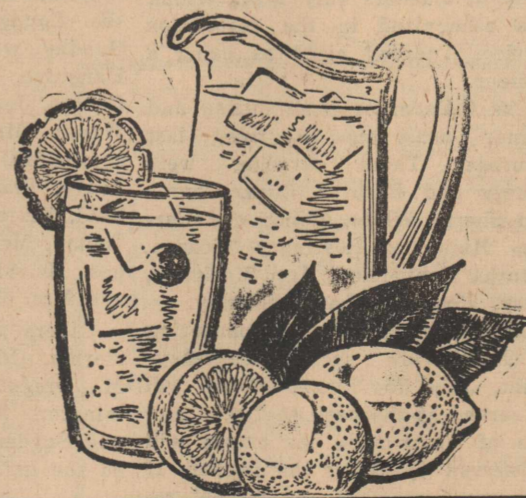

Totally Disabled May Now Receive Help On State-Federal Aid

Complete and permanent invalids or persons in the community so mentally deranged that they require continuous oversight to keep from harming themselves or others may soon be able to receive small monthly checks from their State Department of Public Welfare through the new state-federal program of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled. The Constitutional Amendment which was adopted by the voters in November, 1956, limiting the amount of money that can be appropriated for this program to 1.5 million dollars per year, makes aid possible only to those who are helpless and have no relatives able to support them.

Mr. T. J. Compton, Welfare Supervisor for this area, pointed out this is the only welfare program which requires consideration of the ability of relatives to support. This law defines "responsible relatives" as children, parents, stepchildren, step-parents, brothers, and sisters. Mr. Compton said that for the first time in nearly 20 years the department's field workers will be required by law to determine the resources of relatives of persons who apply for aid.

The "permanency" and "totality" of the disability will be determined by a State Reviewing Physician after study of a complete physical or mental examination by the person's own private physician. Complete helplessness from a medical standpoint, rather than inability to work, is the criteria. The State will pay the private physician for the examination.

Funds for assistance payments will not be available until September 1, 1957, but applications will be taken after July 15. While the helpless individual will not be able to leave home, the persons responsible for his care may come to the local welfare office and acquaint the Department with his situation. A field worker will then call, as soon as possible, at the home to take the application.

They will also take part in impressive ceremonies during a special banquet given in their honor by Olin Mathieson. Each will be presented with the 4-H alumni gold key award.

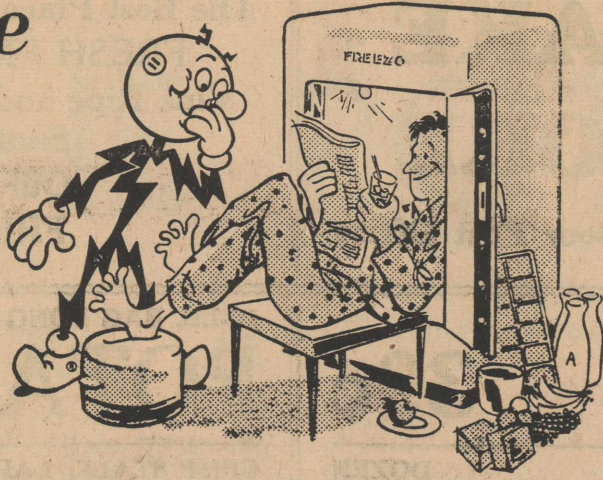

Sparks Improving Soil With Blackeyed Peas

"I planted 40 acres of blackeyed peas for soil improvement", said Lawrence Sparks. "I planted them on land in the acreage reserve. While this land is in the Soil Bank and out of commercial production this year, I decided to try to build up my soil by growing a soil improving crop."

Sparks started planting his peas on June 20, just as soon as he could after planting cotton. He had a good seedbed prepared. He

inoculated the seed before planting. This will start the growth of Nitrogen Nodules on the pea roots, and enable Nitrogen from the air to be deposited in the soil through the legume roots. Future crops will benefit from this Nitrogen, as well as from the additional organic matter the pea vines should make.

Sparks' farm is three miles east of Rotan. As a part of his long range basic conservation plan to conserve and improve his soil, he is planting a soil improving legume or black eyed peas. He is a cooperator with the Upper Clear Fork Soil

Conservation District. He began talking with Soil Conservation Service personnel some time ago about soil improving crops.

"I plan to chop my pea vines up with a one-way just before they mature," Sparks said.

By doing this, Sparks will be able to leave most of his vines on the surface and leave all the roots under the ground, where they will be most beneficial.

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Fisher County Leaders Discuss Plans For Flood Control

Fisher County leaders talked with the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District board of supervisors in Sweetwater last week about going ahead with plans for flood control structures upper stream.

The Cottonwood Creek, which rises south of Roscoe and runs through Claytonville, to Roby, and then into the Upper Clear Fork of the Brazos was among the topics discussed.

The committee will go ahead to obtain information necessary about damage suffered by landowners, the highway department, public utilities,

public roads and the county commissioners.

Among those in the conference were Ray Hendricks of Roscoe, Max Carriker of the Farmers Union of Fisher County, Edd Carter, Fisher County, ASC manager Frank Mitchell, O. L. Armstrong, field engineer with Soil Conservation Service, and other officials of the conservation service.

The information meeting had maps and figures showing the watersheds flowing into the Clear Fork of the Brazos. Soil Work Unit Conservationist Harry Rucker and others presenting a picture of the water going into the flood picture.

Cottonwood Creek, it was indicated, could do much to put the Upper Clear Fork out of banks at Sylvester and on down.

It drains 147,000 acres and from Alkali Creek above Roby it picks up flood waters from 28,000 more acres. The whole drainage area has 212,000 acres.

Gannon area has 11,000 acres going into the East Cottonwood Creek. Sweetwater Creek drains 116,000 acres.

Raven Creek drains 8,000 acres, Dry Creek 8,000, Plum Creek, near Longworth 10,000 China Creek 20,000, Kildooogan 25,000.

Near Oak Creek, Antelope creek drains 12,000 acres, Eagle 23,000, in the White Hat ranch country, Robertson Creek near Oak Creek 36,000 acres, Pecan Creek 8,000 acres.

Other creeks listed showed Lower Cottonwood 10,000 acres, Rocky Creek 16,000, Fish Creek 21,000, Holder Creek 12,000, Bitter Creek (Lake Sweetwater) 51,000, Stink Creek, 19,000.

Cottonwood creek in all has 136,000 acres drainage, Big Buffalo Creek 22,000, Sandy, 30,000, Red Creek 12,000, Rough Creek, 12,000, Double Mountain 50,000, Unknown Creek, 17,000, Gyp Creek 32,000.

Buster Brown, vice-president, called the meeting to order.

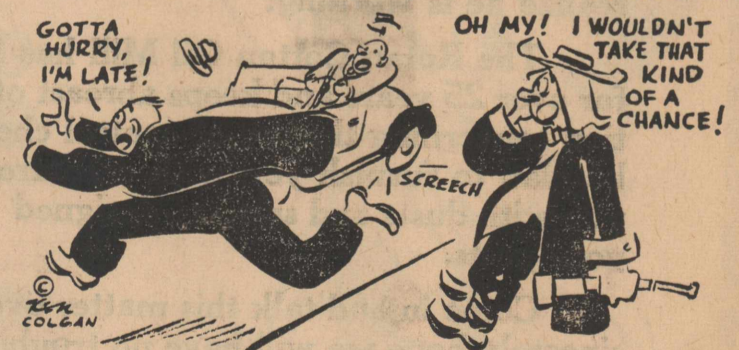

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Austin.—"School days, school days, all around the state," may stray somewhat from the original song, but it means that come September, around 263,000 little Texans will be going off to school for the first time.

In anticipation of this the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health is girding itself for the annual last minute onslaught of thousands of requests for birth certificate photostats.

It seems that each year the situation repeats itself. Most school districts require proof of birth in the form of a birth certificate or photostat for students entering school for the first time in the first grade.

Harried mothers all too often forget about this requirement until middle August. By then the Bureau of Vital Statistics is flooded with thousands of similar requests for photostatic copies resulting in a delay in the receiving of the copy for two weeks or more.

In efforts to speed up the process, the Bureau each year hired extra help and works overtime, in addition to using certain speed-up techniques to aid in the location of the original certificates kept on permanent file at the Department of Health.

Most of the requests will be for six-year-old children. Knowing this, vital statistics personnel arrange the record books containing the 217,470 certificates of birth for the year 1951 and part of the "stacks" for 1950 so that access will be easier and quicker.

The removal and replacement of the certificates for photostating is done at the "stacks" by the extra personnel instead of at the pho-

tostat machine by the technicians in the usual manner.

In this way a staggering pile-up of record books is avoided and the issuance of birth certificate photostats is greatly speeded.

State Registrar Don Carrol asks that requests for photostat copies be made as soon as possible to avoid the rush. Contact your local health department or send the request to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Health Department, Austin, Texas.

Be certain to include the child's name, name of both parents, and the date and place of birth. Enclose one dollar with your request. Cash is requested.

Write now to be sure to get your photostat on time.

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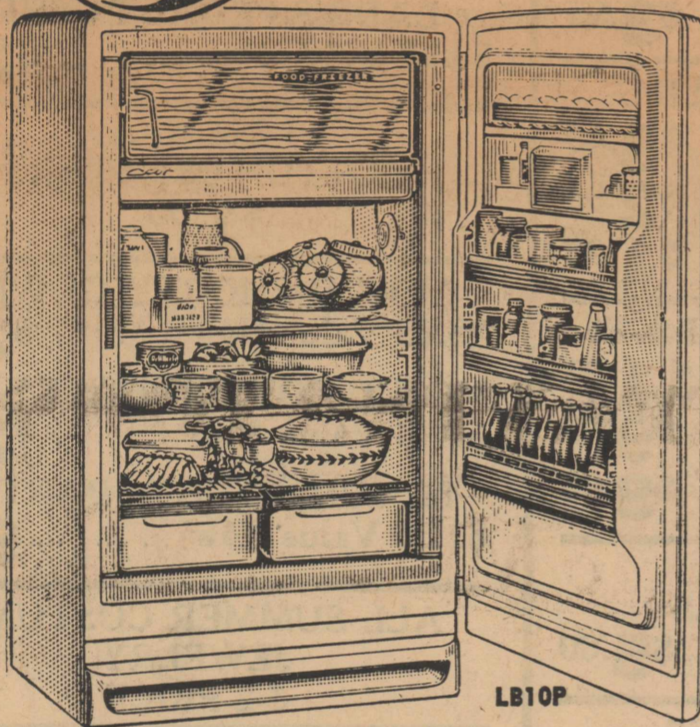
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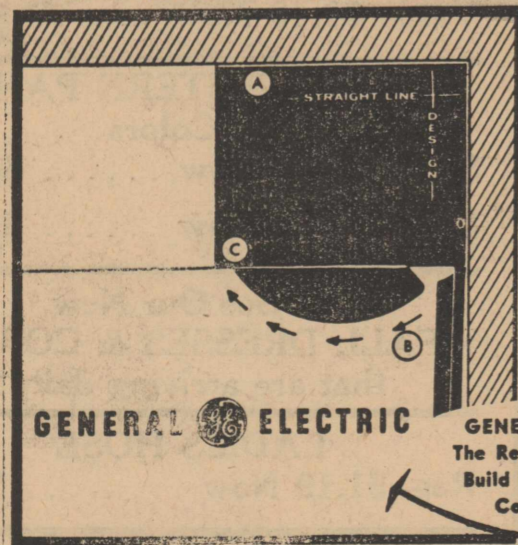


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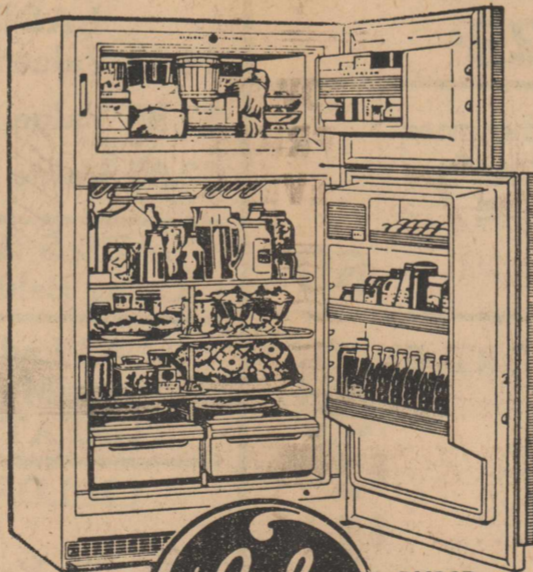
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
