JUDGE COCKRELL DIES AT ABILENE

Abilene, Texas, Mar. 18.—Col. J. V. Cockrell, 80 years old, a member of Gen. J. O. Shelby's Brigade, Confederate States Army, died at his home here this afternoon after a lingering illness of more than five years' duration. Col. Cockrell had been confined to his room on account of wounds received in battle and partial paralysis.

Col. Cockrell was born in Johnson county, Missouri, received his education at Chappel Hill and crossed the plains to California in 1853. He fought in the battle of Lone Jack, Mo., with Col. Foster of the Federal forces, and with Shelby covered Gen. Price's retreat from the state. He was district Judge of the Texas Panhandle, a member of Congress for three terms from the Texas Jumbo district. He was a brother of former United States Senator Francis M. Cockrell of Missouri.

He is survived by his wife and the following children: Miss Ella Cockrell, Mrs. G. B. Triplett and Fred Cockrell of Abilene and Judge Joseph E. Cockrell of Dallas. Funeral arrangements had not been completed tonight.

Judge Cockrell was the first judge of the 39th district. He held the first court in Haskell, in 1885. He did more than any man to establish law and order. All west Texas was overrun with cow thieves, outlaws and murderers in those days, and it was he who put the law in force and sent the outlaws to the penitentiary or ran them out of the country. He and the district attorney, W. B. Houston, now deceased, both carried repeating rifles with them, and many threats were made against them, but neither ever wavered nor faltered. All the old settlers held Judge Cockrell in the highest esteem, and honored him for his worth as a man and Judge. His charges to the grand juries inspired confidence in the honest citizen, and terror to the outlaw and as much to do with the moral progress as any other force. The bar of the district was composed of young men, and he was always like a father to the young lawyer, and many of them loved him with deep affection.

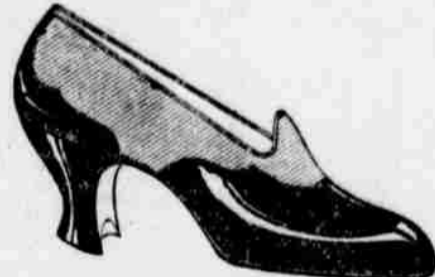

THE SMALL POX SITUATION IN HASKELL

The City Council met last week and passed an ordinance making it a hundred dollar fine for anyone to appear on the streets with the small pox.

It occurs to us that this is the way to handle the situation. If such an ordinance had been in force, there would have been but few cases. This fine business will beat quarantine. The calaboose is the very place for anyone walking around with the disease, and the fines will help to pay the expenses of his keep. Quarantine can be avoided and people exposed and the county bankrupted under the old system. We believe the county judge, the county commissioners and the city council have acted conscientious in the small pox matter, and have tried to do what they thought best. If they made any mistake, it was one of judgment only. Any way there are only a few cases and

they are getting fewer every day.

If the people will help enforce the new ordinance and not be so critical, we will soon stamp out the disease. We say this because we have heard all kinds of unreasonable criticisms of the new ordinance. Some think the ordinance void because they never heard of it before; others think the health officer should legislate for the council and make the laws on health; other great constitutional lawyers who have not been yet engaged in the practice, (and the streets are full of them) think the ordinance is unconstitutional. We look for some fellow to take the small pox and get in jail and spend all he has to make a test case. If some smart fellow does this he will at least have to hire a lawyer to get him out of jail, and will have to give bond before he can get out, and before all of them can get loose, they will be well of the disease, so it is a good scheme anyway.

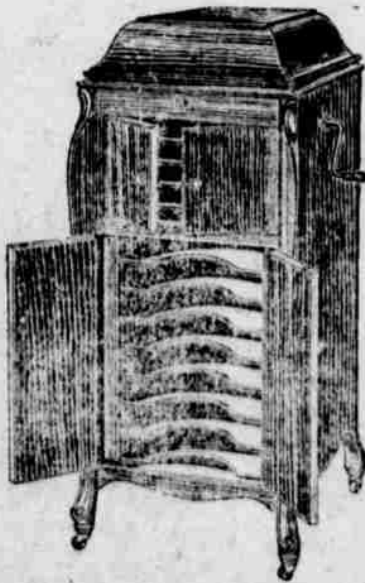

An Ordinance to Prevent the Spreading of Small Pox

As It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Haskell:

Art. 1.

It shall be unlawful for any person who has small pox to knowingly or wilfully enter into any public place, street, alley or any private residence, other than his own, in the City of Haskell, Texas.

Art. 2.

It shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully enter into any public place, street, alley or any private residence in the city of Haskell, who has knowingly entered into any room or place containing a person or persons having small pox, without a thorough disinfectant of his person and clothing.

Art. 3.

It shall be unlawful for any person, after having small pox to leave his place or residence without first obtaining a health certificate from the City Health Officer.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars.

The rule calling for a second and third reading of an ordinance is hereby suspended and waived and this ordinance shall be of force and effect from and after its passage. Passed March 19th, A. D. 1915.
