

Former Resident In State Senate Race



Robert R. Patterson, State Representative from Snyder announced Thursday, April 24, he will seek the Democratic nomination for State Senator of the 24th Senatorial District.

Patterson, 46, and a lawyer, has served two terms in the House of Representatives from the 90th Legislative District, composed of Scurry, Borden, Garza, Kent, and Crosby counties. He was chairman of the delegation of the 24th Senatorial District at the Democratic Convention in Fort Worth in 1956.

The incumbent State Senator is David Ratliff of Stamford who was elected in a special election following the death of Harley Sadler. In making his announcement the candidate for the upper house of the State Legislature said he would make an on-the-ground, person-to-person campaign from now until election day.

"Based on my experience in the Capitol during the two regular sessions and two special sessions of the Legislature I am convinced that the best interest of the people of West Texas will be served by a change in this office. During the course of this campaign I will submit the record to substantiate my opinion" the candidate said.

Patterson was born at Rotan, August 18, 1911, the son of Mrs. R. R. Patterson and the late R. R. Patterson, a pioneer family which settled in Fisher County in 1907. He attended the public schools in Rotan, Texas Tech, the University of Texas and graduated with the LL.B. Degree from Cumberland University. Licensed to practice law in 1939 Patterson opened a law office in Snyder. During World War II Patterson was in the Navy aboard a destroyer operating in the Atlantic and Pacific.

Prior to his first term in the House of Representatives in 1955, Patterson had served as Special County Judge of Scurry County during the height of the oil boom there and as City Judge of Snyder. The 24th Senatorial District of the State Legislature is composed of Dickens, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan and Taylor counties.

B. A. Waddell Dies After Extended Illness

B. A. (Ben) Waddell, 91, pioneer of the area died in the hospital at 5 p. m. Tuesday. He had been hospitalized several days and bedfast most of the time for the past four years.

Mr. Waddell had lived in Dowell community since 1896. He was born June 30, 1866 in Leon county, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Waddell. The family moved to Travis county. In 1890, because of his health he started to Colorado, stopping off at Roswell N. M. working as day laborer. He went up the trail as a cowboy several times with cattle.

He came to Fisher county in 1896 and worked on ranches until he purchased the land at Dowell. He had considerable land holdings at the time of his death.

He was married to Betty Finch in 1900 and she died May 28, 1954. Both Mr. and Mrs. Waddell were longtime leaders in the Rotan Church of Christ.

Services will be held at 3:30 p. m. today in the Church of Christ with Otta Johnson of Eastland, assisted by Charles Adams in charge. Burial will be in Belview cemetery with Weathersbee Funeral Home in charge.

Survivors are one son, Willie Waddell of Rotan; three grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; and a niece and nephew reared by the Waddells, Ernest Lafon of Riverside, Calif. and Mrs. Omata Sabens of Cypress, Calif.

Surplus Commodities Program Is Opened

Fisher County issued surplus commodities for the first time this year on April 17, and will issue hereafter on each third Thursday of each month.

Four hundred and sixty-nine persons from one hundred and thirty-three families received commodities in April. Of these, eighty-one families were recipients of state aid (Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to the Totally and Permanently Disabled). These persons are automatically eligible for commodities. Fifty-two families were classed as 'other'. This means that a family has a low income from sources other than the State Department of Public Welfare. All income is considered: Unemployment Compensation, Old Age and Survivors Insurance, Pension as well as salaries, earnings, rents, etc.

Fisher County uses the same income levels set up by the State Department of Public Welfare and are shown by number of persons in the following table:

Number of persons 1, income per month, \$60.00; 2-3 persons, income \$120 per month; 4-5 persons, \$140 per month; 6-7 persons, income per month \$165; 8-9 persons, income per month \$180.

In the instance of farmers and others who have no fixed salary, the above monthly income figures multiplied by twelve (12) will reflect the annual income levels to be used.

Persons wishing to apply for surplus commodities may apply at the Fisher County Welfare Office in Roby on Monday, Wednesday or Friday morning. Persons other than those who receive State Department of Welfare aid must bring a statement from their employers, showing the average monthly income of the person or the family. Only persons who receive state aid will be eligible to receive commod-

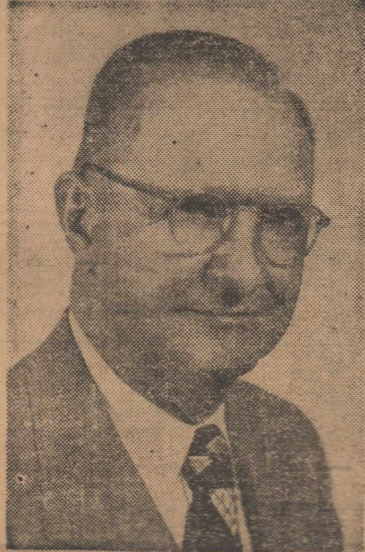

Over 200 farmers, ranchers and businessmen connected with Agriculture attended the Cattle Feeder Day at Spur Experiment Station last Friday.

The program consisted of tours of the wheat and native grass pastures, and inspection of calves wintered on these pastures.

Dr. R. O. Drummond, entomologist with the USDA told the group that the new chemicals "Trolen" and "Co-Oval" will soon be on the market since they have proved out successful in the control of cattle grubs, screw worms, ticks and horn-flies.

William J. Waldrip, in charge of the Range Research Project for cows and calf operations explained the program that has just been set up which will be in operation for ten years. This experiment is being conducted in Throckmorton County.

Development of the electro-ejaculator to collect semen from bull now makes possible for cattle producers to evaluate the semen quality has been known for several five their bulls are in making ewes conceive.

Methods of evaluating semen quality has been known for several years, but its use has been confined mostly to artificial breeding programs because it was very difficult to collect semen from bulls on most farms and ranches, according to L. A. Maddox, extension animal husbandman.

Semen has been collected from over 1200 bulls and evaluated in the last eight months from a wide area of the state, says Maddox. About 6% were sterile while another eight per cent had semen of such low quality that they would usually settle less than one-third of the cows bred.

This indicates that the average ranch with 20 bulls has three that are just boarders leaving the other 17 to cause most of the cows to conceive, points out the husbandman.

There are three times during the year that are most practical to check the bulls—just before the breeding season, soon after the breeding season, and three to five months after the breeding season, he advises.

Maddox encourages evaluating the semen of young bulls, but warns that certain points should be taken into consideration.

First, the production of semen begins with sexual maturity and all bulls do not mature sexually at the same age. Too, bulls of European breeds show viable semen at 14 months of age in most cases. Semen evaluation in bulls of other breeds is not recommended until about 18 months of age.

Semen checks of young bulls may be very useful to determine if they are mature enough sexually to turn out with a breeding herd.

Seed treatment may pay off more this year than in the past due to the cold and rainy unfavorable weather we are having for planting now. Certain materials, when dusted on the outer surface of the seed frequently results in marked increases in yields by protecting the young seedlings from fungus and certain soil insect attacks.

The following materials are recommended for treating seeds against both seed borne and soil borne diseases: Ceresan (2%), New Improved Ceresan (5%), and Spergon are recommended for the treating of both cotton and sorghum seeds.

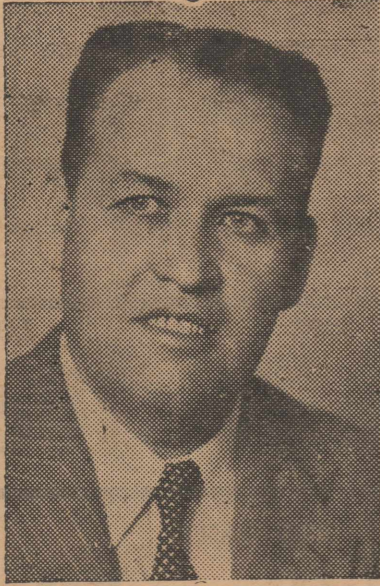
The directions given by the manufacturer should be followed in the treating of all seeds.

Good control of Southern Corn Rootworm, wireworms, and seed corn maggots has been obtained with dieldrin, lindane, or heptachlor. Dieldrin or lindane should be used at the rate of 2 ounce and heptachlor at 2 to 3 ounces of actual toxicant mixed with 100 lbs. of grain sorghum seed.

**Prominent Educator Says Russian Scientific Success Not Alarming**

Two leading educators in Dallas for the state convention of the International Delta Kappa Gamma Society spoke plain English on complex international problems. Miss Margaret Boyd of Steubenville, Ohio, international president of the society, and Dr. Mildred English of Milledge, Georgia agreed on these points:

Russian scientific success should not stampede us into abandoning either the teaching of the humanities or the goal of education for all.

The surest way to international understanding is the people-to-people approach, including the exchange of students and teachers.

Both visitors speak with authority of personal experience. Dr. English made three trips to Germany after World War II, helping first the American authorities and then the Bonn government to resurrect the German schools.

Miss Boyd, who heads the 62,000 member international organization, has attended three world-wide gatherings of teachers in Europe. She was formerly chairman of the National Education Association's international relations committee. Miss Boyd addressed the president's dinner at the convention on Friday night, and Dr. English spoke at the birthday luncheon Saturday.

Miss Boyd, an assistant superintendent of schools, is a former math teacher herself. She states "I think the mathematics and science fields need to be strengthened, but not at the expense of the humanities". She traveled in Europe one summer visiting education organizations. "I hope the time will come when every high school will have an exchange of teachers with a foreign country every few years."

Dr. English believes that Nazi teachings have been successfully rooted out and that West Germany is sincerely democratic. During occupation days she often attended meetings with Russians. "They would never compromise".

Now retired from the faculties of Peabody College and Georgia State College for Women, Dr. English is a consultant at West Georgia College and is writing a book about its unique program of adult education for rural communities.

Her thoughts as an elementary education specialist on the Johnny-can't read controversy: "Johnny's having a good time reading while they're fussing about math and science."

**Drivers License Exams Here Third Thursday**

"Has your driver's license expired?" An effort to improve Drivers License Service was revealed today by Major Wilson E. Speir, Commander of Region 4 of the

Texas Department of Public Safety. "If you once held a driver's license in Texas and still have the license in your possession, regardless of the expiration date, it may be renewed, by going to the Driver License Office." Said J. B. Hart, Captain of the Driver Licen-

se Service, Midland region.

If you hold a license that has expired within the last five years you may renew it by mailing your full name, birth date, and description, along with the statutory fee to the DPS Headquarters in Austin for a new license.

At the same time, Major Speir pointed out that Highway Patrolmen are intensifying their drivers license checks for drivers who are driving on expired licenses or no licenses at all.

"It is not the Department's desire to surprise motorists without

warning," Speir said, "So we would like to take this means of advising the public they may expect these checks any time." Major Speir pointed out, "The Department is now mailing courtesy reminders to all licensed drivers 30 days before their licenses expire and we hope

our motorists will take advantage of this reminder and re-new licenses before expiration."

Major Speir stated the Drivers License Law has been in effect almost 22 years in Texas and we feel that no driver has a legitimate excuse for not having a valid drivers license.

The Drivers License Patrolman for this area is in Rotan on the 3rd Thursday of each month for the purpose of giving examinations and accepting renewals of licenses.

### Farm Ponds Can Produce Many Fish

One of the main uses for farm ponds is often forgotten when we build one. This is for fish production. A farm pond will also provide water and cover for game birds and animals.

For best results bass and bluegills make the best combination for fish production. These must be stocked in combination because neither species is satisfactory alone.

In this area, 50 bass fingerlings and 500 bluegill fingerlings per acre are stocked in unfertilized ponds. In fertilized ponds, the stocking rate may be increased to 100 bass and 1000 bluegills per surface acre of water, while on fertilized ponds will support 200 to 600 pounds. Commercial fertilizer (8-8-2 is best) added to the water at one to two week intervals is best. Continue to apply it until the water becomes so cloudy that you can't see a white disk 12 inches deep. Additional applications should be made until frost whenever the water begins to clear.

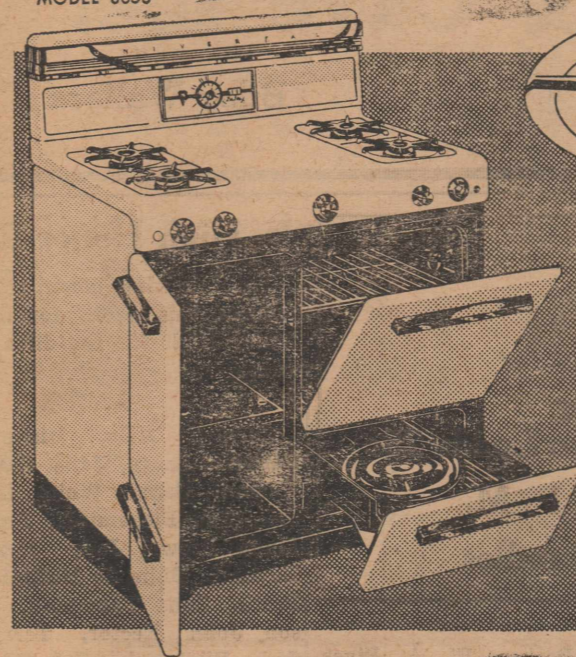

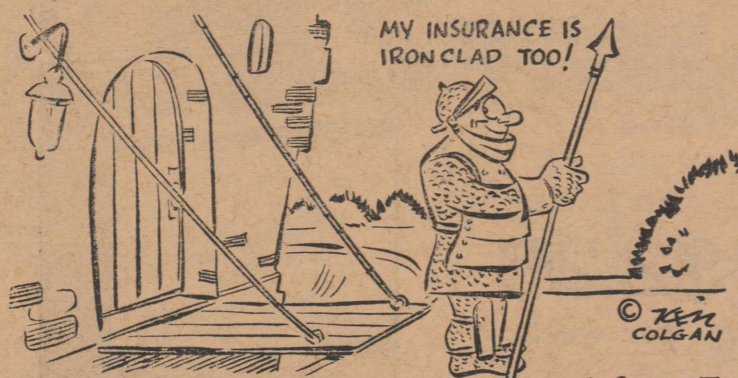
