# Absentee Voting Continues For May 4 Election

Absentee balloting continues this week for the Democratic and Republican Primaries which will be held on Saturday, May 4. [ED NOTE: The Star had an incorrect date last week for the Primary Elections. They will be held on Saturday, May 4, instead of Tuesday, May 7 as reported in last week's issue of The Star.]

Absentee ballots will be accepted at the office of County Clerk Marguerite Terrell in the Court House through the end of business on Wednesday May 1. Voters will be casting ballots in elections to select their party favorites from the precinct level to Governor in the state along with Congressional seats also on this year's ballots.

The big contested race in Sherman County pits seven men all running for the office of Sherman County Commissioner, Precinct 4 [Stratford], Commissioner S.J. Lavake did not seek reelection this year and opened up the field and a total of seven filed as candidates, all running on the Democratic ticket.

The seven candidates for Pct 4 Commissioner include E.A. Hamilton, Ted Reynolds, Tommy Wakefield, Howard White, L.S. (Red) DeBord, C.T. Watson and Roscoe Dyess.

The only other contested race in this area is for the Democratic nomination for Congressman for the 13th District. There are three Democrats running for the opportunity to meet Republican Bob Price in the General Election set for November.

The three candidates include

Ray Ruffin of Amarillo, State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon and Dr. Louis Finney of Amarillo.

Both Ruffin and Hightower have actively campaigned in this county visiting with voters while Finney has run a relatively low key campaign to date.

The only other areawide race will not be decided until November as Pressley Ashton of Cactus is running for the office of State Representative for the 64th District on the Democratic ticket while Bob Close of Perryton is seeking the same office but is running on the Republican ticket.

Also included on this year's ballot will be a voter referendum concerning horse-racing.

Pari-mutuel betting has been a source of controversy for many years in Texas, having been on

the books back in the 1930's, but was done away with in 1936. Since that time proponents have fought unsuccessfully to get pari-mutuel betting approved by the Legislature. This year the Legislature will approve a bill allowing pari-mutuel betting to become law again in the State of Texas.

The referendum on this year's ballot is "For" or "Against" the proposition that the 64th Legislature shall enact a law to permit perimutuel wagering on horses by local option.

Back on the Sherman County level again, there are several political offers which are up for election this year, but all are uncontested with incumbents seeking reelection.

The candidates and the offices they are seeking include Robert J. [Bob] Ferguson,

Sherman County Commissioner, Pct 2; J.R. [Bob] Marshall, Justice of Peace, Pct 4; Madge Lowe, Sherman County Treasurer; W.S. [Bill] Frizzell Jr., Sherman County Judge; Archie McDonald of Dumas is also seeking reelection to the office of District Judge.

The office of Sherman County Democratic Chairman is being sought by Charlie Cozart, who is running uncontested as Mrs. Pat Johnson is not seeking reelection to that office. Mrs. Frances Watson is also seeking reelection to the post of Republican County Chairman.

On the statewide level, there are five candidates running for the office of Governor including incumbent Dolph Briscoe who is seeking his second term as the head of the state. Briscoe's most serious opponent is Frances

[Sissy] Farenthold of Corpus Christi who made a real run at the office two years ago and almost upset Briscoe. The other three candidates include Bill Posey and Steve F. Alexander.

The other contested statewide races include Jesse James pitted against Donald B. Yarrbrough for the office of State Treasurer; Bob Bullock, incumbent, is challenged by Hugh Edbert for the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts; John C. White, incumbent, is pitted against Herbert A. (Peanuts) Schroeder for Agriculture Commissioner; Max Wallace and C.A. Kelley are both seeking an unexpired term on the Railroad Commission and this rounds as the contested state races.

The Bik-A-Thon participants will gather at the Rex Christian home beginning at 1:30 p.m. on May 5. The Bik-A-Thon will get underway at 2 p.m. and bicyclists will head north toward the Beaver River. The complete round trip will be 20 miles.

A check point will be along the route every two miles where bikers will get their cards signed. All participants are urged to get as many sponsors as possible with the proceeds to go to the Cancer Crusade.

Four prizes will be awarded as follows: Most sponsors, Most money raised, Youngest rider to finish, and oldest rider to finish. Prizes will be furnished by The First State Bank of Stratford.

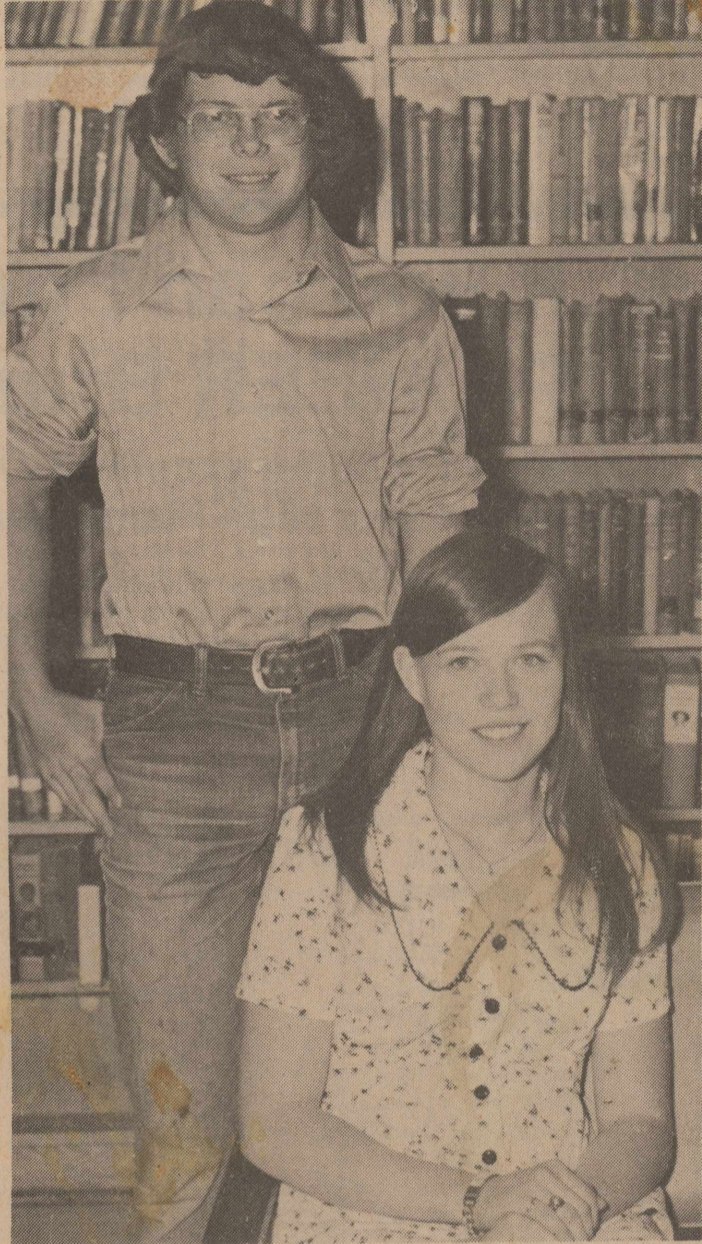

He has been a member of the Elk Band all four years in high school and was named to the All Region Band two years and attended the State Solo & Essemble Contests his freshman year.

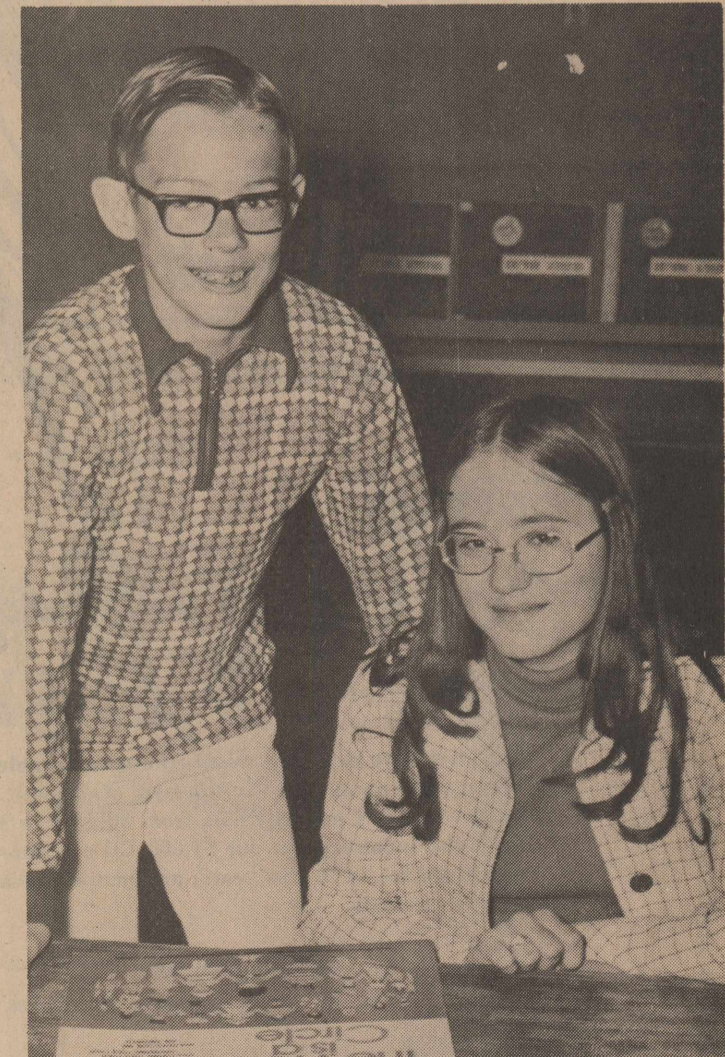
## Harrington Elected

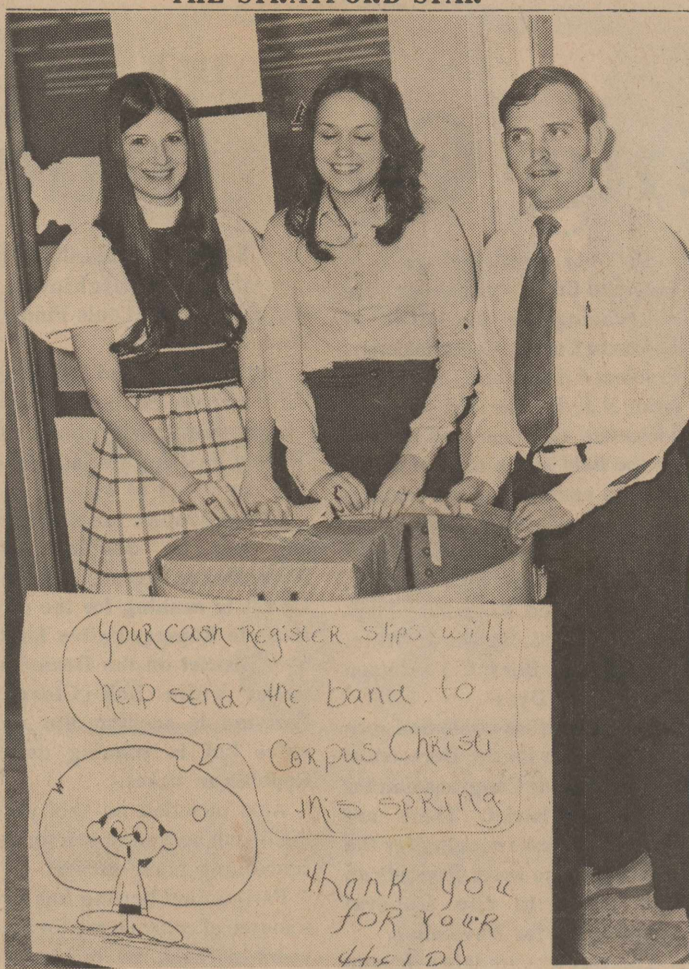
**Good Sale At Texhoma**

Last Friday was a real good day for a Cattle Auction in Texhoma. 6,539 cattle and calves were sold thru the arena during the auction time. Buyers from many states attended the auction.

The market through cut was very active and steady with last week. Some sales of the better quality steers sold 50 cents to \$1.00 per cwt. higher. The quality of our cattle as a whole was not as good as it had been for the past two or three weeks.

The bulk of the Steer Calves sold in a price range of \$50. to \$60. per cwt, depending on weight and quality. Yearling and feeder steers sold mostly in a price range of \$41.50 to \$46.00 per cwt. with feeder heifers selling from \$37.50 to \$42.50 per cwt.

For next Friday, we are expecting between 6,000 to 7,000 cattle of various classes.

**Social Security News**

**Q. In a few weeks I'll be changing my job and moving to another State. Should I notify a social security office of my new address?**

A. No, not unless you're getting social security checks. Social Security doesn't keep up-to-date records of your mailing address until you start getting benefits. Regardless of where you work or live, social security keeps one central record of your earnings in work covered by social security. You use the same social security number in any State, and your number and name are enough to credit your earnings to your record no matter where you are.

**Q. Can I hold my Social Security checks, or is there a time limit on cashing them?**

A. There is no time limit, but social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft. Most retired people need the money as soon as the check is received. If you do not, you might consider depositing them in a savings account where they will earn interest.

**Q. My 20-year old daughter is a sophomore in college and receives social security benefits as a student. She is planning to marry but will continue to attend school full time. Will the marriage effect her benefits?**

A. Yes it will. Her social security benefits will terminate the month before her marriage. Any checks received after marriage must be returned.

**Paint In Safety**

If spring cleaning plans include a painting project, take time to observe some simple fire prevention rules, urges the Texas Safety Association.

Solvents labeled "nonflammable" are safest for removing paint and cleaning brushes. If flammable solvents must be used, work outdoors in areas where there are no open flames and no one is smoking nearby.

Paint or solvent should be stored in capped metal containers well away from any source of heat. Never save empty paint or solvent containers.

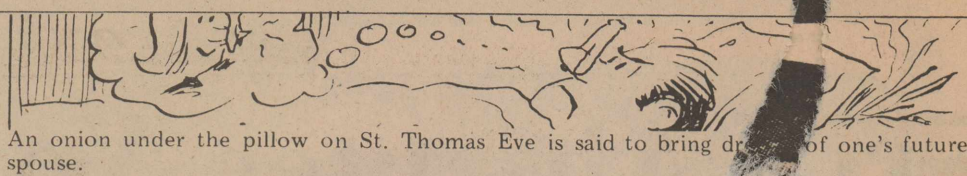
Rags used for painting projects should be disposed of immediately, outside the house. If drop cloths and other combustible items must be kept for re-use, store them in metal containers with tight fitting lids.

The Lung Association's medical division, the American Thoracic Society, has advocated that physicians include the Mantoux tuberculin test as a part of the standard physical examination, that positive reactors be x-rayed for signs of lung disease, and that individuals considered to be at high risk of developing TB be treated preventively with daily doses of INH for a year. "A lot of people have been under the false impression that TB is a thing of the past," the Christmas Seal spokesman said. "This unfortunately just isn't so. I am reminded of that period in our history when we thought we had VD whipped, too."

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1974, shows a total of 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured as compared to March, 1973, with 468 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured. This was 73 less accidents, four more killed, and 91 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

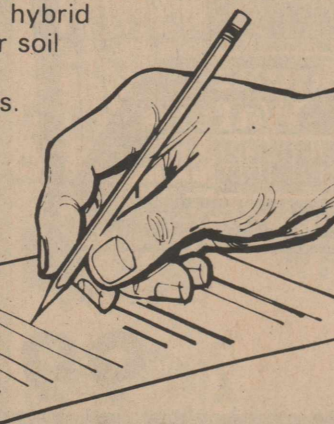

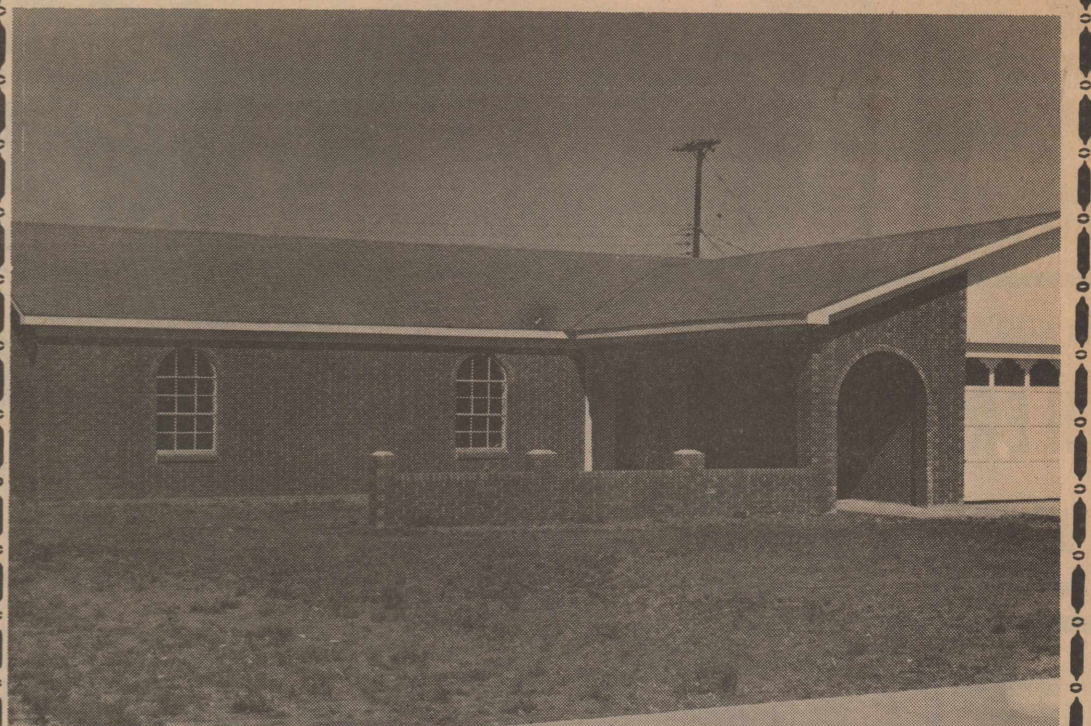

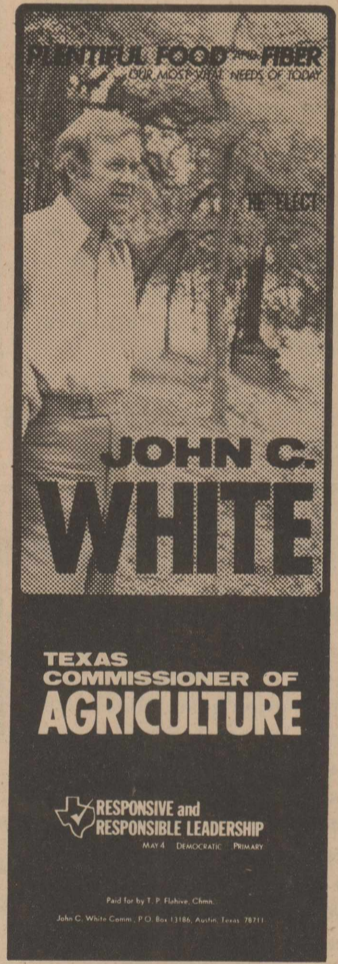

The party will depart Wichita Falls at 3 p.m.

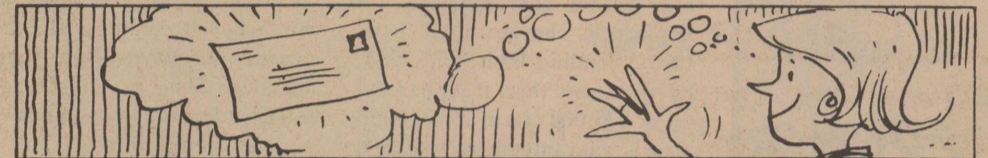
Proceeds from the benefit luncheon will go to finance Price's current campaign, help pay off other campaign debts and be added to the state and national Republican coffers.

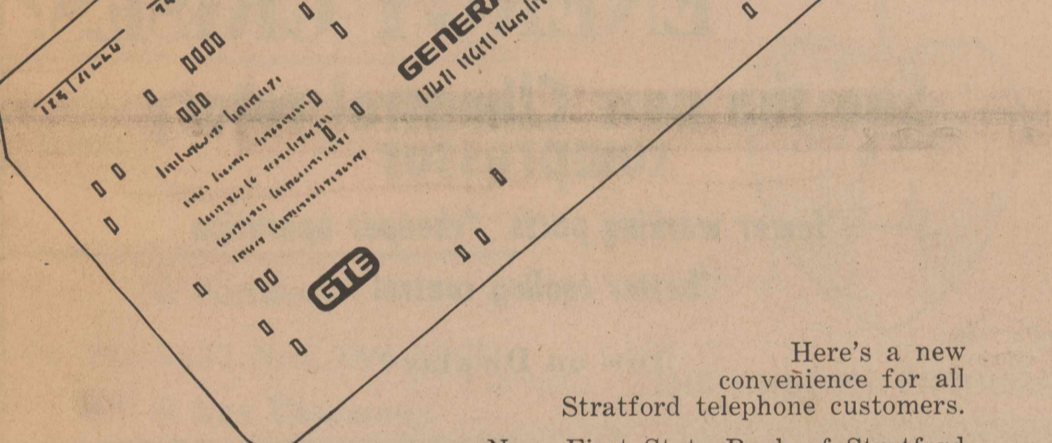

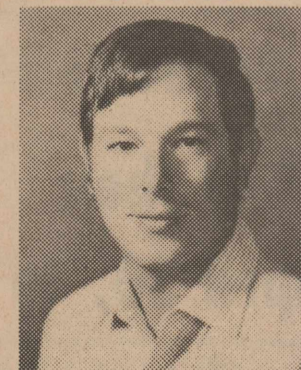

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# Guaranteed Farm Loans Available Thru FHA

Guaranteed loans by banks and other lending agencies are a new source of credit for farmers who can not otherwise find financial assistance. J. Lynn Futch, FmHa State Director for Texas said today.

"FmHa is already offering borrowers insured loans and loans in which private lenders and FmHa participate. We are now adding guaranteed farm loans made by banks and other local lending agencies," Futch explained.

Farmers who need credit can apply for loans either through the Farmers Home Administration or through banks, Federal Land Banks, co-ops, insurance companies, or other private sources of financing. The

lending organization make and service the loan.

Farmers Home Administration will repay private lending institutions up to 90 percent of any loss on a guaranteed loan, but not more than 90 percent of the original principal. Farmers Home also pays the bank the difference between the borrower's interest rate, and the current FmHa guaranteed rate of 9 percent for emergency and operating loans, and 8 percent for farm ownership, soil and water, and recreation loans. Lenders pay FmHa a fee for each loan guaranteed.

FmHa borrowers are now paying 5 percent interest for farm ownership, emergency, soil and water, and recreation loans. The interest rate for operating loans is 6-3/4 percent.

Futch also indicated that a recent ruling from the office of the Comptroller General, Washington, D.C., was good news for national banks that participate in the FmHa guarantee program.

"The ruling provided that only the non-guaranteed part of any loan is charges against the bank's lending limit," he said. "This means that, if 90 percent of a \$75,000 farm ownership loan is guaranteed, only \$7,500 of that loan will be charged against the lending limit."

Futch points out that the applicant must meet the same eligibility requirements for a guaranteed loan as he would for a regular FmHa loan of the same type. Interest rates and repayment terms are the same for guaranteed loans as for conventional Farmers Home loans.

In order to make the guaranteed lending process easier and faster, applications, forms, and statement are

prepared by regular lenders.

The Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor has many loan programs available for farmers and other rural residents and rural communities. Guaranteed loans made by private lending institutions is one more method of helping the rural development activities of Texas.

## Soil Conservation News

Cost share assistance is again available to landowners and operators through the Rural Environmental Assistance Program known formerly as the ACP Program. Participants had been notified by mail and referrals were approved last Thursday for funds available.

The programs have not changed noticeably since 1972. Tailwater recovery systems will not be approved unless all other needed structures have been installed. This, in some cases, could mean the installation of pipe, leveling where needed, or open ditches. This will vary for each individual unit.

Designs for any structure must be in accordance with a design approved by the Soil Conservation Service.

Some farmers in the Texas Panhandle feel they have justifiable reasons for burning stubble. Some might be valid, however, if you apply for cost share assistance under the REAP Program you will not be able to burn stubble. This does not mean for stubble that you might have burned in the past but for stubble that is burned through the remainder of the year. Most farmers were handed the following statement and we re-emphasize it for your information if you did not receive one.

"According to the State ASC committee a producer cannot earn ACP (REAP) cost sharing during the same year which he burns stubble. This applies to any farm on which he has an interest as owner, operator or tenant. If you plan to burn stubble this year you should not make application for ACP Cost sharing. If you earn ACP cost-sharing and later decide to burn stubble the total amount of payment must be refunded."

## FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION Rita Blanca Co-op Gets Okay On Loan

Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative of Dalhart has received approval from REA of a new loan of the amount of \$814,000 for construction on its system.

The loan for \$1,201,000 for two years was made in late January by the board when previous loan funds from REA had been exhausted.

Amount of the loan was agreed upon after conferences with Merrill Riggen, OFR from REA, and John Carlson, REA engineer. It was based on the long-range study prepared by Harris and Patterson, consulting engineers, and the prior two years' growth of Rita Blanca.

Plans call for construction of 92.6 miles of new distribution line, 94.5 miles of conversion of line, 16.5 miles of tie lines and 12 miles of transmission line. Line conversion calls for

changing some of the lines from 7,200 volts to 14,400 volts, and others from single-phase to three-phase power.

Projections call for 471 new consumers to be added to RBEC lines in the next two years. This would put Rita Blanca at the 3,000 service mark in the number of active consumers as compared with the present approximately 2,700 now being served.

Manager R.L. Elliott said all this proposed construction and extension of service will depend on availability of materials which are still in short supply, especially poles and wire.

Part of the work has already been done in recent months with conversion of part of the lines being served by the Hartley county substation, as well as construction started to double the size of the substation. This was started in order to try to take care of additional load recently added in this area, Elliott said.
