Conaway addresses immigration, border violence, local concerns

WINTERS, Texas.- Immigration, border security and national debt, as well as international conflicts and the federal government response were among the issues concerning Winters citizens at the America Speaking Out meeting.

As a part of the America Speaking Out tour, last Wednesday, June 2, congressman Mike Conaway (R) visited Winters to hear about local problems and concerns, and to receive direct input from the voters about District 11.

Conaway arrived in the morning to the Rock Hotel, to meet with constituents and engage them in the

America Speaking Out initiative.

Local citizens urged congressman to take action about border violence, due to the increasing crime rates in Mexico, and the possibility of Texans to become victims either traveling south of the border or in the Lonestar state.

"(Mexico's President) Calderon is doing the right thing, and we need to support him because is Americans that are buying the drugs," said Conaway.

Mexico has been having a lot of drug related violence lately, but has many resources that support democracy.

Conaway said that the gun ownership ban in Mexico is part of the violence problem, because people does-

n't have the ability to defend themselves, and that President Calderon did not do any good by criticizing Arizona laws on his last visit to Washington D.C.

The immigration reform issue will not be addressed by federal government before November election "but if we let them another two years it will be done."

For Texas representative one of the most endangering threats in terms of common people lifestyle is not Iraq or Afghanistan, but the increasing spending in federal government.

"The way things are going we have two choices, we either raise taxes or we stop spending money in something less important than

our health... we should not raise taxes, this is not a tax issue is a spending issue."

According to congressman the health care bill will play a main role in the November election, where Republicans need 39 more seats to gain control of the House of Representatives.

The health care bill, said Conaway, has to have consequences in November, and two of the most probable districts will be one in San Antonio and another one in Waco.

Medicare will be facing financial problems next year, when the generation known as Baby Boomers start retiring, and find out that some of their doctors won't be working with Medicare.

The big fish run at Ivie is still going on with a 12.98 weighed Sunday in the bass tourney. Several over 10 and one over 11 have also been weighed at tourney headquarters at Concho Park Marina. There are also plenty of smaller fish being caught as Ivie continues to be one of the hottest lakes in the nation for that big one.

On a trip this past Saturday the bass boys and girls were doing their thing, but ours was catfish for the frying pan. In preparation for the trip I normally try to catch a few of the local catfish experts and ask their advice. 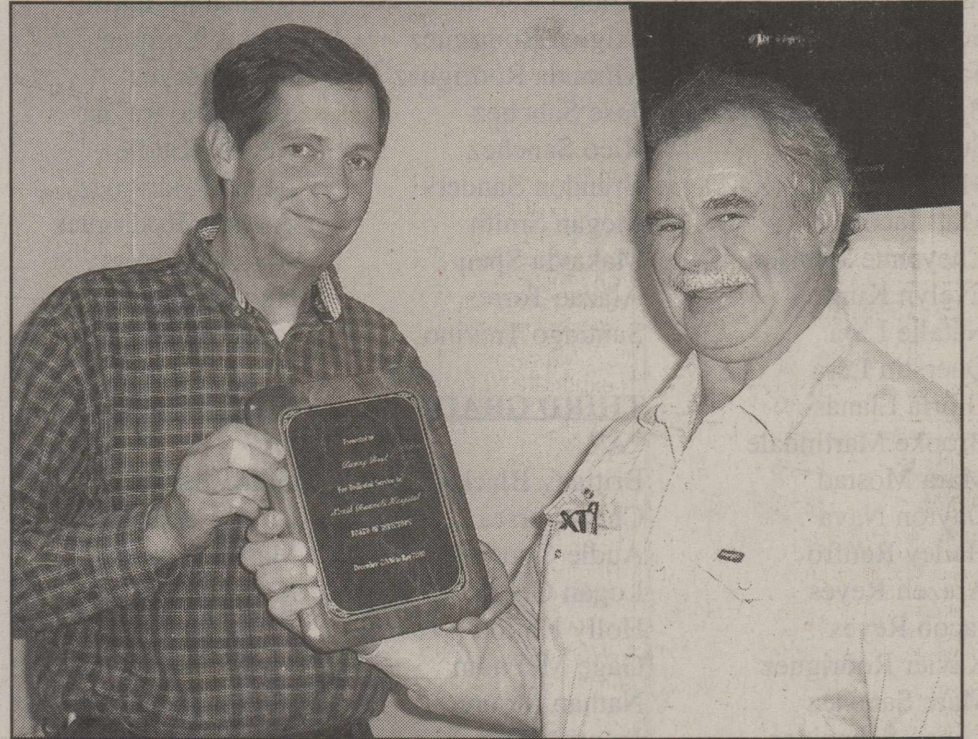

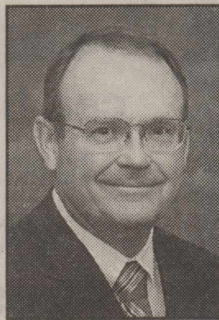

TEMPLE, Texas.- Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that USDA has selected four recipients in Texas to receive business development assistance to pursue marketing opportunities for agricultural commodities. Funding is made available through USDA Rural Development assistance under the Value-Added Producer Grant program, which was authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill.

"As part of the Obama administration's work to turn the economy around, USDA is acting as an important catalyst for business development and job creation in rural America," Vilsack said. "These grants will improve financial returns and help create jobs for agricultural producers, businesses and families across the Nation. USDA is investing in farmers, ranchers and cooperatives to strengthen the economic foundation of rural America."

"Investing in the ideas of rural Texans is a direct route to economic recovery of our rural communities," said Paco Valentin, USDA Rural Development Texas State

Director. "I congratulate these recipients on their innovative ideas and initiative in finding profitable value-added agricultural commodities."

Two Texas recipients will utilize the grants to investigate the viability of new value added commodities. Green Gate Farms, located outside Austin, will receive an \$87,500 grant to determine the profitability of blending chicken manure with the City's food scraps from apartments and condominiums to produce a high protein feed for pets and animals. The Waller County Biofuel Steering Committee will receive a \$25,000 grant to investigate biogas electrical generation from hybrid forage sorghum.

Two additional Texas recipients will receive grants to provide working capital to package and market their value-added commodities. J Berry Nursery, located in Van Zandt County, will receive a \$300,000 grant for their project with a hybrid hibiscus plant. Rangeland Restoration and Improvement, LP, located in Hays County, will receive a \$250,000 grant to process and market hay into compost and compost tea extract.

USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages more than 40 housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of 6,100 employees located in the nation's capital and 500 state and local offices. These programs are designed to improve the economic stability of rural communities, businesses, residents, farmers and ranchers and improve the quality of life in rural America.

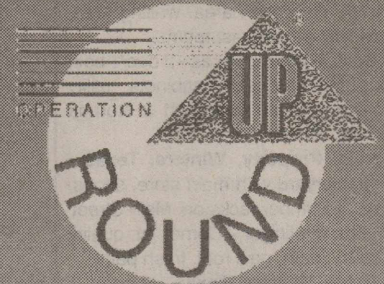
