Federal Suit Settlement Finally Agreed Upon

With the settlement of the \$300,150 Federal lawsuit that was filed against several Clarksville and Red River County Law officers, Clarksville attorney Jim D. Lovett states that he "feels that we have written the model for police review boards in the state and possibly the nation."

This is in regards to the establishment of a Police Review Board which will be able to investigate charges of police brutality, and related matters, and check into the background and approve applications for police officers.

The City and County will fund the board, and it was a key issue in the settlement of the suit.

Bike-A-Thon Scheduled

The Rev. Terry Barnett announced that the St. Jukes Hospital with headquarters in Memphis, Tenn. and Austin, Tx. will sponsor a Bike-A-Thon in the near future.

More information will be available in the next few weeks.

Barnett is the chairman of the Talco area.

The compromise also called for the resignation of Chief Deputy Doug Jackson, and he has submitted his resignation. A pledge that was earlier asked for, stating that he would not engage in law enforcement was not included in the final

agreement.

The financial terms are complicated, and were only agreed upon after hours of debate in a Thursday, March 6, meeting.

A sum of \$5000 to the plaintiffs, Gene Shadid and Peggy Mitchell, was agreed

upon, \$4000 of that coming from the county treasury, and \$1000 from the city. There is a possibility that an insurance company will contribute to the settlement for the county.

The county will also pay \$2,500 on the legal expenses

of Doug Jackson, who had retained personal counsel.

The county will also pay a \$1000 settlement with Cornett, Echols and Baird, a Paris law firm the county retained for Deputy Dispatcher Kelly Slaton.

The City of Clarksville has

already paid local attorney Jack O. Herrington for representing Patrolman Donald Parks earlier in the case, and will settle with Clarksville attorney Austin Guest and Paris attorney Hardy Moore who acted as counsel for the City of Clarksville and Parks.

Several other points were agreed upon in the settlement, which has been a drawn-out affair. The

compromise had been close to agreement once before, but Jackson and his attorney would not agree to all the terms. That brought about the withdrawal of the City and County and more negotiations took place.

Lovett stated that he felt that "Gene Shadid and Peggy Mitchell, the plaintiffs, had had to change their life styles during the course of this suit and deserved a lot

of credit for their courage in staying with the suit."

Agreement on the suit was not unanimous in either the county commissioners meeting or the city meeting, but after much careful deliberation it was agreed to accept the compromise agreement.

Lovett also stated that now that the law suit was settled "we're going to get to work on the fire, and find out who burned my office."

Rivercrest Rebels Fall To Top-Ranked Sabine

The Rivercrest Rebels faced the number one ranked team in their class Tuesday night at Gladewater. The Rebels knew they had a tough game to play, and they were right. The Sabine Cardinals, armed with superior height and playoff experience, defeated the Rebels 70-36.

Coach Wake Wood said of his team, "We wished we could have played better, we didn't play our best game, and are really a better team than we showed to be Tuesday night." He also stated that the Sabine Cardinals had a great deal more experience than the Rebels, four of their starters having been at the State Championships last year when Sabine captured the state AA title.

The score in the first quarter was what really put the Rebels in serious trouble. The first quarter ended 23-7, and it was a lead that the Rebels were never able to overcome. Even though the boys played Sabine even the second and third quarter, that first quarter lead was just too much.

By the fourth quarter both teams were substituting freely and Sabine outscored the Rivercrest boys 19 to 5. Sabine is rated to have the best chance at a Championship this year, and Coach Wood says that he hopes that the Rivercrest team gained a lot of experience which the young Rebel players can use to their advantage in next year's play.

Viterna Discusses County Jail At Meeting

Robert Viterna, Executive Director of Texas Commission on Jail Standards, met with Red River County officials and residents Monday evening, March 2, 1981, for a discussion concerning the need for improvement of county jail facilities.

In an earlier meeting with county commissioners during a statewide conference at Texas A&M, Viterna advised them that the Red River County Jail would be closed by the end of the year unless a firm plan was formulated for either renovation or construction of a new jail.

According to County Judge Connie Sullivan, Viterna inspected the jail before the meeting began in the district courtroom of the county courthouse.

"He said that the jail was cleaner than it had ever been but that the county would still be in serious trouble if anyone was ever hurt at the jail," Judge Sullivan said. "Mr. Viterna reviewed the history of the Jail Standards

Commission and how it was formed to set minimum standards for jail facilities," Judge Sullivan added.

"Viterna also said that the main reason the commission was created was to keep the federal courts from intervening in the county jail system," Judge Sullivan said.

Approximately 50 people were in attendance at the meeting.

Viterna pointed out to the group that the use of padlocks on the cell doors instead of an automatic system by which the doors could be opened in the event of fire was among the chief complaints, Judge Sullivan said.

A survey drafted by the commissioners' court in a Monday morning session was distributed during the meeting to study the opinions of the audience.

"Only two of the 25 people who returned the forms said they were in favor of renovating the present jail," Judge Sullivan said.

Fifteen of those surveyed

said they were in favor of a \$350,000 loan application to the Farmers Home Administration by the county to finance the construction of a new jail.

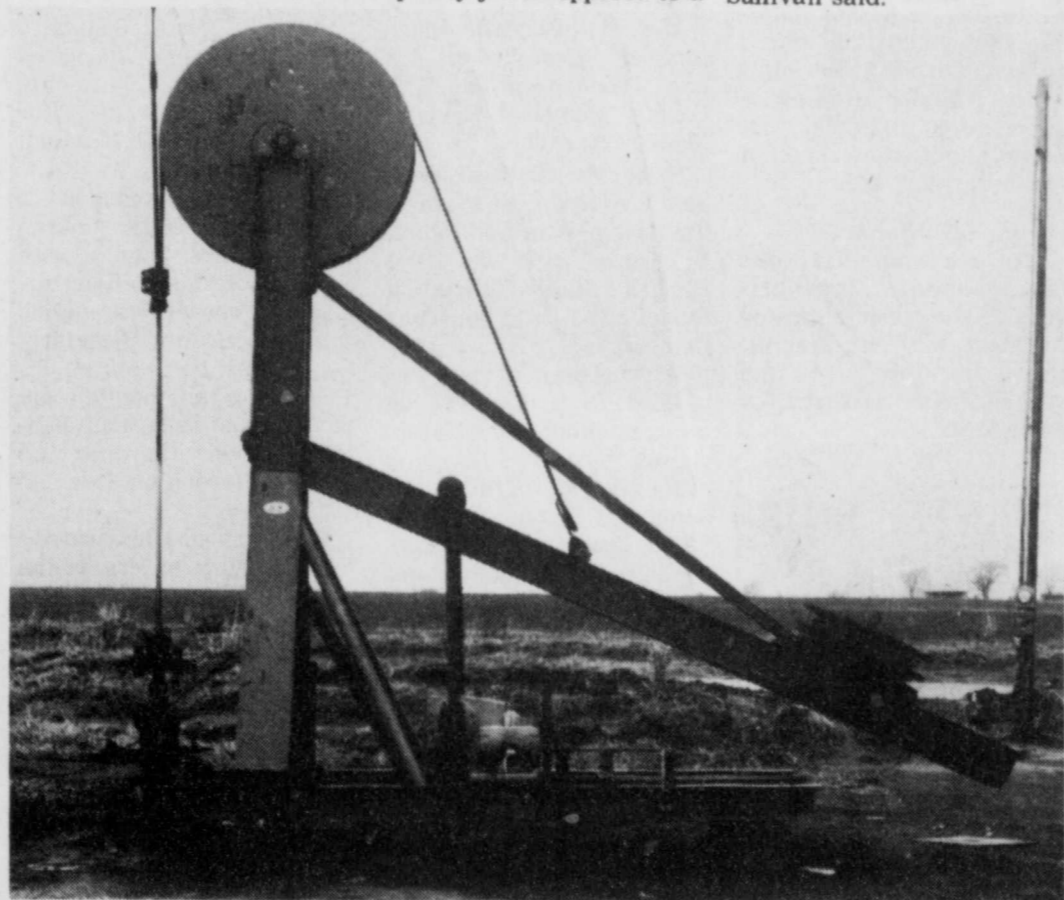
"The rest favored con-

struction of a new jail no matter how it was financed," Judge Sullivan said.

According to Judge Sullivan, Viterna supported construction of a 24 prisoner capacity jail as opposed to a

smaller facility as was discussed during the meeting.

"Viterna said a 12-man jail would be certified but that it would have to be expanded within 12 years," Judge Sullivan said.

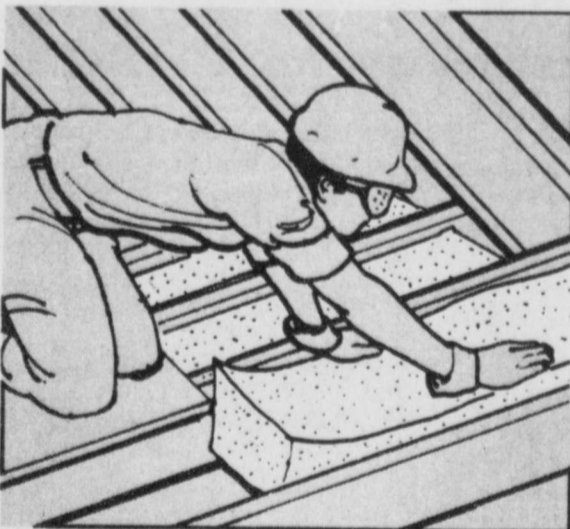

East Texas Eating

Fresh garden lettuces, are in my opinion, pure luxury!

For the last couple of winters now, we have been able to mulch several volunteer Bibb lettuce seedlings through the cold weather with the aid of a blanket of loose hay. We pulled the hay back a couple of weeks ago. The little Bibb plants that had been hovering close to the ground promptly responded to the sun's warming rays by sending forth tender, bright green leaves. The plants even survived last night's chilling 32 degrees. We will be able to begin to snip the outer leaves for salads in the next few days. The wintered-over Bibb plants will bolt to flower and seed about the time the lettuces we planted in mid-February reach their peak. Meanwhile though, we will enjoy their tender, fresh goodness.

Add some new lettuces to your garden this spring. Or, border a flower bed with them. Lettuces can take some filtered shade. They do like adequate moisture and a fairly loose soil. Work some mature compost or old barnyard soil that is rich in humus into the row before planting as well as a light application of commercial fertilizer and the bright green lettuces will reward you amply.

Black Seeded Simpson that sends forth the familiar yellow-green loose leaves is the old-timey favorite in our East Texas Area. Romaine, Bibb, Buttercrunch, Salad Bowl, Prize Head, Ruby, and Oak Leaf are other loose-leaf or loosely heading varieties that grow beautifully locally and yield leaves of marvelous texture and flavor.

Romaine yields tall, crisp leaves that form loose heads 10 inches or so tall. Give Romaine a little shade from late spring's hot sun and it will go on into early summer. Bibb yields a smaller, tender rosette of bright green leaves. I like to use the young leaves whole in salads and on hamburgers.

The red-tinged sweet Prize Head leaves and the sparkling red, crisp ones of Ruby perk up any salad and are a joy to behold in the garden. Oak-Leaf lettuce looks unbelievable like its namesake and has a very

mild flavor. It stands up to more heat than most lettuces and therefore can be planted on up to late spring.

Plant and care for these lettuces as you do Black Seeded Simpson. Most of these do like a little more room between the plants as they begin to grow. So, when two or three leaves have formed, thin to four or five inches apart. As the larger leafed varieties—Romaine, Prizehead, Ruby, and Salad Bowl, grow, continue to thin to allow room for the plants to reach their peak.

Enjoy the tender goodness of the lettuce thinnings. Here are some ideas to try:

+ They make marvelous additions to soups.

+ Mix with Romaine from the grocery store and toss lightly with a cream and vinegar dressing.

+ Keep salad dressings light and with just enough seasoning to compliment the delicate flavors of the young lettuce leaves. Try this dressing: Combine equal parts of fresh salad oil and red wine vinegar with a whiff of garlic and freshly ground white pepper and a bit of finely minced parsley or

dried parsley. If the dressing is a little vinegary for you, add a bit of water. Shake well before pouring lightly over the salad greens.

+ Try the old-timey East Texas favorite, Wilted Lettuce:

2 slices bacon;
1 onion, sliced;
5 cups chopped lettuce;
2 Tbsp. vinegar;
3 Tbsp. sugar;
dash of freshly ground pepper;
1 tsp. salt.

Brown bacon in skillet until crisp. Remove bacon; add sugar, salt and pepper to drippings. While the drippings are still hot, add the vinegar and pour over cleaned and chopped lettuce and onion. Mix well; garnish with bacon bits and serve. For a change, add a chopped, boiled egg.

CUTTING FOOD COSTS

A little Yankee ingenuity will hold down those grocery bills. Buy dark green and bright orange vegetables, they are high in vitamins. Broccoli and collard greens rate high while peas and green beans are farther down the list.

Fresh orange concentrated juices are a better buy than the "drinks". Ales and juice drinks all have sugar and water added. Remember that orange juice is a whole food that has other nutrients as well as vitamin C.

Eating eggs for supper instead of breakfast is a protein bargain when cost per pound is figured. Omelets with cheese and sauted onion filling or chopped vegetables, bits of meat, cheese, herbs and seasoning added to scrambled eggs is great. Fried potatoes with eggs is a quick, nutritious meal.

Make homemade toast in the morning instead of the high priced bakery pastries found in the supermarket aisles. Sales in fast food outlets show another way consumers are spending more for a very simple meal.

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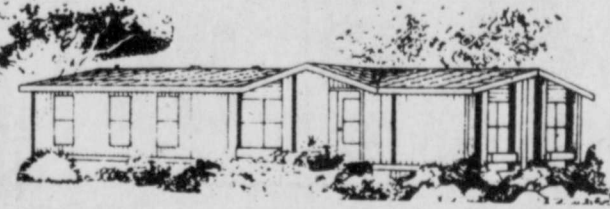

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT AMENDMENT

City of Deport, P.O. Box 354, Deport, Texas 75435 has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for an amendment to Permit No. 10741-01 to install a new oxidation pond treatment facility with an increased design capacity. The existing permit authorizes a discharge of 32,000 gallons per day. The applicant proposes to construct an oxidation pond system consisting of an aerated lagoon followed by a facultative pond and two stabilization ponds with a design capacity of 183,000 gallons per day. The proposed amendment would also revise the effluent discharge limitations consistent with Department criteria for oxidation pond systems.

The plant is to be located approximately 3 miles east of FM Road 1503 and approximately 1 mile south of U.S. Highway 271 in Lamar County, Texas. The effluent is discharged to Mustang Creek; thence to the Sulphur River.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapter 25 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources. No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address, and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the waste discharge permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

Local Mayors Attend Meeting

On March 4 the Paris Chamber of Commerce was host to about 75 or 80 people who were in Paris at the Best Western Inn to plan for the Green Carpet Route that will join the South Coast of Texas with the mid western part of the country.

The meeting was to regenerate interest in the Green Carpet Route which is the shortest route from the mid-west to the South Texas Coast. The Paris Chamber of Commerce sponsored the meeting which was attended by the Executive Director of the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority, the director of the Indian Nations Turnpike, Mr. Robert Thompson of the

Texas Highway Department, who outlined the route from the Oklahoma state line to the Gulf Coast. The route is a total of 326 miles in the state of Texas, and will go through some of the most scenic part of the state.

There will be a rest station on the Texas side of the river, with an information board on each side of the highway.

The Paris Chamber of Commerce was mainly responsible for getting the rest stops and information

board approved. Along the entire route there will be nineteen picnic areas, with four comfort stations. It will basically follow Hwy. 271 from the Red River to the end of 271 where it will then pick up Hwy. 59 down to the coast. The Big Thicket will be on the route, as will some of the other historical parts of the state.

Some of the route will go through Paris, Deport, Bogata, Mt. Pleasant, Talco, Kilgore, Nacadoches and many others.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS

The Talco-Bogata Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exist in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 632-5205.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Rivercrest High School.

Weekly Ag Update

By Herb Brevard Many people throughout East Texas are in the process of planting gardens and vegetable crops. Home gardeners time the planting of their crops in various ways. Many plant by the moon or by signs and dates handed down from generation to generation.

According to Dr. Terry Menges, area horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the most accurate means of timing planting is by the soil temperature. Crops such as beets, broccoli and onions can be planted and expected to germinate when the soil temperature reaches 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

Beans and corn should be planted when the soil temperature reaches 65 degrees and the average last frost date is reached, usually from

mid-March to early April. Tomatoes, okra, eggplant, squash and cucumbers should be planted when the soil temperature reaches 75 degrees Fahrenheit.

A soil thermometer can be purchased at many garden centers and supply stores throughout the area at a nominal cost. Using soil temperature as a guide, gardeners can more accurately time the planting of their crops and reduce losses and poor stands which develop from planting into a soil which is too cool.

Management strategy such as this will help the gardener get a better start in producing vegetables at a lower cost.



Tax Pamphlet Available

Cornelia Dickey, tax assessor-collector for the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District, announces the availability of a twelve page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

This pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of the Property Tax Code, which was passed

by the 66th Legislature in 1979.

Resident homeowners are eligible for a \$5000 school homestead exemption and certain disabled persons and those age 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their property.

"Taxpayers who were 65 or older on January 1 of this year are also entitled to a school tax freeze on the tax bill for their house and yard. The elderly must make application to get the freeze in 1981 or retain one acquired in 1979 or 1980," the school assessor added.

Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. also provides an additional \$3000 exemption from market value for persons aged 65 or older on a local exemption.

District residents are encouraged to review this pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period ends on April 1. The school tax office is located at the Rivercrest High School and the telephone number is 632-5205.
