Working together to fight truancy in Winters schools

WINTERS, Texas.-The Winters Independent School District and City Police Department are working together on a program to fight student truancy, and keep kids from dropping out of school.

Last Monday, Police Chief Nathan Johnson presented a memorandum to the City Council, in order to draft the agreement with the School District. The deal includes a budget from the School District for a part time agent, who will enforce attendance.

Council approved unanimously the motion to create a special amendment on the city budget, and handle this revenue properly.

Attendance falls could cost the Winters Independent School District to loose status and a budget cut. "We are working very closely with them," said Johnson about the project.

Before putting this to work, the project must be evaluated and approved by the Winters School Board, Superintendent and both the school and city legal departments.

According to the project, the Police Department will be enforcing school drop offs in every grade, from PreK to High School, and the School District will cover the cost incurred because of the truancy problem.

The project is also seeking to solidify relations between the Police Department and the WISD, as well as fight the burglary problems that Winters had during the last two summers.

In the regular meeting held last Monday, City Council also canceled the Mayor election scheduled for May 8, due to the lack of candidate registrations, discussed the status on Water Treatment Plant, and a grant for the construction of six houses.



Major Update for Hoops in WISD

Over \$5 million invested in the new Blizzards gym, will be ready to host the November games

WINTERS, Texas.- The last school gym was constructed over half a century ago, and this time the Winters Independent School District has prepared to roll out the red carpet and build a new facility, to fulfill needs of the students of Winters ISD.

The new gym is being built right next to the old building, which dates back to 1954, and hopefully will be ready in November, for the 2010-11 basketball season tip-off.

The Winters community welcomes the new project not only because of the benefits to local students but because it was not necessary to pass a bond election, increase taxes, or apply for grants.

A key person in the project, David Hutton, WISD superintendent, is looking forward to completion of the gym construction for 2010-2011.

"This is going to be a great upgrade to the WISD facilities, and will allow us to seat nearly 800 people. The facility will have showers and restrooms for the junior varsity and varsity teams," said Hutton.

The building under construction could top a \$5.5 million budget although expectations are that it will not go over \$5 million. The 33,000 square feet facility will have a basketball court, a large lobby which can be divided for classrooms, and a concession area. The newest addition will sit along side of the old building and is designed to form a complex. Coaches will have new offices in the facility

Transition for high school principal in progress

WINTERS, Texas.- With a 34 year academic background, Susan Sharp, the Winters High School principal, is retiring as soon as the school year is over. Last week the deadline was met for applicants willing to take the seat, and the WISD started the selection process with more than 40 candidates.

Applications from all over Texas, as well as some from other states were sent after the job posting in the Texas Association of Secondary Administrators, Society for Educational Businesses and the Region 15 Service Center.

After a quick process the list was narrowed down to just a few, based on the experience and requirements needed for the job.

The application stated 5 years experience as preferred, and some of the candidates just recently obtained the principal cer-

Most applicants from cities out of the state were also discarded because of the little or no knowledge at all of the local community and culture.

Retired principals and former teachers were scratched from the list unless they had outstanding abilities.

Right after that, the superintendent office started with the real selection process, the only candidates to be interviewed will be the ones with serious experience, some of whom are currently principals.

A list of just a few candidates will be evaluated by a group of teachers and the WISD staff checking references and back-

According to the plan, on May 1st the School Board of Trustees will receive a recommendation, in order to have a smooth transition with the two principals working together.

A qualified voter is one voted in the Republican primary in March or did not vote at all in the same process, while a person who voted in the Democratic primary is not eligible to vote in the run

There is one statewide runoff for the office of Supreme Court Justice Place 3, between Rick Debra Green and Lehrmann. There is also one local runoff for County Judge between Nathan T. Johnson and Barry Hilliard.

Voters should present their voter registration cards when voting.

The last day to receive an application to vote by mail is April 6th.





PUBLIC NOTICE

On March 15, 2010, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 1, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,190,843 residential, 97,756 commercial, and 735 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$56,826,830, or 6.04% percent, including gas costs, or 14.82% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:



To whom it may concern with the City if Winters,

Many of our DSC members come to your " Dove Fest" in Winters, Tx. each year. We have known Don and Nolo Gene Davis for several years and we know they truly care about the wildlife habitat and proper game management.

We, at the Dallas Safari Club, fully support and endorse this effort to "protect the roost" for the sand hill cranes coming to Winters.

We know from experience if people are allowed to get close to, shoot at or in any way harass roosting species that species will move on and seek "sanctuary" at a safer location. Game biologists, game wardens and hunters world wide have seen and experienced this movement. Sand hill cranes are especially sensitive to roost invasion.

I personally saw a perfect duck roost habitat on a themselves, they prefer to rice plantation in Sulfur Bluff, Tx. over run and over hunted till the ducks move on to Cooper lake in Cooper, Tx. for a roosting sanctuary. Once they have moved it is virtually impossible to entice them back





WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF A PANIC ATTACK?

The symptoms of a panic attack appear suddenly, without any apparent cause. They may include: racing or pounding heartbeat chest pains dizziness, light-headedness, nausea dif ficulty breathing *tingling or numbness of the hands *flushes or chills *dreamlike sensations or perpetual distortions *terror-a sense that something unimaginably horrible is about to occur and one is powerless to prevent it *fear of losing control and doing something embarrassing

A panic attack typically lasts for several minutes and is one of the most distressing conditions that a person can experience. Most people who have one attack will have others. When some one has repeated attacks, or feels sever anxiety about having another attack, he or she is said to have a panic disorder

WHAT IS PANIC DISORDER?

Panic disorder is a serious health problem in this country. At least 1.6 percent of adult Americans, or three million people, will have panic disorder at some time in their lives. The dis order is strikingly different from other types of anxiety in that panic attacks are sudden, appeal to be unprovoked, and are often disabling.

Once someone has had a panic attack—for example, while driving, shopping in a crowded store, or riding in an elevator—he or she may develop irrational fears, called phobias, about these situations and begin to avoid them. Eventually, the pattern of avoidance and level of any iety about another attack may reach the point where the individual with the panic disorder may be unable to drive or even step out of the house. At this stage, the person is said to have pani disorder with agoraphobia. Thus panic disorder can have as serious an impact on a person's daily life as other major illnesses—unless the individual receives effective treatment. IS PANIC DISORDER SERIOUS?

Yes, panic disorder is real and potentially disabling, but it can be controlled with specific treatments. Because of the disturbing symptoms that accompany panic disorder, it may be mistaken for heart disease or some other life-threatening medical illness. People frequently go to hospital emergency departments when they are having a panic attack, and extensive medica tests may be performed to rule out these other conditions.

Others often try to reassure the person who is having a panic attack that he or she is not in great danger. Expressions such as "nothing serious," "all in your head," or "nothing to worry about" may give the incorrect impression that there is no real problem and that treatment is not


WHAT IS THE TREATMENT FOR PANIC DISORDER?

Thanks to research, there are a variety of treatments available, including several effective nedications and, also, specific forms of psychotherapy. Often, a combination of psychothera py and medications produces good results. Some improvement may be noticed in a fairly shor period of time—about six to eight weeks. Appropriate treatment of panic disorder can preven banic attacks or at least substantially reduce their severity and frequency, bringing significant

relief to 70 to 90 percent of people with panic disorder.

In addition, people with panic disorder may need treatment for other emotional problems Depression has often been associated with panic disorder, as have alcohol and drug abuse Recent research also suggests that suicide attempts are more frequent in people with pani lisorder. Fortunately, these problems associated with panic disorder can be overcome effect ively, just like panic disorder itself.

Tragically, many people with panic disorder do not seek or receive treatment. Brought to you as a service of
