Frontier Days Events Part Of Rodeo Celebration

June 25-26-27 will be the dates for the annual Bogata Rodeo, with performances scheduled for 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings.

The big celebration will be climaxed on Saturday by the colorful Frontier Day, which this year will be sponsored by the Bogata Lions Club, with Gaylen Legate in charge of the day's activities.

The free pancake and sausage breakfast, a traditional Frontier Day meal, will be served in downtown Bogata from 7 to 9 a.m. on Saturday morning. At 9 a.m. the exciting, traditional turtle auction will be held by buying on of the turtles. This will be followed by the race itself as soon as the entries can be trained and brought to the starting post.

A snack break will come at 10 a.m. with two groups in

the watermelon eating competition: those 14 years and under and youngsters 15 and over trying for prizes and recognition, as well as messy faces.

The Ugliest Man judging is next with the top award going to the really big ugly of Bogata and surrounding territory.

Those having a possible contestant in mind are urged to contact him to be present for this event at 10:30 a.m.

Those disgusted by the whole thing who fancy their spitting ability may participate in the tobacco-spitting event following. Contestants must provide their own tobacco.

Then comes the big egg-throwing event, with two categories of contestants, youngsters, and adults. In this sporting event teams of two throw an egg back and forth at increasing distances with the couple avoiding the

inevitable "smush" the longest winning.

Eggs will be provided to the contestants to eliminate any possibility of hard-boiled ringers.

At 11:30 a.m. folks will begin throwing their weight around in the tug-of-war with one contest for men and the other for the ladies.

Joe Kelsy and Johnnie Hudson are planning the activities for the rodeo events, including the two big parades, one to open the celebration at 5 p.m. on Thursday and the grand parade at 6 p.m. on Saturday to officially end Frontier Day.

Gerald Smith's Wing Rodeo Company will produce the rodeo event as usual providing the very finest in Rodeo stock.

Bill Buckman, chairman, is still seeking entries in the Rodeo Queen Contest, with the entry deadline being

June 10th.

Young ladies between the ages of 14 and 21 years, living within 25 miles of Bogata, and who have never been married are urged to enter the competition. Western attire is required and those participating will be asked to ride in the parades and rodeo grand entries.

The parade on Saturday will follow the same procedure except that it will be much larger and will include several Shriner Units from as far away as Dallas and Texarkana. Northeast Texas Prime Dumpsite

Northeast Texas will continue to be a prime area for location for a chemical waste disposal site, even if a proposed site in Red River County proves not to be feasible, a spokesman for Chem-Security Systems, Inc., of Bellevue, Wash., said Tuesday.

"There is a need for industrial waste disposal in the area," Roger Nelson, business development manager for the company said Tuesday, adding, "We won't be giving up on Northeast Texas. There's too much potential for growth in the area."

"Not having a site in Northeast Texas is a worse crime than having one," Nelson continued, indicating that the waste is probably being disposed of improperly.

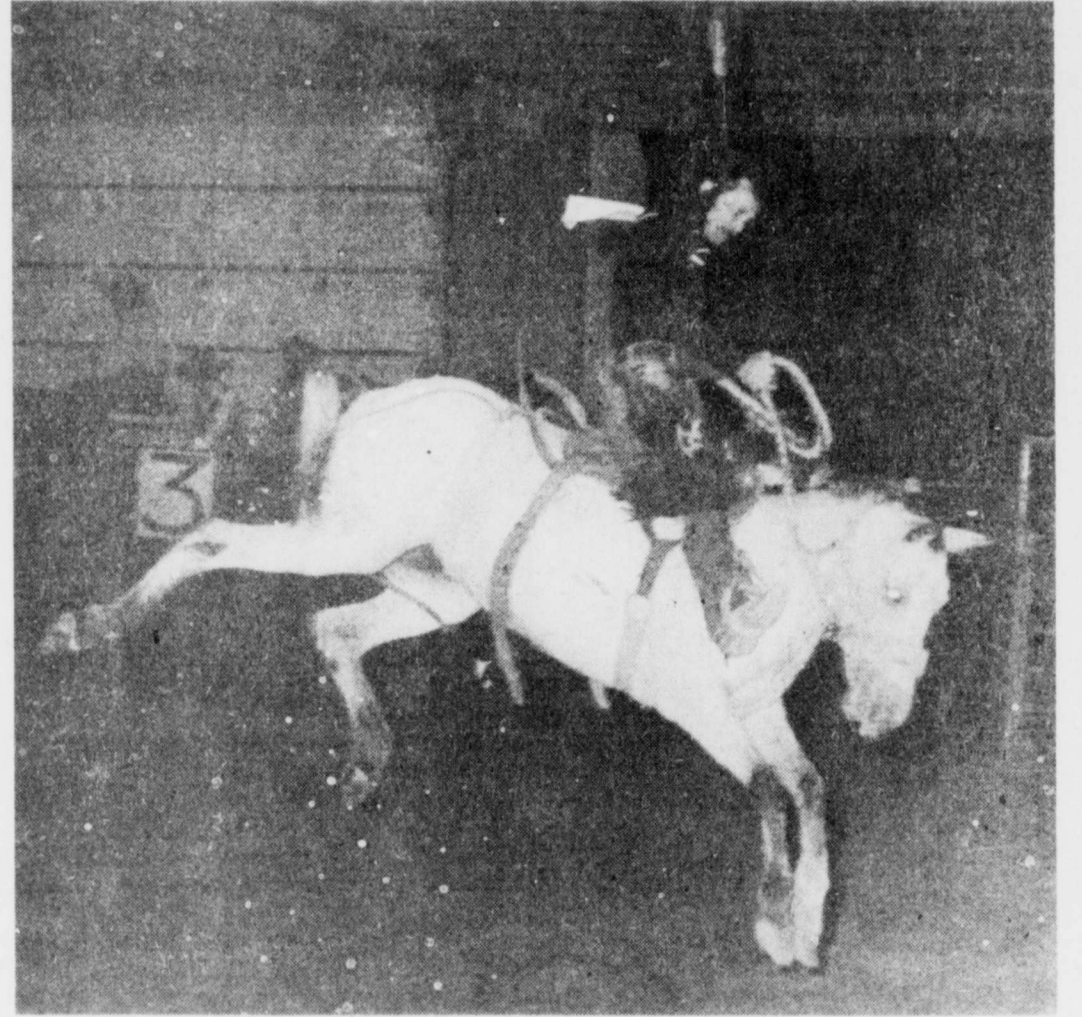
Chem-Security has proposed an industrial waste disposal site for southwest Red River County on a 310 acre site owned by John

Ward of Fulbright. An option to purchase the land is on file in the office of Red River County Clerk Mary Hausler.

Since the proposed site became public, a group formed in opposition to the site, the Sulphur River Watershed Concerned Citizens Association has been formed, which has retained Clarksville attorney Jim D. Lovett.

Nelson denied Tuesday that Chem-Security has any corporate ties with Southwest Nuclear, Inc., a firm which tried to locate a low-level nuclear waste dump in Delta County, then near Roxton.

Nelson added that eighty to ninety percent in areas where Chem-Security sites are located are happy with the facilities once it is in place, but that the company always faces strong opposition before it can prove itself to be a good neighbor.

Red River Co. Concerned Citizens Oppose Chemical Dump

The concerned Citizens of Red River County met June 2, 1981 at the Chamber of Commerce Meeting Room in Clarksville.

P.C. Abernathy spoke on the opposition the proposal to build a chemical Waste Dump in Red River County had brought. He asked the people to write their state and Federal representatives and stated that an attorney had been retained to represent the group, but that donations were needed for the attorney fees. Fees for a geologist and other expenses also make donations needed to defeat the issuance of a permit to construct such a dump, Abernathy stated. He also asked that donations be deposited at the First National Bank of Deport, or

be mailed to P.C. Abernathy, Rt. 1, Box 349, Bogata, Tx. 75417 or to Mrs. Jane O'Neal, Cunningham, Tx.

Mrs. Jane O'Neal stressed to the group that it would probably take a long time to defeat the project, and asked that people not get discouraged.

County Judge Connie Sullivan spoke to the group about the redistricting, which is necessary each ten years after a population census is completed. She displayed a map of Red River County and showed the possibilities that are being considered.

Coral Moriland discussed some of the problems that CARS is faced with at this time.

The July meeting of Concerned Citizens will be held

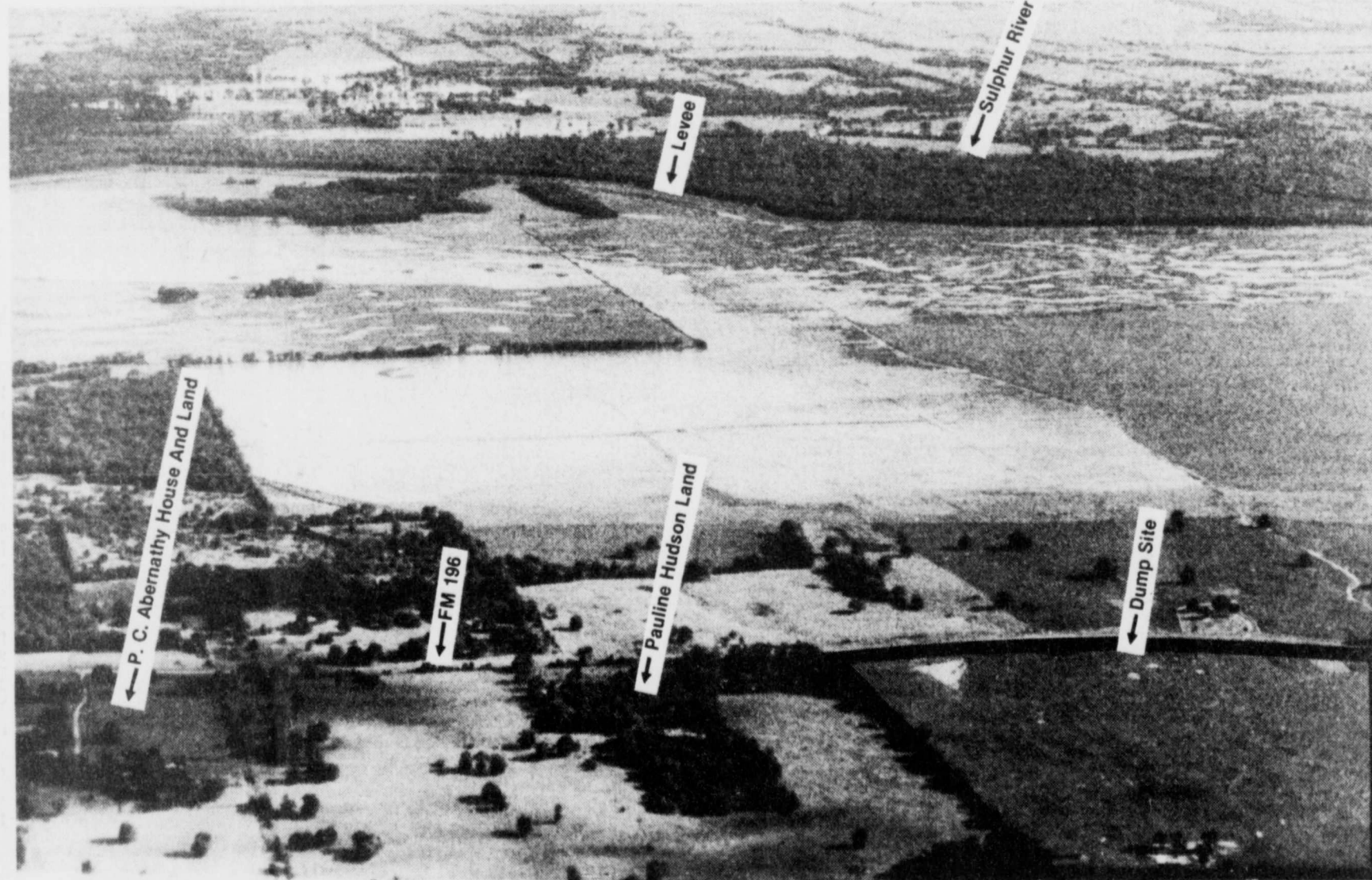

Champion Bronc Rider To Compete

Since he developed a superlative "lick", the saddle bronc rider in the 1980 CRA came down to one man, Calvin Merriman. A long time bronc rider, Merriman has developed into a consistent winner at most rodeos. He traveled hard in 1980 competing at almost all CRA rodeos and won the championship at the finals in October.

Calvin is not only one of the best in the business, but he is also one of the nicest. He is always around to help a contesting cowboy in the chutes or in the arena. He has been active in the CRA

for the last three years and is currently the Saddle Bronc Director of the Association.

Merriman placed in three go rounds at the CRA finals, Sulphur Springs in October but failed to win the average. All in all he had a great year in 1980 and will be one of the leading contestants at the Bogata rodeo June 25, 26, and 27.

The Saddle Bronc event has been termed the "classic" event of rodeo and it is a great contest to see. The cowboy has a bucking rein to help keep his balance but most use the rein very little. They spur with a

"lick" all the way to the broncs shoulders and then back to the cantle of the saddle with toes out and a loose rein. This will cause judges to score more points for the cowboy than when he is dependent on the bucking rein and holds with his spurs.

The rules of the contest favor the bucking horse. The cowboy must have his spurs in the horses shoulder the first jump out of the chute and have a good spurring action for the balance of the eight second ride. Make plans to attend the CRA Rodeo in Bogata.

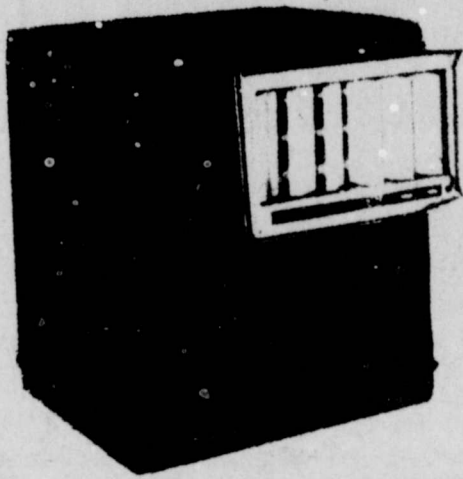

Col. Conn Anderson

Funeral services were held Monday at Auburn United Methodist Church for Col. B. Conn Anderson, who died Thursday night in Tuskegee in Veterans Administration Hospital after a long illness.

The Rev. Jim Dannelly will conduct the service. Burial followed in Pine Hill Cemetery on Armstrong Street.

Col. Anderson, 96, had been active until recent months when his health failed and he was confined to his home on Cary Drive.

The Texas native was a career officer in the U.S. Army. He entered the service in 1917 upon this country's entry into World War I. He was a member of the first officer training camp at Leon Springs, Texas.

The Andersons first lived here in 1925-30 while he was on ROTC duty. In 1928 he became one of the prime movers in organizing the Auburn Kiwanis Club. He signed the letter to Kiwanis International requesting a charter for a local and became its first president.

An alumnus of the University of Texas at Austin, Col. Anderson was born in Lamar County in northeast Texas near the little town of Deport. He attended rural schools and worked on a farm and then was a telephone lineman for a while. He was headmaster of a military school in Texas before joining the Army in 1917.

Although 60 years of age when he departed the Army and came to Auburn, he plunged into a variety of civic endeavors in which he was active at different intervals over the next quarter century. These included member of the city's first Water Board, following the purchase of the system from Alabama Power Company, chairman of the Lee County Tax Equalization Board, commissioner of the Auburn Boy Scout program and member of the area Alabama-Georgia council, president of Friends of the Library, and president of the old Inter-Club Council. He was member of the United Methodist Church.

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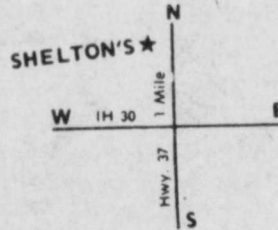
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Tippin-Davis Exchange Vows

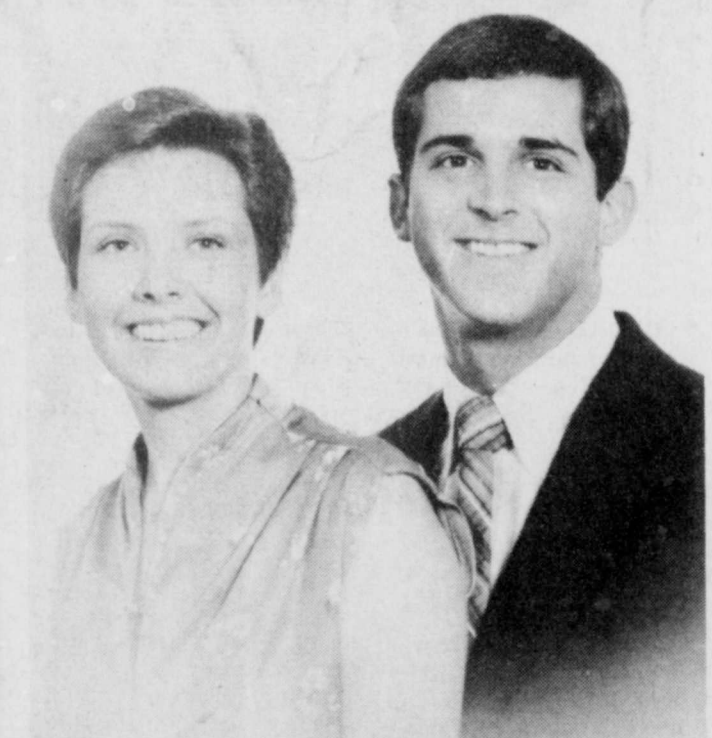

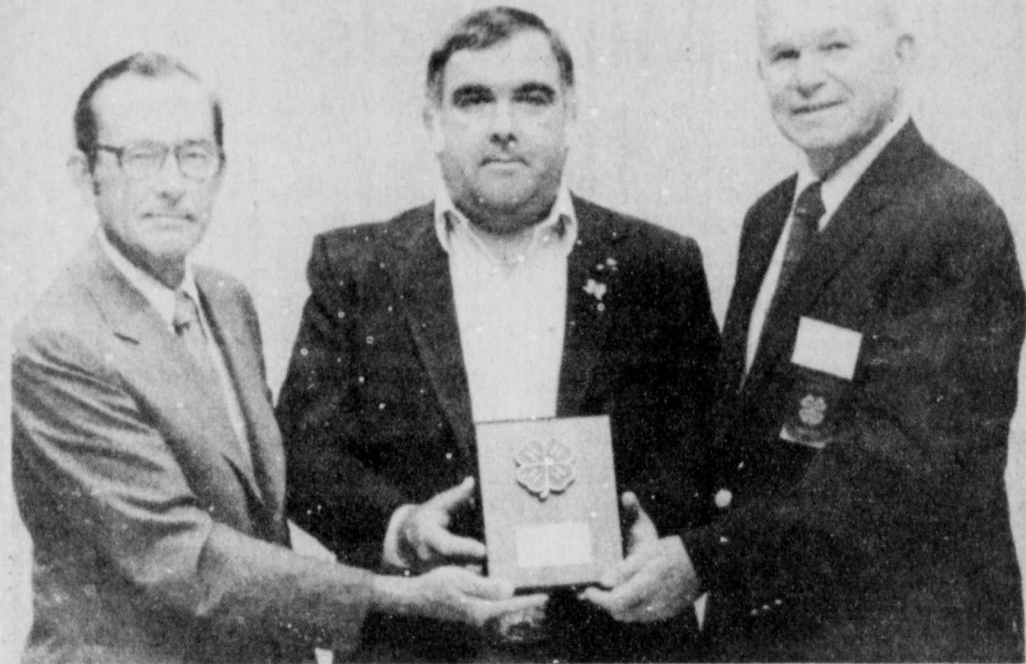

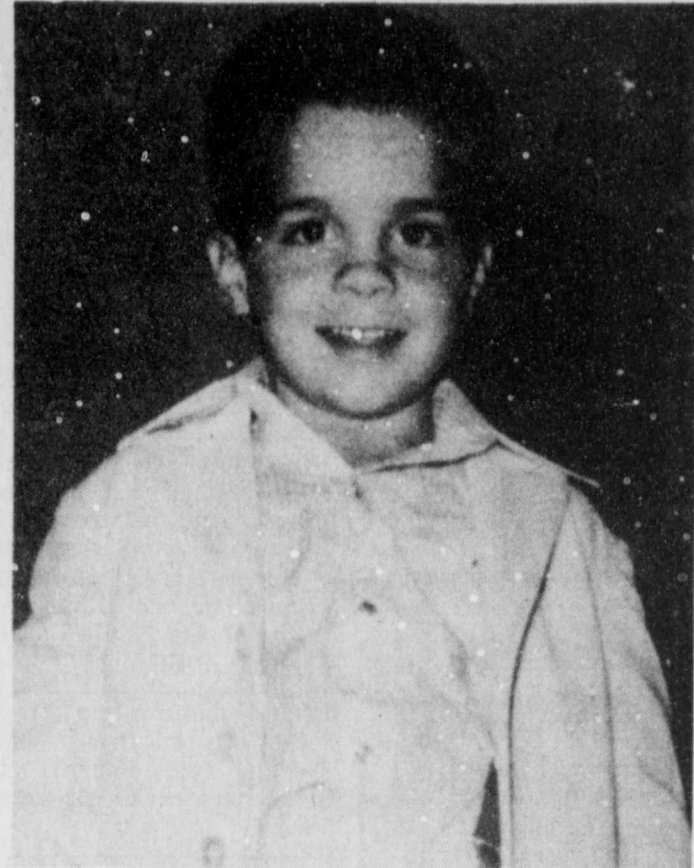
