Out Of Court Settlement Reached In Ambulance Suit

The class action lawsuit filed on behalf of Loyd Ambulance Service subscribers against the service has been settled out of court over the weekend. The suit had been scheduled for jury trial in the 102nd District Court during the week of April 27th, but a spokesman for Jim D. Lovett, attorney for the subscribers, stated that settlement for an unspecified

amount had been reached over the past weekend. The suit was filed in August of 1979 by a committee consisting of Duane Benson, Olen Douglas, Bobby Brem and James Wood, who had retained Clarksville Attorney Jim D. Lovett as counsel. The action, which had included virtually all the members of the Loyd Am-

bulance Service as plaintiff's charged the service with deceptive practices, and asked that Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Loyd, operators of the service either refund the fee charged to subscribers or fulfill the service for the year. It was estimated that 2800 citizens of Red River County had been members of the commerial ambulance

service, and those memberships had ranged from \$20 for an individual to \$30 per family. The service had located in Red River County in the summer of 1978, and after a year of operation conducted a massive membership drive in the summer of 1979, and then abruptly discontinued the service in the county in September of 1979, leaving

the county without an ambulance service, and the subscribers without services for their money. The settlement provides for a monetary payback of the funds that had been paid to the service. Since the discontinuation of services by Loyds the Red River Ambulance Service, a non-profit corporation has been organized, and is now serving the county.

Water Well Will Provide For Needs

The City Council of Bogata looked to the future recently, and let a contract for the drilling of a second water well to provide water for the city of Bogata. The well will provide extra water for the present, and

will also be sufficient to keep the city from suffering a future shortage as the town grows. During the scorching hot month of July last summer

the motor on the present well burned out. For four or five days only small wells were available, and the shortage of water nearly became a problem. If during that period there had been a large

fire, controlling it would have been impossible. The city at that time began consideration of a new, large well, which would provide a backup system and also help to handle increasing water needs in the future.

The well is now in the process of being drilled, and so far reports look good that it will be able to provide plenty of good water for the city of Bogata, both now and in times to come.

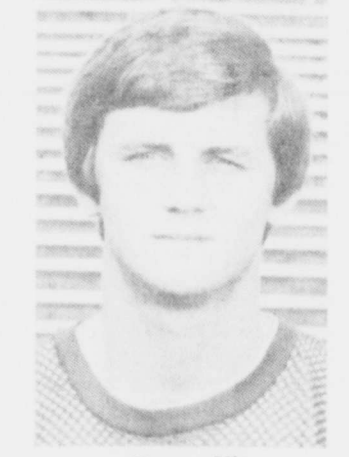
Rivercrest Math Students Compete

Twenty Rivercrest Math students recently took the annual High School Mathematics Examination. This was the second year for Rivercrest students to be involved in this testing program. Rivercrest competed against all classes of schools from AAAAA to A. The top three students scores were combined to give a team score. Rivercrest had the highest team score for any AA school in Texas. Also, only one AAA school was higher than Rivercrest. Rivercrest outscored several

AAAAA schools in the testing program also. There were a total of 21,320 students in Texas that took the exam. The three top scoring students for Rivercrest were Timmy Daniels, Lisa Thompson, and Pam Mauldin. Several other Rivercrest students were close behind these three.

Requests for transfers for 1981-82 school year need to be filed by May 1, 1981. Forms may be picked up at the



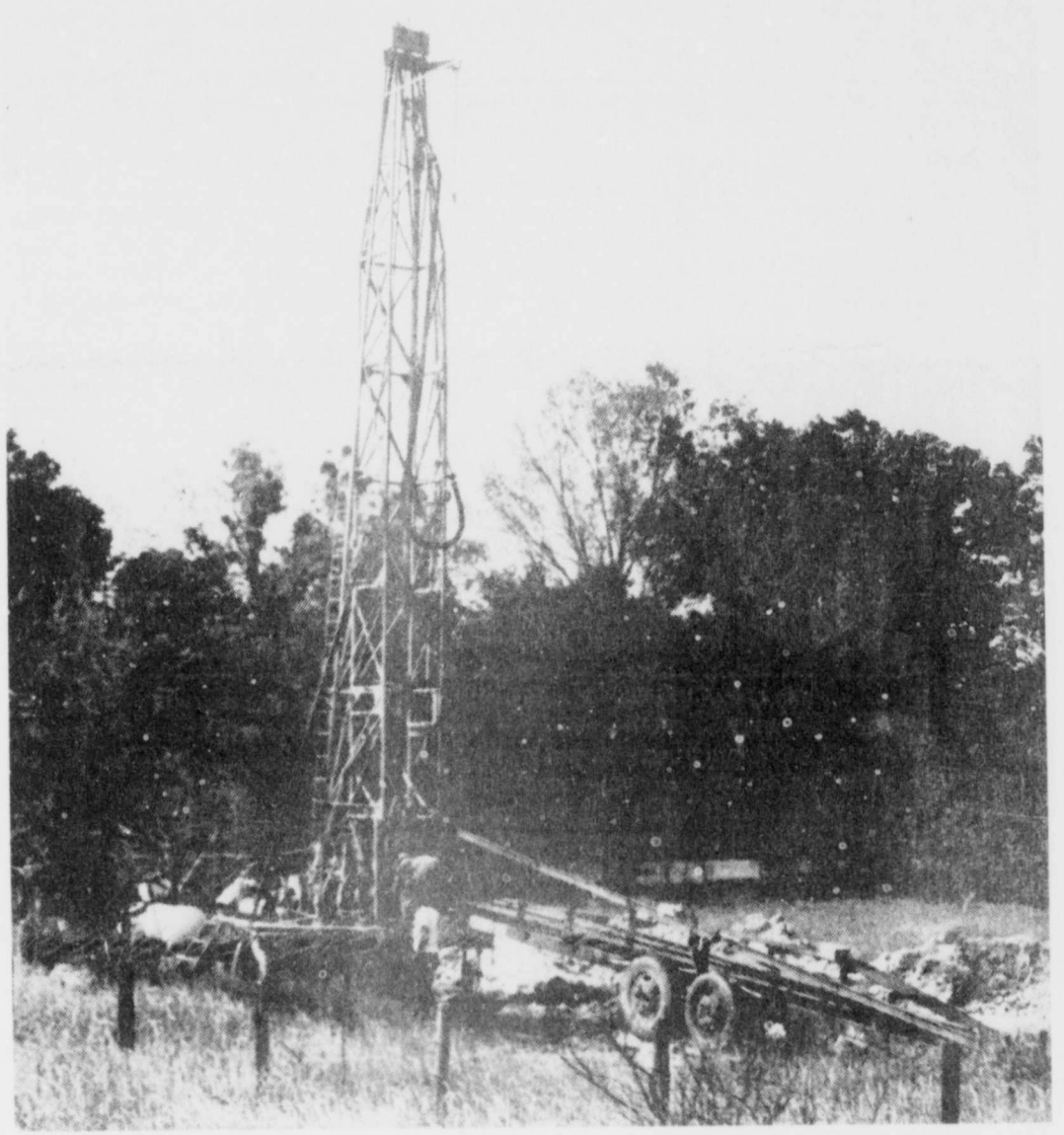

east of Bogata, is completed. Tom Wright and Kenneth Waller are working on the drilling,

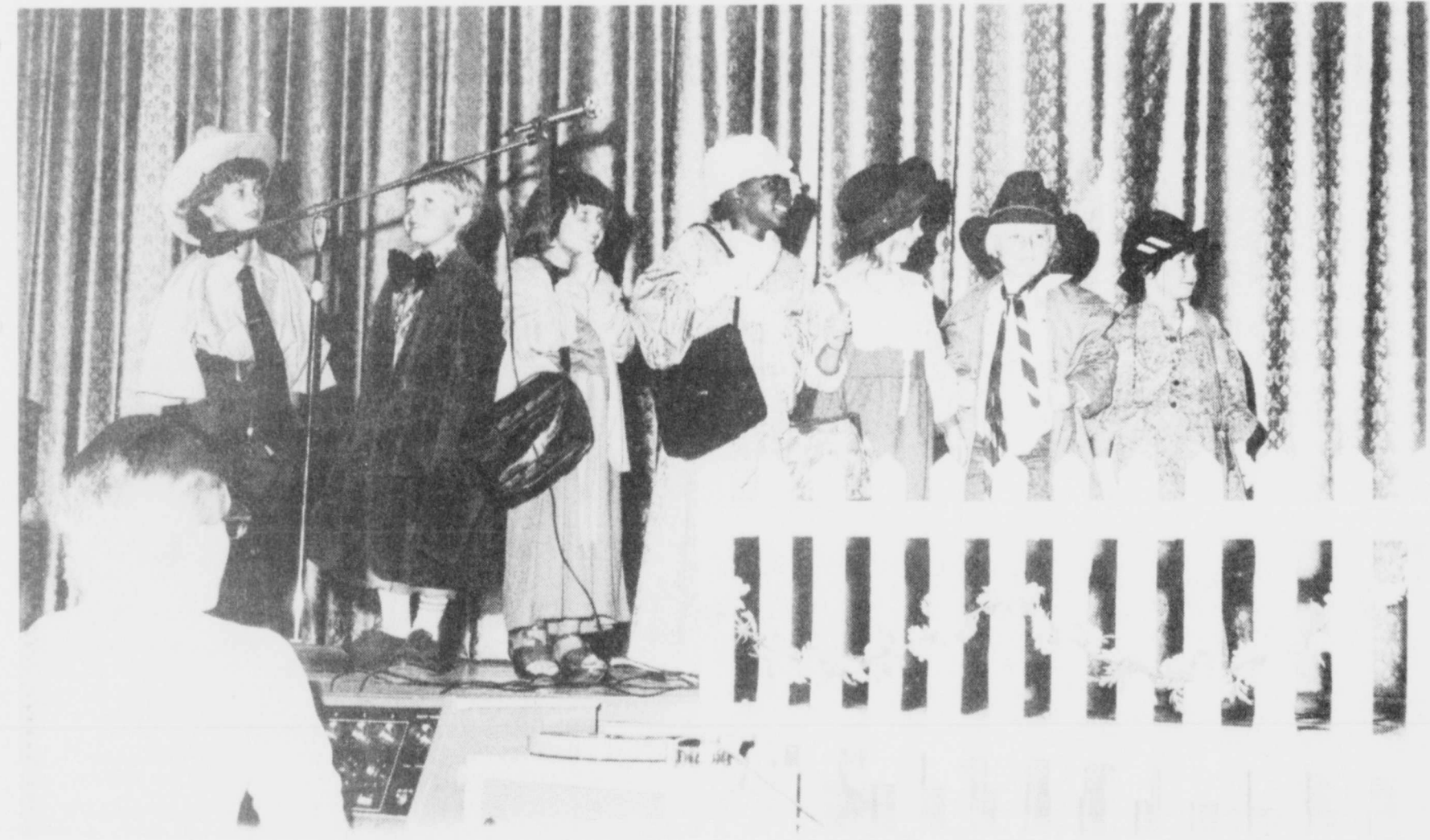

Talco-Bogata Board Organizes

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session on Tuesday, April 14, 1981 at 7:00 p.m. The first item on the agenda was the reorganization of the new Board and the swearing in of newly elected members. Board officers for the year were elected as follows: John Ward, president; Gene Smith, vice-president; and Kenneth Jeffery, secretary. Newly elected members Donald Ray Jones, Dr. E.E. Brooks, and Jerry Russell took the oath and were sworn into office.

The meeting was held at the Talco Elementary School for the purpose of touring the building and looking at the classrooms arrangements and use being made of the building as it might relate to

the proposed heating and air conditioning project which is under study. The Board was impressed with the use being made of the building in that many of the teachers are given double rooms which makes it possible to set up various study centers and creates a better learning situation. The feeling was expressed that an effort should be made to maintain the present use being made of the building if at all feasible to do so. The Board continued to discuss various factors related to the heating and air conditioning of the building with the hopes that some firm action can be made in the near future. Tillman Hale, Rivercrest principal, met with the Board to present information and discuss some matters concerning the high school program for next school year. In other matters, the Board adopted a resolution endorsing the Community Concept of education, approved a revised employee contract form, and approved the various financial reports. An executive session was held for the purpose of discussing personnel matters. Various auxiliary personnel were employed for the 1981-82 school year as recommended. In final action, it was agreed that the Board would begin meeting at 7:30 p.m. with the May meeting during Daylight Saving Time. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, May 12, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Red River Co. Horse Show Scheduled May 9

The Annual Red River County 4-H Horse Show is scheduled for Saturday, May 9th.

The show will be conducted at the Bogata Rodeo Arena in Bogata, Texas. Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m. and the show will begin at 9:00 a.m. Trophies and Rosettes will be given through sixth place.

There will be Mare and gelding Halter classes, Showmanship and 12 performance events. There will be four age groups and a high point trophy will be given for each age group. Everyone is invited to attend.

At the show there will be

three age groups plus four, eight and under classes. One high point trophy will be given in each age group. First place will receive trophies, with second through sixth place receiving rosettes. Plaques and 18" rosettes will be given for Grand, and plaques and 12" rosettes will be given for Reserve. Contestants must enter showmanship to be eligible for high point.

Halter classes will begin at 9:00 a.m. and there will be a \$3.00 per entry-per class charge. Classes are: Reg. Mares 4 yrs. and under; Reg. 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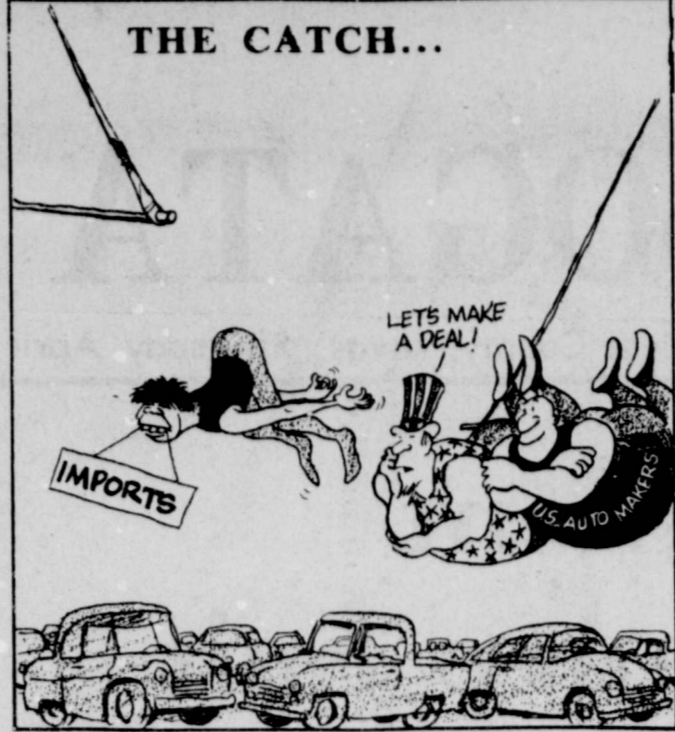

Refreshments of raw vegetable snacks, cheese and cracker, and V-8 juice were served by Mary Joblin

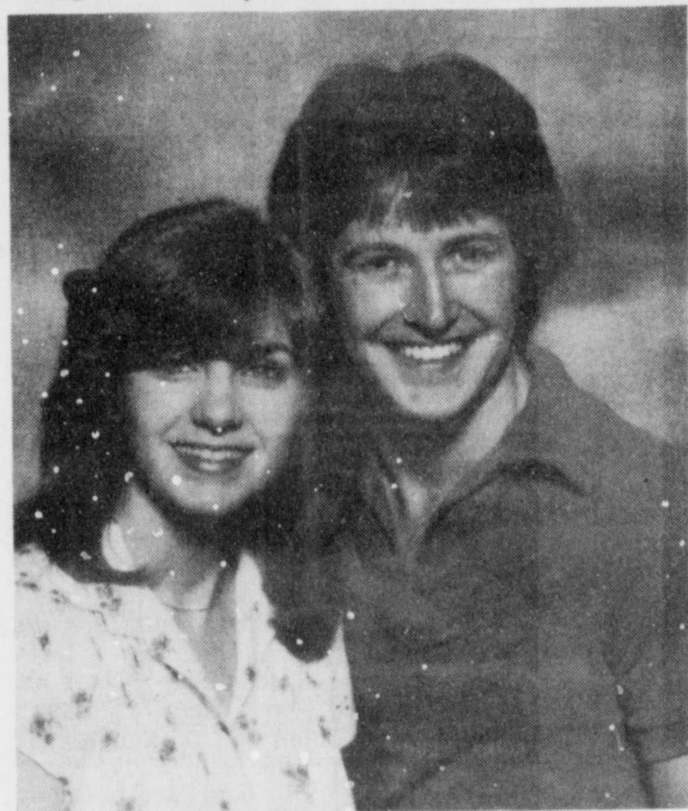

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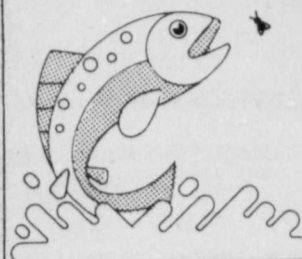

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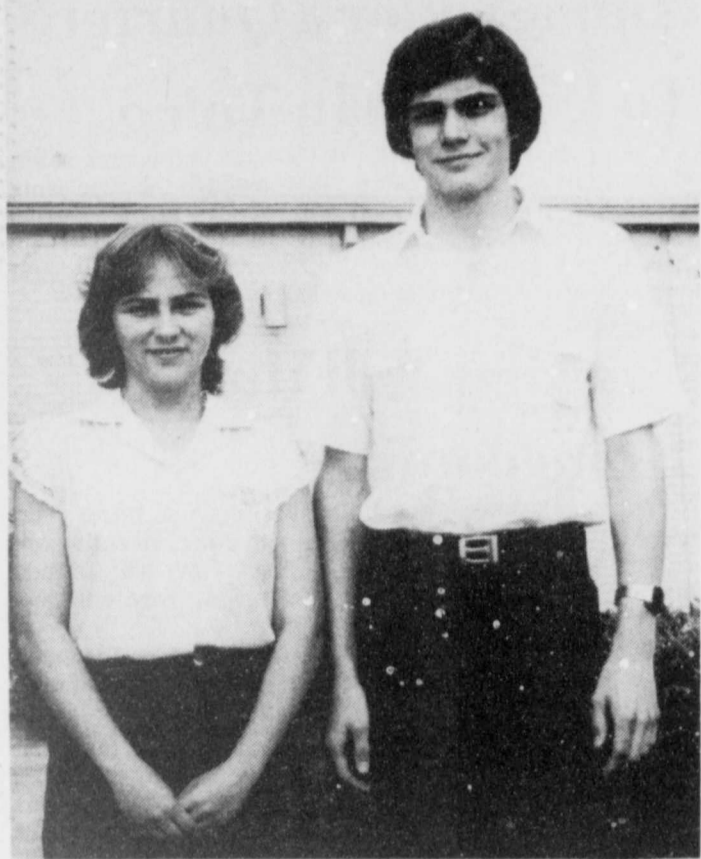

The meeting was adjourned by singing Faith of Our Fathers and praying the Mizpah.

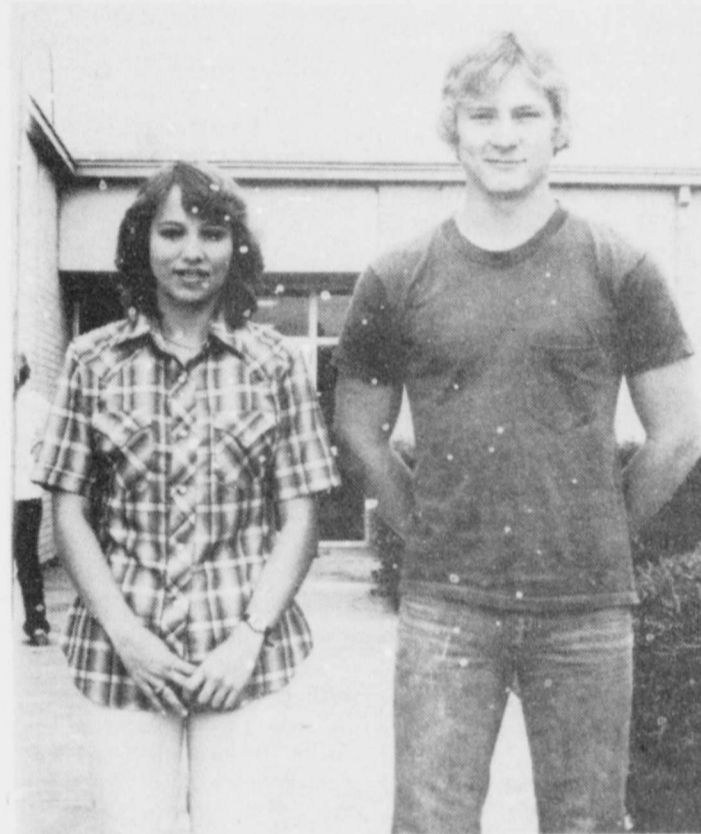
