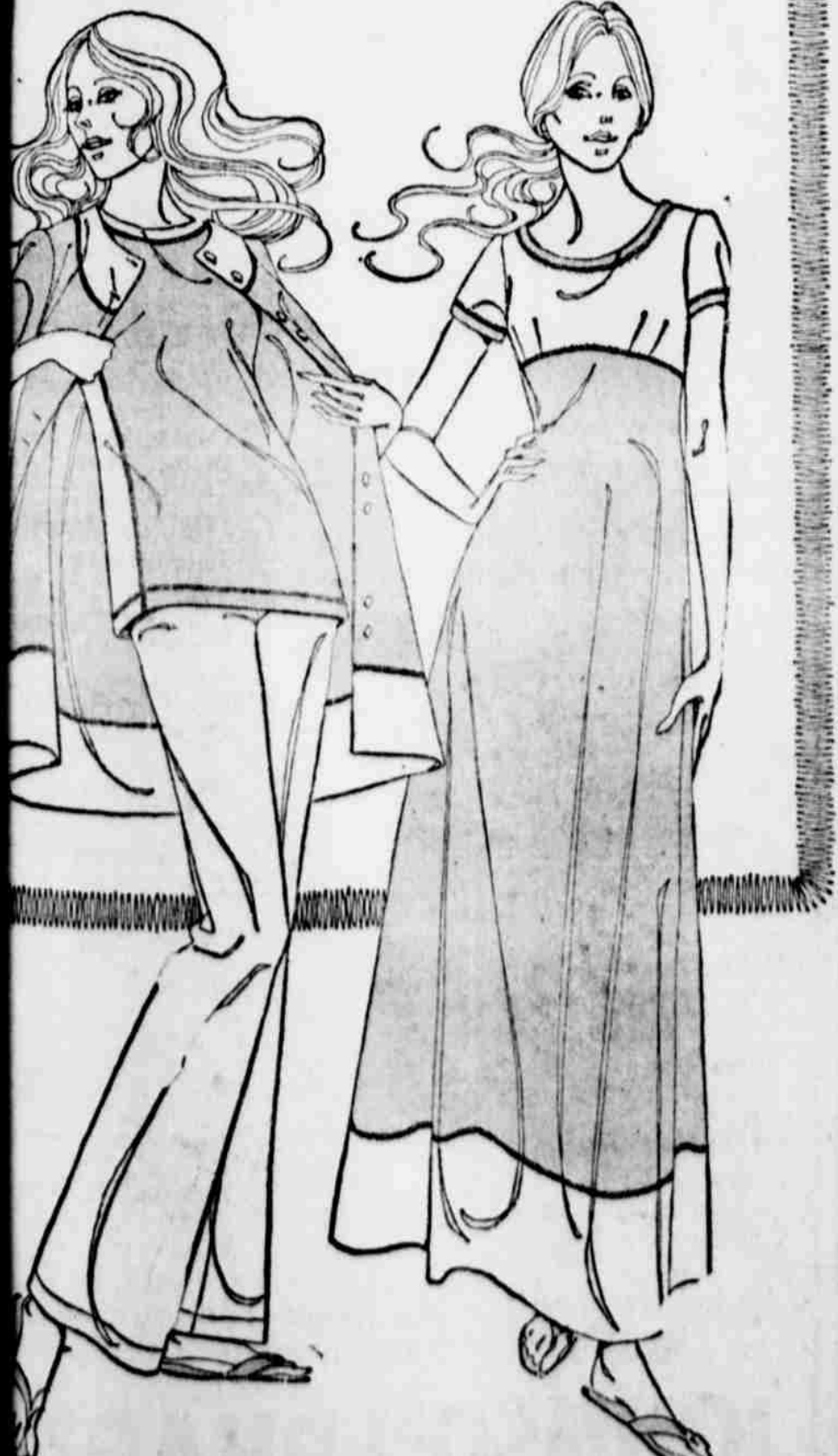
Engagement Announced

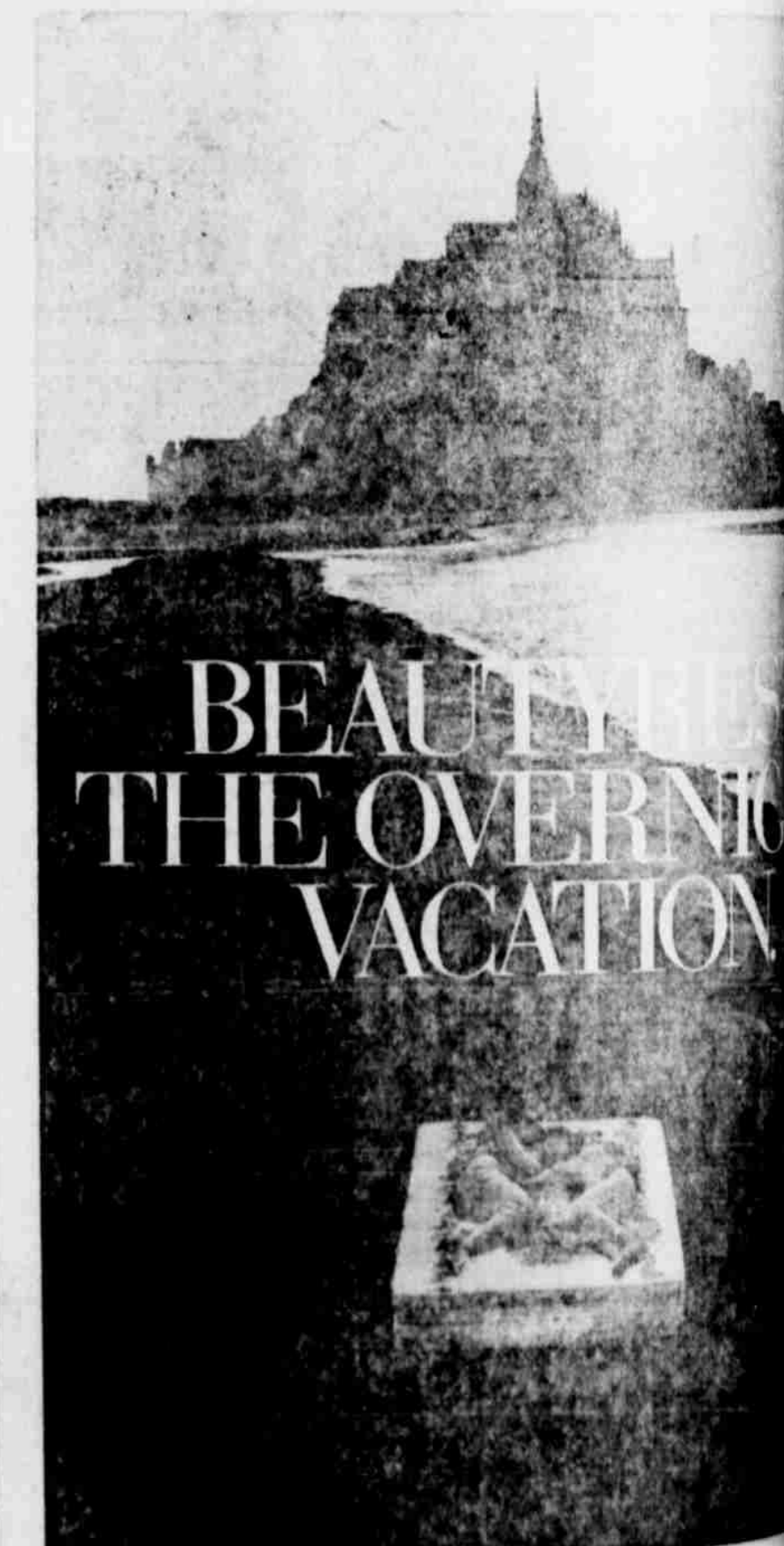

Practicing proper grazing use, taking half and leaving half, will enable the grass plant to stay vigorous and healthy, and produce more forage. It will also assure winter protection of the plants. It will assure good growth next year, as the mulch, or dry forage, left on the soil surface will help to hold more moisture for next year's growth.

I can only urge ranchers and livestock farmers to take the time to observe their pastures during this winter season. The success of the cattle operation next year depends on grass production. Half the grass on a well managed range is more than all the grass produced on a poorly managed range.

**Cotton Classing**

**MUNDAY**

Sample receipts increased sharply as favorable weather allowed cotton harvesting to gain momentum in the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Officer-In-Charge. According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, harvesting is approximately 32 percent complete.

Quality statistics for the week ending Dec. 8, 1972, remained about the same as the previous week. Fourteen percent of the cotton was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), compared to 10 percent last week. Forty-nine percent was classed as Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), and 12 percent was Low Middling Light Spotted (52). Thirteen percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass compared to 24 percent the previous week. The staple length showed 10 percent staple 30, 49 percent staple 31, and 34 percent staple 32.

The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 79 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9. Twenty-one percent read 5.0 and above.

The Pressley fiber strength tests concluded by the USDA's fiber laboratory at College Station shows that the average strength was 80,000 pounds per square inch, compared to 79,000 pounds per square inch last week.

Cotton markets continue to be fairly active with farmers offering moderately. Eighteen to 25,000 cents per pound was paid for most grades offered with staple lengths of staple 30 through staple 33.

The Munday Office classed 6,558 samples this week, bringing the season's total to 32,312.

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**ABILENE**

The U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office, Abilene, classed approximately 40,000 samples for the week ending Dec. 8. This was almost twice the number classed the previous week, and brings the season total to 124,000 classed. Only 11,715 samples had been classed by this date last season, according to B. B. Manly Jr., in charge of the Classing Office.

Dry weather allowed farmers to make considerable progress with harvest. Cold, windy weather did slow harvest one day, however.

Grades and staples of samples classed remained much the same as those of the previous week. Forty-seven percent of the samples graded white, 47 percent graded light spotted, and 9 percent graded spotted. Staple lengths 30, 31 and 32 were 16, 50 and 27 percent, respectively.

The presence of bark in samples declined for the second week straight. Only 22 percent was barked this past week, as compared to 32 and 56 percent the two prior weeks.

Micronaire readings were little changed with 82 percent in the premium range, 16 percent lower than premium, and 2

percent higher than premium. Cotton prices were steady or increased. The price for grade 4131 ranged from 21.55 to 23.25, 4231's ranged in price from 20.25 to 22.25, and 5231's brought from 19.10 to 19.75 cents per pound. Prices paid farmers for cottonseed varied from 47 to 54 dollars per ton.

Divided Into  
Three Divisions**

Of the more than 500 species of birds in Texas, each falls into one of three categories:

game, non-game and unprotected.

Game birds are protected and hunted during regular seasons and cause little confusion.

Much controversy, however, rages over non-game and unprotected birds.

According to state and federal regulations, only three birds may be shot at any time. English sparrows, European starlings and feral pigeons may be killed at any time and their eggs and nests destroyed.

The federal government protects hundreds of species, most of which are also guarded by

state law, including all song birds, raptors, shore birds, other non-game species and all game birds.

In March, 1972, the U. S. and Mexico agreed to add 32 families of migratory non-game birds to the protected list and caused some misunderstandings.

Several birds which formerly could be hunted are now protected by the act.

The disputed species are crows, grackles, red-winged blackbirds and cowbirds.

These birds are still unprotected by state law and the

federal government has amended its ruling to permit control if the birds are found committing, about to commit depredations upon ornamental or shade trees, agricultural crops, livestock or wildlife, or when concentrated in such numbers and manner as to constitute a hazard to health or other nuisance.

Hunting protected birds can draw a fine of up to \$500.

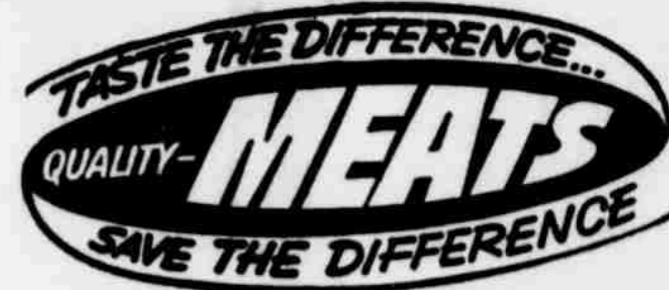

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture  
John C. White, Commissioner

**Sheep and Lamb Feeding Declines; New Trailer Light Laws; Cattle, Calf, Sheep Sales Up; Hog Sales Down; Egg Production Declines.**

A 3 percent reduction in sheep and lambs on feed in Texas is reported by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Elsewhere, sheep and lamb feeding increased 2 percent in seven major feeding areas of the nation.

Texas sheep and lambs on feed in Texas totaled 210,000 head, down 3 percent from a year ago. Sheep and lambs on feed during September and October are down 5 percent from a year ago. Marketings of fed sheep totaled 141,000 head, or 2 percent below the same period last year.

Department of Public Safety has issued requirements for cotton trailers under 15,000 lbs. gross weight when operated during daytime with visibility of more than 1,000 feet. The requirements coincide with the provisions of the lighting and trailer brake law as amended in the last special session of the Legislature.

Regulations include the following: for trailers less than 80 inches in width and under 30 ft. in length—two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear. Trailers less than 80 inches wide and more than 30 ft. in length; one amber reflector on each side centrally located on trailer body, and two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Complete details may be obtained from your local Texas Department of Public Safety office.

Farm Bureau Offers Property Protection Plan

A news story concerning Haskell County Farm Bureau's new Property Protection "rural crime fighter" Program contained an error that needs to be corrected, according to Marvin Phemister of Weibert, President.

The story released by the Haskell County Farm Bureau in the November 2nd issue, said that the \$200 reward money would be delivered to the property owner. It should have said that the money would be given to the reward recipient—the person supplying information leading to the arrest and final conviction.

Phemister said that the reward program which is offered to County Farm Bureaus on an optional basis by the Texas Farm Bureau has proven to be exceptionally popular. Already more than 170 counties have signed up for the program, he said. The county leader said the program should act as a deterrent to the increasingly serious problem of break-ins and burglaries in rural areas.

All members in a participating county who have the official "No Trespassing" signs posted on their property are protected against trespass and other offenses. This reward program is provided by the Texas Farm Bureau and its affiliated companies.

The new service-to-member program provides for the posting of property according to the new anti-trespass law passed during the last regular session of the Legislature.

A reward of \$200 is offered by the Texas Farm Bureau companies for information leading to the arrest and final conviction of persons committing trespass, felony theft, or malicious mischief as defined by Article 1350 on property of a current Farm Bureau member.

Each member will automatically have protection if he has properly posted his property. Signs are available from the County Farm Bureau at a cost of 50c each. Name plates may be purchased at a cost of \$1.00 each. Decals for autos, trucks and other vehicles will be provided at no cost to the member.

In the matter of reporting claims, the County Farm Bureau completes the form furnished them and turns the matter over to a Farm Bureau adjuster who makes an investigation of the case. When conditions for the reward are met, a check is sent to the County Farm Bureau for presentation to the reward recipient.

Except for the cost of the signs, there is no charge to the member for this Property Protection Program. The County Farm Bureau assumes the cost of the program which is 20 cents for each current member not having a fire or casualty policy with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies.

The group divided in two smaller groups and prepared Cherry Delight and Apple Delight. Vicki New and Sharon Turner then served the Apple



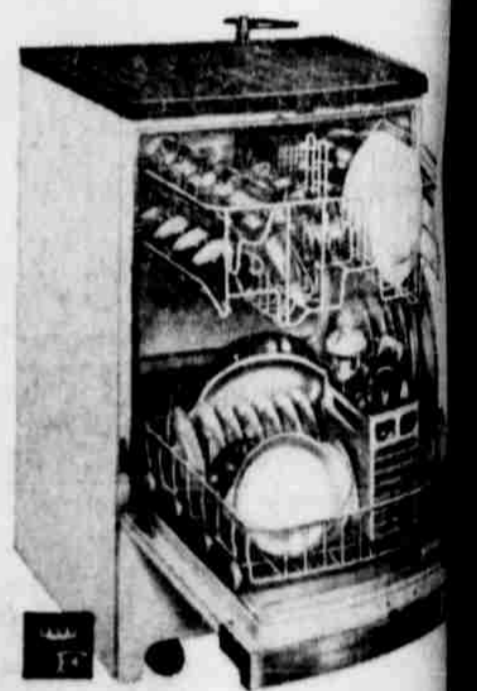
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
