Lovett Says Letter Is "Another Cowardly Act"

Clarksville lawyer Jim D. Lovett Tuesday termed an anonymous letter directed toward him and thrown to business and some residences in Clarksville, Deport, Detroit, Avery, Annona and Bogata as "damn lies" and "another act of cowardice."

Lovett said his investigators had turned up some evidence concerning the letter, and he felt there would be "no surprises" when the source of the letter is uncovered.
Lovett said the confusion revealed in a Paris newspaper about the FBI being involved in the case was probably centered around Del Drake of Paris, a former FBI agent and now a private investigator. "Drake, at my request and on my behalf, looked into the matter on that end of the county," Lovett stated. A Deport

businessman said he was contacted by Drake about the letters, but that there was no confusion about who he was or who he was representing.

Initially, the two page letter claims that Judge Leon Pesek appointed Lovett as the defense attorney in a

murder case as some repayment for Lovett's help in electing Pesek to his post as District Judge. Lovett said Tuesday he was appointed to

the Frugia case by Judge Henry Braswell, probably because he was the only attorney present in the courtroom when Connie Frugia

was arraigned. "I have not received a dime on this case," Lovett said. "The case has not been completed. I hope that I will receive a fee, because I have spent a lot of time on the case and I've earned it. I even spent \$1,500 of my own money for a psychiatric evaluation of Mrs. Frugia, for which Judge Pesek would not order the county to reimburse me. A later evaluation ordered by the court held up the first examination," Lovett added.

saying they "absolutely" want the case pursued. Quoting the letter, "Most people who are scared and in fear of losing their lives and have to hire armed guards for protection just get up and move out some night. Possibly, that could be the best piece of luck the City of Clarksville and the citizens of Red River County ever had."

"This is just another threat against me and my family," Lovett said. "We think the burning of the building, the threatening letter and this letter are all efforts to get us to move out of the county, but it's not just my family that's being threatened, it's everyone. If these people are allowed to get away with this, where will it stop? Who will be next?"

The letter states, "How can the county officials, who were elected by us, the taxpayers of Red River County, presume that we want to sit by and let our Sheriff's Department and other county offices be dictated to by Jim D. Lovett?"

In response, Lovett stated, "They have never investigated the arson. They have never investigated the threatening letter. They have done nothing about this character assassination. Not only can I not dictate to them, they don't even bother to do the things they are supposed to do. Not everyone can afford private investigators and private bodyguards, but why should I be expected to pay for services that should be provided by them?"

"In closing the letter states, 'The majority of this county wants Doug Jackson cleared. We believe in him. We must stand together and not allow our county government to turn its back on our Chief Deputy.'"

"This anonymous letter is just an attempt to keep this case from being settled out of court," Lovett said. "We think we have an agreement with the City of Clarksville to settle separately, with some changes in the original proposal, and should have that done this week."

Telephone Company To File For Change In Rates

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Friday, Jan. 23, filed a statewide request for increased revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) seeking \$44.6 million in annual revenues of which the company would receive \$23.2 million after taxes and uncollectibles.

The rates do not include an instrument charge, which is also to be increased under the proposal. Also not covered in the increase are long distance rates, which will not be increased.
The standard rotary dial telephone, which now costs \$1.10, would cost \$1.20. Standard touch calling telephones would increase from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Other instrument types, the present charge and the proposed charge follow: compact rotary dial, \$1.95, \$1.95; compact touch calling, \$2.40.

The request is based on financial data for a one-year period ending Sept. 30, 1980. General Telephone is the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone company in Texas serving over 1.3 million telephones in 291 exchanges across the state. Major cities served include Garland, Irving and Plano in the Dallas/Fort Worth area; Baytown and Dickinson in the Houston area; and Texarkana, San Angelo, Bryan and College Station.

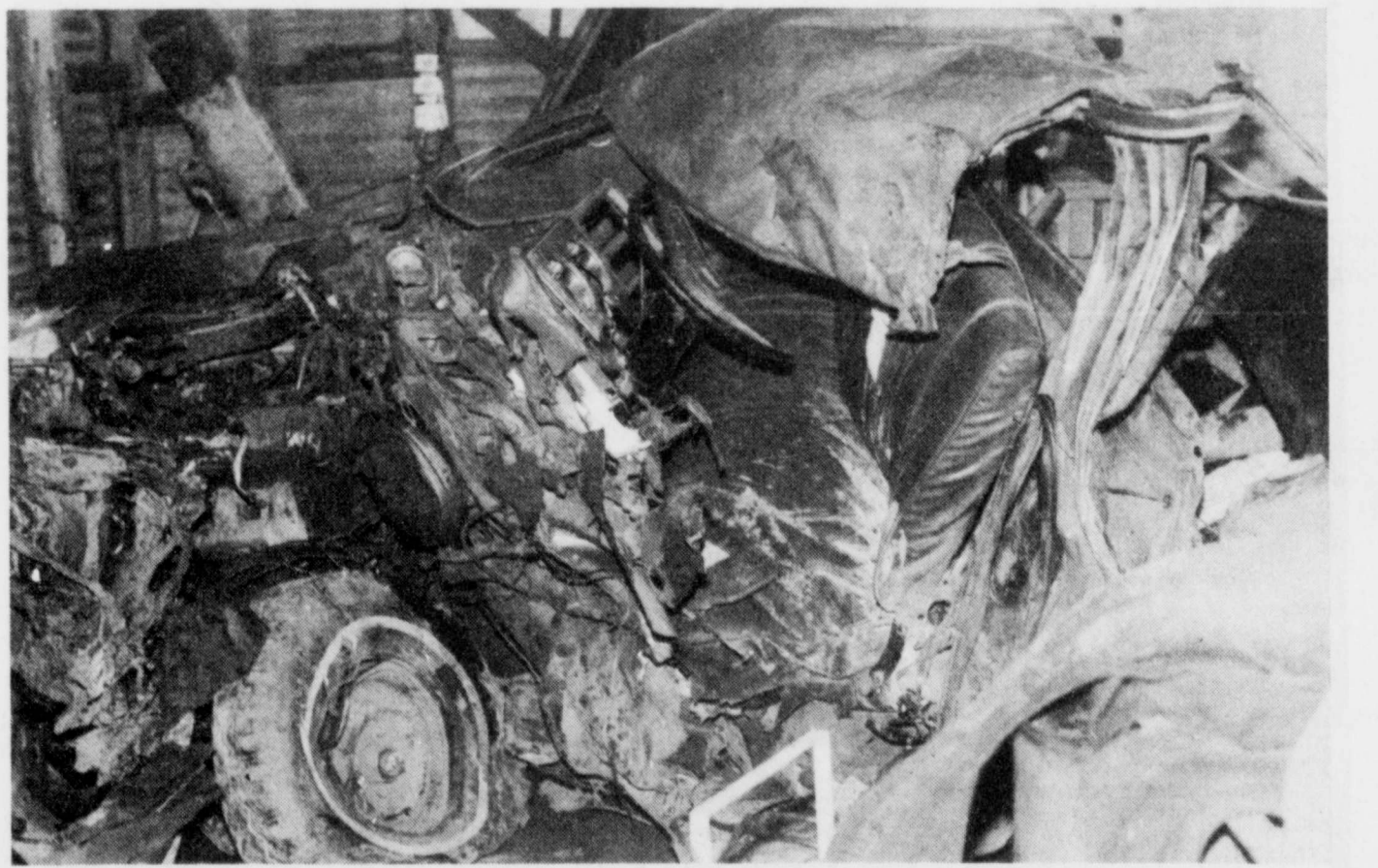

County Commissioner Joe Runyan, age 38, was driving east on U.S. Highway 82 near the Avery School when he crossed over the center line of the highway and hit the trailer of the rig.

Nosebleeds
 A small nosebleed will usually stop by itself. If bleeding continues or is severe, put the person in a chair and loosen all clothing around the neck. Apply cold compresses to the nose and back of the neck. Press the nostril on the bleeding side against the bone for about five minutes. Or, plug up the bleeding nostril with sterile cotton. Keep the patient sitting unless he feels faint.

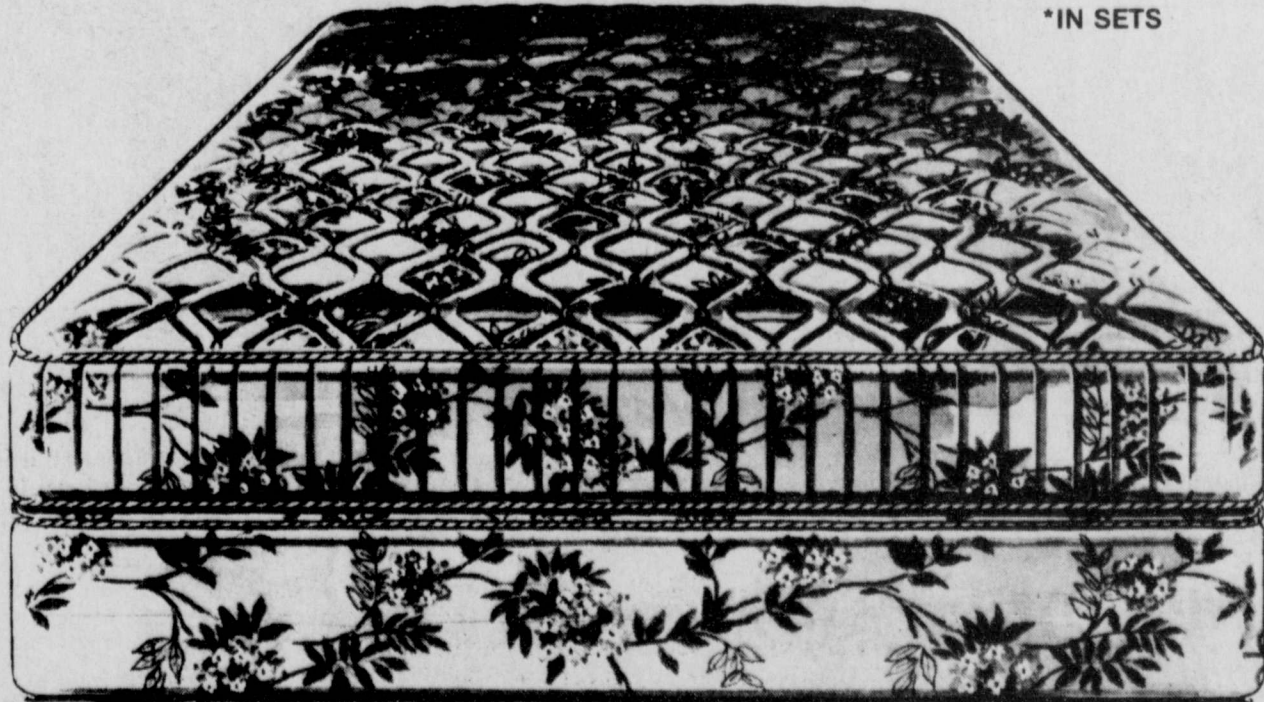

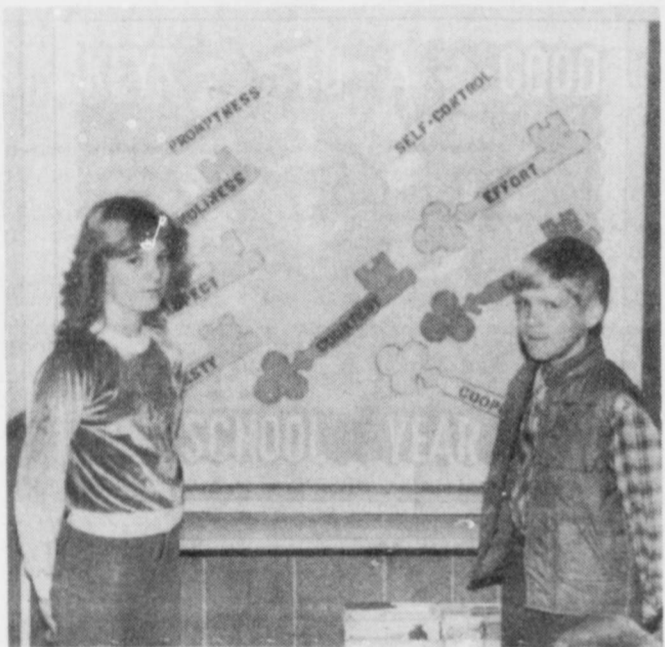
