New panel tested for Northrop

A Northrop Air Division sponsored program to test new composite materials that will possibly be used on the ATF-23 future fighter aircraft being designed by Northrop is being tested on Reese T-38s for the next two and one-half years.

The materials, Thermoplastic and Bismaliemide, are forms of a composite material also used on the F-15 and F-16 aircraft, which were formed into six different panels that are being tested on 18 of Reese's jets. Williams AFB, Ariz. and Nellis AFB, Nev. are also test units for the panels that are being tested on T-38s and F-5s.


On July 18, a team from Northrop Air Division began installing the panels, and finished installing the last panels on the 18 test planes July 28. "We are not upgrading our aircraft, we are just testing because training jets are the most continually used in the Air Force, and more hours can be logged in a shorter amount of time," said TSgt. Kenneth Brown, assistant flight chief, 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron Eagle Flight. Sergeant Brown served as a liasion and inspector during the installation of the panels by the Northrop team.

The team will do periodic inspections on the panels. They will check stress areas, contaminant effects, such as fuel, oil and hydraulic fluid, and how durable they are by testing handling by crew chiefs and specialists.

"The panels are about half the wieght of the original metal panels, and cost is anticipated to be less," said Sergeant Brown. "The main thing is that the material can take more stress fatigue than the metal panels."

"The new panels are ours until the test is over, then they will be replaced with the original panels, and the composite panels will be taken back to Northrop for further evaluation," he said.

Unsafe summer habits can lead to tragedy

Lately we've been hearing a great deal about mission enhancement and safety, especially during the summer months.

Usually we associate mission enhancement with wearing seatbelts and driving carefully, safely participating in summertime sporting and recreational activities and using caution when out in the sun, whether working or just having a good time.

But summer health and safety go way beyond these areas. Unfortunately a couple at another base learned this valuable lesson at the expense of their two-year-old daughter.

The girl was the daughter of two dining hall workers at the base and was found unconscious in her parents' parked car last Thursday evening outside the dining hall. Security police were called to the scene, but efforts to revive her were unsuccessful. She was later

pronounced dead at the emergency room.

Tragedies like this are hard to believe. Unfortunately, tragedies like this are not too uncommon. Sometimes parents leave children in cars assuming they will "be back in just a minute." But leaving a child unattended in a car for any length of time is not a good idea, even if the temperature outside isn't very high. Leave children, or even pets at home or take them with you.

To reiterate Reese's policy on children being left in a car, Wing Supplement of AFR 125-14 states that if a child is left unattended in a car, the security police may make a citing on the parents, question them and refer them to the Mental Health

The best way to avoid encounters with the security police or tragedies like the one stated above is to be extremely safety conscious during these hot summer months, not just for yourself, but for your entire family.

Revised SOS program underway

MAXWELL AFB, Ala. (AFNS) — A revised Squadron Officer School non-resident program began in mid-July.


Course content still covers officership, staff communications, leadership and force employment, but has been updated. Some material intended for first lieutenants was removed because the course is now targeted at captains

Half of the revised course consists of parts A and B, which are mailed together and must be completed within a year of enrollment. Parts C and D will be mailed together and must be completed within one year after completing the first two parts.

Although no extensions will be granted for completion of any part of the course, students who fail two tests in the same area will be put on six-month hold and given an opportunity to retake the tests. The hold does not count against the required one-year completion date. The complete course, including holds, must be finished within three years.

Students currently enrolled in the old program are not affected.



Third stage rocket motor tested



ARNOLD AFB, Tenn. (AFNS) — Engineers at the Arnold Development Center here have successfully completed the third test firing of a production Peacekeeper missile third-stage rocket motor.

The test series ensures proper ballistic performance and structural integrity of the rocket motors. Tested motors are randomly picked from the assembly line.

The motor was the 17th third-stage engine to be tested during development, flight proof and qualification test programs.

The most recent firing was conducted in the J-5 test cell at a simulated altitude of 85,000 feet. Motor burn time was approximately 60 seconds. More than 100 channels of instrumentation were used to gather data.

Third-stage motors develop 75,000 pounds of thrust. Manufactured by Hercules Inc. in Magna, Utah, Peacekeeper second- and fourth-stage motors also are tested here. The first-stage motor is tested in Utah.

New Technology Wave hits Air Training Command

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS) — The wave of the future has arrived and Air Training Command is riding the crest in a bold program designed to put the latest research and technology into its classrooms.

The Training Technology Applications Program (TTAP) is cutting a smooth wake through the turbulent waters of high tech computer applications by evaluating and proving computer based instruction and training methods at ATC bases across the country.

This evolution in training has the potential to save both time and money, said Maj. Tim

Whitacre, technology application manager in ATC's Plans and Requirements Directorate. "One of TTAP's missions is to identify training technology innovations from government, business and education. Once we evaluate these innovations, we assist in transferring the successful efforts to operational status.

"While other services have jumped on the CBI bandwagon thinking it will solve all their training problems, TTAP as a joint Air Staff and ATC effort is designed to take a hard and thorough look at the latest products in this remarkable new field," explained the major.

"Using computers instead of instructors in every center or base would not be cost effective," he said. "It wouldn't make any sense to use computers or an interactive video disc if a chalkboard will do. We already have chalkboards, why go out and buy computers if it's not required?"

From the developer viewpoint, the computer, with its color, motion and interactive touch screens, opens the door for many opportunities to enhance instructional programs. The key is deciding which applications will improve the quality of the course, he noted.

One of the problems normally encountered is deciding which courses to convert to CBI or IVD. Does it make more sense to use interactive videos or just a textbook?

According to Major Whitacre, it depends on the application. "Obviously you don't want to just type the workbook into a computer.

Then you have students sitting in front of the screen for eight hours a day and the computer just serves as a page turner — a very expensive page turner!

"What we want to do is try and incorporate different techniques to maintain the student's motivation so they can continue to learn faster and still improve overall retention of learned material."

To accomplish this, ATC has established technology application officers at each training center to act as a focal point for that base's particular mission.

Keesler AFB, Miss., for example, is testing a prototype IVD to train radar maintenance students.

According to Hal Clark, 3300th Technical Training Wing technology application officer, the disc simulates the removal of major and minor components, switch manipulation, test equipment hookups and other mainte-

nance actions. Trainees are able to perform all of the required maintenance tasks through the use of simulation.

"They have the luxury of accomplishing each task in a demonstration, practice or test mode and repeating each task until they achieve mastery."

At Chanute AFB, Ill., TAO Lylburn Greer announced they have plans for a computer system that will simulate animated weather phenomena.

Greer explained they're looking into the feasibility of providing a wider range of observable weather phenomena by using a simulator or other media devices.

Students attending the weather specialist course have only a seven day period of weather observation, Greer said. This limits student practice to observe weather conditions in the local area to the time of year they attend the course.

"One of the main reasons TTAP was established is to allow each base to apply the technology in a prototype basis before a lot of money is invested," said Major Whitacre. "A kind of 'fly before you buy' deal. By doing this we can save resources by testing these concepts out before full scale development and implementation."

Major Whitacre explained that TTAP's main goal is to ensure training innovations are well planned and used to satisfy a specific training requirement.

"The use of technology for the sake of using technology is not an acceptable approach. TTAP accomplishes a front-end analysis prior to any application of technology to determine specific training requirements. Then we choose the best technology to use to satisfy that specific project goal."

10-million lost VA records found

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Recent discovery of partial military treatment records by the National Archives and Records Administration may let Army and Army Air Corps veterans of World War II and the Korean War file for Veterans Administration disability compensation payments.

To speed these claims, the Veterans Administration is expediting a massive cross-checking of files to determine cases than can be reopened.

Using the new records, the VA hopes to assist many veterans whose claims previously were denied because no record was available to confirm medical disabilities that occurred during military service.

Veterans and survivors who are unsure whether their disability compensation claims

are affected should contact the nearest VA regional office. A toll-free number of the nearest VA regional office is listed in the federal government section of telephone directories.

The National Archives and Records Administration on June 15 advised the VA that it is obtaining computer tapes of about 10 million Army medical treatment records that partially fill a gap created when a 1973 fire destroyed millions of military files at a federal record center in St. Louis.

The newly found records cover the years from 1942 to 1945 and from 1950 to 1954.

For some veterans whose claims for disability compensation were denied since the fire, the VA may now be able to establish (continued on page 9)

Commander's Column Solving the mysteries of contracting

When many of you read the title of this article, you probably thought, "Why should I care about contracts?" Read on, and I'll tell you why.

You probably think of the base contracting office in terms of major construction projects and large service contracts such as grounds maintenance, transportation, and the dining hall. However, the base contracting office also processed hundreds of smaller contractual actions each week to fill purchase requests by people just like you.

Every time the Air Force buys goods or services from a civilian vendor, we have entered into a contract. For example, you call a repairman from downtown to fix a typewriter. We have just entered into a contract by agreeing to pay for that service. The same downtown yourself to get materials or supplies in order to save time. Unless you want to pay the bill out of your own pocket, I recommend you call contracting first.

The law says that only a properly trained and authorized contracting officer can commit the Air Force to pay for the goods and services you may need to do your job. We recently received a letter from the vice commander of ATC emphasizing the fact that everyone needs to understand this contract-

If you don't process your purchase request through the base contracting office, you may be subject to disciplinary action and be personally liable for payment. If you have never worked with the contracting office, you may think it's easier to do without an item rather than to do the necessary paperwork. Not true. The contracting office exists to help you get

contractual commitment exists if you go what you need when you need it - not to prevent you from buying things.

If you need something in a hurry, let us know. We have a system to satisfy your urgent needs. If it's after duty hours or on a weekend, contact the Command Post. We have contracting personnel on call to work emergency needs at any time.

When possible, please plan ahead, and try to give us a week or so to process your order. With many purchases we need time to shop around and find the best price. If we need to go outside the local area to get your item, or to find a better price, shipping time and expense must be considered. Federal Express sometimes costs more than the goods themselves. Limiting emergency buys to mission critical items saves both organizational funds as well as our tax dollars. If you'll work with the folks in contracting, they'll help you get the most for your money.

Motor vehicle accidents are a life and

This week marks the beginning of the last third of our "101 Critical Days." Although we place extra emphasis on hazards associated with summer-time activities during this period, it is still important to remember that POV accidents remain the number one cause of injuries throughout the year.

Every week, hundreds of people in this country are killed in motor vehicle accidents. In Lubbock, we average 125-150 accidents each week. Nationwide, almost 10,000 people are injured on our streets and high-

ways every day. Clearly, human tragedy resulting from motor vehicle accidents is a major problem in the United States.

Do you know that in the next ten years of normal driving, it's almost a certainty that YOU will be involved in a motor vehicle accident serious enough to injure or even kill you? You're taking a tremendous risk every time-you get into an automobile - unless you're taking action to protect yourself.

Right now, the simplest and most effective protection against possible injury or death in motor vehicle accidents is a fastened safety belt. Most automobiles on the road today are equipped with safety belts, but too few

people are performing the simple act of fastening those belts. The result is that far too many people are being injured or killed need-

This problem is serious. It's a real life and death issue, and no one can escape facing the problem because accidents don't always happen to "somebody else."

Following are two examples that happened to Reese people just last week!

The first mishap occurred at 10:30 Monday morning. The individual was traveling south and stopped at an intersection.

After a truck cleared the intersection, the individual entered the intersection and a

second truck smashed into his right front fender.

The second mishap occurred at 7:05 Wednesday morning. The driver was in the right hand lane of a light controlled intersection. His left side vision was blocked by a garbage

When the light turned green, he noted one car ran the red light. After that car cleared the intersection, the driver pulled out and was struck by another vehicle that ran the red

If it wasn't for the use of seat belts, both individuals would have suffered serious injuries. So take that extra second and buckle up. It's for your own protection.

Dental Program changes

The following is a policy change pertaining to the enrollment/disenrollment from the Delta Dental Program (DDP) upon a PCS move:

— CONUS to CONUS PCS individuals may disenroll within 90 days of arrival at their new duty station providing they have not used the DDP.

— CONUS to Overseas PCS individuals may disenroll while out processing at the CONUS base, or after inprocessing at the overseas base. Outprocessing time is the time one is relieved of duty prior to the final outprocessing appointment. If the disenrollment is at the overseas base, no retroactive disenrollment back to the outprocessing date is allowed.

— Overseas to CONUS PCS individuals can enroll either while outprocessing at the overseas site, or within 90 days of the date of arrival on station at the CONUS site. Delta Dental





Software theft not advisable

Are you thinking about taking a copy of the software you use on your office computer home with you? You might want to read this article first.

Recently, I received a message that told the story of an Air Force individual who did just that. Thisindividual was convicted for "theft of a copy of government software (Peachtext)."The individual lost all stripes, received a bad conduct discharge, 75 days in jail, and a \$100 fine.

The software originally cost the government \$50 and is used by the Air Force only on Z-100s. These computers are considered obsolete by their manufacturer, Zenith Data Systems. If the Air Force punished an individual this severely for a cheap software package for an obsolete computer, think of how they would treat the misuse/abuse of current standard computers. You might want to ask yourself if the price of that software you were going to take is worth your career and some time in jail.

Moving soon? Get help from TMO

Are you moving soon? If so, prior coordination with the Traffic Management Office (TMO) and good preparation could make this the best move you have ever expe-

Upon notification of a pending reassignment (PCS orders) you should go by TMO in Bldg. 920. At this time you will need to present them with seven copies of your orders for each shipment and they will schedule you for an appointment for your complete counseling.

There are some things that you should do prior to this counseling. The first should be to discard any unwanted items such as old clothes, broken toys and the like.

Next, a preferred pick up date should be given some thought. These are usually scheduled for at least five working days after your appointment. We encourage you to bring your spouse to your appointment, but due to limited space, we suggest an alternative for children.

With these preparatory steps out of the way, you are now ready for your counseling. The counselor will cover pick-up time and dates, who your carrier will be, what to expect from them, delivery and storage information and claim procedures in the event you should incur any loss or damage. On moving day, you should know just what to expect.

Additional nine months adds system

OFFUTT AFB, Neb. (AFNS) — Air Force's 60th and last KC-10 tanker will stay on the assembly line an additional nine months to install a new refueling system that will let it transfer fuel to three aircraft at once.

The three-engined jet will test the probe and drogue refueling system. It will be delivered to the Strategic Air Command in April.

Jack Patton, KC-10A program monitor, said the system will place pods on each wing and is the same one used by the Navy and Marine

"We currently plan to modify 20 of our KC-10s to use the wing pods.

Work will start in the summer of relieve Military Airlift Command expected to be in use by fiscal year miles and is itself air refuelable. 1989," the chief said.

The new system will not require additional boom operators on each

"To operate the wing pods, fuel controls will be placed on the flight engineer's panel and the pod controls will be the boom operator's responsibility," the chief explained.

Video equipment installed in the boom operator's compartment will let him see the wing pods. "The refueling procedure won't be that much different," Chief Patton said.

The probe and drogue system is one of two major modifications planned for the KC-10, the second being addition of an on-board cargo

The chief said the loader would



When used as a airlifter, the KC-10 can carry up to 75 people and 170,000 pounds of cargo with a range of 4,400 miles.
