## Petitions, Resolutions Oppose Chemical Dumping

Serious concern over the effects, both long-range and short, that a chemical waste dumping facility located near Cunningham might cause, have started the circulation of a petition throughout the area.

Citizens are being urged to sign these petitions, which will be sent to the Texas Water Commission, several other state agencies, Rep. L.P. Patterson, Senator Ed Howard, and congressman Sam B. Hall in order to

register with them the concern felt over the proposal.

The petition reads: The names of the persons whose signatures are affixed hereto are all residents and/or landowners of the area in Lamar County, Franklin County, and Red River County, Texas surrounding the proposed site for chemical waste disposal by Chem-Security, Inc. and by our signature strongly affirm our opposition to the

designation of any tract of land in or adjacent to our communities as a site for the dumping and/or disposal of chemical waste, industrial waste, or any other such similar material as proposed by Chem-Security, Inc.

It is our collective opinion that the location of such a facility in this area could or will be injurious to the health of area residents and detrimental to the value of property in and adjacent to

such site.

We feel strongly that the waste generated by industrial, chemical and other facilities in a particular area should be disposed of in or adjacent to the area where such waste is, and should not be transported to our community for disposal. We feel further that the problem of chemical, industrial and other waste disposal is created by the unwillingness

of those creating the waste to devise a proper and suitable method of disposition and that we, as citizens of this community, should not be imposed upon against our will and made to live with such a problem against our choosing.

The effect on our immediate community is potentially serious, however, it is not only serious here but also potentially dangerous to those who are removed from

our area, namely, the residents along the boundaries of the Sulphur River and ultimately the residents of the City of Texarkana and several smaller Northeast Texas towns. The proposed dump site is in the watershed of the Sulphur River, which is the source of water for Lake Wright Patman. This lake is the primary water source for the City of Texarkana and several other Northeast Texas towns.

In addition to the above cited reasons for opposing the location of a chemical or industrial waste disposal site in our neighborhood, we feel strongly that such is extremely detrimental to the quality of life of our families, our children and their children for years to come.

By our own choice, we chose to live in this vicinity. The major attraction is the clean environment and we intend to strive to the utmost to keep it that way, clean and free of chemical and industrial waste from areas foreign to our own.

We urge that you join us in this effort to keep this pestilence from our midst and it is our sincere appeal that Chem-Security, Inc. be denied a permit to construct such a waste disposal in our community.

Petitions are available to sign at City Drug Store in Deport, the First National Bank of Deport in Deport, Buckman's Drug Store in Bogata, Alexander's Grocery in Pattonville, Musgrove Store in Cunningham, Taylortown, and Sulphur Bluff.

Anyone wanting to register their protest should sign the petition, and might also consider calling or writing their congressman and representatives on a state and local level.

In addition to the petition the County Commissioners Court of Red River County, and Judge Connie Sullivan have signed a resolution

stating their opposition to the proposal.

It reads: On this the 11th day of May, 1981, the Commissioners' Court of Red River County, Texas met in Regular Session. Whereupon, among other proceedings had, the following Resolution was, upon motion made and duly seconded, adopted, to-wit:

Whereas a dumping ground for hazardous waste has been proposed by Chem-Security System, Incorporated, and Whereas, the proposed site is located in the south-western portion of Red River County, and Whereas, the proposed site is located within the Sulphur River Watershed, and Whereas water is one of our most vital of all scarce resources, and Whereas the citizens of Red River County have expressed grave concern over the proposed chemical dump site, and Whereas, Chem-Security Systems, Inc. has not met with any local officials to explain the proposed project; Therefore, be it resolved by the commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas that we strongly oppose any chemical dump site being located in the Sulphur River Watershed and further urge that the Texas Department of Water Resources require Chem-Security Systems, Inc. to have public hearings in the effected area of the proposed site and give an

## White Speaks On Education, Prisons

The Democratic Party is not to blame in the recent rulings of Federal Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler concerning bilingual education and the state prison system, according to Attorney General Mark White, speaker at a Democratic Party Workshop in Sulphur Springs at the Hopkins County Civic Center Saturday, May 9.

Even though Justice is a Democrat, White said the bilingual education case was introduced during the administration of Richard M. Nixon, as was the prison case.

White admitted that the Texas Prison System is in trouble, however, adding that 80% of the inmates are from four cities, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio. There are 32,000 prisoners in the system, White said, with each costing

Recognizing that there are 60 different languages spoken in Texas, White called for intense instruction in English for children in grades K-5, rather than hiring 20,000 Spanish speaking teachers to teach in Spanish.

The state's public education taxpayers \$8.50 a day, far below the national average, because Texas prisoners have to work. With 70% of the prisoners convicted of theft, because they didn't want to work, White asserted that the work program in Texas prisons is a good one.

tion system and the farm to market roads were built by Democrats, White said, adding that Republicans in this state have never been for public education and public roads.

White concluded by saying that Democrats provided better government in Texas at lower cost.

Among the 100 attending the workshop were Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan, Red River County Clerk Mary Hausler, John Howison of Bogata, Bettie Pace of Clarksville, Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher, Franklin County Democratic Party Chairman Vatra Solomon and Bob and Pat Wright of Mt. Vernon.

Fifteen counties were represented at the workshop, which dealt with voter registration, working with volunteers, precinct conventions and clubs and organizations.

Bob Slagle of Sherman, State Party Chairman, spoke to the group briefly and conducted part of the workshop. Also attending were former State Democratic Executive Committee (SDEC) members Leta Davis, Gladys Stockton and Jim Allison.

## Core Sample Results Expected For Dumping Site

Results from core drilling tests made in Red River County for the possible location of a chemical waste disposal site are expected late this week or early next week, according to Roger Nelson, business development manager with Chem-Security Systems of Bellevue, Wash.

Chem-Security has an option to buy 310 acres of land in Red River County just north of Sulphur River, near the Franklin/Lamar County lines from John Ward, an area farmer from Fulbright.

Company representatives were in Austin, Bogata and Mt. Vernon in late April trying to talk with state legislators Ed Howard, L. P. (Pete) Patterson and a few local people about the Texas site.

Chuck Johnson, a legislative aide for Oregon State Representative Tom Throop, said Monday, "The Oregon DEQ was never instructed to monitor the place, (in Oregon) just given general jurisdiction," Johnson said.

"The tanks (at the Oregon

site) themselves appear to be well protected," Johnson said. "They (Chem-Security) seem to be doing a pretty good job there."

The lack of monitoring by state agencies in Oregon seems to be covered by federal agencies, however, with the Environmental Protection Agency monitoring the transportation of hazardous waste, according to Diana Dutton with the agency's office in Dallas.

Bruce Elliott, chief enforcement officer with the EPA in Dallas, said that Federal law allows the im-

portation of hazardous waste, but requires that EPA be notified in advance of the importation. The EPA officer indicated that they were aware that waste was coming into the area from Canada, which was confirmed by Nelson.

"We are in the process of trying to locate a disposal facility now in Canada so they can take care of their own waste," Nelson said.

Nelson confirmed that the Arlington facility has been used by the Department of Defense to dispose of waste from U.S. property in Korea and Guam.

"The Arlington facility has a pretty good track record," EPA's Elliott said. "They are a PCB-permitted disposal facility, and there is no place in this region that can store PCB."

PCB is a highly dangerous cancer-causing agent which is disposed of under the most stringent rules, Elliott explained.

Company officials have maintained that the Red River County site will not be used unless the geology is suitable for the facility.

According to Nelson, the site would not be used for low-level nuclear waste, but could be used to treat, store

and dispose of any other product, including cancer-causing agents.

Ms. Dutton said the EPA does not have regulatory power over the disposal of nuclear waste, and nuclear dumping cannot easily be added to a chemical dump site, just because it exists.

Elliott added that the permitting procedure with both the state and the EPA is such that it will be at least a year before Chem-Nuclear could construct the disposal facility, if they don't have a lot of problems with the permitting process.

Nelson said the disposal facility would employ 20-25 people.

## Red River County Considering Precinct Changes

Red River County is in the process of redistricting the county precincts using the 1980 census information.

The ideal precinct population is set 4,025. Estimated population in Precinct 1 is at 5,353, meaning that to meet ideal standards they should lose 1,328. Precinct 2 has an estimated population of 4,543, needing to lose 518, and Precinct 3 needs to gain 1,011, having only 3,014. Precinct 4 needs to gain 821,

since their estimated population is set at 3,204.

This breaks down to Precinct 1 having 33 percent of the population, Precinct 2, 28 percent, Precinct 3, 19 percent, and Precinct 4, 20 percent. The ideal is each precinct should have 25 percent of the county population.

County Judge Connie Sullivan stated that she foresaw most of the changes coming within the city limits of Clarksville. But some

changes would also be made in the rural areas to help adjust for the wide discrepancies in number of road miles served by the different commissioners.

Among the reasons that redistricting must take place is that the law requires such action each ten years in order to adjust for shifting population.

A citizens committee has been formed to consider the changes needed and assist in considering all factors.

Bogata Rodeo Association is the man contact to enter the contest, and entries are requested as soon as possible.

The Princess contest will be determined as usual by advance ticket sales. Morris Foster is the committee chairman.

Princess entries must have been in grades fourth through seventh in the 1981 school year.

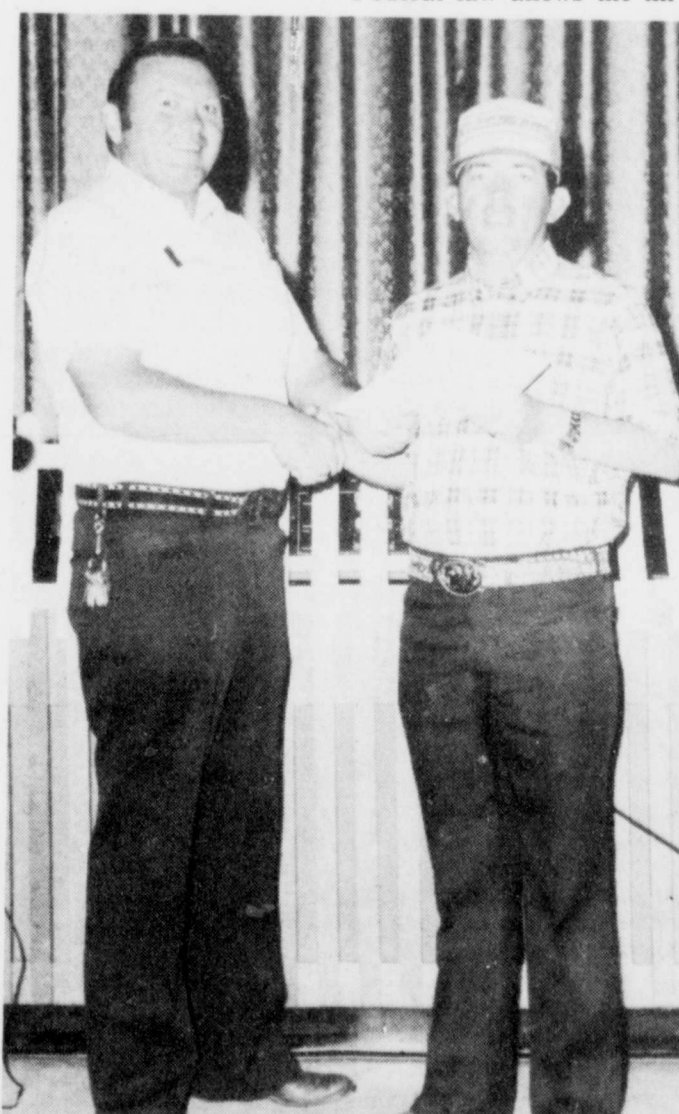

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## Red River, Titus County Commissioners Indicted

James Darwin Floyd, Precinct 4 Commissioner of Red River County, has been indicted along with five other commissioners on charges involving political corruption.

Floyd, Burt Dinnin Parr, Billy Wayne Reynolds and Alvin Parrish Jr., all current Titus County commissioners, and Carthel Herbert Reese, a former Titus County commissioner were all indicted.

Floyd has been a commissioner since 1962.

The indictment, coming from a federal grand jury in Tyler, accuses Floyd of having placed purchase orders for road building and maintenance material which was never delivered and submitting invoices to the county for purchases that were false.

It also alleges Floyd acquired \$2,852 from road and bridge material sales people Dorothy Griffin of Farris, Ok., and Sharon Griffin and Dallas Thompson

of Arling, all by unlawful means. Thompson has pled guilty to charges of racketeering and promotion of illegal acts.

Investigation into the case is expected to last for months. Indictments are just allegations, not proof of guilt, stated U.S. Attorney John Hannah, Jr.

Floyd, if convicted, faces a fine of up to \$10,000 and a maximum jail sentence of 20 years.

### Tiger Lily—Exotic Gift of the Orient

Fans of a long popular comic strip remember Tiger Lily as an exotic Oriental lady. Liliium Tigrinum (Tiger Lily or Ogre Lily) on the other hand, is an exotic member of the lily family that has been cultivated in the Orient for more than a thousand years, originally as a source of food. The Tiger Lily is native to China, Japan and Korea and in these countries the bulbs are still highly valued as a food item and are sold in the market places.

The bulbs are white and broadly ovoid, and are usually about three inches long. Stems are purplish, but covered with white downy hairs. Leaves are dark green. Scentless, orange-red flowers are liberally dotted with purple-brown spots.

Unlike some members of the Lilaceae family, the Tiger Lily needs full sunlight. Lime-free soil with plenty of humus to retain moisture and promote drainage is recommended. Propagation is not simple, as the flowers



are self-sterile. Reproduction is possible from the bulbils in the leaf-axils, however, the flowers may be pollinated artificially for seed.

Tiger Lilies are usually planted in open woodland areas, with shrubs, or grouped in borders. Regular watering is needed to keep soil moist during the growing season.

Tiger Lilies are stem rooting, so bulbs should be planted at least seven inches deep. Flowering time is late summer or early autumn.

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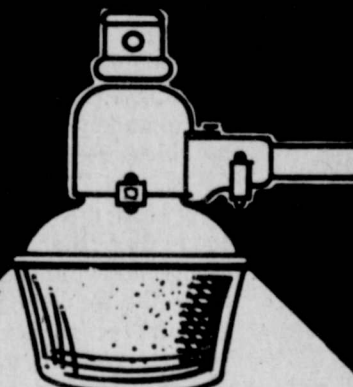
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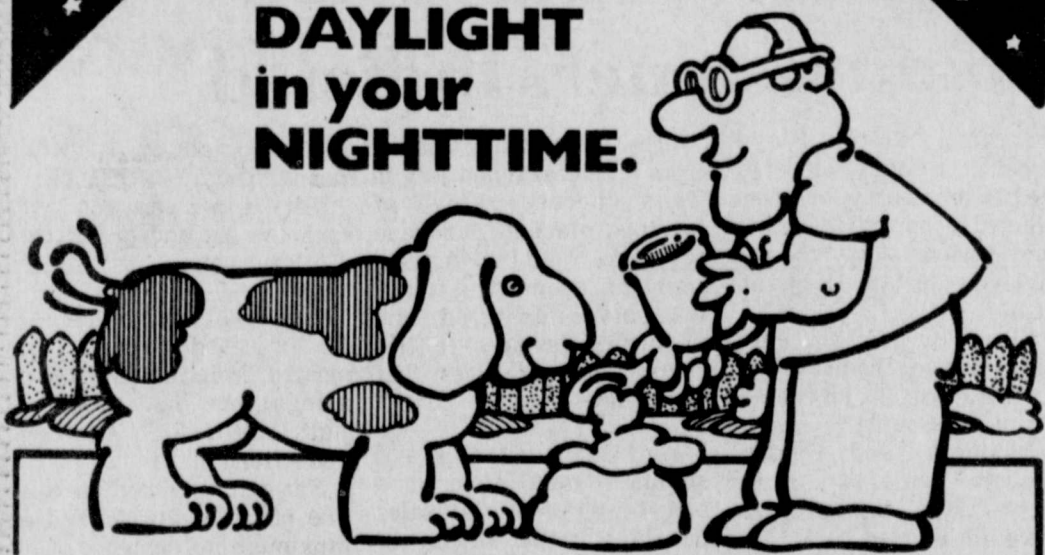
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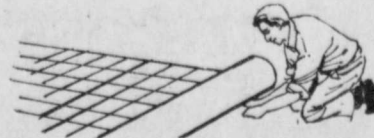

accurate detail accounting of the proposed project.

The resolution was made by motion of Bruce Scott and seconded by Ben Storey, with all voting to approve the resolution.

Permits would have to be issued by both the Texas Department of Water Resources and the Environmental Protection Agency.

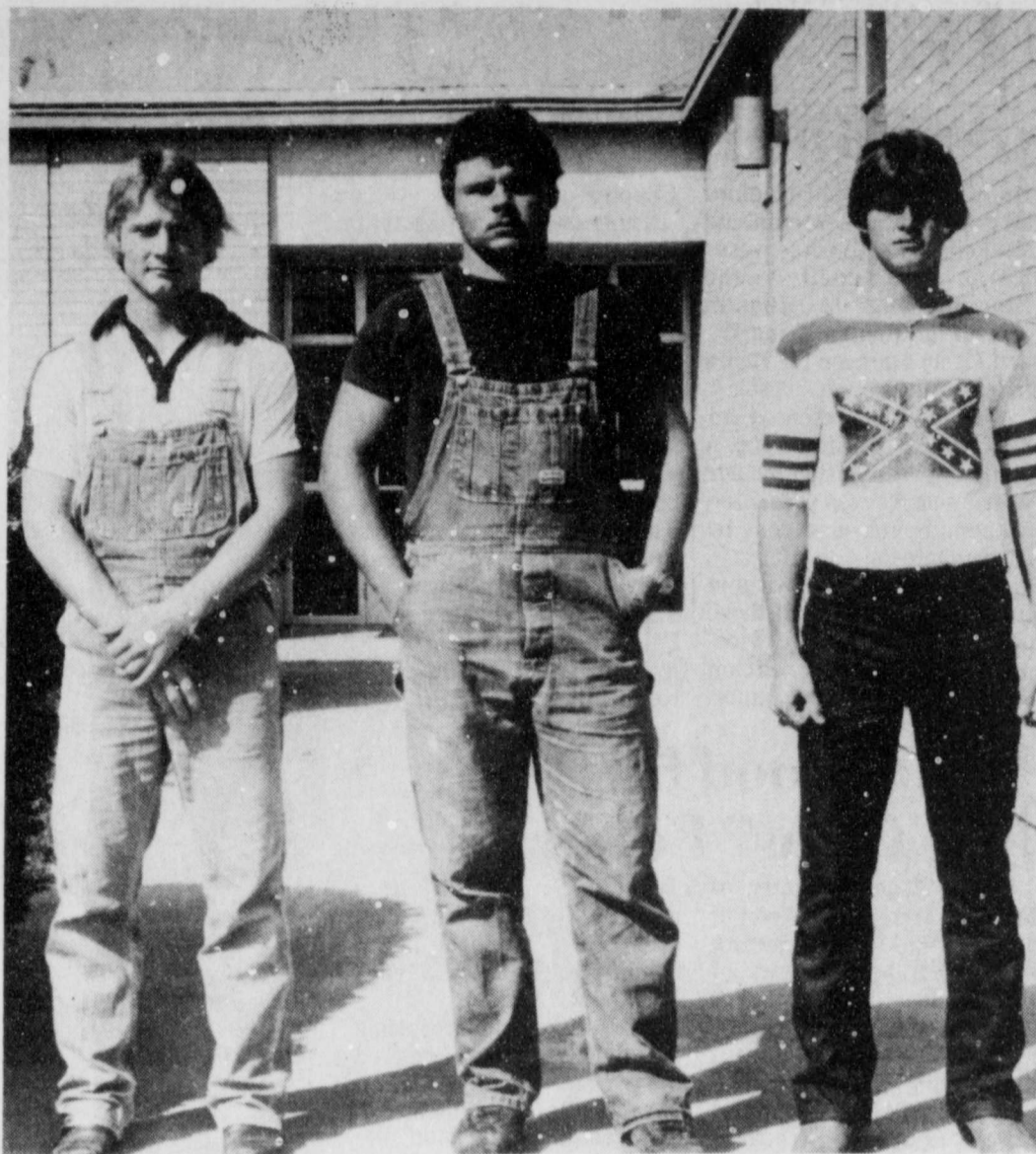
Both agencies would accept a request for permit. After reviewing the request for complete information and accuracy they would then draft an actual permit or deny a permit. If a permit is drafted they would then call public hearings. The Department of Water Resources states that the hearings would be local and only adjoining land owners, downstream land owners and local governments would be considered actual parties to the hearing. All interested persons could attend and anyone would be allowed to speak. The hearing would be held by an impartial hearing examiner. Two hearing examiners names are: Larry Soward, Telephone, 512-475-1311; and Lee Mathews, Telephone, 512-475-1311. Their address is the same as the Department of Water Commission.

After the Water Resource hearing which will be held by the impartial examiner acting as a judge at the hearing. The case will then be presented to the Texas Water Commission for action.

The EPA would hold a similar hearing and run a notice of the hearing in local papers.

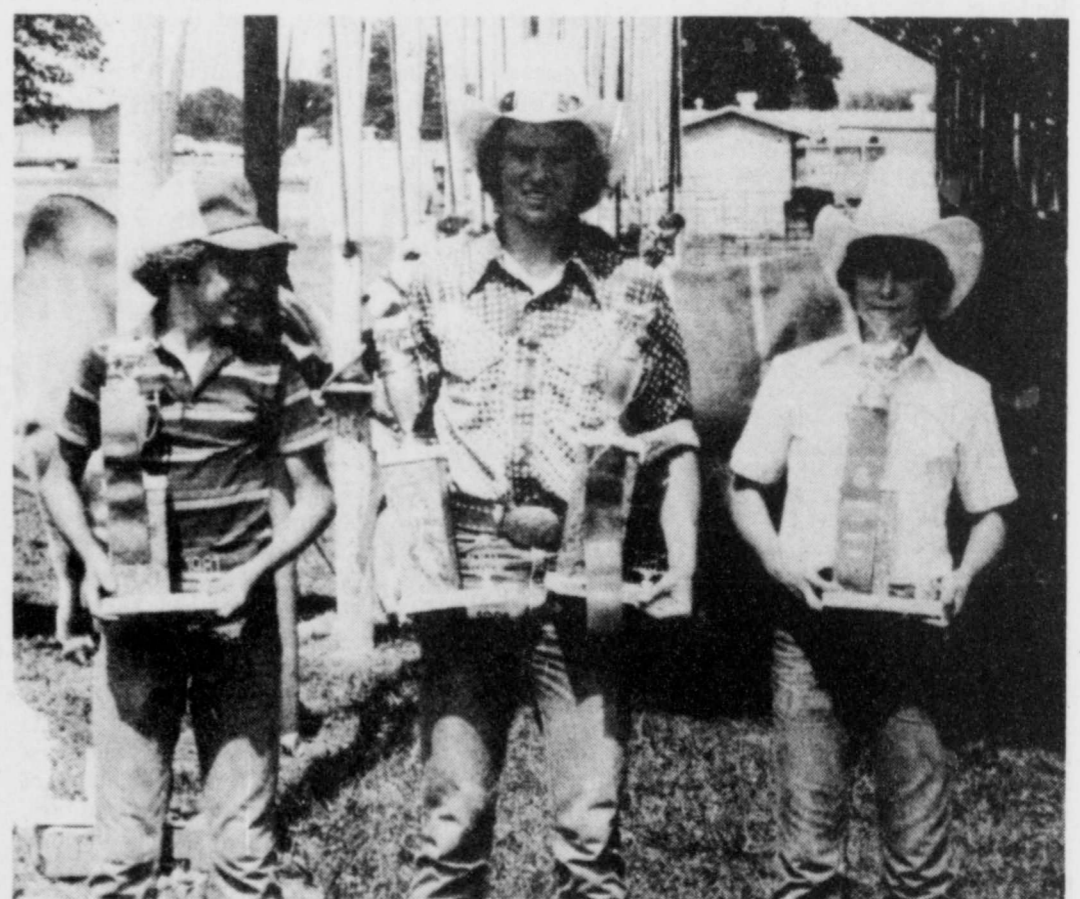

**COUPONS POPULAR**

A recent sampling of Supermarket Consumer Affairs Directors by a trade newsletter, indicated a strong awareness of the benefits of coupons.

A representative from a major supermarket chain in California noted that while it once looked as if coupons were a passing fad, now they appear to be here to stay. "With the current economic situation, everyone wants to get that extra savings (from use of coupons)," she said. Some 76 percent of American households use coupons, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. The Nielsen figures also indicate that 76 percent of coupon users like them very much.

As consumers become more budget conscious, coupon usage rises. A total of 56 percent of the coupon-using households surveyed by Nielsen are using more coupons than they did a year ago.

## Public Notice

An Ordinance amending and changing a franchise ordinance enacted by the city of Bogata, Red River County, Texas on July 30, 1946 and being partly styled, "An ordinance granting to Lone Star Gas Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, a franchise to furnish and supply gas to the general public in the city of Bogata, Red River County, Texas"; and providing for a modification of the definition of the terms "service lines" and "yard lines" referenced in section 4 thereof.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Bogata, Texas:

**SECTION 1.** As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on July 30, 1946, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

**SECTION 1.** In addition to the rates charged for gas

supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping.

**SECTION 2.** Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

**SECTION 3.** The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory
