#### Kralis Gives Views On Water Problem

The following statement on current water problem is issued by Dan Kralis, candidate for Congress, 17th district:

Lack of water is a real threat to the 17th Congressional district. Dust bowls are on the way back.

We are going to run out of water if we don't act. There is, a critical shortage in this district. Dust storms follow a period of sparse rainfall, that produces dry soil and water shortages. The water table is gettling lower and lower. Our underground water supplies are being seriously depleted.

Water conservation storage on our streams must be more fully and better developed with better floodcontrol reservoirs. 





2. The losing candidate has been in office too long with too little accomplished for the people he is supposed to be representing, or he may have never been in office but also does not have a winning platform.

There is one politicians' tactic that all the people should know about. This method of campaigning has ben often used by desparate politicians who cannot win by any other method. These politicians have little to offer in the way of a platform and their only recourse is to try to draw the voters' attention away from the opposing candidate's platform by attempting to create a duel between personalities. Their weapons are character assassination, prejudices, inferences, and falsely creating a compltely untrue or misleading picture of what the opposing candidate has said or done in the past or now.

In the heat of such animosities, both candidates soon forget why they are running for public office and their only concern is to tear each other's heart out, to stir up confusion, cause hard feelings, and in general, bring into disgrace this God given right which allows free Americans to run for public office.

I do not believe my opponent and I want to conduct a "mud slinging" character assassination campaign. We have all we can do to state our viewpoints and I for one will have all I can do to stick to my platform and give the people of the 17th Congressional District a solid firm platform. All the people will know exactly where I stand on any issue.

This campaign can be refreshing, enlightening, and conducted in the atmosphere of true statesmanship instead of "political skull duggery." We can make this a clean campaign with the issues clear cut. However, if this is to be a "no holds" drag down, knock out battle, I'm prepared for this too. The people of the 17th Congressional District are interested in only one thing. Timely Tips:

Watering the lawn is the maintenance practice that is most often done incorrectly. Lawns should never be watered until the grass shows a definite need. Grass suffering from lack of moisture takes on a definite sheen and the plants wilt and curl. When this occurs, the lawns should be thoroughly scaked to a depth of 6 inches or more. Light sprinklings are never recommended except during excessively hot spells following a prolonged period of heavy rainfall. Light daily sprinklings at this time reduce scalding during such periods.

Deep watering of 6 inches or more encourages development of a deep root system capable of utilizing more efficiently the nutrients available deep in the soil. Light frequent sprinklings produce shallow, weak root systems which encourage weed invasions.

Chiggers, ticks, spiders, ants and other pesky insection can be controlled in the lawn by spraying with directions on package.

To get his refund a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 2240, and are to be filed with the United States Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas.






