Independent Baptist Church "Homecoming"

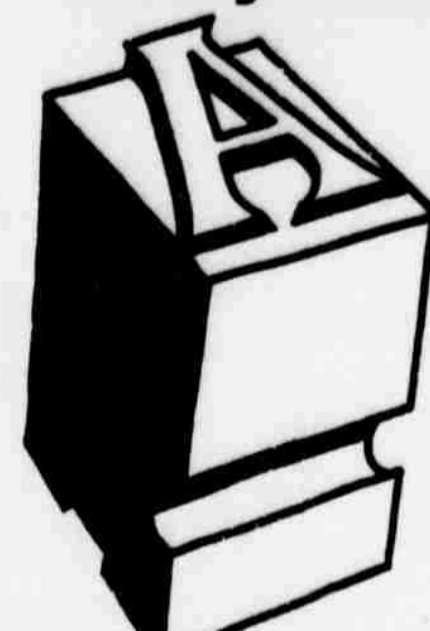

In this scribe's opinion the jury wheel to select venires for both district and county court juries is fair and practical. In this wheel which will be somewhat like those in use for community drawings, will be placed the names of all qualified voters in the county. The wheel is turned so that the cards are thoroughly mixed before the venire is selected.

After the cards are selected, the jury list is prepared and the prospective jurors are notified as in the past. Those who are exempt from serving on jurors have been greatly reduced by the law. Only those persons over 65 years of age and women who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of 10 are exempt. The law specifically eliminates any consideration of economic factors.

Persons under 21 years of age may not serve on juries, and their names need not be placed in the jury wheel.

As more 18-year-olds exercise their right to vote, they may begin to wonder about those social security "contributions" that are taken from them by law each month so that government can provide for their well-being nearly 50 years from now. They might well wonder about the thousands upon thousands of dollars of their earnings that they are told are to be put into some vague trust fund to help care for them in their old age. A lot can happen in 50 years. The rules can change. Inflation can wipe out the dollar.

Whatever happens, the 18-year-olds, who are starting to vote are destined to bear a substantial portion of the cost. 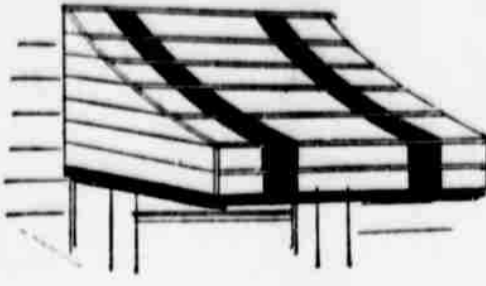

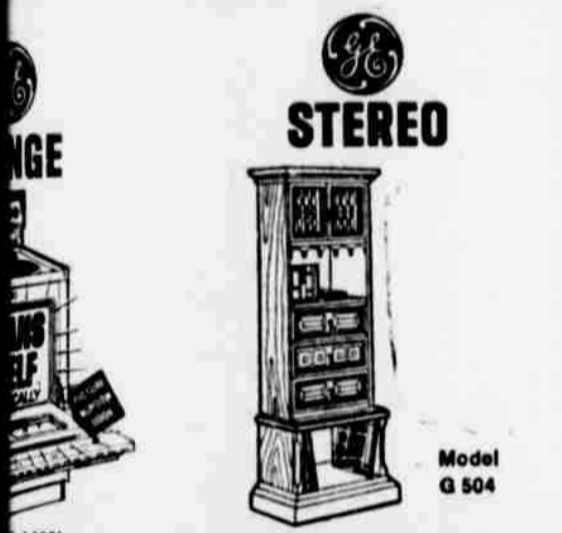

Today's action on cotton is expected to strengthen income in 1972 and subsequent years for cotton farmers in the drouth areas of the Southwest. An adjustment in the farmer's actual 1971 cotton yield up to 90 percent of his 1971 payment yield—instead of the previous level of 80 percent—will be permitted where this year's yield is reduced by adverse natural conditions.

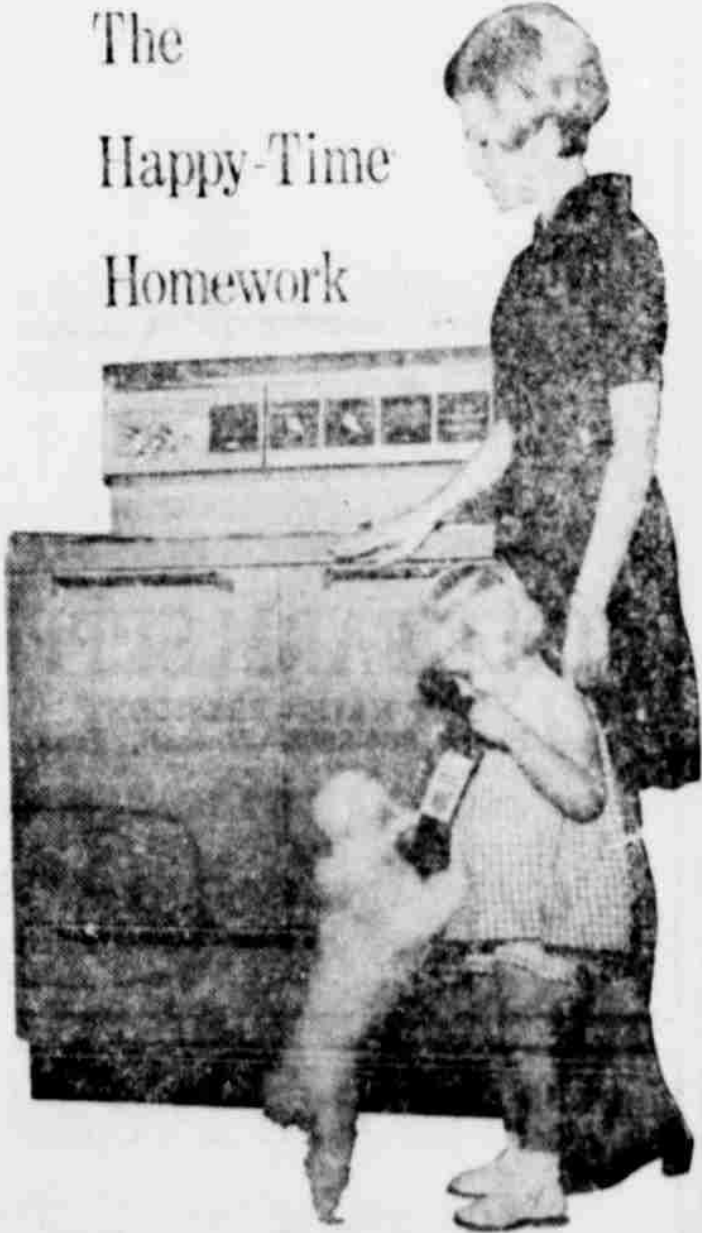
