The officials of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company have been indicted by a New York Federal Grand Jury, for supplying war material to German war vessels.

Ex-President Taft made a speech at Morristown, N. J., on Washington's birthday, commending the foreign policy of Mr. Wilson, and condemning the movement of naturalized citizens, who were advocating

making the war issues of Europe an issue in this country. He pointed out that those who did this were not considerate of their duties of loyalty, and would be defeated in their efforts to succeed on such issues. He said a grave crisis was pending between this country and the belligerents of Europe. He expressed sympathy with those whose Fatherland were engaged in a Titanic struggle for National existence, but cautioned them as to the duties they had assumed as citizens of this country.

The United States is still conducting negotiations with England and Germany, in an effort to get them to observe the laws of civilized warfare.

The State Legislature is running smooth and will probably rush a lot of bills and adjourn in a few days. There has been very little attention paid by the people to this session of legislature. The whiskey question seems to be the only issue that arouses the patriotism of all classes in this state.

The English and French fleets have attacked the Turkish forts of the Dardanelles and are making ruins of them as fast as they get to them. The losses of the Allies are four or five men so far and the Turks have lost train loads of men. The German papers charge that Russia and England will fall out over the spoils when Russia demands Constantinople.

The Germans claim to have taken 1,000,000 prisoners during the war, and say not over two per cent are British, which means about twenty thousand all told of British prisoners. When the war broke out, we predicted that the British would hold enough men in reserve to dictate terms to Russia, and protect the Germans from extermination. It is probable the

hatred the Germans bear the British will make them suffer terribly before they will consent to accept the protection from an English source, but it looks like England is going to still be the power that will dictate the map of Europe after the war.

The Turkish Government has abandoned Constantinople and moved to Asia Minor. The Germans objected to this move, and wanted the Turkish Government to go to Adrianople on the European side. It is reported that the Turkish people are blaming their Government for being led into the war with Germany, and an attempt has been made to assassinate the Grand Visier.

It is with pride that the Free Press takes note of the continued efforts on the part of the ladies of our city along civic and sanitary improvement lines. When a city has ladies who love the beautiful and have interest in the sanitary welfare; who are willing to back up this interest with energetic efforts to bring about the desired end, that city may be rightly numbered with the progressive class. Half the battle in anything we may attempt to accomplish is won in the willingness to do. March 10th has been designated as "Clean-up Day" for Texas, and the ladies of the Co-Operative Meeting, the civic workers of Haskell, have issued their edict, as will be seen from their notice in another part of this paper, and we men might as well begin to get busy. So put on your overalls, roll up your sleeves and do as the ladies tell you, whether you feel like it or not, and, metamorphosing David Crockett's saying just a little, say, "I am sure I am right and am going ahead." Let's have a cleaner and a more beautiful Haskell.

## MUSIC HAS ITS PLACE IN SCHOOL

The following article was read before the Parents-Teachers' Meeting at the High School auditorium last week, by Mrs. H. R. Jones:

"Should Pupils Take Music Lessons in Private Home During School Hours?"

The power and influence which a music teacher exercises over her or his pupils, is such that it deserves more attention than it ordinarily receives.

If the general public knew the educational influence that the music teacher exercises aside from music, they would better understand.

Music is an art; and when the mind is receiving artistic impressions, it is in a very plastic condition, and other impressions are liable to be absorbed unconsciously. It is therefore evident that the music teacher, as well as other teachers should have a well defined beginning and end.

There should always be a spirit of helpfulness in the very atmosphere of the music room. In all our schools English literature forms part of the study, and we may surely hope that before long, studies in like manner be taught, to understand the great masters music properly studied is a training of muscle, brain and spirit to work together in perfect harmony.

Should not this be the purpose of all education?

Bach was a Public School Teacher. You know he loved to teach the youth.

It is perhaps not altogether proper at the present day to refer to the great Bach as a supervisor of public school music, but was not the "Thomas Schule," so far as he was connected with it, essentially a public music school for the city of Leipzig. Through all the work of that celebrated school the spirit of the greatest of musicians breathes today, and tourists (of musical propensities) stop as they pass to refresh themselves in its atmosphere.

This brings me to my point. You know there is the great trinity of H in music.

1. Head—Intellect.
2. Hand—Muscle.
3. Heart—Emotion.

The intellectual side of a person must be cultivated in music, without which you readily see they would not interpret intelligently. Then the technical side is developed through the muscle.

Through the heart we develop the emotional, without which we would not have much music. To do this there must be a musical atmosphere.

The pupils feel this at once in a well conducted music room. There must be a certain place to go for the lessons.

This is just as essential as it is to have a certain place for Grammar or High School pupils to assemble. This may be in a room situated in the building situated where it will not disturb study or recitation or it may be in a room set aside for that purpose in some private home near and convenient or a building erected for that purpose on the campus.

I say near and convenient to the school building, for as many of you know I do not think it best, or that you get the results desired, by going from home to home giving private lessons. Why? you say?

Well of course there is always a certain amount of musical atmosphere in every home. But the music room where the teacher is prepared to instruct will just breathe its influence and inspiration. Valuable time is lost going from house to house, and really it is hard to have any system about it, for the hindrances are too numerous to mention.

In other words, the educated teacher's salary for the year is less than that of the uneducated day laborer. Six thousand teachers quit the profession in Texas annually. Can you blame them, when you compare their annual earning capacity with that of any other class of educated men and women. The bookkeeper, stenographer, private secretary or operator gets, as a beginner, from \$50 to \$75 per month twelve months in the year, and soon receive an advance in salary and it isn't long, if they are made of the right kind of stuff, before they are promoted to assistant managers of large business concerns where they draw salaries that soon enables them to lay up a comfortable living for old age.

The teaching profession is a noble, charitable one, but are you content to work in the charity department of your state when they allow you no pension or protection in old age, or will you go into the great broad field of business where you can lay up something for a rainy day and provide your own protection for old age.

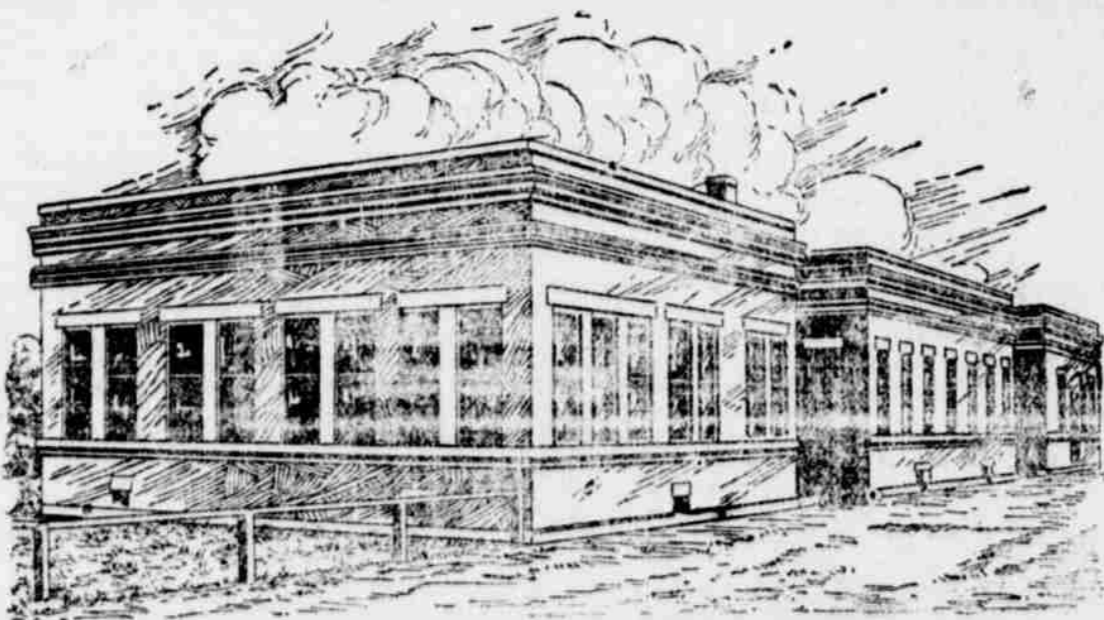
