

## 17-year NCO earns BCD

Technical Sergeant Hollis O. Hopwood of the 64th Supply Squadron was tried by courts-martial Aug. 23-25 in the the United States Courtroom in Reese's headquarters building. He was represented by both civilian and military defense counsel and chose to have his case heard by officer members. Sergeant Hopwood entered pleas of not guilty to charges of making false official statements and forgery. After reviewing all the evidence, the court returned findings of guilty to all charges.

The misconduct, which brought this non-commissioned officer to trial, began when he arrived at Reese in March 1987. Sergeant Hopwood falsely claimed to having a college degree which he had never earned. When those falsehoods went undetected for a time, Sergeant Hopwood also claimed to have started work on his master's degree at Texas Tech. This too was untrue.

In January of 1988 he masqueraded as his

brother in order to fraudulently purchase a 1988 Nissan Maxima from a local dealer. In the process, Sergeant Hopwood forged the signatures of both his brother and sister-in-law. Both relatives were subpoenaed to testify at the trial.

The prosecution of this case was due to investigative work by special agents of the AFOSI and the cooperation of local witnesses, civilian and military, who had come come in contact with the sergeant during the course of his misconduct.

The consequences of TSgt. Hollis Hopwood's criminal labors include a bad conduct discharge from the United States Air Force. When that punitive discharge takes effect a few months from now, he'll have to start a new life after 17 years in uniform. We can imagine the difficulty he'll face trying to explain his 'almost' successful Air Force career. The lesson we can carry from U.S. vs Sergeant Hopwood is clear: when it comes to matters of personal honor and integrity, 'almost' isn't nearly good enough.

# ATC members go for another record

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS) — Records are made to be broken, but the record Air Training Command people intend to break has nothing to do with sports. It's much more important than that — it has to do with life.

In 1983, ATC established a record low number of 13 fatalities. So far in fiscal year 1988, with about a month left to go, ATC has had 12 fatalities — 12 individuals lost, 12 separate tragedies.

"We mean to break that 1983 record low of 13," said Brig. Gen. Albert A. Gagliardi Jr., ATC inspector general, "but not for the sake of the record. We mean to do it for you. But the only way to accomplish that is for you to do it for you. We need you to stay alive. We need you on the job. Your family, friends, coworkers — they all need you."

So, what can you do? What are your responsibilities? General Gagliardi said, "The

first thing you can do is buckle up every time you get in your car; it's your responsibility to do that. Three of our troops didn't — and died.

"Your second responsibility is to not drive drunk. Drinking and driving will kill you. It's already killed three of our people this year.

But, it's not just your drinking and driving that can kill you — you can be killed by drunks. Four of the people we lost were killed by drunk drivers. You have to 'think defense' to survive."

The general said the final responsibility is, if riding a motorcycle, fasten the helmet down tight, don't speed, and don't ride drunk. "Our last fatality was a motorcyclist who broke all three of those rules. We don't want you to be the next one," he added.

"Yes, we need you, not just for the record. The record isn't all that important to us, but you are."

# Security Police building begins upgrading

If you've driven past the Security Police building recently, you've probably noticed some excavation taking place.

This work begins a \$538,000 improvement project to the existing facility which will approximately double its size.

moved into the new SP building.

Besides providing an enlarged armory and larger training and investigation rooms, new space will be available for weapons cleaning, mobility NCOs, NCOIC training and two orderly rooms.

Add to this space for quality control, administration, evidence storage—plus

more storage space—and you have a Security Police facility that will finally meet the squadron's needs.

This Army Corps of Engineers project is scheduled for completion in June 1989 and will include complete landscaping and an additional parking area west of 5th Street.

## **New Officer Evaluation System**

Just as I discussed last Friday during our quarterly officers' call, the new Officer Evaluation System is now in place and ready to go to work. I hope everyone shares my enthusiasm and support for this new system as I believe it will eliminate many problems associated with the previous one.

First, the new system has the ability to give direct feedback to the ratee from his/her supervisor. This feedback will occur in a private meeting and is designed to provide a realistic assessment of the officer's performance, without having any adverse repercussions. The feedback does not become part of the officer's record and cannot be shown to anyone else. I believe this will eliminate the need to say everyone 'walks on water.'

Second, and most important, raters will consider performance of *primary duties only*, and will record this information on an Officer Performance Report (OPR). Duties include any of the taskings assigned to you by your supervisor. They will not consider or evaluate the probable impact of PME, advance degrees or career broadening assignments.

The rater's task is to focus on performance and potential based on the performance. A common complaint with the old system was not being rated on performance of job duties, but rather extra tasks accomplished. This is no longer true. Job performance analysis will be based on excelling within your own specialty as will as the eagerness you display toward added responsibility. The Air Force recognizes that almost everyone does his or her job.

Another feature to reduce inflation is that each block on the new OPR is rated on a two block scale. Either someone "meets standards" or "does not meet standards."

Lastly, a promotion recommendation is only given when an officer is in the zone for promotion. This eliminates the pressure of feeling one has to compete for promotion every year during the OPR cycle. For the majority of officers, this means they will only compete for promotion one time. The promotion recommendation is broken down into three categories: "promote," "definitely promote," and "do not promote."

Percentages of "definitely promote" are controlled according to rank, but there is no requirement or quota to give any "do not promote" ratings. Also, the promotion rating is not retained with the officer's record following the promotion board, so each board is essentially a clean slate.

The simple fact that the Air Force has a high-quality force makes competition for promotion inevitable. I feel the new system does not attempt to reduce or eliminate this healthy competition, but rather ensures that all officers compete on the correct basis by measuring the proper qualities and attributes.

## Torchlight...a base-wide effort

TORCHLIGHT '88, the annual ATC flying and maintenance competition held at Randolph AFB, will run from Sept. 12-16 this year. The purpose of the competition is designed to test instructor pilot proficiency, maintenance capability, enhance esprit de corps, increase training efficiency and recognize the best pilots and maintainers within the command. It is my desire that this be a base-wide effort and that the team members we've selected be the best representatives of Reese AFR

We have selected 12 pilots and 14 maintainers to represent us at the competition. The pilots will be judged and scored on such events as exact arrival time, precision of the wing landing, a composite of formation, contact and instrument skills, and timing along a low level flying route.

The maintainers will be in competition for aircraft judging, timed tire change and timed engine change.

There will be an internal competition on Sept. 28 and 30 and I encourage everyone to come down and cheer our representatives on. I believe a warm-up in front of the home crowd will do much to relieve any anxiety the team may feel, as it is always more difficult to perform in front of those you know. ## Training Vietnamese pilots gets U.S. involved

KEESLER AFB, Miss. (ATCNS) — By 1961, the situation in Vietnam was getting too hot for President Kennedy.

After much debate within his cabinet, he elected to send a detachment of the 507th Tactical Control Group to South Vietnam to establish a radar warning station at Tan Son Nhut AB, near Saigon.

Air Force pilots and mechanics were not new to Vietnam. There had been Air Force presence in the country during the French Indo-China War, and a B-29 raid had been considered to help the defenders of Dien Bien Phu.

Like so many decisions involving Vietnam, the B-29 raid proposal became mired in politics and Dien Bien Phu fell before anything was done.

As the 507th TCG was setting up in Vietnam, Gen. Curtis LeMay, then Air Force chief of staff, established with President Kennedy's approval the 4400th Combat Crew Training Squadron. The squadron, an air commando unit specializing in counterinsurgency operations, became known as the Jungle Jims.

As 1961 wore on, the situation kept getting worse for South Vietnam. President Kennedy sent more units to Southeast Asia, including a squadron of C-123 defoliation planes and placed a brigadier general in charge.

By January 1962, the 4400th CCTS was deployed and operational. Four RF-101s had also arrived at Tan Son Nhut to fly reconnaissance missions over Vietnam and Laos.

To help the South Vietnamese upgrade their fighter capability, the U.S. sent 30 T-

28s. Air Force pilots started training the Jungle Jims things were not working out as Vietnamese pilots to fly them.

Dubbed Farm Gate, this operation was designed to teach Vietnamese pilots tactics most suited to the war in Vietnam. Night flying was stressed. Before long, U.S. pilots, flying SC-47s, were dropping flares to light targets for South Vietnamese Air Force strikes

Although still regarded as advisers, Air Force pilots got more and more involved in ground support missions and providing forward air controller work for the government's ground forces.

By January 1963, it was apparent the South Vietnamese Air Force was stretched too thin for the job it was trying to do. One squadron each of T-28s and B-26s, two RF-101s and RB-26s, all flown by Americans, were sent in for photo reconnaissance.

By April, all Air Force units were in place and operating. The T-28s out of Soc Trang were especially busy, providing air cover and ground support for South Vietnamese Army operations in the Mekong Delta.

Late in 1963, the Jungle Jims began operating under their true colors. They had been flying combat missions for some time, but always with a South Vietnamese student pilot in the back seat so they could refer to air strikes as training missions. Now, they were redesignated the 1st Air Commando Squadron.

Although the conflict in Vietnam kept growing, it was still the Americans' intention in 1964 to pull the Air Force out just as soon as the South Vietnamese Air Force could function on its own.

By April of that year, it was clear to the

Jungle Jims things were not working out as intended. Their effectiveness was hampered by losses to the North Vietnamese and the aging T-28s. A month later, U.S. advisers were ordered to stop flying combat missions and strictly limit themselves to training South Vietnamese Air Force pilots.

Everything changed Aug. 2, 1964, the day North Vietnamese torpedo boats attacked U.S. ships in the Gulf of Tonkin. In response, the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution was passed, and the U.S. was involved in a real shooting war.

# Ready for cooler days Labor Day weekend and challenges ahead

The 64th Flying Training Wing's jets and aircrast maintenance organization have come through the hot summer months in good shape. One of the most important measures I look at is the Mission Capable (MC) rate or the percentage of the aircraft which are flyable at any one time. Today, the wing's August MC average for T-37s is over 88 percent and the T-38 rate has reached 80

On the T-38 side, however, it has really been a long hard pull. Probably the greatest pressure has been on Aero Repair (AR). Those skilled AR mechanics have experienced a summer of 12-hour days and extended work weeks as they contended with major safety of flight inspections and preventive repairs generated by aircraft accidents at other bases. Major work on the canopy and flight controls (mixer assembly) kept the mechanics and technicians busy and the mission capable rate down. My hat is off the SMSgt. Michael Hall and Mr. Jimmy Chacon and to AR for their superb work.

Maintenance is gearing up for the ATC Torchlight competition. A team of strong contenders has been working under the lead-Lowery and MSgt. Jimmy Jones to bring

home the trophy for the wing. Four of our best flying T-37s and T-38s have been selected and are being prepared for competition. Significant efforts by our Structural Repair, Egress and Paint (corrosion control) shops and the Torchlight team who are molding those jets into award-winning shape. You will be proud of both the maintenance folks and the machines when they are publicly

The national budget reductions are impacting the status of Reese jets. Today, we have three T-37s grounded because proportioner pumps are not available and the lack of airconditioning packs has grounded three T-

We understand that the Air Force Air Logistics Centers have fewer dollars to work with—Kelly AFB primarily for us—which has caused them to slow down purchases and repair work. We can expect to be under this handicap for the upcoming months.

What I have been impressed with is the smart, aggressive way Maintenance and Supply have worked to minimize the impact on our pilot training mission. Robusting benchstocks, forward supply points, minimum levels, supply difficulty messages, exceptional repair programs, cannibalizing parts from grounded aircraft to keep good ones airborne—all are being done to ensure that we are ready for the 64th FTW aviators.

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



# Labor Day is our day

In 1882 P.J. Maguire of the Knights of Labor had an idea. He wanted a day set aside to honor the American workman. Through perseverance and hard work (appropriately), he succeeded, and in 1887 the Congress of the United States authorized the holiday which we know as Labor Day.

with parades and celebrations. Many today see it as just a three-day weekend. Most view it as a peculiarly civilian institution. But before we so casually dismiss it, let's take another look at labor and the military.

Labor Day should have particular significance for the military member. It is a paradox of military life that we work in order that our specialty — the successful application of violent force — not be employed. With rare exceptions, no one else practices so hard something its practitioners fervently hope will not be used.

For us in the military, it is an unusual labor. It knows no set hours — over a career, a military member can often expect to work extended hours. It has a fixed basis of reward - no matter how much a person works, the compensation remains

the same. By its very nature, it defines and limits the people it can employ. War, being strenuous as few pursuits are, must employ people who are capable, fit and, usually, young.

It is unforgiving labor. In war, the tolerance for error approaches zero. Wrong decisions are measured immediately in human lives; in the long term, in the fate of nations, perhaps of the world





tion, have always contributed gallantly to our defense.

Six Hispanics died among the Alamo's defenders. Almost 10,000 served with either the Union or the Confederacy. Several rode with the Rough Riders in the Spanish American War and in WWI, Pvt. Marcelino Serna was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross (DSC) after being wounded and capturing 24 Germans.

As many as 500,000 Hispanics served in WWII, with 53,000 from Puerto Rico alone. Twelve of these men were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the highest proportion of any ethnic group. One unit of Hispanics, the 141st Battalion of the Texas 36th infantry Division won three Medals of Honor, 31 DSC's, 12 Legion of Merits, 492 Silver Stars and 1,685 Bronze Stars.

In Korea, Hispanics won nine Medals of Honor, and the third highest ranking Air Force ace with 14.5 kills was Col. Manuel J. Fernandez, Jr.

In Vietnam, Hispanics were among the first to answer America's call. One of the first Americans captured while fighting the Viet Cong was SFC Issac Camacho in November 1963. After 20 months, he escaped and was awarded a battlefield commission, later winning a Silver Star and Bronze Star.

The first American pilot shot down was Lt. Everett Alvarez who was lost in the first Tonkin Gulf raid. He would serve eight and one-half years as a prisoner of the-North Vietnamese.

In Vietnam, 13 Hispanics were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, 10 posthumously. Again, the highest proportion of any ethnic group. From Texas, among the 3405 casualties, 771 Hispanics died in Vietnam or 22.6 percent of the total. This represents the highest percentage of any ethnic

A study done on five states: Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas shows that 19 percent of the casualties during the Vietnam War from these states were Hispanic, even though Hispanics represented less than 14 percent of the population of those

But Hispanics have not only served down in the ranks during our Nations' history, they have reached the highest levels of military command.

In the Civil War, Adm. David Farragut, the son of a Spaniard who fought in the American Revolution and the War of 1812, captured

Hispanics, since the beginning of our na- New Orleans, La. and Mobile, Ala, for the Union.

> Horacio Rivero, who graduated third in his Naval Academy class of 1931, became a four star admiral. When he retired in 1972 he was made Ambassador to Spain.

> Another Hispanic, Brig. Gen. Luis R. Esteves, the first Puerto Rican to graduate from West Point, was the first of his 1915 class to be promoted to general, ahead of his classmates, Eisenhower, Bradley, Van Fleet and

McMarney.

The Army's first four star Hispanic General was Richard E. Cavazos, a native of Kingsville, Texas and a graduate of Texas Tech, a school at which his brother is now president. General Cavazos served in Vietnam in 1967-68 and was III Corp Commander at Ft. Hood in 1980. During his career he won two DSC's, two Silver Stars, two Legion of Merits, five Bronze Stars, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Purple

Thirteen other Hispanics have reached the General or Flag ranks in the regular armed services, of whom at least five are Vietnam veterans. In addition, 19 other Hispanics have reached the general ranks in the reserves or the National Guard.



# New weapons trainer being tested at Lackland

LACKLAND AFB, Texas (ATCNS) — Instructors at the 3280th Technical Training Group's Combat Arms Training Division have begun learning how to operate a new advanced individual combat arms trainer. The new trainer will be used for teaching the students weapons operations.

The device, known as a Firearms
Training System, is under a sixmonth operational test and evaluation period.

"The system is a laser-aimed computer-based trainer which looks like a video arcade machine," said MSgt. Edward Scott, resident writer of the Combat Arms Training Development Branch. "The device is comparable to those used in the civilian community by several law enforcement agencies.

"The Air Force is looking to use the system to evaluate students' problems using firearms and aid in their training," the sergeant said.

"It will help save time training the students in the use of firearms and also help in reducing costs by saving on the use of ammunition and firing range time."

students fire at using a weapon linked to the computer. The computer then evaluates the students' performance by scanning the screen and reading the areas fired upon by the laser-emitting weapon.

"The simulator uses many important features of a real weapon such as noise and recoil," he said.

It can be used to train on a variety of weapons from the M-16 rifle to the 9mm pistol. The video disc can be changed to offer different targets and training situations.

"This system gives us the opportunity to show the basics of firearms use to students and then later upgrade it for more advanced training," Sergeant Scott said.

ing," Sergeant Scott said.
"Combat arms instructors are being trained on the use of the system with students scheduled to start using it soon during an operational testing of the system," he added.

The system is under a six-month lease to the Air Force to evaluate its effectiveness in training combat arms, law enforcement and security police students.

ATC officials explained this new training method will not take the place of live-fire training. It is designed to supplement remedial and refresher weapons training.

# Transportation to visit ill provided for family members

AIR FORCE MILITARY PER-SONNEL CENTER, Randolphi AFB, Texas (AFNS) — Family members of a seriously ill activeduty Air Force person may now be provided round-trip transportation from their residence to visit the member in a medical facility in the continental United States or overseas.

A similar DOD program previously was available to family members that provided transportation from ports of debarkation to overseas, but not within CONUS.

The 100th Congress passed legislation allowing each branch of the service to pay for the travel both overseas and CONUS. The Joint Service Travel Regulation has since been changed to include the legislation.

Under the new DOD program, up sult base per to two family members may travel affairs unit.

within or outside the CONUS area to the hospital where the member is hospitalized. "Family member" is defined as the individual's spouse, spouse, children, brothers and sisters, and parents.

Travel must be recommended by the attending physician and approved by the hospital commander. The travel must be of value from a medical standpoint to aid in the recovery of the individual.

This change allows the Air Force to pay for travel to or from the next of kin's residence, but does not include payment for incidental expenses such as food and lodging. Additionally, it does not allow for funded travel for family members of dependents who may be seriously ill or injured.

## **Air Force News Briefs**

## Drug free

KELLY AFB, Texas (AFNS) — Congress declared Oct. 24-30 Drug Free America Week "to get the message across that illegal drug use will not be tolerated." Citing public opinion polls and surveys that report 23 million Americans age 12 and over currently use illicit drugs, the resolution said Americans perceive drug and alcohol use as serious threats. However, those surveyed credit awareness efforts for the lowest marijuana use in 11 years and for increasing the number of high school seniors who associate great risk with trying cocaine once or twice.

#### Strength figures

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Air Force strength declined in July by 1,444. At the end of July there were 578,978 people on board, down 27,859 from the same time last year. Army strength increased by 3,842 people, Navy gained 5,450 and the Marine Corps added 679.

#### **Energy Month**

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Energy Secretary John S. Herrington and the Department of Energy have designated October as Energy Awareness Month.

The 1988 theme is "Energy makes America work."

The observance marks the eighth annual National Energy Awareness Campaign.

## DDP disenrollment

AIR FORCE MILITARY PERSONNEL CENTER, RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — The Air Force recently established a three-part change to its policy regarding enrollment or disenrollment from the Dependent Dental Program.

The change was made to provide coverage for those in a transient status.

Coverage isn't effective until the first day of the month following that month in which the member initiates enrollment.

Those transferring between United States, Puerto Rican and Virgin Island bases may disenroll within 90 days of arrival at their new duty station if they haven't used the DDP.

Those moving from a base in the United States, Puerto Rico or Virgin Islands to overseas may disenroll while outprocessing at the Continental U.S. base, or after inprocessing at the overseas base.

If the disenrollment is at the overseas base, no retroactive disenrollment back to the outprocessing date is allowed.

Individuals transferring from an overseas base to United States, Puerto Rican or Virgin Islands locations may disenroll either at outprocessing at the overseas site, or within 90 days of the date of arrival from overseas.

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

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

## satety vest for pilots

- Researchers are designing a breathing system to protect jet fighter pilots from G-force induced blackouts.

Researchers with the Human Systems Division here say a new system they call Combat Edge could be ready for Tactical Air Command fighter pilots in two years.

The new system would require pilots to wear a vest over the standard flight suit.

The vest and the G-suit would plug into a breathing regulator that triggers pressurized breathing assistance when certain G-loads are reached. That assistance would combat gravity-induced loss of consciousness that occurs when G-

HSD will test Combat Edge in the centrifuge, altitude chamber and at various altitude pressures.



# Pregnancy fitness and questions

Is it safe to exercise during pregnancy?

Check with your obstetrician first. Most doctors recommend mild to moderate physical activity for their pregnant patients.

Generally most women can continue their regular exercise regimen into their pregnan-

to exercise because of complication. Keep in touch with your doctor throughout your pregnancy and ask his or her advice about your exercise program.

Most doctors advise pregnant women to avoid activities that involve jumping, twisting and quick direction changes. Ligaments soften during pregnancy and joints are more easily injured. High impact aerobics may be too stressful. If you've been weight training and know how to avoid joint injury by lifting correctly you may continue, as long as you don't strain. Never hold your breath. Racquet sports may be continued with care.

Always keep your doctor informed of what exercise activity you plan to participate in. If However, in some cases it is not advisable you are afraid something is wrong or if you exercise plans.

experience bleeding or pain, you should stop exercising immediately and see your doctor.

My doctor says I can continue my exercise class. Is there anything I shouldn't do?

Many pregnant women can continue with exercise classes as long as they monitor their heart rates and adjust their pace. Your center of gravity changes with pregnancy and it's easier to lose your balance. Exercises that require lying on your back should be avoided after the fourth month since this interferes with circulation.
