Three Places Open On School Board

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools has called a school trustee election to be held on Saturday, April 3, 1982 for

the purpose of electing three trustees. The positions of Kenneth Jeffery, A.D. Stephenson, and Gene Smith are expiring.

One three-year term is to be filled from Bogata; one three-year term is to be filled from Talco; and one one-year term at large will be

filled from either Talco or Bogata. All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election

shall be in writing, signed by the candidate, and filed at the superintendent's office at Rivercrest by 4:30 p.m. on March 3, 1982. Voting boxes will be at the Bogata and Talco Elementary Schools

and the polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on April 3rd. Absentee voting is to be from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. from March 15th to March 30th at Rivercrest High School.

Weather Affects Rebs Performance

The winter weather has once again taken its toll on the Rivercrest cagers. The periodic showers of sleet Friday caused not only a dismissal of school, but a cancellation of Friday nights games and a rescheduling of them Saturday night.

But the bad weather did not seem to effect the Rebels and Rebelettes last Tuesday night as they hosted James Bowie and sent the Simms cagers home wishing they had not come in the first place.

The Rebelettes started the night right as they jumped out to a first quarter lead of 23 points while holding the lady Pirates scoreless. The Rebelettes quite handily commanded the contest and finished it on top 59-17.

Veronica Howerton led scoring for the Rebelettes with 21 points & sophomore Nelda Anderson had twelve. The Rebels took the honors of the second part of the romp as they held a devastating 47-8 lead by half time. The Rebs went on to post a 73-21 victory over the Pirates.

Senior post David Wisinger was top scorer for Rivercrest with 24 points. John Hines added 12 and David Rozell netted ten.

Saturday the Rebels squads traveled to Maud to take on the Cardinals in the delayed contest. The Rebelettes, playing one of their best games of the season, made sure the lady Cardinals stayed in second place as they rallied in the second half to post a 55-34 victory.

Senior Veronica Howerton again led scoring with 28 points. Jean Ann Norman added ten more.

The Rebelettes are now 22-2 on the season and a perfect 9-

0 in district play. The Rebels, hit hard by sickness from the weather and injuries suffered in practice and previous games, gave up their second district loss of the season causing their changes of claiming the district title rather slim.

The Rebs fell behind in the first quarter but came back to tie the Cardinals at 25 by half time. But the Cardinals were running as smoothly as a well-oiled machine and the injured Rebels could not keep up the pace. The Cardinals held a 72-52 lead as the final buzzer rang and ended some of the Rebs hope of gaining a district championship.

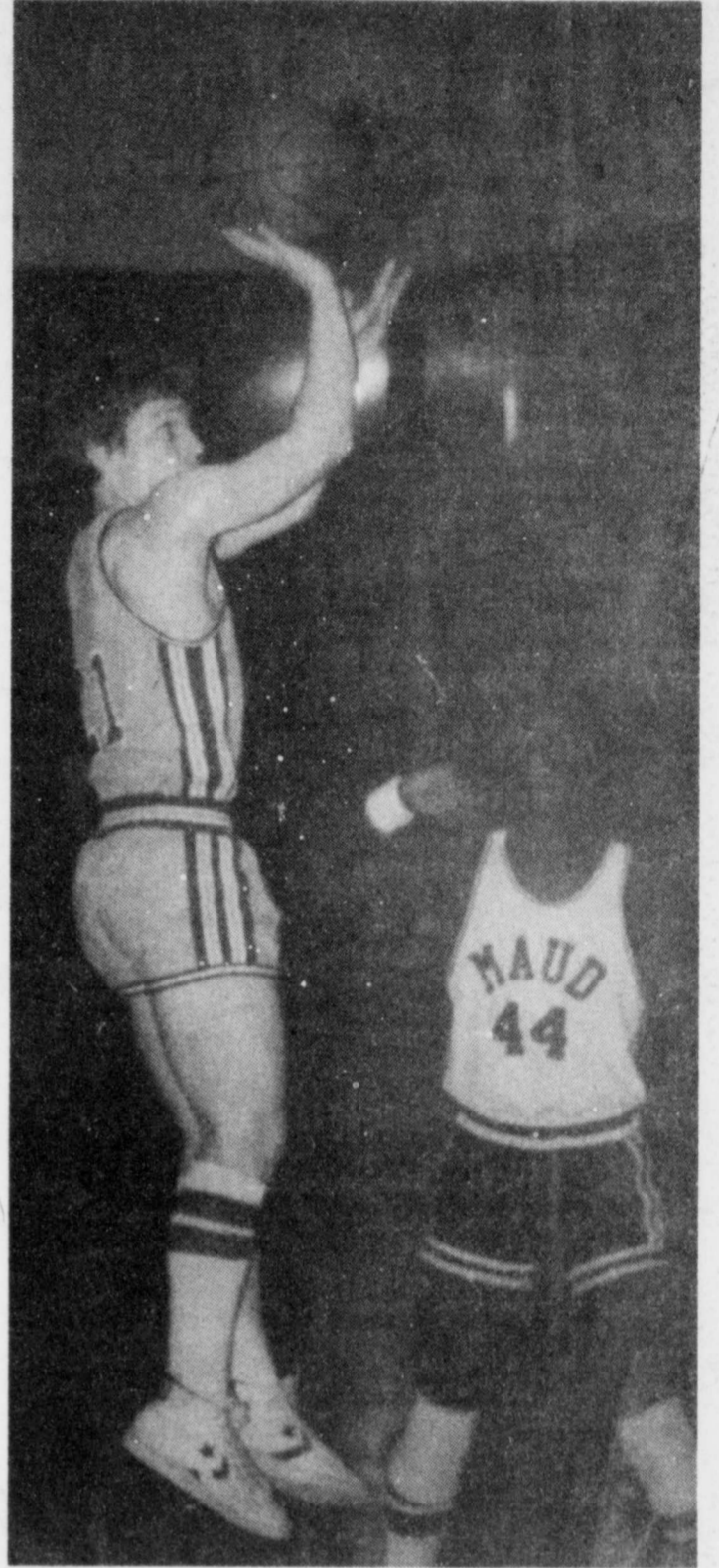
Stan Wood held top scorer honors with 30 points and John Hines added ten to that. The Rebels now post a record of 18-8 for the season and 6-2 district standing.

The Rivercrest freshman boys and junior varsity girls teams saw action on the road last week. Last Monday the freshmen boys traveled to Springhill and dropped a close, hard-fought contest 45-41. The Rebs played a good game and led on many occasions, but found themselves behind when the final period had ended.

Hayden Martin and John Easley led scoring for the young Rebel team with 13 points each. Anthony Brown put in eight more.

The junior varsity girls traveled to Maud Saturday to play the Cardinals in an early contest. The young Rebelettes jumped out to a 15-0 lead in the first quarter and went on to post a 48-18 victory.

Five foot nine center Staci Thompson led scoring for the Rebelettes with 13 points. Deborah Moore had 12 and Becky Brooks netted nine. The victory boosted the Rebelettes record to 15-2.

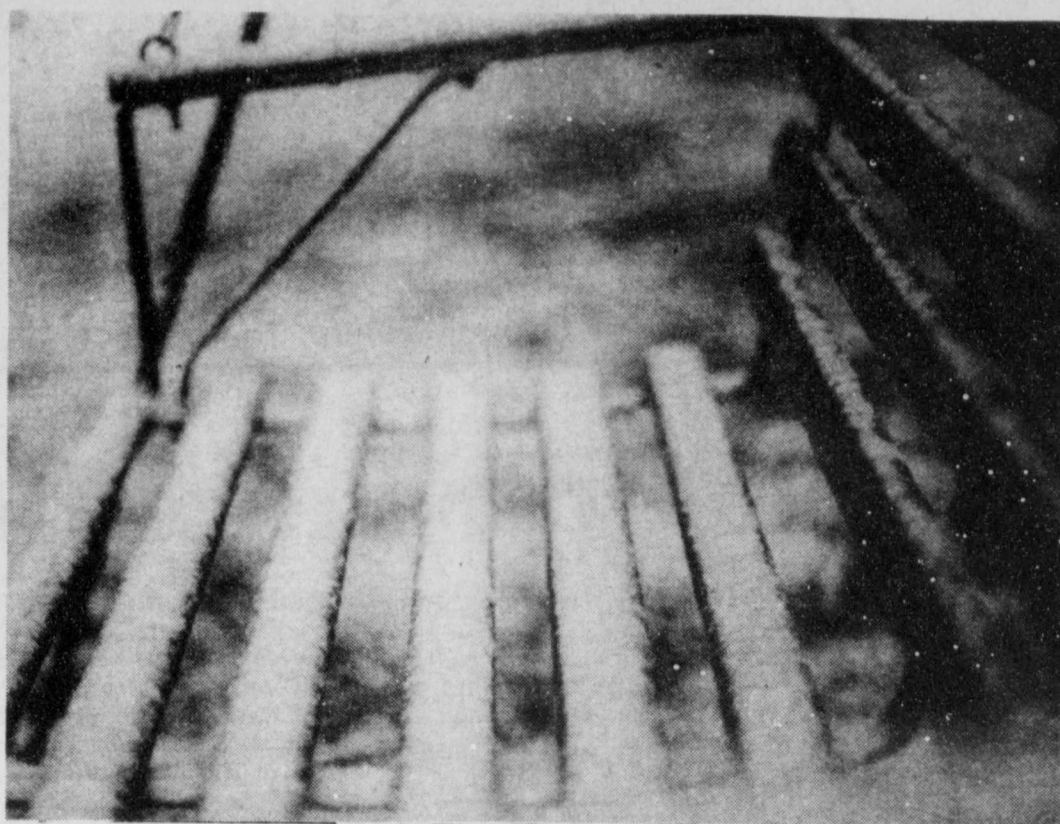

His pastimes are hunting, fishing and caring for his small herd of cattle.

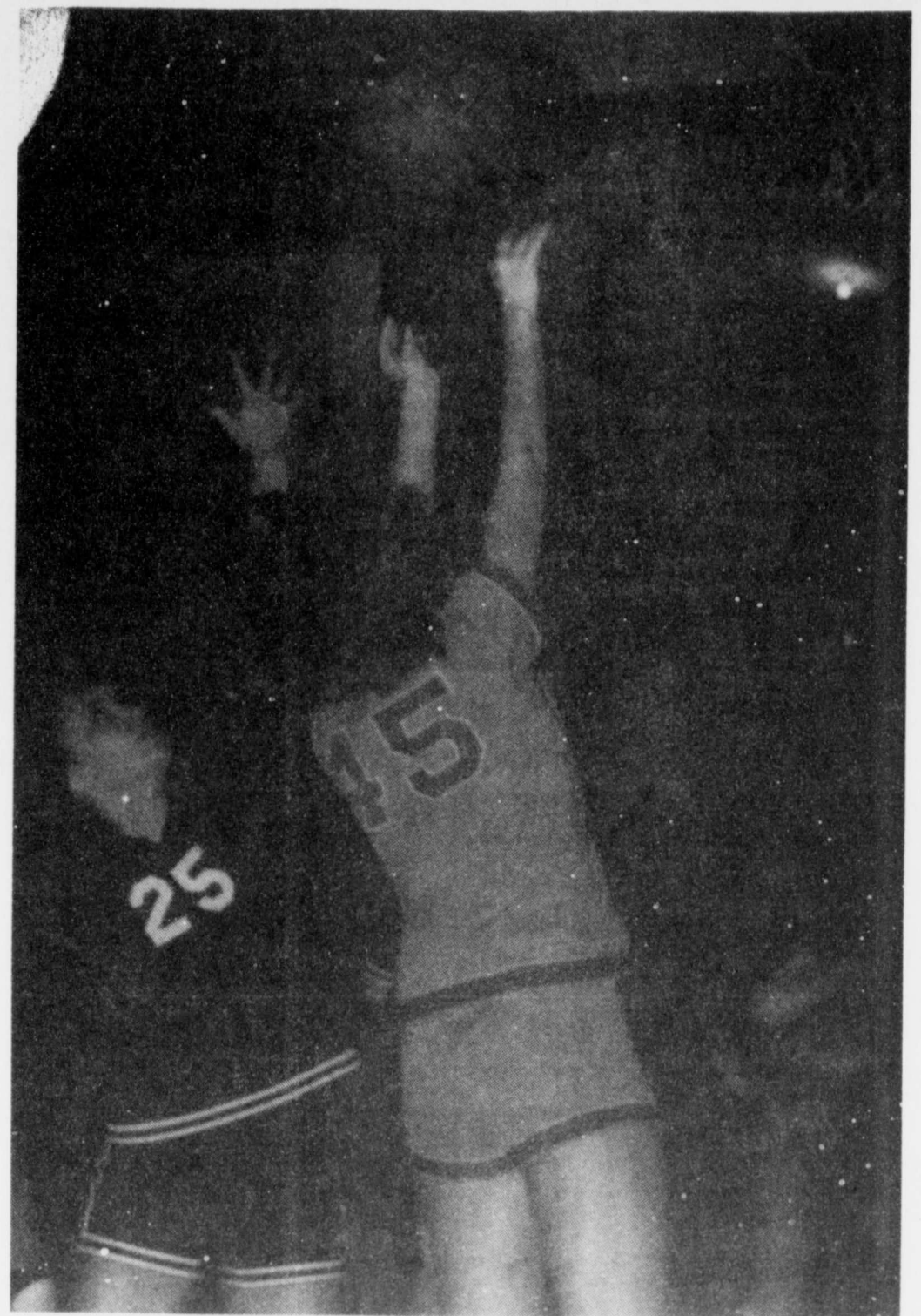

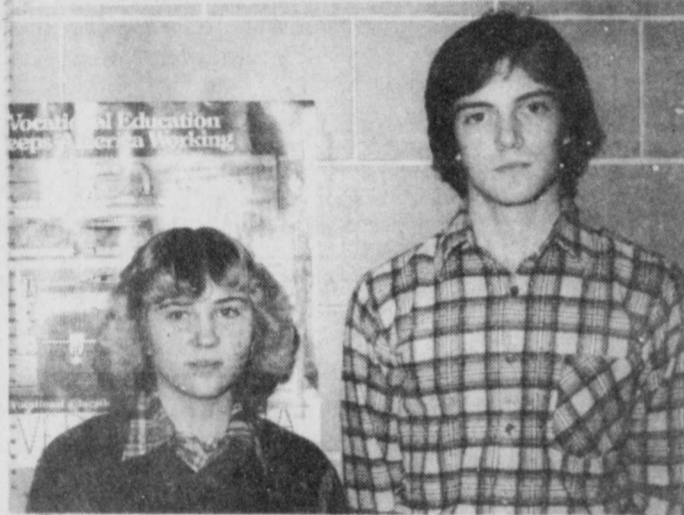

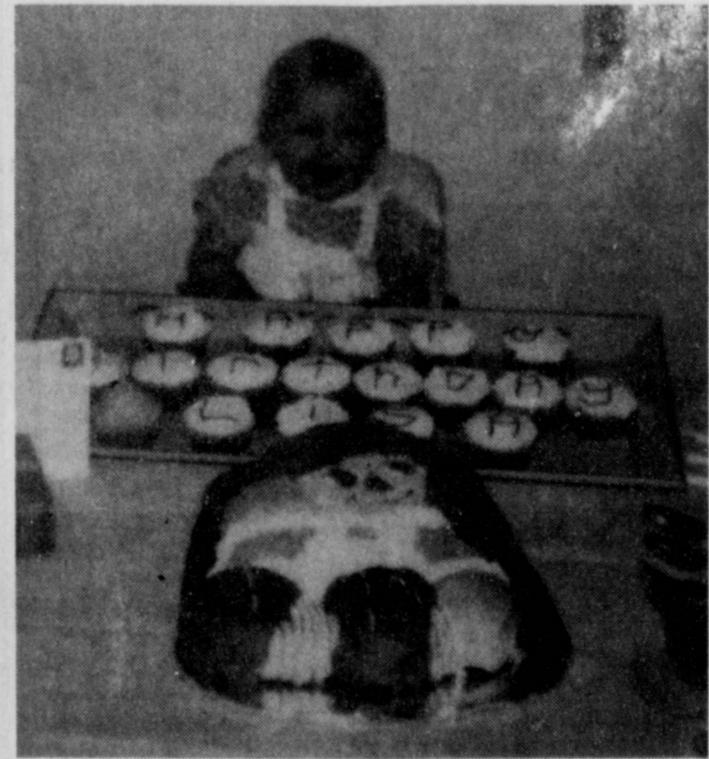
