## Bobcats Defeat Knights 12-7

The Rule Bobcats remained undefeated last Saturday night before a capacity Homecoming crowd, defeating the Notre Dame Knights, 12-7.

The Bobcats received the opening kickoff and drove 57 yards in eight plays before Don Hisey scored from five yards out. PAT attempt by Jesse Macias was no good.

Macias kicked off to the Knights and recovered the pigskin on the Knights 35 yard line. The Bobcats relinquished possession of the ball four plays later, failing to convert a fourth-and-four situation.

Four plays later the Bobcats regained possession of the ball after a partially blocked punt sailed only five yards before going out of bounds.

The Cats failed again to make yardage needed for the first down and attempted to punt. The punt was blocked and Joe Luna recovered the loose ball and carried it 27 yards for a Notre Dame touchdown. PAT

was good and Notre Dame led 7-6 with 3:35 left in the first period.

On the second play in the second period, Hisey put a strong rush on Ron Veitenheimer who threw an interception to Art Briles. The ball saw-sawed back and forth through the second period with neither team scoring until just seconds before the half when Notre Dame attempted a 35-yard field goal. The kick was no good and the Bobcats managed only one play before time ran out.

The tough Bobcat defense held the Knights to a total of nine yards rushing during the third period. Larry Barbee blocked a pass and Cole Turner recovered a Notre Dame fumble to stop two drives in the scoreless period. The Bobcat offense managed only one first down and 26 yards rushing during the period.

The winning touchdown for the Bobcats came on a 12-yard scamper around right end by Art Briles with 7:48 left in the

game. PAT was not good and the Cats led 12-7.

During the final period the Knights never penetrated into Bobcat territory and managed a total offense of only three yards.

Hisey led the offense with 111 yards rushing. Briles had 51 and Barbee had 12.

Defensively for the Bobcats, Rob Kittley, Larry Barbee, Roy Don Wilson, Steve Anders, Gary Miller, Don Hisey, Lynn Dale Dudensing, Art Briles and Cole Turner played a fine game. Briles, Kittley and Barbee each intercepted passes and Turner and Anders recovered fumbles.

## Indians Down Stamford 46-0

The Haskell Indians trounced the Stamford Bulldogs 46-0 last Friday night and held the Bulldogs to a total offense of 94 yards. The Tribe chalked up a total of 392 yards offensively.

The Indians took control of the game in early stages, recovering a Bulldog fumble seven plays after kicking off to Stamford. Two plays after punting to the Bulldogs, Randy Ivy intercepted a Stamford pass and returned it 25 yards to the Stamford 40 yard line. After a 15 yard penalty against the

Bulldogs and a 28 yard run by Jackie Young, the Indians scored on a two yard run by Young. PAT was blocked.

The Bulldogs next drive lasted only three plays and after a 26 yard punt and eight plays, Young carried the ball 26 yards on a 4-and-2 situation for the 6 points. PAT by Ivy was good and the Indians led 13-0 with 8 minutes left in the half.

Not satisfied with a 13 point lead, the Indians held the Bulldogs to 3 yards on their next three plays and after a 27 yard

punt and a 16 yard pass to Robin Colbert, Ivy caught a 32-yard touchdown pass. PAT was good.

Three plays later Young intercepted a Bulldog pass and set up the final score of the first half. The score came on a 20 yard half-back pass from Young to Ivy. PAT failed and the Indians had a half-time lead of 25-0.

During the second period, the Bulldogs had possession of the pigskin for only seven plays on four offensive attempts and were held to a net gain of 11 yards. Only a 12 yard pass moved the figure to the positive side of the tally sheet. The pass from Roland Gonzales to Bo Jones was the only complete. (Continued to Page 4, Sec. 1)

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

**Feed, Fiber Abundance Month**  
**Cotton Stalk Regrowth**  
**... VEE Emergency Ends ...**  
**Grain Stocks Increase.**

November is Food and Fiber Abundance Month. Agricultural groups throughout the state are promoting Texas food and fiber and telling all consumers of the efficiencies of agriculture, efficiencies which have made this nation possible.

A major part of the story about agriculture as it relates to the total environment is also being told this month to civic clubs and other organizations in Texas' cities.

The farmer is the world's first practicing environmentalist and ecologist. And it is the

Thus, Texans are not only getting an abundant supply of food and fiber but can also be assured that it is of the highest quality possible.

Agriculture in Texas is big. It is the state's most basic industry.

**COTTON** farmers in the southern half of the state have done an excellent job in destroying cotton stalks this season. But recent rains are causing regrowth problems in some areas. Farmers are urged to continually check their fields to make sure that regrowth is destroyed so that it will not become a habitat for cotton insects this winter.

**VEE** emergency has ended. Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis, a sleeping sickness disease of horses, which created havoc in South Texas last year, is now considered no longer a menace to the Texas' horse population. Officials declared the end of the emergency recently.

**STOCKS** of grains in Texas as of October 1 is estimated at 198,000,000 bushels, almost 50% above the levels of 1971.

Increased stocks of wheat contributed to most of the increase. Sorghum, corn and oats also showed increased stock from previous years.

Wheat stocks in all positions are set at 105,000,000 bushels, 56% above a year ago.

Old crop grain sorghum stocks in all positions are estimated at 74,000,000 bushels, 44% above a year ago.

**AN ASSESSMENT** of 25 cents per 100 pounds of pecans has been set by the Texas Pecan Producers Board to initiate a program of research, education, promotion and disease and insect control for the Texas pecan industry.

Over 80% of the Texas pecan producers voted such a program recently; the assessment was not to exceed 50 cents per 100 pounds.

Texas this year will produce about one-third of the total pecan crop in the nation.

## November Is Food And Fiber Month

The entire month of November this year has been designated "Texas Food & Fiber Abundance Month." Last year's observance—the first state-wide promotion—was limited to the week just before Thanksgiving.

According to the sponsoring Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Council, the purpose of the observance is to promote public awareness and appreciation of the bountiful harvests which have made this "the best-fed, best-clothed nation in the history of the world."

The Council is comprised of representatives of farm organizations, agri-business firms, state and federal agencies, educational and banking institutions, and the news media.

Promotional activities planned include publicity through newspapers, magazines, radio, television, billboards and special displays in supermarkets. A speakers' bureau will take the story to garden clubs, service clubs, etc.

Jack Barton, Houston, Senior Vice President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, serves as Council president. W. H. Meischen, Austin, Executive Secretary of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, is co-ordinator. C. G. Scruggs, Executive Editor, Progressive Farmer, is chairman of the board.

Demand for cotton is improving, but prices remain about the same. Prices ranged from 200 to 400 points above CCC Loan prices with the higher grades bringing the best prices. Strict Low Middling (41) cotton averaged 310 points above loan, and Middling Light Spotted (32) cotton averaged 335 points above.

current ginnings are selling for 17.50 cents per pound to 21 cents per pound. A 3231 premium mike will bring around 21 cents per pound. A 5231 premium mike brings around 18.50 cents. It appears that there will be a better price paid this year for the higher grade cotton, therefore it should pay producers to harvest their cotton carefully, and to be sure that every step is taken to preserve quality.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office classed 900 samples this week, which brings the season's total to 13,150.

Percentages of other grades are as follows: Strict Low Middling (41) was 10 percent; Low Middling (51) was 5 percent; Middling Light Spotted (32) was 10 percent; Low Middling Light Spotted (52) was 8 percent; and the Spotted grades accounted for 14 percent.

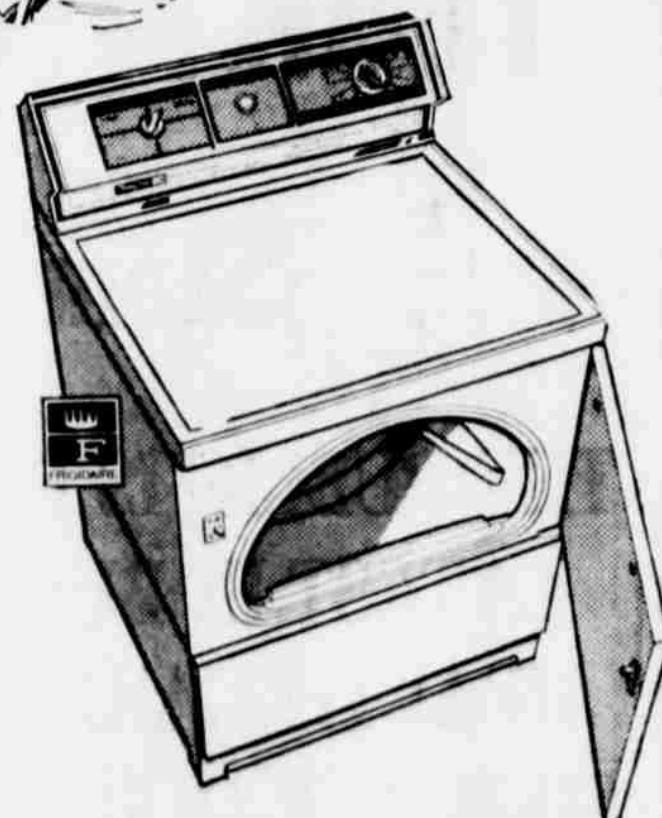

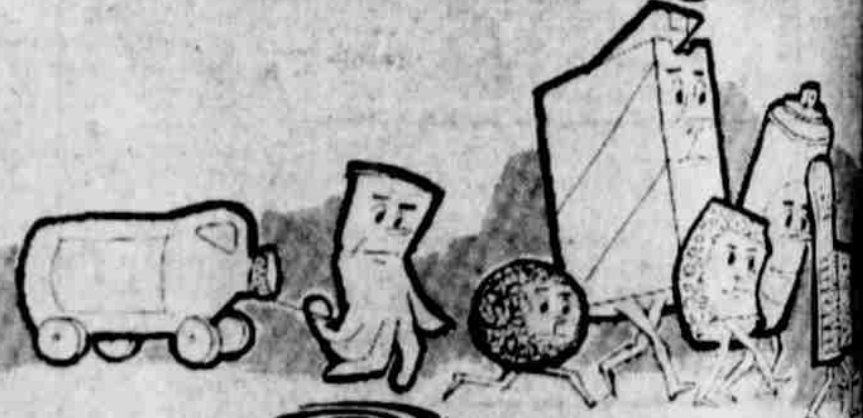

**CONSERVATION  
 VIEW POINTS**

District Conservationist  
**J. C. YEARY, JR.**



It is human nature to brag or "show off" something new, and we are no exception to the rule. We want to brag some on our new conservation cooperators. These people have "seen the light", so to speak, and have placed their farm units under agreement with the conservation movement. Complete conservation plans have recently been developed with Bob Dumas of Haskell on 435 acres he operates for Martha Meadors, Clifford Thomas, et al. also developed plans on 80 acres he farms for Mrs. C. G. Burson, Sr. of Haskell. T. J. Doris Brueggeman of Haskell developed a plan for 160

acres that they purchased from the Anderson Estate. Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Ellis of O'Brien have developed plans on 780 acres Mrs. Ellis inherited from her father, the late Sam Reed. The Meadors, Burson and Ellis farms are located in the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District sub-division No. 2. W. L. Ballard of Rochester is District Director for this zone. The Brueggeman farm, also in the Wichita-Brazos SWCD, is located in sub-division No. 1. L. M. Patterson of Weinert, District Director. Complete conservation plans have been developed by Thurman Stout of Weinert on 367 acres of land southeast of Has-

kell belonging to the John M. Pace Estate. Howard Perry, Jr. of Haskell received planing assistance on 100 acres he recently purchased from Gene Tonn. Durwood Miller and Otis Matthews developed a plan on 75 acres Miller bought from E. W. Andrews. Abe Turner has developed a plan of operations combined with a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract on 120 acres he recently purchased from the A. M. Turner Estate. Andy Wilfong also developed plans for a GPCP Contract on 173 acres he purchased from T. C. Walker. O. L. Glover of Rule developed a plan on 60 acres south of Rule, and Dale and Billy Middlebrook planned 104 acres of land belonging to Martin Middlebrook of Winters.

All seven of these plans are located in the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District. The Miller-Matthews and Glover farms are located in sub-division No. 5, Elmer Boedecker of Sagerton, District Director. The Pace Estate, Perry, Turner, Wilfong, and Middlebrook farms are situated in sub-division No. 1. R. V. Farles of Paint Creek, District Director.

A conservation plan includes a complete inventory of all natural resources existing on the individual unit of land. The plan includes land use and treatment based on this inventory, incorporating the desires of the producer with the needs of the land. The soil conservationist assisting the landowner or operator works on the Soil Conservation Service principle that soil, water, plant, and animal resources cannot be effectively used or managed separately but are interdependent and must be dealt with as a whole.

Planning assistance is available to any and all landowners and operators in Haskell County through the technical services furnished to the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos SWCDs by the Haskell Field Office Staff of the Soil Conservation Service.

**N**FU—Continued to urge for full-scale investigations of chain store profiteering and the Administrations ailing economic stabilization plan.

**N**FU—Testified before the Senate Commerce Committee that a surface transportation proposal under study must be amended to include a moratorium on railway abandonment and tighter safeguards on proposed loans to transportation companies if Farmers Union was to support the legislation.

**N**FU—Continued its opposition to transfer parts of the Agricultural Department to the new Department of Community Development.

**T**FU—Urged Congressional action to offset environmental decisions made by government agencies discontinuing the predator control practices on federal and private lands, if performed by a federal employee.

**N**FU—Testified before the Price Commission that the economic stabilization program is partially to blame for the rapid rise in food prices. Too little regulation of processors and chain stores under anti-trust laws and price administration was the reason cited.
