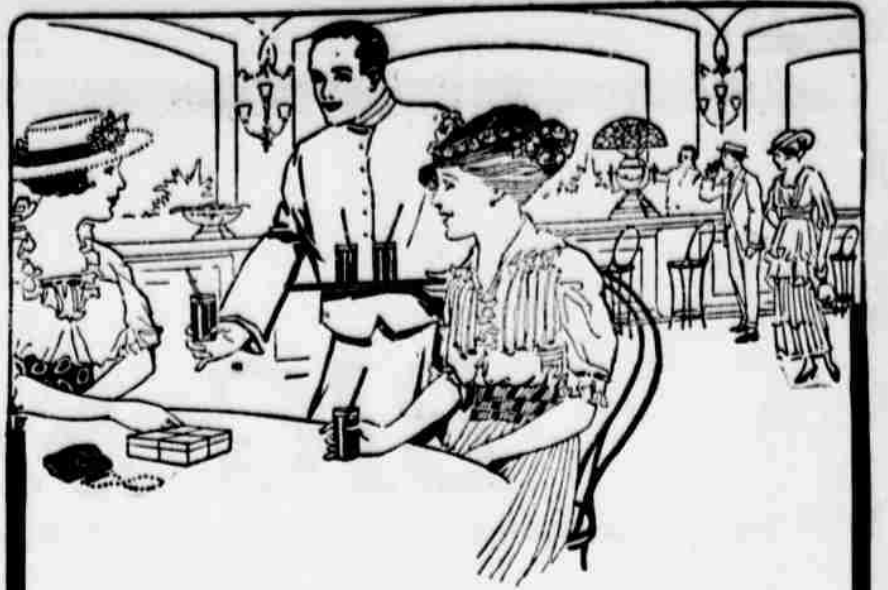

This is the policy now being written by the Haskell County Home Circle and Accident Association of Texas. Let us get together and boost. If we will, we will soon have 1000 members.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE HASKELL COUNTY HOME CIRCLE AND ACCIDENT ASSOCIATION OF TEXAS

CONSTITUTION
The object and purpose of the above named organization, which is unincorporated, is to provide mutual life and accident insurance, the same to be transacted only in the territory within a radius of twenty-five miles with the city of Haskell, in Haskell County, Texas, as its center and to provide funds by assessment to care for the rights of the policy holders in the incorporated company known as Haskell County Home Circle.

BY-LAWS
1. The business of this Association shall be supervised and controlled by a board of seven directors who shall hold office for two years and until their successors are duly elected.
2. The first Board of Directors shall and does consist of seven policy holders already elected, who shall hold their office until the election of their successors and such elections for that purpose may be held on the first Monday in May, 1917, and on each succeeding two years thereafter for the purpose of electing a new Board of Directors.
3. The officers of the Association shall consist of a President, one Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer whose duties shall be the same as those in similar organizations.
4. The officers of this organization shall be elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors at the same time as above provided for the election of directors.
5. The directors shall be elected by a meeting of the policy holders of this Association, to be held as aforesaid, on each two years on the first Monday in May above provided for. The said policy holders shall be called together on that date and on all other occasions when necessary by addressing to each a written notice and mailing same to the postoffice address of such policy holder as shown in his application for membership in this Association, at least five days before the date of the meeting and ten policy holders shall and does constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business to be transacted by said policy holders.

6. The Association binds itself to pay to the beneficiary named in each certificate of membership on the death of the holder of said certificate, one dollar for each member of this Association in good standing.
7. The Association also binds itself to pay to any member holding a certificate of class "A" or "B" who happens to an accident or accidents causing damage and injury to him to the following extent: For the total loss of both eyes, both hands or both feet, one dollar for each member in good standing; for the total loss of one hand, one eye or one foot, 25 cents for each member in good standing; for the total loss of one hand and one foot and one eye, or one foot and one eye, 50 cents for each member in good standing; for the total loss of one hand, one foot and one eye, 75 cents for each member in good standing; for the breaking of one arm or leg, 10 cents for each member in good standing; provided that the member who happens to such accident shall only receive accident benefits not to exceed the amount that would accrue from the assessment for accident purposes levied against members of this Association.

8. The funds to be paid out for accident purposes shall be derived by an assessment levied against the members in good standing by order of the Board of Directors of this Association.
9. Any person who, at the time he becomes a member of this Association, shall be not over 50 years of age at his nearest birthday, shall be entitled to receive in person the amount provided for in his certificate of membership upon the surrender of his said certificate at the age of seventy years, provided that he be then living.
10. All members of the Haskell County Home Circle shall be subject to assessment the same as they are authorized to be assessed by the Constitution and By-Laws of that company, and they and their beneficiaries shall receive from this company the same benefits that they or their beneficiaries are entitled to receive from said Haskell County Home Circle, even to the extent of one dollar per member for each member of this company and Haskell County Home Circle to be paid to their beneficiaries on the death of such members in good standing not to exceed one thousand dollars.

11. Each policy holder in this Association shall be and is hereby assessed \$1.10 to be paid by him upon written notice from the secretary of this company within 15 days from the date of the call for said assessment after the death of any member and \$2.00 per annum dues to be paid on or before the first day of December of each year and failure to pay such assessment within said time, shall forfeit all claims of the member, so failing, to any rights or benefits of this Association.
12. This Association will pay to the beneficiary of each member who dies an amount of money equal to \$1.00 for each member of this Association and each member of Haskell County Home Circle in good standing at the time of the death of said member, not to exceed \$1,000.

13. The amount to be paid to any member or his beneficiary shall not exceed \$1,000.
14. The number of members of this Association shall be unlimited.
15. No assessments shall be made unless the same are necessary for the purpose of meeting the legitimate demands of this Association as authorized by these By-Laws.
16. These By-Laws may be amended at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors.
17. No member of this Association shall be liable for any amount of money at any time except for the assessments authorized by these By-Laws.

18. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of this Association to collect and receive all moneys due this Association and to safely keep and care for same, paying out the moneys only upon the legal demands made against the Association and to guarantee the full, faithful and complete performance of these duties he shall make and execute a good and sufficient bond to be approved by the President of this Association, payable to the Association in the sum of \$5,000.
19. All money paid out for or on behalf of this Association shall be done by draft drawn upon the Treasurer countersigned by the President of this Association.

And it is further agreed that failure to pay any assessment so levied within fifteen days from date of call, or to pay said annual dues on or before the 1st day of December of each year, shall forfeit all claims as a member of this Association. And it is also agreed that if any untrue statements have been made with fraudulent intent in the application as to age, health, family history, or any other questions that would materially increase the risk assumed, this certificate becomes void and of no effect.

3. That it shall be the duty of each member to keep the Secretary of said Association informed of the postoffice address of such members, and in giving notice of any assessment shall not be necessary for said Association to do more than mail a written or printed notice, properly stamped and addressed to such member at his or her last known postoffice address.

4. That the said _____ agrees to pay all assessments levied by the Directors for accidents as per By-Laws.

5. That this Association binds itself to pay _____ the beneficiary of _____ related as _____ the sum of \$1.00 for each member in good standing, said amount not to exceed \$1,000 should _____ die while in good standing, in this Association.

6. This Association agrees to pay any member of this class who happens to the accident or accidents herein stated as follows: For total loss of both eyes, both hands or both feet, \$1.00 for each member in good standing; for the total loss of one hand, one foot, or one eye, 25 cents for each member in good standing; for the total loss of two such members 50 cents for each member in good standing; for the total loss of three such members 75 cents for each member in good standing; for the breaking of an arm or leg, 10 cents for each member in good standing. Provided however, that the member who happens to such accident shall only receive accident benefits for any one accident not to exceed the amount that would accrue from the assessment for accident purposes from one thousand members.

7. Should the holder hereof attain the age of seventy (70) years, inclusive, this Association agrees to pay \$1.00 for each member in this class, not to exceed \$1,000.00 upon the surrender of this policy, which will be of no further effect.

There shall be no other liability rest on this Association other than herein stated.

This policy is not valid unless signed by the insured.

The By-Laws on opposite side hereof are a part of this contract.

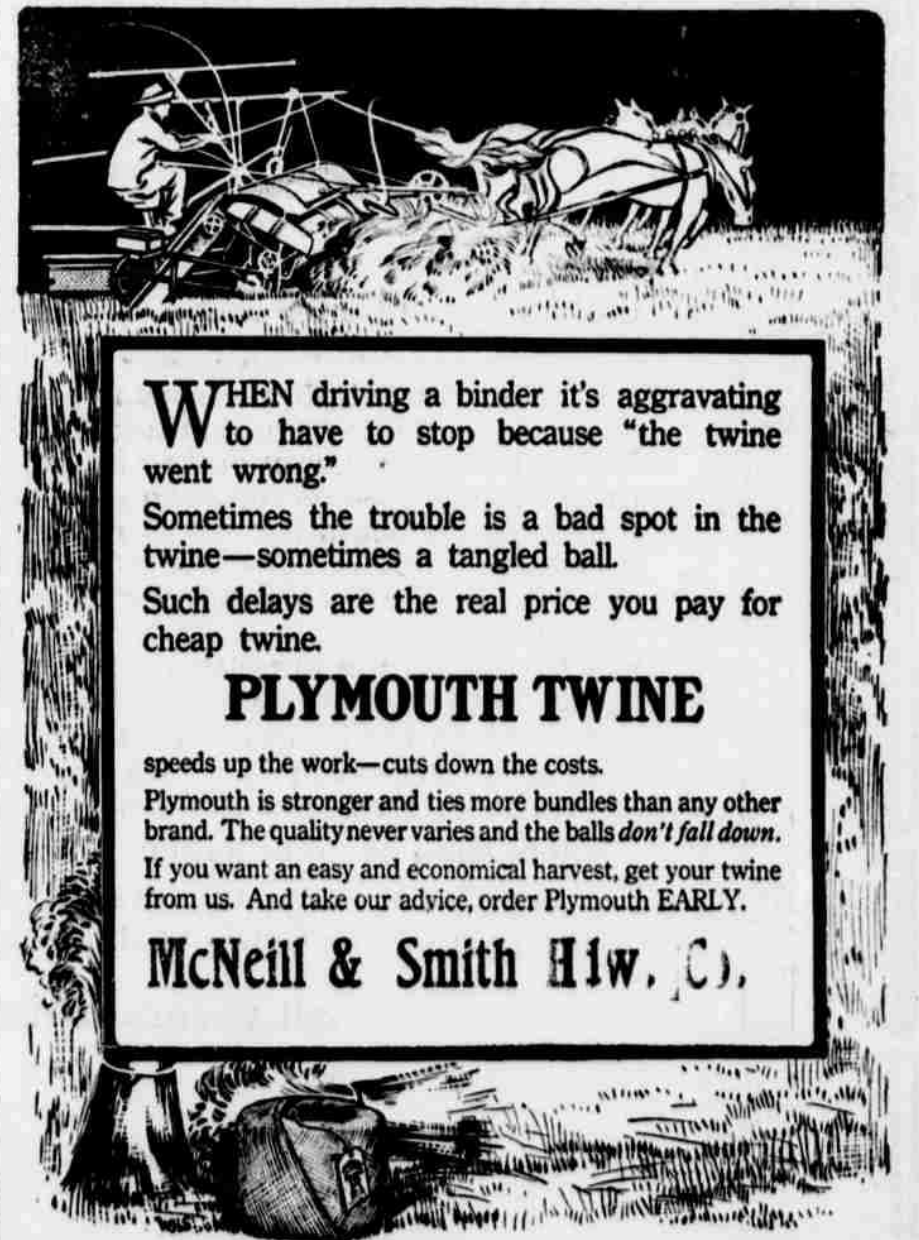

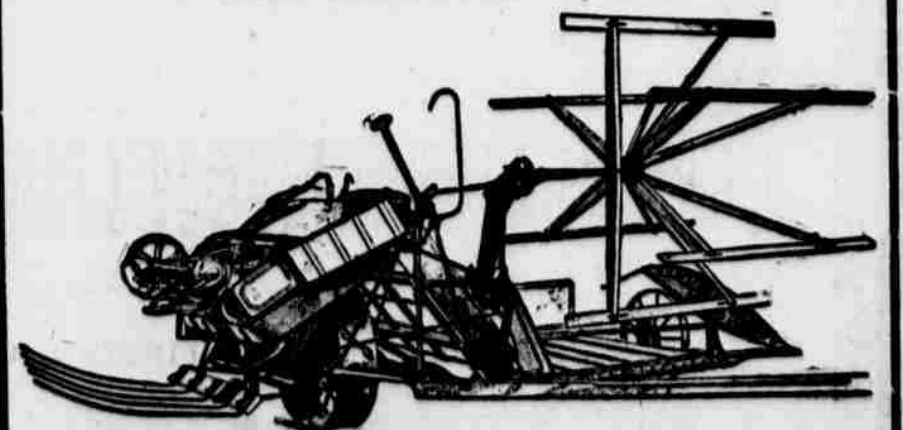
