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

auguration Day In Austin

AUSTIN—Almost before the final echos of a 19-gun salute had died Tuesday, Dolph Briscoe and William P. (Bill) Hobby had taken the oath of office and were officially Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas.

The ceremony took place on the south steps of the Capitol on a special platform built for the occasion. Overcast skies and gusty winds threatened rain and played havoc with carefully planned hair-dos. Honor guests on the platform were former President and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson.

Immediately following the invocation, Chief Justice Joe Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oaths. Hobby took the oath first and spoke briefly about writing a new State Constitution before Briscoe addressed the 3,000 spectators.

Only two interruptions were seen during the entire 30-minute ritual, the first came immediately after Briscoe finished taking the oath when wife, Janey, smiling and clapping, jumped from her seat and kissed the Governor on the cheek. The second came as Briscoe said, "It is my firm belief that our present tax resources are sufficient to operate an effective, efficient government that meets its responsibilities without choking the initiative out of the working people and the businesses of Texas by constantly demanding more and more taxes. Our goal must be no new taxes in 1973."

Briscoe also pledged a "Clear Code of Ethics for those who hold public office." He concluded saying, "The future is in our hands. The kind of Texas, the way of life, that we pass from our hands to our children's in not too many years depends upon what you and I do in the immediate future. This is our challenge. This is our opportunity."

Shortly after the inaugural ceremony the parade began down South Congress Avenue. Governor Briscoe and Lt. Gov. Hobby led the parade and mounted the reviewing stand across the street from the Capitol to view the long string of bands and floats.
