Texas Wins Oil Bowl, 15-0

And 'There Goes Charley'

By Bill Comedy With two exceptions, Haskell's Super Chief, Charles Franklin, stole the show Friday night in the 34th Annual Oil Bowl Football Classic...

Before a crowd of some 20,000 spectators, Franklin led the Texas All-Stars to a 15-0 win over the Oklahoma All-Stars. Franklin is the only AA player in the history of the Oil Bowl to receive the sportswriters vote as outstanding defensive player of the game...

The game began as most people had predicted—in a tight defensive title. The Texas All Stars moved to within the Oklahoma 30 yard line four times during the first half, but failed to score because of fumbles or forced fourth-down punts.

Nearing the end of the half, Greenville's Mike Thomas romped 33 yards to brighten the hearts of all Texas fans. The kick was good and Bill Miller of Southwest Texas State and Grant Teaff of San Angelo State, coaches of the Texas team, were enjoying a 7-0 lead. As the half ended, Oklahoma scored a touchdown that was called back because of an off-side penalty.

The second half quickly exploded when Franklin intercepted a Clyde Crutchmer pass and ran it back 45 yards for Texas' second score and Haskell's first. The kick failed. The scoring was finalized when Mickey Macaluso of Austin dropped Joe Daniels in the Oklahoma end zone for a safety.

The defenses of both states did a superb job, allowing only 308 yards of total offense. The Oil Bowl was another stepping-stone for the fleet-footed Franklin, who advances to San Angelo State College this fall to continue his football career. For the Haskell fans who ventured to Wichita Falls Friday, this was the first in a long line of successive wins we hope to witness this year.

Charles Chapman Lions Speaker Tuesday Noon

Charles Chapman, who is associated with the law firm of Adkins and Chapman, spoke to members and guests at the Tuesday noon day luncheon meeting of Lions at Felker's Restaurant dining room. Dr. Frank Cadenhead was program chairman for the day and introduced the speaker.

Chapman explained the 'Jury Wheel' system to select venire for both district and county court juries.

"The new law sets out that the sheriff, district clerk, county clerk and tax collector shall get together sometime each year between August 1 and 15 and prepare the wheel. In this wheel, which will be somewhat like those used for community drawings, will be placed the names of the qualified voters in the county," Chapman said. "The wheel is to be turned so that the cards are thoroughly mixed before the venire is selected. After the cards are selected, the jury list is prepared and the prospective jurors are notified as in the past," the speaker said.

Chapman pointed out that those who are exempt from serving on juries have been greatly reduced by the law. Only those persons over 65 years of age and women who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of 10 are now exempt.

For each additional family member, add: \$480 per year to the income level. Eligibility determinations are made on a family basis, that is, all the children attending schools under the jurisdiction of the same school food authority receive the same benefits, a free lunch or a reduced price lunch, not some a free lunch and some a reduced price lunch.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available from the Principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine eligibility based on the income and number of persons in the family and any other circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. Information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the school principal will review applications for eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. H. T. Wilkinson, whose address is: Box 666, Haskell, Texas, has been designated as the hearing officer. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

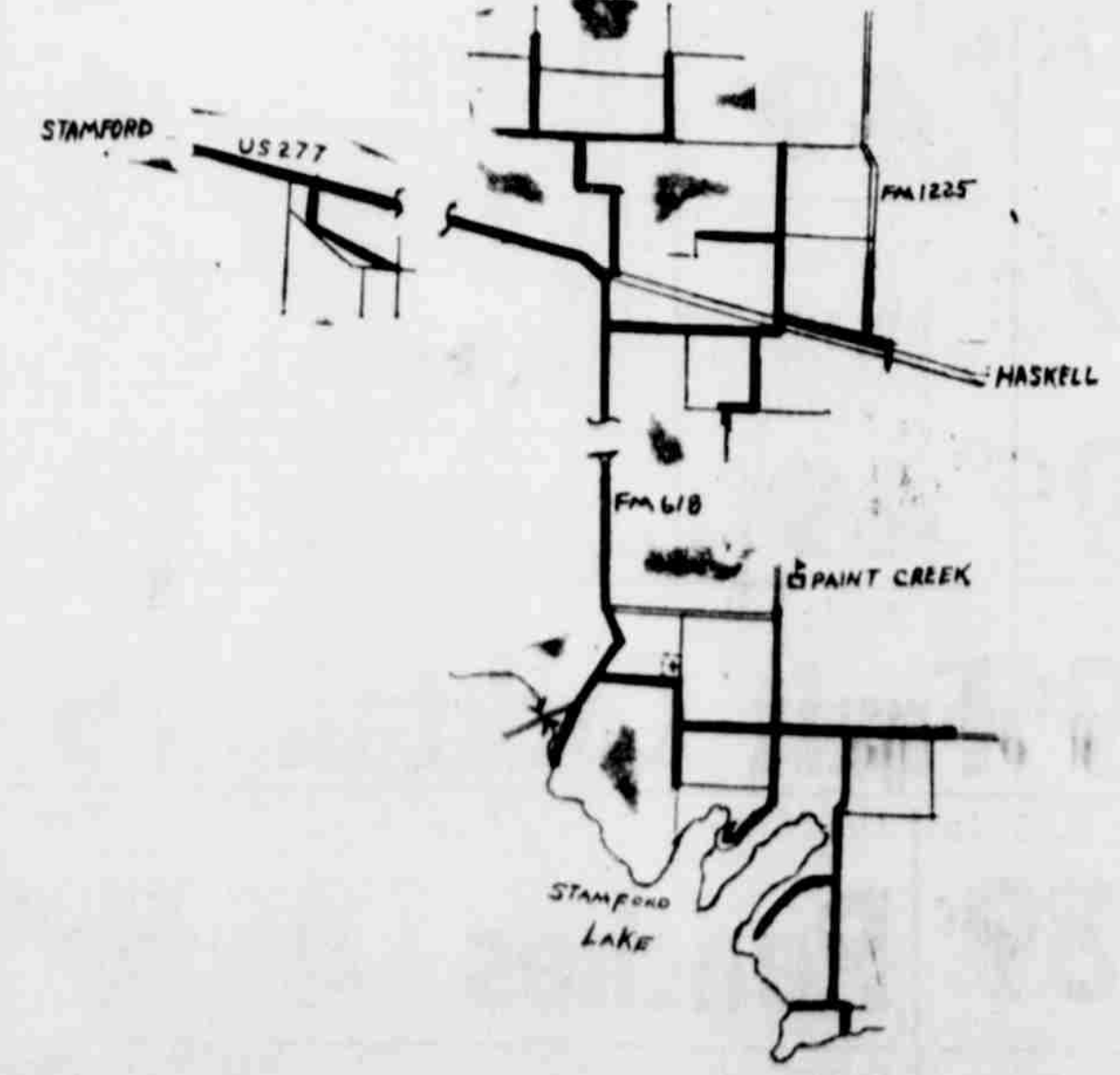
The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against a student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

Free 1972 Automobile License Plates To Be Provided Some Disabled Vets

Details of a new program which will provide free 1972 automobile license plates to some disabled veterans were revealed by the Texas Highway Department.

The program was set up by an act of the 62nd Legislature. To qualify, an applicant must:

- Be a Texas resident;
- Be a veteran of the armed forces of the United States;
- Have a disability rating of 70 per cent or more;
- Be drawing compensation from the federal government as the result of service-connected disability.

A qualified veteran is entitled to register one passenger car or light commercial vehicle with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less for his own use without paying the prescribed registration fee. There is a statutory fee of \$1 which must accompany each application.

Specially designed license plates will be issued with the letters "DV" appearing as either a prefix or suffix to the license number. The words "Disabled Vet" also will appear on the plates.

Vehicles with Disabled Vet plates will be exempt from paying parking fees charged by any governmental authority other than the federal government.

This includes parking meters. The license plates will not be available until the beginning of the 1972 registration year. The law provides that the disabled veteran must make application by October 1 preceding the registration year for which the plates are requested.

All Disabled Vet plates will be issued directly from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin. As a prerequisite, the veteran's disability rating must be verified by the Veteran's Administration or the branch of the armed forces from which he draws his disability compensation.

Also, the Texas title to the vehicle must be issued in the name of the veteran.

Application forms and instructions may be secured from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Avenue, Austin, Texas 78703.

The forms also will be available from Motor Vehicle Division district offices in Houston, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Port Arthur, El Paso, Fort Worth, Dallas, Lubbock, Amarillo and Longview, as well as county tax offices; county veteran service officers; American Legion headquarters in Austin and Veterans of Foreign Wars headquarters in Austin.

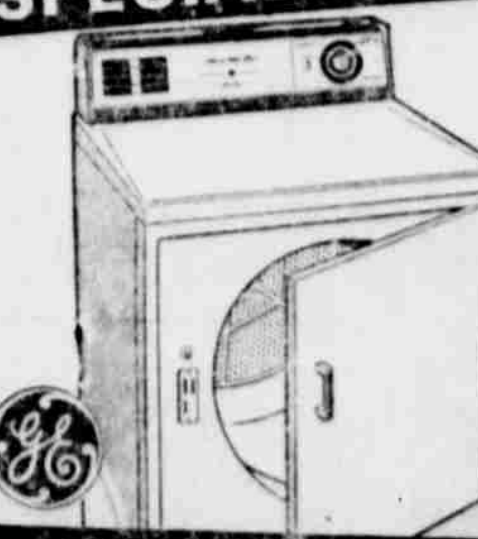

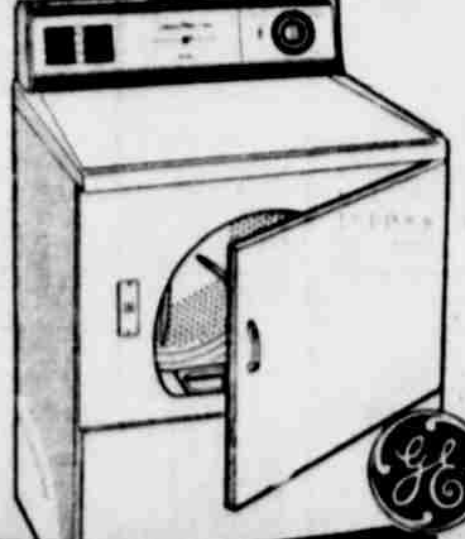

Constructing Terraces In 1935 Was Slow Process In Comparison To 1971



Constructing terraces in 1935 was a slow process, using teams and a single-bottom moldboard plow. It took two men, two mules and two oxen 85 to 100 hours to build one mile of standard contour terraces at a cost of \$6.00 per day. Only a small ridge of approximately 12 square feet per running foot was constructed. This

small terrace ridge was sufficient to control erosion as both farmer and team could work on the steeper side slopes of the small terrace ridge. Often the ridge was not planted to crops. The conservation objective in 1935 was erosion control—stopping gullies from forming in the field.



Constructing terraces in 1971 is a fast, efficient process, using 9 to 11 cubic yard carry-all scrapers powered with 180 to 200 horsepower diesel engines. One operator and this machine constructs approximately 1400 feet per day of operation, including ridge construction, cutting and filling within the terrace interval, at a cost of \$175.00 per day. The modern parallel terrace is a ridge of approximately 18 square feet per linear foot, broad-based so the farm operator can farm the ridge with today's big tractors and equipment.

According to Willie W. Buerger of Haskell, these returns far offset the cost, making parallel terraces highly profitable.


Comprehensive Research Project Is Revealed By Industrial Commission

Plans for a comprehensive research project to discover why some Texas rural areas have begun a population upsurge while many more continue a 30-year loss have been announced by the Texas Industrial Commission. "We already know that factors like new lakes or resort areas have affected several areas," he said. "But a thorough study can detect more subtle qualities which make for healthy population growth." Current population trends are deleting the state's rural areas and concentrating people into huge metropolitan complexes, Harwell said. "Unless preventative action is taken, Texas could develop vast areas of vacant rural land and overpopulated, unmanageable cities," he said. "This project marks the start of that action."

CONSERVATION VIEW POINTS
J. C. YEARY, JR.
District Conservationist



In the early 1930's the pyramid of mounting soil erosion, floods and land damage was topped by monstrous dust storms, sweeping soil from the Plains over large areas of the country. Coupled with the depression, thousands of farm families were faced with poverty and forced to move. By the middle 1930's, the time for decision grew near. Conservation leaders studied the wind-erosion-control districts of Texas and the grazing districts of Montana. They studied the Miami and Muskingum Conservancy Districts of Ohio. They analyzed the experience of the Soil Conservation Service with its early erosion-control projects and the Civilian Conservation Corps camp areas. Everywhere it was apparent that really effective soil conservation work was done faster and better when the farmers themselves took a large and active part in the job. Where Government men did the job, the farmers didn't understand what was being done or why. Out of all this experience the Soil Conservation District idea was born. The men most concerned with conservation realized that as long as land was used by free people, the people themselves must organize to use it safely and permanently. It was soon discovered that the successful management of land is closely related to water management which presented problems that only skilled technicians could solve. To secure the needed technical assistance, Soil Conservation Districts normally apply to the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the facilities of the Soil Conservation Service. The Soil Conservation Service furnishes technical help to the District on the basis of an agreement with the governing body. In addition to Soil Conservation Service technical assistance, Districts get educational and other kinds of help from other local, state, federal and private sources. Each has its place in helping the work of the District. Through Soil Conservation Districts, the land owners of America are keeping the land in good, productive condition to meet the requirements of their country in war and peace—and also for future generations. They are protecting the very base of their own and the nation's prosperity. In the years ahead, Soil Conservation Districts offer America the greatest opportunity it has had in modern times to strengthen its ideal of self-government and solve at the same time on the most fundamental problems—the protection of its vital land and water resources.
