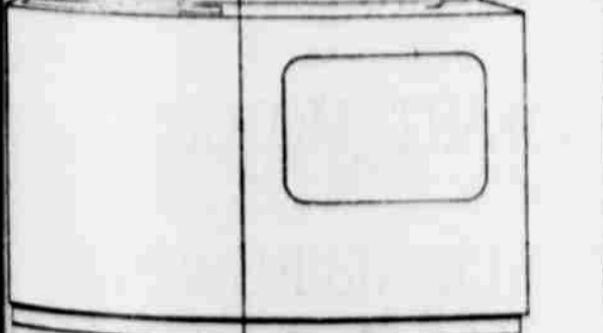

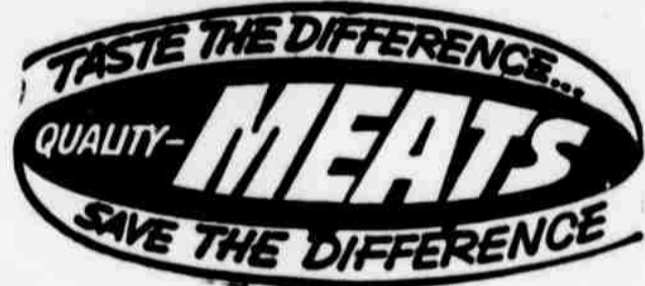

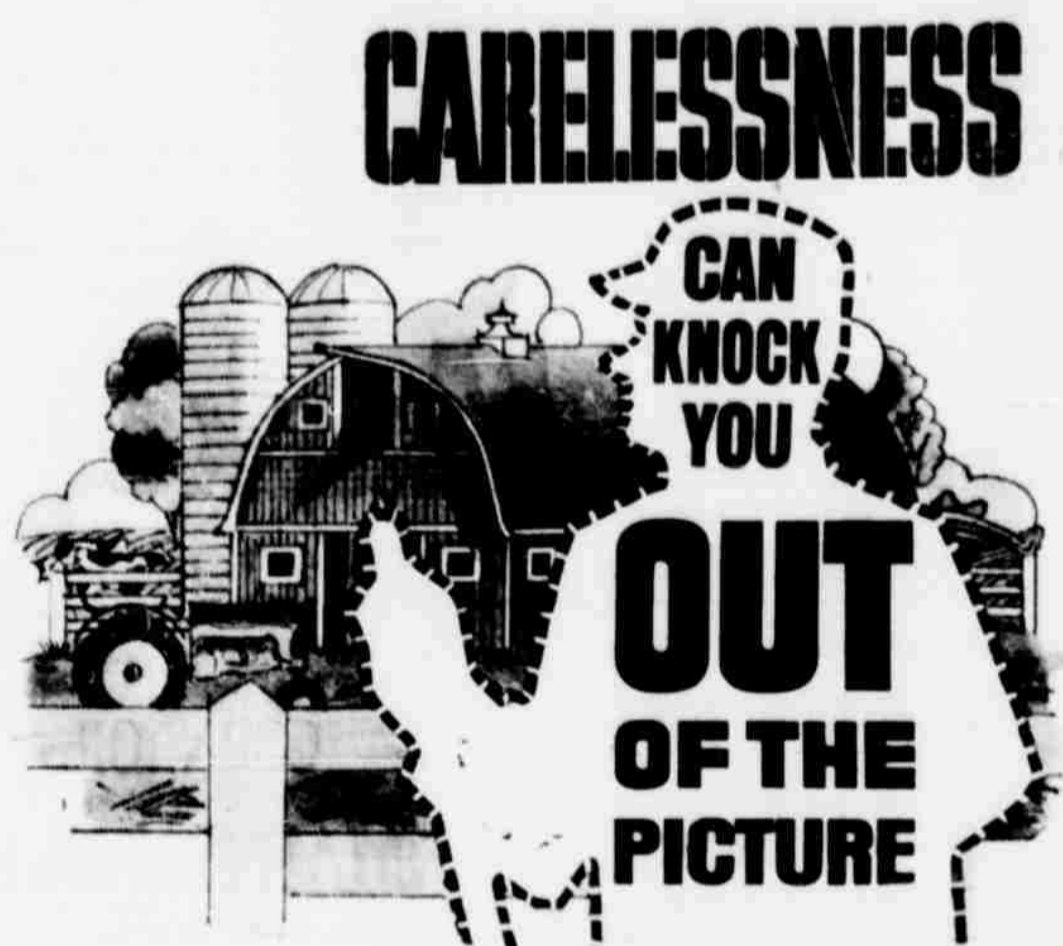

 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 cup Crisco  
 3 tsp. water  
 Mix flour and salt in a large mixing bowl. Cut Crisco into flour with pastry blender until mixture is uniform and very fine. Add water and mix until you can make a ball. Do not

work any more than you have to. Roll out to fit 9" pie pan. Put in pan, trim edges, prick bottom with fork and bake 15 minutes in 450 degree oven. Let cool.  
 1 cup unsweetened pineapple juice  
 1/2 cup orange juice  
 1 tsp. lemon juice  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 1/3 cup cornstarch

1/4 tsp. salt  
 5 beaten egg yolks  
 1 tsp. butter  
 1 tsp. vanilla  
 2 stiff-beaten egg whites  
 Mix fruit juices, add 1 1/2 cups sugar mixed with cornstarch and salt; blend. Cook in double boiler until clear and thick, stirring constantly. Add small amount of hot mixture to egg yolks; stir into remaining hot mixture and cook 2 minutes. Add butter and cool. Add vanilla and fold in egg whites. Pour into cooled baked shell. Spread with meringue made of 3 egg whites, 6 tbsp. sugar and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees 12-15 minutes.

**Lime Delight Salad**  
 1 1/2 oz. pkg. cottage cheese  
 1 6 oz. pkg. lime jello  
 1 10 oz. carton whipped topping  
 1 15 oz. can pineapple, crushed (well drained)  
 3/4 cup chopped pecans  
 Mix cottage cheese and dry jello together. Add whipped topping, pineapple, and nuts. May be garnished with nuts or fruits. Chill and serve. Makes 8 servings.
