Beckham, known to me to be a credible person who being by me first duly sworn, deposes and says: "I was assistant Secretary of the Texas Delegation to the Democratic National Convention at Baltimore in the summer of 1912, and as such accompanied several members of that delegation on the trip from Texas to Baltimore. In the party from Texas was Jas. E. Ferguson, now candidate for Governor of Texas, who, however was not a delegate, but accompanied members of the delegation merely as a guest, he being a friend of some one or more of the delegation, who asked that he be permitted to go with as in the Pullman set apart for

our use. That Mr. Ferguson occupied the stateroom, and had with him as his guest therein, several members of the delegation at various times. That once or twice during the trip affiant was with other members of the delegation in Mr. Ferguson's stateroom, and on one of these occasions witnessed a game of cards therein, which affiant was told, and understood to be a game of poker. Affiant did not participate in the game but Mr. Ferguson was playing on said occasion, and it was generally understood that cards were played in Mr. Ferguson's stateroom frequently during the trip.

Before me, the undersigned authority, personally appeared G. F. Love, who resides at Sulphur Springs, Route 5, Belton, Texas, and upon his oath says

that he has resided there since 1884, and that his homestead adjoins the old Ferguson homestead where Jim Ferguson, the present candidate for Governor was reared; and that he has known James E. Ferguson since he was a small boy.

That sometime about 1896 Jas. E. Ferguson, the present candidate for Governor resided on the home place adjoining my farm; it was generally understood in the community at that time that Jim was running a monte game for negroes; he was considered a very slick gambler and made plenty of money off the negroes in that community, however, one Sunday afternoon Jim came to me and told me that these dam negroes had skinned him out of all his money at the monte game and asked me for a loan of \$10. with which to continue the game Sunday night. He said "I can skin them all right at night," or words to that effect. The next time I saw Jim he told me he "got them" and paid me back the ten dollars that I let him have.

It was rumored at that time and there are people who report it now that Jim, on that Sunday after going broke at the game of monte borrowed about \$30 from one of his negro patrons and give his check on the bank for the money; this check it is re-

ported was not paid at the bank and it is understood that Jim stopped payment on the same. It is my recollection that Jim told me himself that payment had been stopped.

POKER PLAYING POLITICIANS Turn States Evidence

The last days of the campaign, have developed a search of the entire life of the leading candidates for governor. They both have been charged with gaming. We only wish that every voter, who rejoices in such exposures, would have his life exposed by his former friends, as has been done in the case of Ball and Ferguson. Suppose the brainless yap, who was in the northwest part of the hall at Rule last Monday, who went wild with delight as his open mouth caught the morsels of muck, had the power to run things in this county, would we not have mess of politics? It is the ignorant vicious element, who swallow muck with joy and loves a corrupt politician. But these fellows are getting in the minority. The political colonels gained prominence by appealing to the vicious element in humanity. Take away the new arrivals from Europe and the Mexicans and the stand pat bunch will lose all their colonels, for the lovers of muck are few. alleging the claim of plaintiff and
derendants as follows:

Plaintiff claims title to said
property by reason of the follow-
ing facts: (a) The Estate of N.
S. Walton, deceased, is the com-
mon source of title between plain-
tiff and defendants, and plaintiff
holds the same by reason of his
appointment and qualification as
executor under the last will and
testament of N. S. Walton, deceas-

to secure payment of said note,
same bearing interest at eight per
cent per annum from date, pay-

ten per cent additional as at-
torneys fees. (c) That neither
the principal nor the interest of
said note nor any part thereof has
ever been paid, though long since
past due. (d) That said note
has been placed in the hands of
H. G. McConnell, an attorney at
law, with instructions from this

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Articles XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution--Providing for Authorizing Counties Bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to Build Seawalls

[S. J. R. No. 22.]
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls by adding Section 7a, so as to authorize such counties to build sea-walls and designate sea-wall reclamation districts for the protection of life and property from storm overflow, and to build or condemn land for sea-wall and reclamation districts, the county to have State's title to the roads and bay shore line to low tide within the district, and the right to issue district bonds for acquiring and developing the district and building the sea-walls, and when district is developed as townsite to sell such portions of the land as not reserved for public use by the county.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas be proposed to the voters of the State of Texas for their adoption in accordance with law, and that the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to add Section 7a of Article XI, and that Section 7a of Article XI shall read as follows to-wit:

Section 7a. Where protection against the waters of the Gulf of Mexico is needed for protection of life, health, property or the sea-wall, any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico may acquire title to the land for said sea-wall or sea-wall reclamation district as designated by the county Commissioners' court by purchase or condemnation of all the land desired for sea-wall and land for the sea-wall reclamation district from the sea-wall to bay shore tide line boundary of the property abutting on the bay, and the State hereby cedes to the county, for such district, for reclamation and general uses of the district, the title to bay shore lands in the district between the property tide line boundary and the low tide line of the bay shore, and any land in the reclamation district that may have been retained by the Republic of Texas of (or) the State for roads when the lands adjacent were platted and sold, and the county is given the right to dredge in the bay or in the gulf for fill for the district, and right to sell the land when reclaimed and laid off as townsite or otherwise, and where condemnation is used to acquire the land the proceedings to be as under the Statutes for condemnation for railroads, provided that the condemnation shall vest title in fee in the coun-

ty, and county may issue bonds or other evidence of district indebtedness for acquiring the property, building the sea-wall, reclamation developments and all incident thereto as expenses of sea-wall and reclamation district, with lien on land and such terms and conditions as county, through its commissioners' court may deem best, and the county commissioners' court shall appoint two persons who are owners of land within the district, and who desire to sell for reclamation and buy back from the county when reclaimed, who, with the county judge as chairman, shall continue a sea-wall reclamation district commission, whose compensation shall be fixed by the court, and this commission has power to make all rules and regulations for acquiring the land of district sea-wall building, reclaiming and plating land of district, issuing bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for same, subject, however, to all such rules, regulations and acts of the commission being authorized and approved and ratified by county commissioners' court. The district must bear all expenses of sea-wall and purchase of the land and expenses of filing (filling) same and other expenses, and the same shall not in any way involve the credit of the county or be a basis for a tax by the county on general lands of the county unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the property taxpayers of the county voting at a special election therefor. It is further provided that any owner of land in a proposed district may subscribe and pay for the district commission, when organized, as the pro rata of his land of the expense of the wall, reclamation, platting as town lots on a basis as such area of land is to be the whole land of the reclamation district and sea-wall, and at any time before the completion of the district may surrender the bonds and receive from the county a bond for title for his land in town lots, less streets and alleys deducted therefrom, for which on surrender deed may be demanded from the county after the district is walled, filled and platted into streets, alleys and lots, and bonds so bought shall so provide. It is further provided that no district shall be formally designated by the county commissioners' court until owners of at least one-half of the proposed area of district petition therefor, and subscribe out for bonds for repurchase from the county as herein provided. This amendment may be acted on without delay of legislation in aid thereof, or legislative action may be had in furtherance thereof if desired by the county, acting through its commissioners' court. Be it further resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas for their ratification and adoption at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and at such election those favoring the ratification and adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls;" and those opposing the adoption and ratification of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." Proclamation of such election shall be made by the Governor, as required by the Constitution and the law, and there is appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the ex-

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution, Providing for the Initiative and Referendum.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend Section 1, of Article 3, of the constitution of the state of Texas, so as to give to the people, or reserve to them, the power to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any act of the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read:

Section 1. The legislative powers of this State shall be vested in a Senate and House of Representatives, which, together, shall be styled "The Legislature of the State of Texas," but the people reserve to themselves power, as here-in provided, to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any law, or any part of any law enacted by the Legislature. The Legislature shall provide by law for submitting to the vote of the people, upon the petition of twenty per cent. of the qualified voters of the State the enactment of laws and the approval or rejection of any law enacted by the Legislature.

Be it further resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas: that the above and foregoing is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Texas for members of the Legislature, for their adoption or rejection as a part of the Constitution of this State, and shall be voted on by such electors at the regular elec-

tion of officers to be held throughout the State, on the Second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and those voting for the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum." And the foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four consecutive weeks, commencing at least three months before the election at which it is to be voted upon, in one weekly newspaper in each county in this State, in which such a newspaper may be published. The Governor shall make proclamation of such election upon said proposed amendment by publication as aforesaid, and as required by the Constitution and laws, and the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is now appropriated out of any fund in the Treasury nor otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of making such proclamation and publication and holding said election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Section 24, Article 3 of the Constitution Increasing Compensation of the Legislature and Extending Length of Regular Session.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section No. 24, of

Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of State officers, or at a previous general election, in case a general election for the State shall be sooner ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, and extension of term of regular sessions, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

Section 24. The members of the Legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200.00) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the Legislature is held, payable in equal installments on the Twentieth days of January, April, July, and October of the year in which the regular session is held, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held in the year next succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes, and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, at the first general election to be held in this State. Those favor-

ing the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution increasing compensation of the Legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the Legislature." Those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot the words: "Against amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution increasing compensation of the members of the Legislature and extending the term of regular sessions of the Legislature."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated, out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.
